The Commissioners' Court of Wheeler County, Texas met in regular session on Monday, May 22, 2023, at 9:00 a.m., in the Wheeler County Courthouse at 401 Main Street, Wheeler, Texas, to consider prior bills and discuss matters of mutual concern and to take action on the 28 items on the agenda.

Judge McDowell called the meeting to order and offered the prayer.

Court was opened for public comment and none was offered.

The county treasurer's report was accepted.

No Budget Amendments were presented.

The line-item transfers presented were approved by the court.

No action was taken on the Burn Ban.

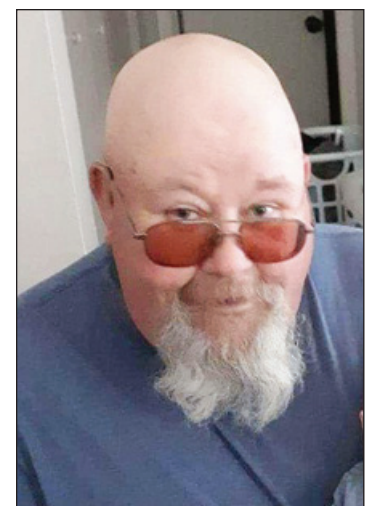

USDA Previews Emergency Relief Assistance

for Agricultural Producers Who Incurred Losses Due to 2022 Natural Disaster Events

Additional payments on the way for livestock producers impacted by drought and wildfire in 2021.

WASHINGTON, May 19, 2023 — Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack today announced plans to roll out \$3.7 billion in Emergency Relief Program (ERP) and Emergency Livestock Relief Program (ELRP) assistance to crop and livestock producers who sustained losses due to a qualifying natural disaster event in calendar year 2022. USDA is sharing early information to allow producers time to gather documents in advance of program delivery. Through distribution of remaining funds, USDA is also concluding the 2021 ELRP program by sending payments in the amount of 20% of the initial ELRP payment to all existing recipients.

On May 1, 2023, Southwestern Public Service Company ("SPS"), doing business as Xcel Energy, filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas ("Commission") for authority to revise its fuel factor formula for its Texas retail jurisdiction by approving a new formula that SPS uses to calculate its fuel factors. The filing has been assigned Docket No. 54952. If the Commission approves SPS's revised fuel factor formula, SPS will propose new fuel factors derived from the formula, which will affect all SPS Texas retail customers and retail rate classes within its Texas service territory. The revised fuel factors will affect only the fuel portion of rates charged by SPS in Texas and will not affect SPS's non-fuel base rates.

This fuel factor formula revision is necessary due to several factors including (1) increasingly volatile natural gas prices, (2) changes in load forecasts, (3) margins from off-system sales, and (3) the net capacity factors at SPS's Hale and Sagamore Wind Projects. Although SPS will revise its fuel factors in a separate proceeding, SPS provides the following table to demonstrate the fuel factors (differentiated by customer voltage level) that result from SPS's proposed changes to its fuel formula based on the gas price forecasts available at the time of SPS's Application. For comparison purposes, SPS also included its current fuel factors. Please note that the actual fuel factors proposed by SPS in a separate proceeding and approved by the Commission may differ from those shown in the table below.

SPS requests that the new fuel factor formula be implemented on an interim basis so that SPS may update its fuel factors using the new formula for electricity usage occurring on or after June 1, 2023. If the final approved formula differs from the formula proposed by SPS, SPS requests that the revised formula and resulting fuel factors be implemented for electricity usage occurring on or after the first day of the month following the month in which the Commission approves the fuel formula. These changes will be subject to final review by the Commission in SPS's next fuel reconciliation proceeding. In a separate proceeding, SPS will request approval to begin charging as interim rates the proposed fuel factors resulting from the fuel formula approved in this proceeding for electricity usage occurring on or after June 1, 2023.

Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS), doing business as Xcel Energy, gives notice that, under Section 36.203 of the Public Utility Regulatory Act and 16 Texas Admin Code § 25.237(b)(2), on May 9, 2023, it filed with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (Commission) a tariff to implement decreased fuel factors. All of SPS's Texas retail customers will be affected by the Commission's approval of the decreased fuel factor tariff. The decreased fixed fuel factors, if approved, will affect only the fuel portion of the rates charged by SPS in Texas and will not affect SPS's non-fuel base rates.

SPS seeks Commission approval to decrease its fuel factors effective June 1, 2023 for electric usage occurring on or after that date. SPS has proposed that its fixed fuel factor be adjusted under formula approved by the Commission in Docket No. 54952 and consistent with Commission rulings in Docket No. 51665 related to fuel factors. The revised fuel factors will decrease SPS's Texas retail fuel and purchased power revenues by approximately \$70.4 million or 25.05 percent decrease on an annual basis. Compared to the fuel factors in effect when SPS filed its application, the proposed fuel factors will result in an approximate decrease of 4.1% percent, or \$6.35 per month, in the total bill for a residential customer using 1,000 kilowatt-hours (kWh) of electricity per month. Amounts collected from affected customers under the revised voltage level fuel factors will be subject to final review in SPS's next fuel reconciliation before the Commission. The revised fuel factors will be in effect with electric usage on or after June 1, 2023 unless revised by Commission order.

Assist. (from Page 2) in 2022 including a megadrought, Hurricane Ian, epic flooding and catastrophic wildfires. To say these events

were costly is an understatement," Vilsack said. "Last year USDA streamlined the delivery of natural disaster assistance, speeding up the timing of payments and cutting the time spent on paperwork by 90% or one million hours relative to the previous disaster programs. While we

will use the same streamlined approaches, funding is limited and significantly less than the estimated losses. We are designing payment factors that ensure the fair, equitable and efficient delivery of program benefits to help as many producers as possible offset the significant financial impacts resulting from these ongoing and widespread natural disasters."

Background
On December 29, 2022, President Biden signed into law the Disaster Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act, 2023 (P.L. 117-328) that provides about \$3.7 billion in financial assistance for agricultural producers impacted by wildfires, droughts, hurricanes, winter storms and other eligible disasters occurring in calendar year 2022.

Additionally, the Act specifically targets up to about \$500 million to livestock producers for losses incurred due to drought or wildfire in calendar year 2022.

ERP 2022 for Crop Producers

USDA, through the Farm Service Agency (FSA), intends to deploy the lessons learned from the development and implementation of ERP and ELRP for previous years' losses to ensure expedited assistance for 2022 losses.

Based on positive feedback from producers, stakeholder groups and FSA county office staff, USDA intends to provide an ERP track for producers who had coverage through Risk Management Agency's federal crop insurance or FSA's Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP). Through a streamlined application process, USDA intends to be in a position to send pre-filled applications directly to eligible producers in early summer.

For producers who have not been able to avail themselves of risk management coverage or whose losses were not covered, USDA intends to offer a program track to access ERP assistance with assistance provided to producers who suffered a decrease in allowable gross revenue in 2022 due to necessary expenses related to losses of eligible crops from a qualifying natural disaster event.

Instead of implementing these program tracks as two separate phases on different timelines, FSA intends to make both tracks available to producers at the same time, noting that the first track will follow a streamlined process with less paperwork burden, based on existing, available risk management data. The second ERP track would require that producers provide FSA with certain information related to revenue.

ELRP 2022 for Livestock Producers and Close Out of ELRP for 2021

For impacted ranchers, USDA intends to leverage FSA's Livestock Forage Disaster Program (LFP) data to deliver ELRP assistance for increases in supplemental feed costs in 2022.

To be eligible for an ELRP payment for 2022 losses, livestock producers will need to have suffered grazing losses from wildfire or in a county rated by the U.S. Drought Monitor as having a D2 (severe drought) for eight consecutive weeks or a D3 (extreme drought) or higher level of drought intensity during the 2022 calendar year and have applied and been approved for 2022 LFP. Additionally, otherwise eligible producers whose permitted grazing on federally managed lands was disallowed due to wildfire will also be eligible for ELRP payments if they applied and were approved for 2022 LFP.

In a continued effort to streamline and simplify the delivery of ELRP benefits, eli-



gible producers will not be required to apply for payment.

Meanwhile, FSA also intends to provide additional assistance to ranchers for qualifying livestock losses from drought and wildfire in 2021. More information will be announced in the coming months.

How Producers Can Prepare

To participate in ERP and ELRP for 2022 losses, both crop and livestock producers should have or be prepared to have the following forms on file with FSA:

- Form AD-2047, Customer Data Worksheet (as applicable to the program participant);
- Form CCC-902, Farm Operating Plan for an individual or legal entity;
- Form CCC-901, Member Information for Legal Entities (if applicable); and
- Form AD-1026 Highly Erodible Land Conservation (HELIC) and Wetland Conservation (WC) Certification.

Most producers, especially those who have previously participated in FSA programs, will likely have these required forms on file. However, those who are uncertain or want to confirm should contact FSA at their local USDA Service Center.

In addition to the forms listed above, underserved producers are encouraged to register their status with FSA, using Form CCC-860, Socially Disadvantaged, Limited Resource, Beginning and

Veteran Farmer or Rancher Certification, as certain existing permanent and ad-hoc disaster programs provide increased benefits or reduced fees and premiums.

Producers with eligible crop losses who did not have federal crop insurance or NAP risk management coverage for 2022 and intend to apply for ERP assistance will need to pull together revenue information that is readily available from most tax records. FSA encourages producers to have their tax documents from the past few years and supporting materials ready including Schedule F (Form 1040) and Profit or Loss from Farming or similar tax documents. FSA will not require these forms to be submitted with the ERP application, but will require a certification, similar to Adjusted Gross Income certification that has been used for many years for Farm Bill programs. Applicants simply report and certify to the information required for the program.

Crop producers who have federal crop insurance coverage should ensure that information on file with their insurance agent is accurate and that any pending activities needed to file loss claims for 2022 losses are addressed as

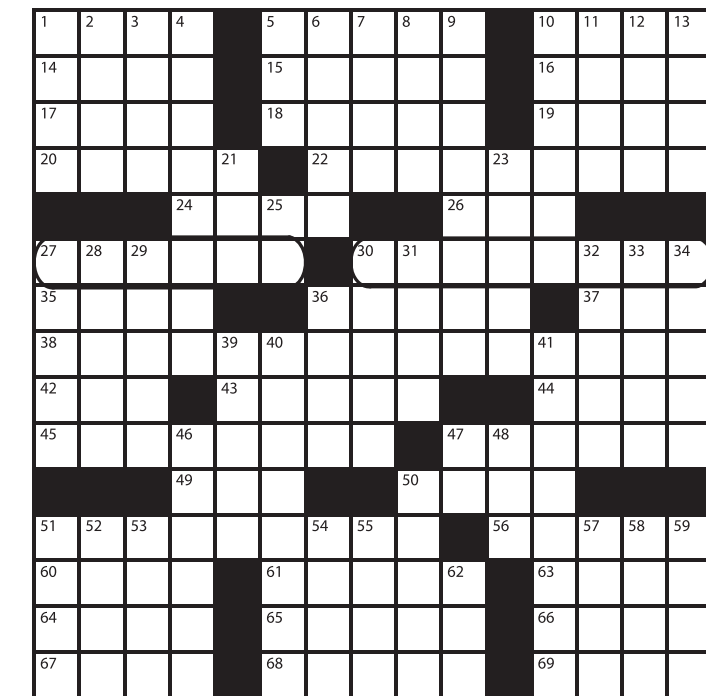

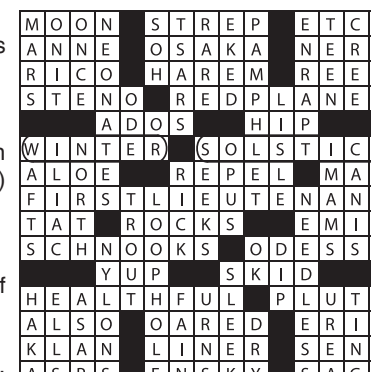
