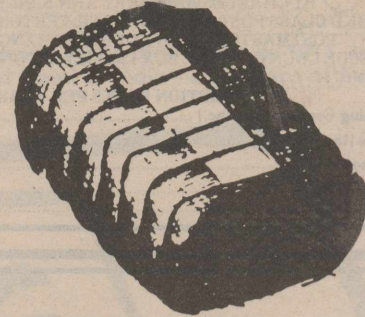
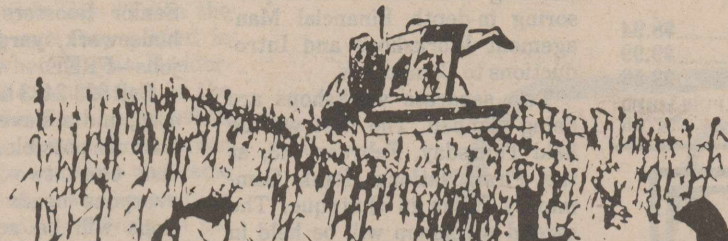

## SUBSCRIPTION RATES TO INCREASE SOON

Subscriptions to the Briscoe County News will be going up \$1.00 each, as of March 1, 1986.

The subscription rate in Briscoe and adjoining counties will be \$9.50 plus 49c tax, for a total of \$9.99 per year.

Subscriptions mailed to other Texas counties will be \$10.50 plus 54c tax, a total of \$11.04 per year.

The charge for mailing to other states will be \$10.50 per year.

This increase is necessitated by a sharp increase in second class postage this month. We regret it, because we need your subscriptions, but this is the only way your hometown paper can continue to exist; many increases have already been absorbed, and it has become impossible to continue to do this.

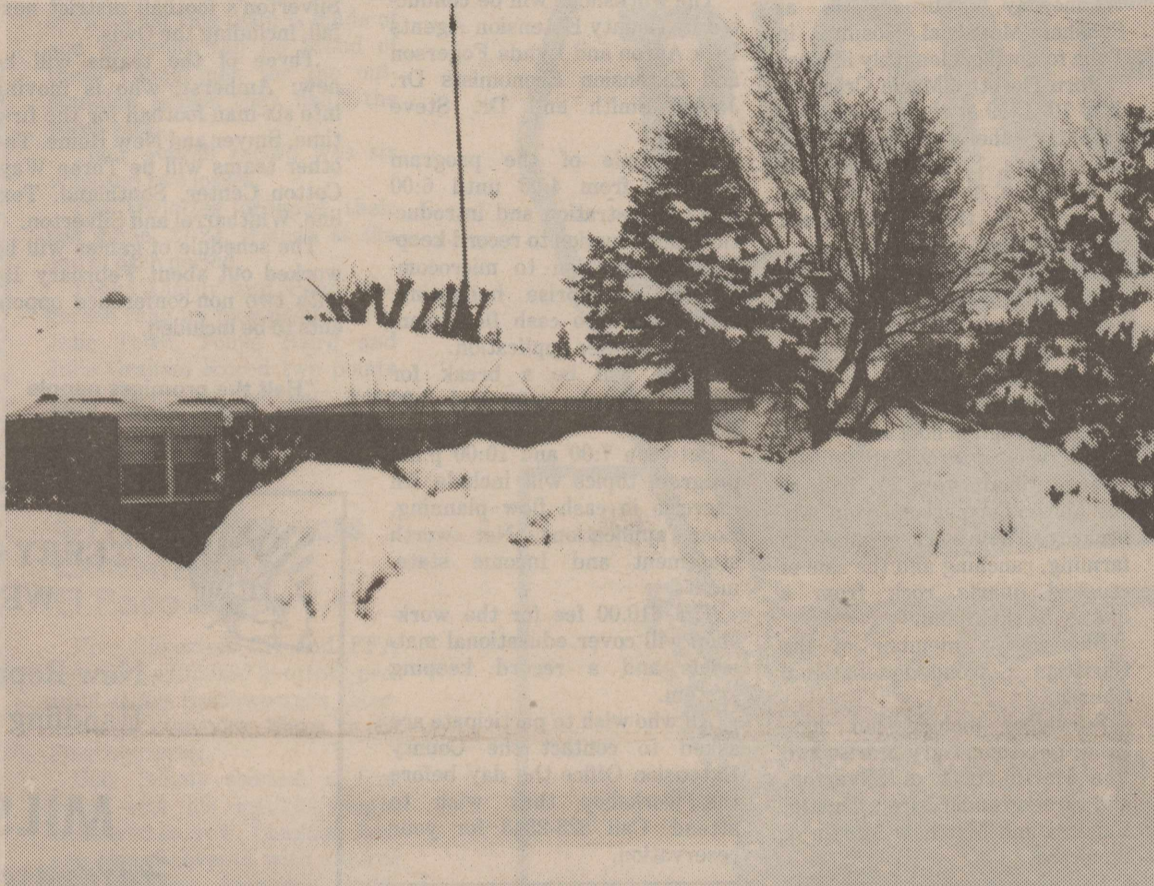
## WHAT OTHER EDITORS ARE WRITING

Harold Hudson recently wrote in The Perryton Herald:

"The latest report shows that our ex-presidents cost us \$26 million last year, including a \$72,000 phone bill. The General Accounting Office says that Gerald Ford rang up the top phone bill, \$30,281; Jimmy Carter \$21,589; Richard Nixon \$20,704. Each former chief executive spent more than \$9,000 on postage. Secret Service protection fell to \$10.5 million from \$11.7 million three years ago because fewer people got it. Bess Truman died, Amy Carter turned 16. It will fall more since Nixon asked to drop protection.

"Ford spent \$21,075 for travel; Nixon \$11,470; Carter \$1,187. Total for pension, travel staff, supplies came to \$363,504 for Carter; \$360,807 for Ford; and \$327,066 for Nixon. The presidential libraries for the former presidents, living and dead, came to \$14 million. Each former president gets \$892,438 in pension; \$100,000 plus for staff. Lady Bird Johnson gets a \$20,000 per year pension. It all adds up and by now surely this can be trimmed just a wee bit and still keep our former presidents off the poverty roll."

"This game meant many things to all of us, but to the players it meant that they would represent District 1-6A in the playoffs as the District runner-up champions," said Coach Bob Loy. "Not only did they come away victorious but by the game's end, each player was physically and emotionally drained from the effort he displayed all through the game."

Leading scorers were Russell Simpson 14, Scotty Harris 17 and Cal Brannon 12.

Monday, February 2, the Owls hosted Lakeview for the last regularly-scheduled district game before the playoffs. "These young men remained poised all through the game and claimed a 45-43 victory," the coach said.

"I can never put into words the feeling that I've had for each and every one of these young men," Coach Loy said. "I will remember them for years to come. I would especially like to thank the seniors who played their last game at home: Cal Brannon,

Scotty Harris, Jeff Wheeler and Russell Simpson. Just as important was the contribution from our underclassmen: Jamie Frizzell, Brad West, Bryan Wheeler, Neal Edwards and Ricky Clardy. Corey Robertson joined the team after Russell Simpson injured his hand.

"I would like to take this opportunity to thank the cheerleaders, faculty, fans, student body and the many townspeople who showed their enthusiastic support during the season. Without your backing and the desire of these young men, all that we achieved could never have been accomplished. Thank you all!" Coach Loy said.

In the Lakeview game, the leading scorers were Brannon 17, Harris 10 and Jeff Wheeler 10.

The Owls finished with a district record of four wins and two losses, and an overall season record of seven wins and nine losses.

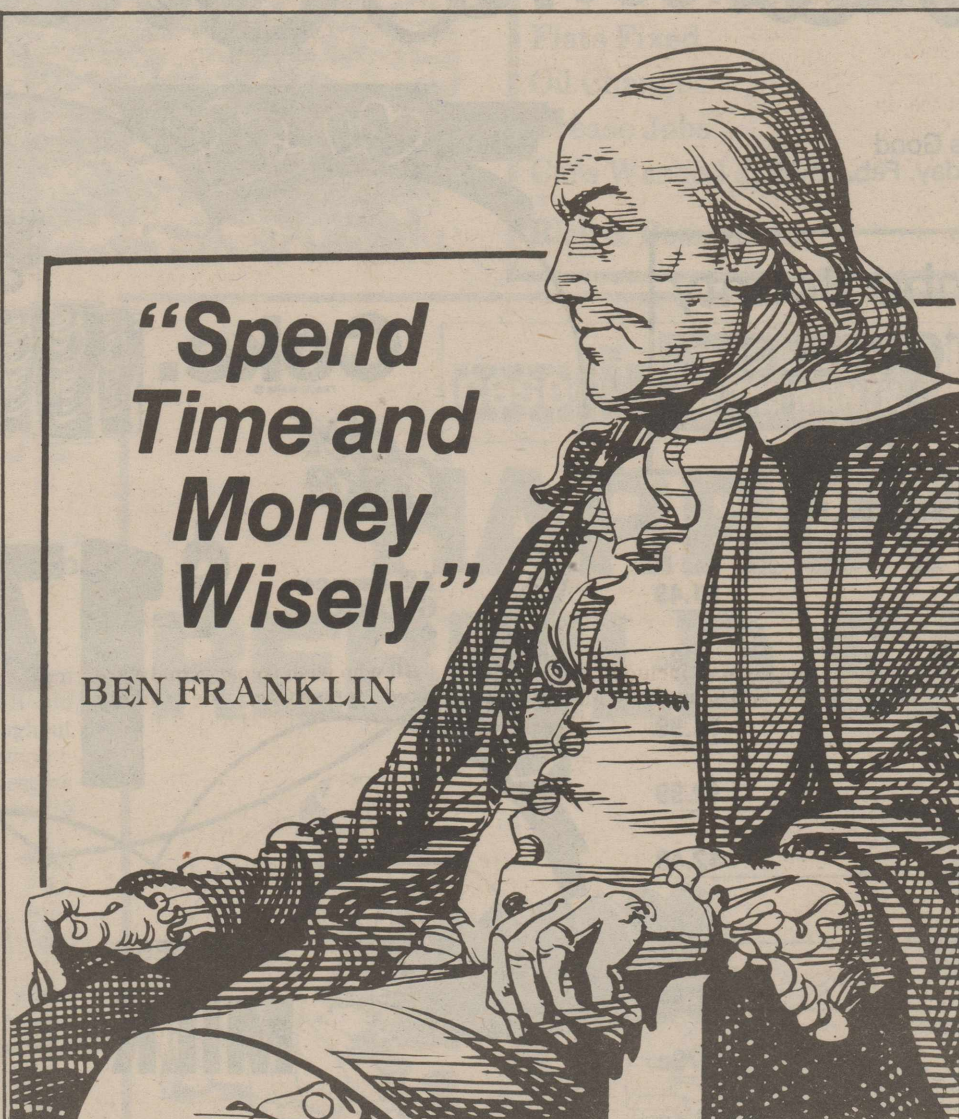

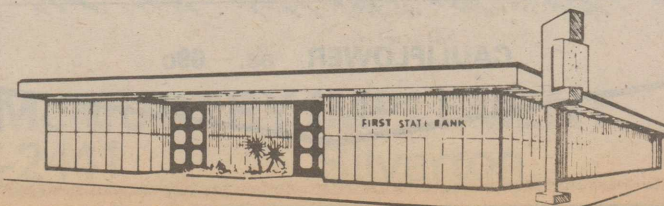

**STRESS ON THE  
FARM AND RANCH**

Those of you involved in agricultural production are recognized as some of the biggest gamblers in the world! You put all of your energy, brain-power, money and other resources into decisions that may mean major gains or major losses for you and your families.

You take the gamble, not just for the chance to make a profit, but most of you enjoy the independence of owning your own business and want to continue producing because you enjoy it and because your families have been involved in farming or ranching for generations.

Yet we know that farm families are facing greater stress related to their decision to remain in farming. We know that how each agricultural family responds to the stressors from agriculture production can be the difference between success and failure.

The first steps in managing stress are to understand what stress is and to recognize the sources of stress that affect you. Stress occurs when agricultural production factors interact with the producer and his family in a way that causes their health and their way to thinking to deviate from normal functioning.

Stress can be good or bad. There are times when stress must occur to cause us to make needed changes. Bad stress occurs when the changes we make bring about destructive results, like illness, depression, violent behavior or accidents.

To make stress work for you, sort out the sources of your personal stress into three groups: those you have NO CONTROL over; those you CAN CONTROL; and those you can feel better about if you UNDERSTAND them better. Remember, events which are highly stressful to one person may be only mildly stressful or not at all stressful to another. Each individual has his/her own internal and external resources and strengths for coping with stressors.


In my newsletter which will be in the mail this week, I have included a check sheet on "Stress . . . Individual Perceptions" for families to use in becoming more aware of your individual stress responses. I encourage families to use this sheet to identify some of the ways they react physically and mentally to stressors.

Stress which is not controlled can affect your health and your family relationships. We hope to have a program in the near future on coping with the stresses related to agriculture. If you need further information on this topic, call my office, 823-2343.

### Owlettes Finish Basketball Season

Silverton's varsity Owlettes finished their basketball season with two key injuries. DeLyn Patton was injured at the beginning of the second quarter of the Hedley game January 31. She suffered torn ligaments in her ankle, and is in a boot and on crutches.

Kathy Brown was injured about two minutes after DeLyn, reinjuring her knee. She went to San Antonio Friday to see the doctor. She has strained cartilage, so no surgery was necessary. She has to take it easy, lift weights and ride bicycle, but is expected to be fine for which all the Owlette fans and her friends are thankful.

In their game at home with Lakeview last week, the Owlettes lost by a 56-48 margin. The Owlettes outscored the visitors in the second and third quarters but were unable to take the win.

Kori Baird led the scoring with 12 points, followed by Shavonne Lowrey with nine and Lee Ann Durham with eight points. Kristy Fogerson rang up seven points, Tonia Perkins and Suzann Settle got four points each, and Tonnette Miller and Kim Burson added two points each.

Kori scored 71% of her shots from the field and 67% of her shots from the free-throw line. Shavonne scored 50% from the field and 100% from the line, while Lee Ann got 30% from the field and 100% from the line. Tonia Perkins also scored 50% from the field and 100% from the line. Kristy scored 60% from the field and 50% from the line.

In addition, Suzann led the rebounding with four, and also was credited with three assists, two steals and causing the opponents to make two errors.

Lee Ann got one rebound, four

assists, four steals and caused six errors. Kori got four steals and caused four errors. Shavonne had one assist, two steals and caused three errors. Tonia had a steal and caused three errors.

For 20 games this season, the Owlettes have outscored their opponents 1028 to 1025 points. They have pulled down 655 rebounds as compared with 552 for their opponents. They have committed 16 turnovers per game as compared with 19 for their opponents.

## Local Dealer Attends Steiger Tractor Show

With a theme of "Four Wheel Drive Pride," Steiger Tractor, Inc. hosted over 3000 dealers and farmers from all over the world in Fargo, North Dakota during January, including David Reagan of Brown-McMurtry Implement.

On consecutive days from January 20 through the end of the month, attendees at the show had an opportunity to see the new 1000 Series tractors, visit with Irvin Aal, president and CEO of Steiger, and tour the Fargo manufacturing plant for the four-wheel-drive tractors.

The 1000 Series Steigers, five models ranging from the 190-horsepower Puma 1000 to the 375-horsepower Lion 1000, represent a new three frame concept of tractor manufacturing, with each model sharing many common components. Each tractor is a full-time four-wheel-drive tractor with easy-access cab, 51 square feet of tinted glass, adjustable 12-position seating, tilt/telescope steering wheel, on-board microprocessor that provides electronic readouts on major functions and diagnoses itself, and a full power-shift 12 speed transmission that is electronically controlled.

A center for much interest at the Fargo show was the Puma 1000, which features a steerable front axle option and bar axles for making minor adjustments during row crop work. The Bearcat 1000 at 235 engine horsepower, Cougar 1000 at 280 horsepower, Panther 1000 at 335 horsepower and Lion 1000 at 375 horsepower make up the remainder of the 1000 Series.

Load-sensing hydraulics are standard on all models, with options ranging from extra remote couplers to three point hitches and 10000 RPM PTO's.

Since 1958 when the first Steiger tractor was built in a dairy barn near Thief River Falls, Minnesota, over 20,000 tractors have been manufactured by the company. Steiger Tractor is headquartered in Fargo, where a 420,000-square-foot manufacturing facility shares space

with all other divisions of the company.

## Local FFA Members to Compete in 1986 Houston Show

Nine FFA members from Silverton will be joining 4-H and FFA members from throughout the state for show-ring competition at the Houston Livestock Show, to be held February 15 through March 2.

Market barrows have been entered in the show by FFA members Kristy Fogerson, Robbie McWaters, Clay Schott and Jeannita Stephens.

They will be among junior exhibitors who will be representing 804 Texas 4-H clubs and FFA chapters.

Junior show and open show exhibitors will compete for millions of dollars in prize monies and premium auction prices.

Long before the Show starts, committee volunteers contact auction buyers to guarantee that each animal sold at one of the four junior auctions will bring a price above the current market value.

Junior exhibitors show a variety of animals, including beef and dairy heifers, breeding sheep, goats, commercial steers, breeding rabbits and market lambs, steers, poultry and barrows.

The junior show will have a new sound this year with two new auctioneers—Charles Rolins of Fort Worth and Ike Hamilton of Monroe, Louisiana. Walter Britten retired after 46 years as Show auctioneer.

Because of past success, the three-judge system will be used again for market lambs, barrows and steers. This system helps ensure fair selection of champion animals based on production, feeding and carcass merit.

In addition to providing a learning experience and exciting show-ring competition for 4-H and FFA members, the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo is the largest donor of agricultural

scholarships in the nation.

The Show is a total charity benefitting youth and education and currently has 899 students on scholarships in Texas colleges and universities.

The Show also funds extensive research and endowment programs at colleges and universities throughout the state.

This year's livestock show opens February 15, a special Sesquicentennial celebration will star Willie Nelson on February 18, and the first rodeo performance is February 19.

Livestock show and rodeo events conclude March 2.

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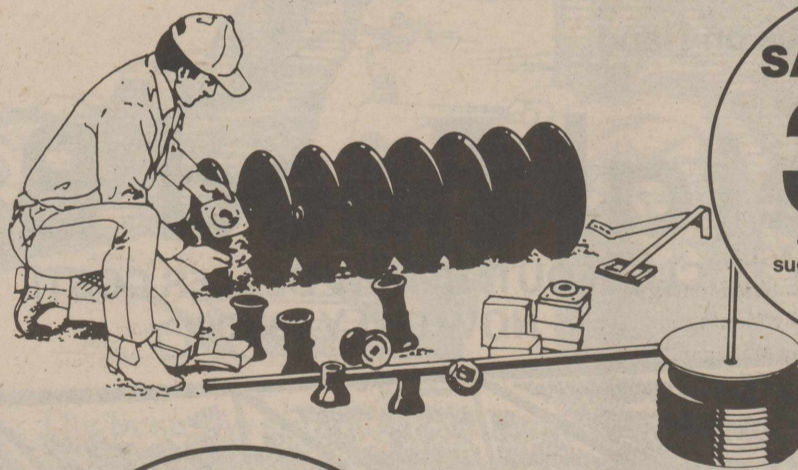

### Jamie Frizzell To Scramble In Houston Rodeo Event

Jamie Lynn Frizzell, a 14-year-old FFA member from Silverton, will participate in the 1986 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo calf scramble on March 1 in the Astrodome.

The calf scramble is an exciting part of the rodeo action starring Barbara Mandrell as part of that evening's performance.

Jamie, the son of Lynn and Kathy Frizzell, will compete for one of the 264 calf purchase certificates to be awarded at the 1986 Rode. Additionally, as many

as two youngsters from each rodeo performance are awarded a "hard luck" certificate for their strong efforts in attempting to catch a calf, resulting in 32 more certificates given.

The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo is Houston's largest entertainment extravaganza and its largest charity event, with all net proceeds directly benefitting youth and education.

The calf scramble, a year-long activity, is one of the Show's programs benefitting Texas youth. It begins with athletic competition in the Astrodome and ends with qualitative competition in the show-ring.

The event involves the turning loose of 28 energetic youngsters and half as many wild calves in one arena. Those who manage to grab a calf, halter it and drag it across the finish line are provided with a \$600 calf purchase certificate.

The certificate, donated by a sponsoring firm or individual, is used to purchase a purebred registered beef or dairy heifer.

The calf is raised by the winner for special show-ring competition to be held at the following year's Show. Each project is closely supervised by a vocational agriculture teacher or county extension agent.

Additionally, the winners are required to submit to the calf scramble office accurate financial records, essays, photographs and a scrapbook for the animal project.

Proper livestock evaluation techniques, efficient cattle feeding and production methods, principles of economics and money management are feasible learning experiences for the youngster who's managed to get a firm hold on a calf.

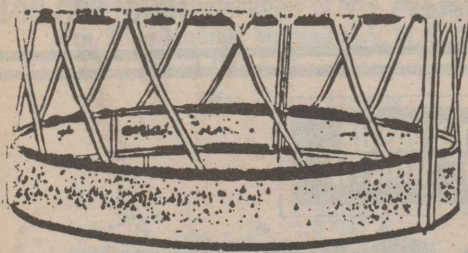

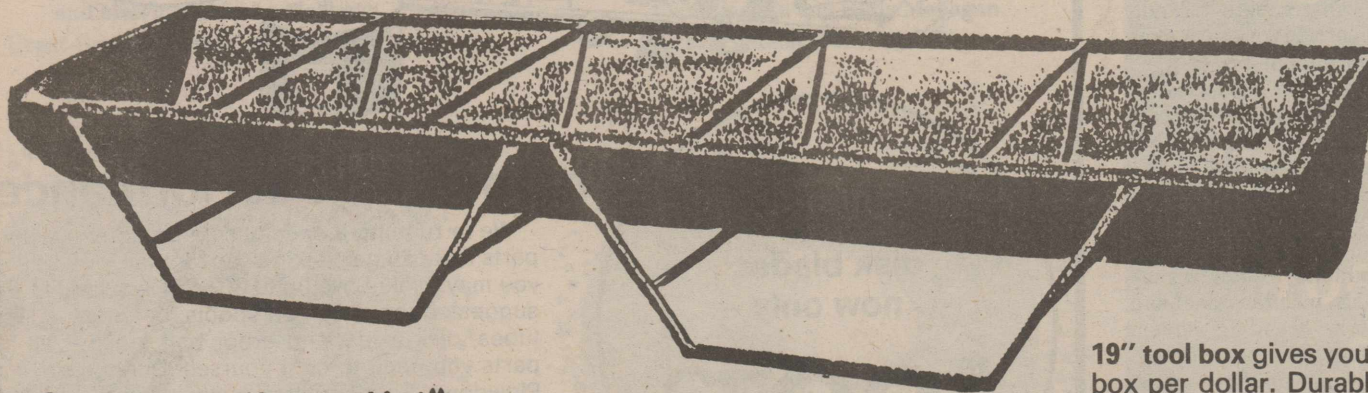

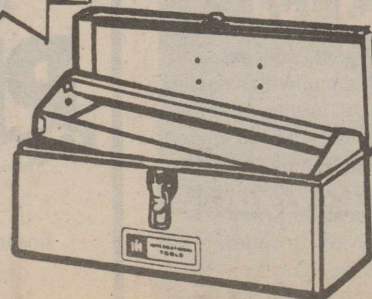
