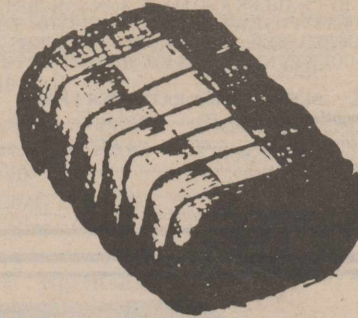
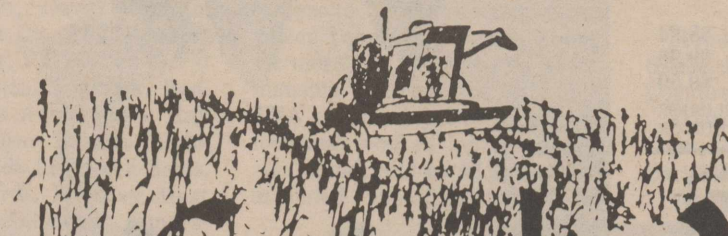

## Mrs. Hill Receives Ambulance Service's Top Annual Award

Emergency Medical Technician Janice Hill was the recipient of the Ambulance Attendant of the Year Award as a highlight of the annual banquet held by the Silverton Volunteer Ambulance Service at the City Hall Saturday night.

Anthony Kingery, president of the Ambulance Service, made the presentation and commented on the many hours Mrs. Hill devotes to the service through bookkeeping, billing, insurance forms preparation, and volunteer service in the ambulance. In addition, she attends many of the continuing education seminars.

The invocation was given by Ted Kingery, after which a buffet meal of mesquite-smoked brisket, grilled onions, barbecue sauce, prepared by Calvin Shelton, baked potatoes, tea, coffee, cobbler and a variety of salad and vegetable dishes was served.

Dave Clark, director of the Panhandle Emergency Medical Services headquartered in Amarillo, spoke on the need for a helicopter to serve Panhandle

residents. "Some people die," he said, "not because we don't have well-trained, well-equipped ambulance services, but simply because they are injured or become ill so far from hospitals."

Joyce Cheeks of PEMS was also a guest at the banquet.

"I intend to attempt to contact each of you individually during the course of my campaign and will look forward to visiting with you with the hope that such visits will result in your decision to make me your District Judge."

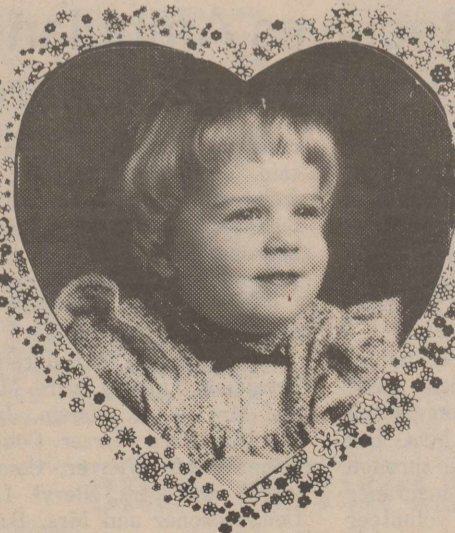

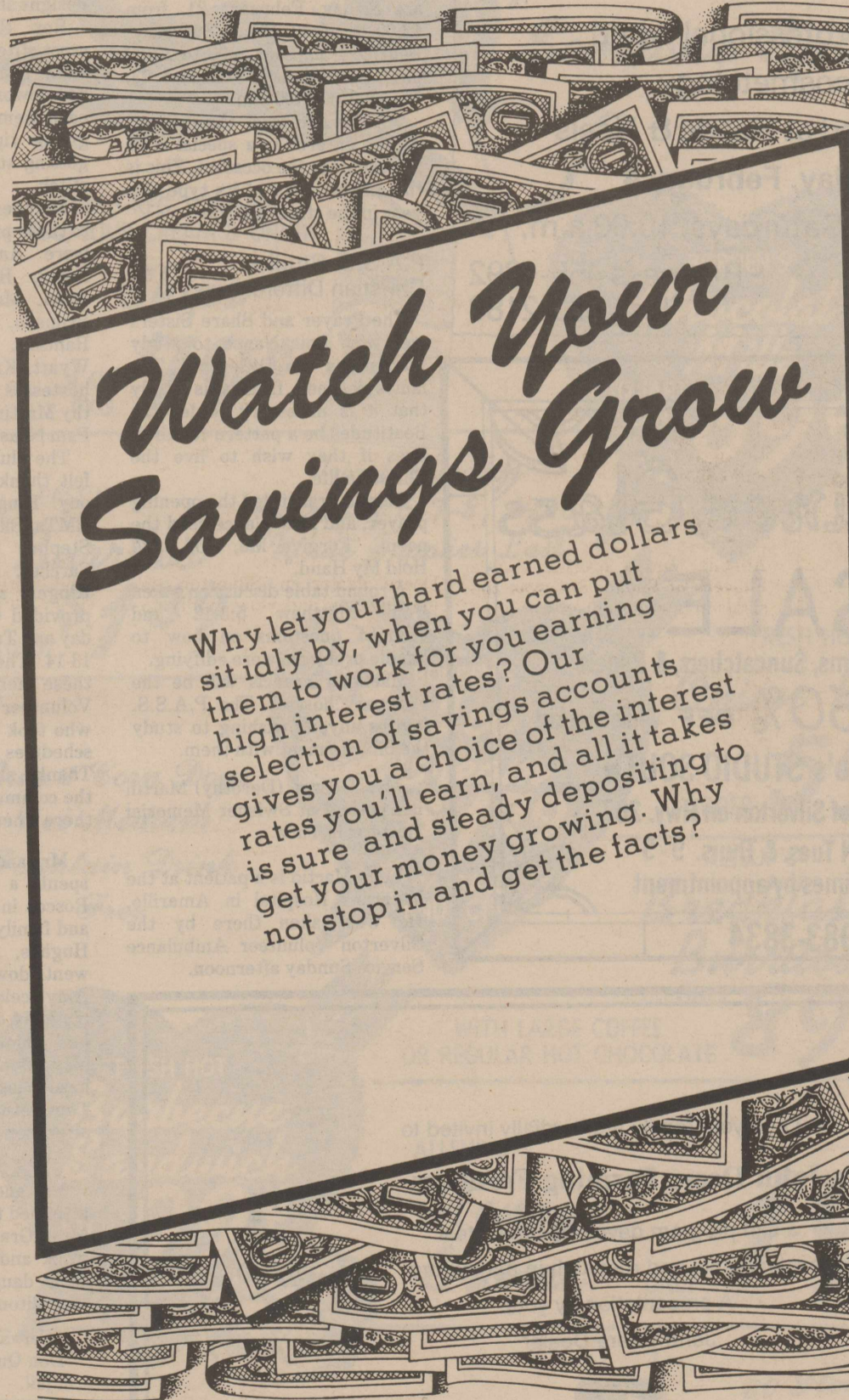

She is now employed by Amoco Oil Company in Tulsa, Oklahoma.

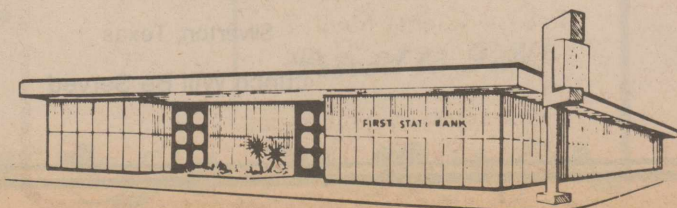

## Mrs. Teeple Designed Winning Quilt Block

Mrs. Syble Teeple designed and made the winning quilt block which will represent Briscoe County in the Panhandle Sesquicentennial Quilt to be completed in February.

The Texas 1986 Sesquicentennial Quilting Bee will be held February 21-22-23 at the Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum in Canyon. The event is co-sponsored by the Museum and the

Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The quilting project involved the top 26 counties in the Panhandle, with local quilters entering their own special blocks designed to represent a specific characteristic of their county.

The Briscoe County Historical Commission selected a panel of judges to determine the county winners. Entries were evaluated

on overall appearance, workmanship, originality of design, adherence to theme, appropriateness of material, and use of color.

The queen-size Sesquicentennial Quilt will have a block representing each of the 26 counties with four additional blocks representing the Museum, the Extension Service, the Sesquicentennial, and the Panhandle.

Area quilters are invited to go to the museum and actually complete the quilt. The quilting frame will be set up in the Museum's front hall, and the public can watch the progress.

Those wishing to quilt must make a reservation by calling JoAnne Arasim at the Museum at 655-7191. Each quilter may have only one 20-minute time slot. The quilting days and times are Friday, February 21, from 12:00 to 5:00 p.m.; Saturday, February 22, from 8:00 to 12:00 p.m., and Sunday, February 23, from 2:00 to 6:00 p.m.

All the names of the quilters will be entered in a special book to document the occasion. This is the only activity of its type this year in the state of Texas.

### SESQUICENTENNIAL MOMENT

George Spiller wrote, in a letter dated May 21, 1923: "I was in your county with a surveying party in December 1874. At that date there was only one road there. It had been made by Gen. Mackenzie, from his supply camp on Catfish Creek or White River, which heads in Canyon Blanco (at that time there were no counties in that territory) to where he had a fight with Commanche Indians on North Fork Red River. It came out of the Canyon Blanco, crossing an arm of the plains extending east to Dickens County, going east to Quita Que peak, that is the way we spelled it then. Crossing Prairie Dog or main Prong of Red River below the sand hills, at the mouth of the Paloduro Canyon. I had traveled this trail in September 1874. I ran a line from Canyon Blanco to Canadian river in 1874. I was then to survey the land north of Quita Que to breaks of Paloduro on the headquarters of Pease River. I here followed the trail up in the Panhandle to McClellan Creek, moved south along the foot of the plains. On December 22, 1874 came out of the breaks, camped on the prairie north of the North Fork of Pease. Surveyors camped the line on to the river, morning of the 23rd, sent party up to the foot of the plains to run over creek to intersect the river. I took party on to camp on the river, when surveyors got to camp they reported having found

camp of Mexicans, four of whom had been killed and scalped or partly so. Presumption was party came on them before they finished their work. That night two Mexicans came to our camp stating they belonged to the party of Mexicans who had just come in there for hunting wolves. One seemed to be the Alcade of party. He had taken one other and had gone to hunt suitable camp, when he got back he found the devastation of his party. Found our trail and followed to our camp. On December 24th we went with these of the Mexicans up to their camp found one of the Mexicans still alive, tho scalped. One other his scalp to pulled off. Rather confirmation of our supposition that the surveyors had surprised the Indians before finishing the job. We then dug a grave, put the three dead ones in, just as we were in the act of filling the grave the old Alcade said hold on this one "bout to die." We waited till he ceased to breathe, one of our party, now living in Dallas (won't give his name) held his pulse till it stopped beating. When we filled up the grave we made quite a mound of stone over it to prevent the wolves scratching the bodies up. This place is near a spring near the trail going up on the plains. It was a branch of the Mackenzie trail, I have already mentioned. It branches off from his main trail where it crosses that prong of Pease river, goes over into Tulia Canyon, where he killed the horses he had captured from the Indians.

"In this fight on North Fork in 1871, he captured their horses and all of their squaws. A few nights afterwards the Indians raided his camp. I ran off their ponies, let him keep the squaws. I saw them at Fort Concho in May 1873. During that year they never returned to Fort Sill reservation. This is about as good history as I can give you of this transaction.

"I have a diary I made on that tour, my dates are absolutely correct. Only three of us living now, that have knowledge of."
