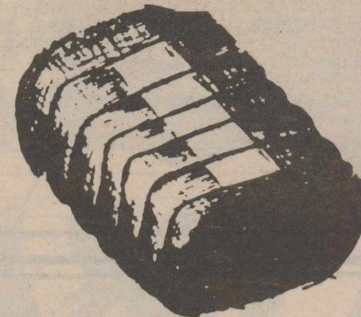

Briscoe County Stock Show Is Success

The 1986 Briscoe County Junior Livestock Show was held Saturday at the County Show Barn in Silverton. Contestants from Valley FFA, Silverton FFA, Valley 4-H and Silverton 4-H exhibited their livestock projects. A total of 75 market pigs, 12 dairy heifers, three steers, one beef heifer, and 38 market lambs were shown to a large crowd.

A total of \$5,550 was donated this year's show which was presented to exhibitors in the form of premium money.

This year's judge was Ken Cook of San Angelo, District Extension Director.

The grand champion steer was a Chianina cross owned by Clay Schott of Silverton. The calf, named Charlie, weighed 1350 pounds, and will be exhibited at the El Paso Stock Show later this month.

The reserve champion steer was a Limousin calf owned by Kim Burson of Silverton.

The grand champion lamb was also exhibited by Clay Schott, and the reserve grand champion lamb was shown by Robbie McWaters.

The grand champion barrow was shown by Langdon Reagan of Silverton, and the reserve grand champion barrow was

exhibited by Jeannita Stephens of Silverton.

The grand champion dairy heifer was shown by Bradley Price of Quitaque, and the reserve grand champion heifer was exhibited by Tina Clay of Flomot. The champion beef heifer was exhibited by Kristi Bean of Silverton.

The showmanship judge at this year's show was Ed Rogers of Tulia. He chose as the top cattle showman Bradley Price of Quitaque, for his excellent job with his dairy heifer. The top cattle showman was chosen from the steer, dairy and beef heifer classes.

The top lamb showman was Julie Graham, and the top swine showman was Todd Reagan, both of Silverton.

Culwell was born September 24, 1954 in Swisher County and lived all his life in Briscoe and Swisher counties. He attended the Silvertown Schools where he was a member of the Future Farmers of America and won third place at the district track meet in the 880-yard dash in 1972.

He married Gina Finney on September 24, 1982 in Tulia. He was a self-employed cattle buyer.

Burial was in the Silvertown Cemetery, with arrangements directed by Memorial Park Funeral Home of Amarillo.

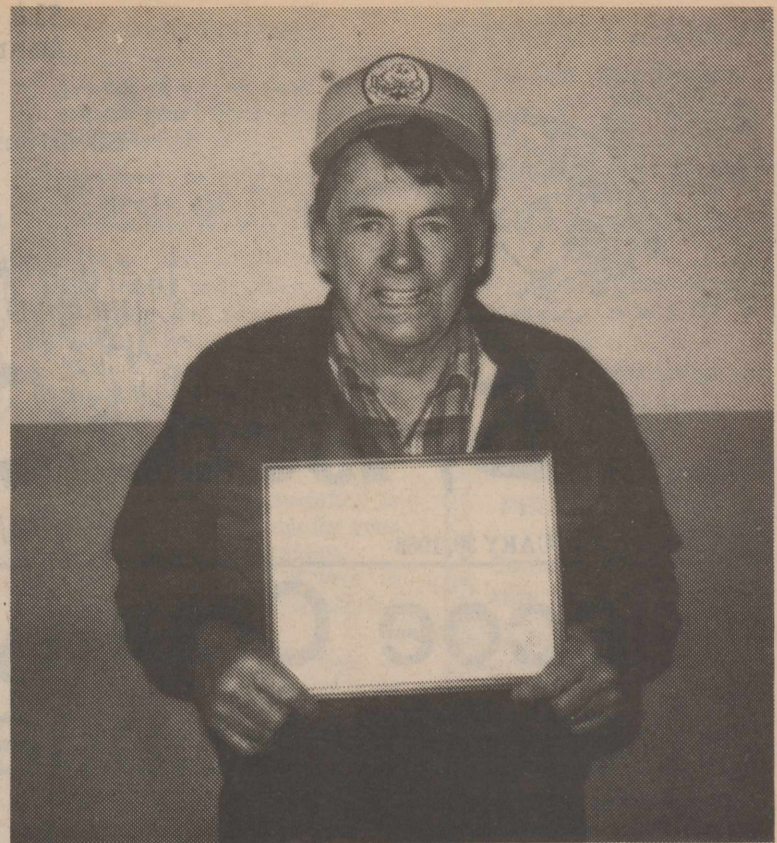
Mrs. Davis died January 18 in Amarillo.

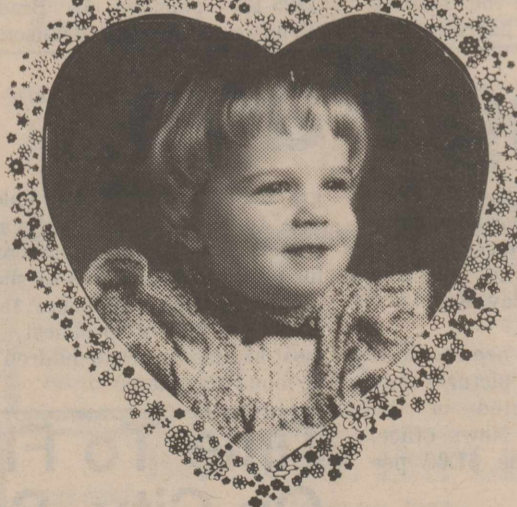

Owls Staying In Second Place in District Basketball

Friday, January 17, the Owl basketball team travelled to Valley for their second district game of the season. Going into this game, the Owls were in sole possession of first place. When the game was over, the Owls had recorded their first district loss.

The first quarter of the game saw the Owls staying close and trailing by only four points at the end of it. Then the turnovers that have plagued the team all season started to occur, according to Coach Bob Loy, and by the end of the first half we were trailing by 30 points.

"We had already committed 16 turnovers and there would be more before the game ended. During the game we took a total of 56 shots at the goal and made 15 for a 26% average. From the free throw line we attempted 27 and made 13 for a 48% ratio," the coach said.

Leading scorers for the game were Cal Brannon with 19 points, followed by Scotty Harris with 10 and Jamie Frizzell and Neal Edwards contributed five points each.

On Tuesday, January 21, the Owls hosted the Hedley team and came away with an impressive 61-51 victory. With his win, the Owls upped their district record to two wins and one loss, putting them in sole possession of second place behind Valley, who is undefeated at this stage.

This was a completely different team that took the floor against the Hedley squad, said Coach Loy, as we committed only 11 turnovers in the entire game. "We attempted 48 field goals from the field and connected on 22 for a respectable 46 percent. From the free throw line we attempted 29 and connected on 17 for a 58 percentage. The type of performance that we received from all members of the team was an indication that this team can play with anyone on a given night," the coach added.

The Owls lost two starters this past six weeks because of the no-pass, no-play policy, and due to this, the coach said, "We will be playing with only seven team members."

After the third district game, Russell Simpson had made 17 of 57 attempted field goals for a total of 55 points. Neal Edwards had connected on 12 of 39 tries from the field for 48 points. Cal Brannon made 53 of 124 for 164 points. Scotty Harris made 66 of 157 for 182 points, to be the leading scorer. Jeff Wheeler had hit 20 of 37 for 56 points; Ricky Clardy, nine of 43 for 42 points; Jamie Frizzell, four of 17 for 18 points; Brad West, none of six for two points; Bryan Wheeler, two of nine for six points. This totals 573 points scored so far this season.

In the free-throw department, Simpson had made 11 of 18; Edwards, 22 of 37; Brannon, 29 of 60; Harris, 30 of 49; Jeff Wheeler, 14 of 24; Clardy, 16 of 34; Frizzell, 10 of 21; West, two of five; Bryan Wheeler, two of 11. For the season to date, the team has made 134 of 259 attempts from the line.

Defensively, Simpson had pulled down two offensive and 19 defensive rebounds; Edwards, 11 and 27; Brannon, 25 and 39; Harris, 23 and 52; Jeff Wheeler,

eight and 18; Clardy, 20 and 27; Frizzell, 12 and 13; West, four and one; Bryan Wheeler, six defensive rebounds.

This is for a total average of 8.7 offensive rebounds and 16.8 defensive rebounds per game.

In individual scoring, Harris is credited with an average of 14 points per game; Brannon, 12.6; Jeff Wheeler, 5.6; Simpson, 6.0; Edwards, 3.6; Clardy, 3.2; Frizzell, 1.3. The Owls are averaging 44 points per game, while their opposition is averaging 50 points per game. There have been 200

turnovers to date with an average per game of 15.3.

Thanks to Coach Loy for these individual statistics on the Owls.
