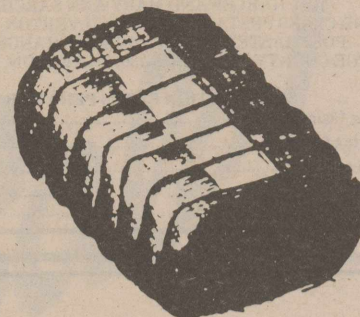

The dedication ceremony in Quitaque is planned for two o'clock p.m. at the Community Center.

Briscoe County received two oak trees from the Texas Forest Service. Silverton will plant a Shumard oak (red oak family) tree and Quitaque will plant a Heritage live oak tree.

Texas Arbor Day is the third Friday in January, adopted by the state legislature in 1949, but later dates have been suggested for the panhandle's climate. The pecan has long been a popular tree in Texas. In June 1919, it was officially designated the state tree of Texas by an act of the legislature.

Fifteen hundred years ago in a little town in Switzerland, the people of the village decided that they must have a grove of oak trees on their common. A work day was set and the men, women and children went into the woods and dug up little trees, carried them to the common and planted them under the direction of a gardener. The story says that everyone did this duty gladly. That evening, the older folks held a festival, and every boy and girl received a wheaten roll as a reward. Thus was the first Arbor Day observed among the people of the Alps.

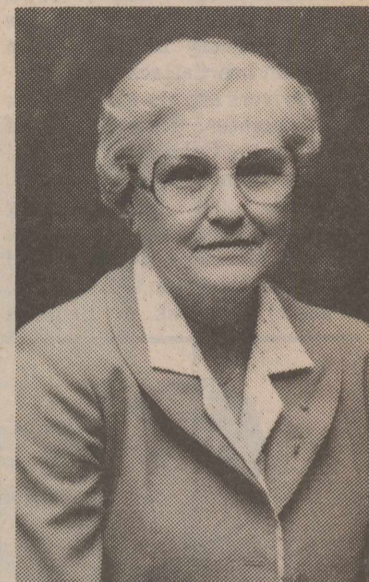
Arbor Day, as we know it, was first observed in Nebraska, a state in which only three percent of the land area originally was covered by tree growth. In 1872 Nebraska's first Arbor Day was proclaimed.

Mrs. Hulsey is Candidate for Silver Haired Legislature

Poppy Hulsey of Tulia has authorized the Briscoe County News to announce her candidacy for the Texas Silver Haired Legislature.

In making this announcement, she said: "I came to Tulia as the bride of W. K. (Kirk) Hulsey 45 years ago. We have been engaged in farming and ranching, an operation begun in the early 1890's by his grandparents. Our grandsons are the sixth generation to live on this land.

"We are the parents of four and while they were in high school we shared our home with two Exchange Students, a boy from New Zealand and a girl from West Pakistan.

"I was the editor of the Swisher County History Book, "Windmilling," and was named "Woman of the Year" by the Tulia Chamber of Commerce in 1977.

"In 1979 I was presented the "Distinguished Service Award" by West Texas State University.

"Currently I am serving on the Private Industry Council of the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission for the Tulia Industrial Foundation, and representing Swisher Electric Cooperative, Inc. for whom I am a consultant.

"Some of the issues we are addressing include: displaced workers, older workers, and job training. My participation in this program gives me knowledge that I think I can use as we seek solutions to older Texan problems.

Services were conducted at 10:00 a.m. Saturday, February 15, at Woods Memorial Chapel in Golden, Colorado.

Rosary for Marcario Garcia, 36, was recited at 2:00 p.m. Sunday at Our Lady of Loreto Catholic Church in Silverton.

Additional services and burial were to be conducted in Rio Verde, Mexico. Local arrangements were by Schooler-Gordon Funeral Directors.

Mr. Garcia died in Amarillo Thursday, January 20, when he fell from a 16-foot high scaffolding at a building site at 11420 East Interstate 40 in Amarillo. He was an employee of the Rex Tiffin Construction Company and was on a scaffold held aloft by a forklift when he apparently lost his balance and fell backward off the platform onto the concrete floor below about 3:55 p.m. The accident was at the construction site of Yellowhouse Machinery Company.

Workers said the victim and another man were fastening wire mesh to the steel frame structure of the building at the time of the accident. They said he had been working at the site for about 2 1/2

Potter County Justice of the Peace Lewis C. Brazier, acting coroner, conducted a preliminary inquest at the scene and ordered an autopsy.

Mr. Garcia was born in Mexico and had lived in Silverton seven years. He had been employed by Harris Gin prior to going to work for the Tiffin Construction Company. He was a Catholic.

Survivors include his wife, Bartola; and five brothers and four sisters, all of Mexico.

Species still available are caragana, cotoneaster, honeysuckle, lilac, plum, sumac, sand cherry, nanking cherry, saqash, Chinese elm, cottonwood, golden willow, hackberry, honeylocust, Russian olive, poplar, aspen, Austrian pine, Colorado blue spruce, Eastern red cedar, rocky mountain juniper and Scotch pine.

four from the Panhandle. The Panhandle is divided into three areas, and we will be voting in the South Area, which includes Swisher, Castro, Parmer, Deaf Smith, Briscoe, Hall, Oldham, Wheeler, Gray, Donley and Collingsworth counties. One representative will come from this area. I will try to represent the 11 counties in our area. Though we are separated by many miles, our concerns are one.

"Voting places will be designated for each town. A voter must be registered to vote in Texas and be 60 years of age or older on January 1, 1986.

"The Swisher County Senior Citizens Association and the Retired Senior Volunteer Program Association have endorsed my candidacy and pledged their support.

"I seek your vote and influence in the May 20, 1986 election. Thank you for your support," Mrs. Hulsey concluded.

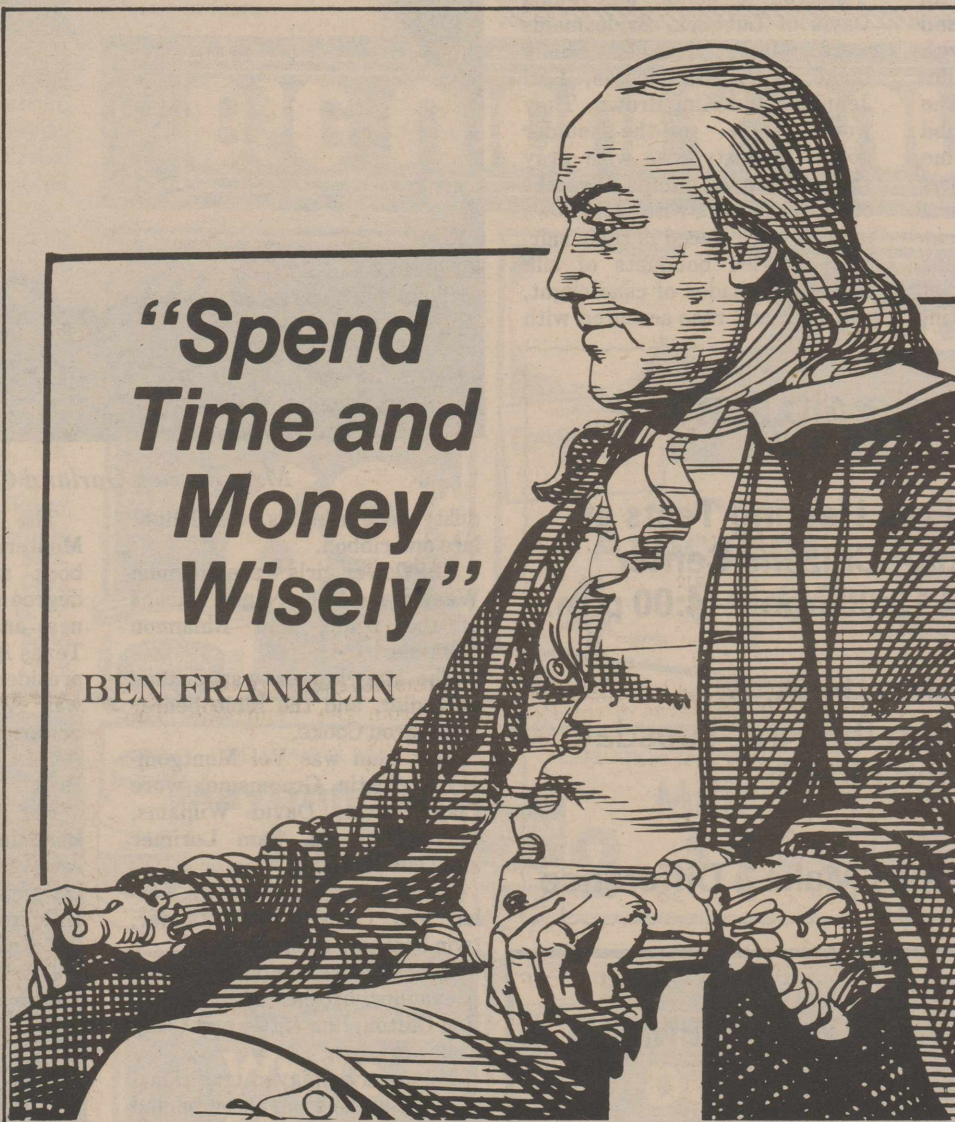

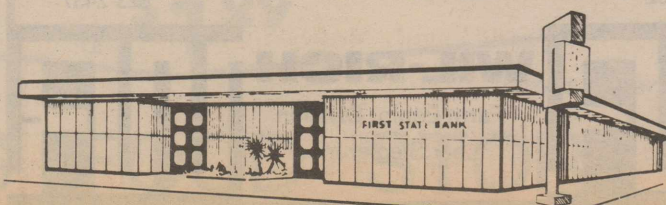
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Alexander-Cooke Vows Exchanged In Lubbock

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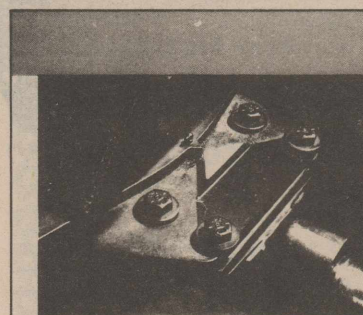
