FSA increases microloan limits

Texas Farm Service Agency (FSA) State Executive Director Judith A. Canales reminds farmers and ranchers that the FSA borrowing limit for microloans increased from \$35,000 to \$50,000, effective Nov. 7. Microloans offer borrowers simplified lending with less paperwork. Canales said it makes borrowing from FSA a "first opportunity" to farm or ranch or quickly expand existing operations.

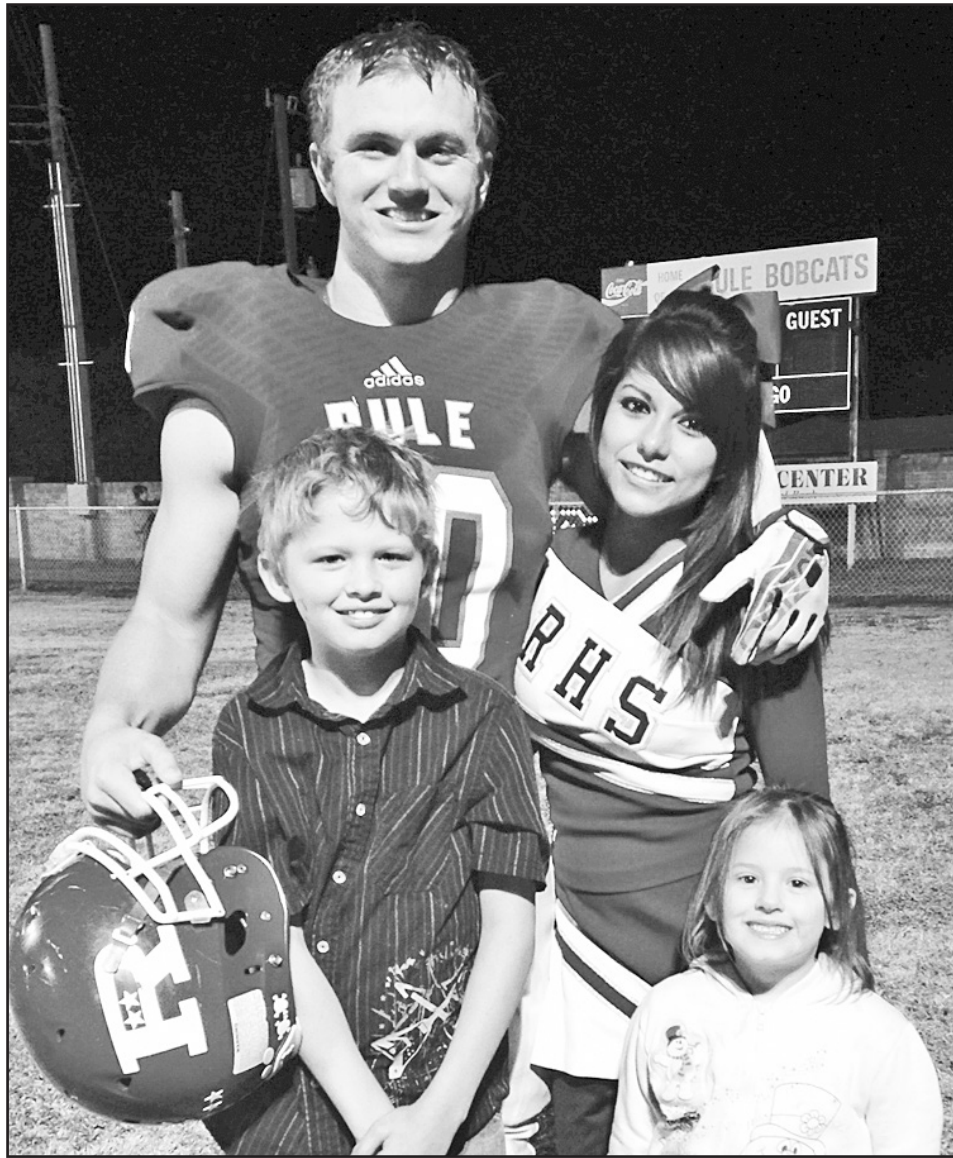
"This will help more people because of new flexibilities created by the 2014 Farm Bill," Canales said. "We're especially excited in Texas, because we want to encourage more beginners and young people, especially those from historically underserved communities, to consider farming and ranching as a way to become independent businessmen and women. It's a rewarding way to build or expand a family operation."

The microloan change allows beginning, small and mid-sized farmers to access an additional \$15,000 in loans using a simplified application process with up to seven years to repay. Microloans are part of USDA's continued commitment to small and midsized farming operations.

To complement the microloan program additional changes to FSA eligibility requirements will enhance beginning farmers and ranchers access to land, a key barrier to entry level producers. FSA policies related to farm experience have changed so that other types of skills may be considered to meet the direct farming experience required for farm ownership loan eligibility. Operation or management of non-farm businesses, leadership positions while serving in the military or advanced education in an agricultural field will now count towards the experience applicants need to show when applying for farm ownership loans.

"If you want to comment on our changes to the microloan and loan eligibility, you have an opportunity to share suggestions," Canales said. The comment period runs through Dec. 8, 2014.

Since 2010, FSA has made a record amount of farm loans—more than 165,000 loans totaling nearly \$23 billion. More than 50 percent of USDA's farm loans now go to beginning farmers. In addition, FSA has increased its lending to socially-disadvantaged producers by nearly 50 percent since 2010.

Sugarcane aphid update

submitted by Jason Westbrook CEA-Ag, Haskell Co. from Panhandle Pest Update Texas Panhandle Sugarcane Aphid Update with comments about Sorghum Ergot by Dr. Ed Bynum, Amarillo Extension Entomologist

In the last issue of the Panhandle Pest Update (vol. 6 issue 17), Dr. Ed Bynum, Extension Entomologist, Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service-Amarillo reported on sugarcane aphids (SCA) being confirmed on the Texas Panhandle in Moore County. Bynum provided a description of the conditions in the field where there were very few SCA numbers but sorghum heads with a lot of honeydew. After finding SCA in Moore County Tues., Nov. 4, Bynum was in Lubbock Thurs., Nov. 6, and talked with Dr. Calvin Trostle, A&M Extension Agronomist-Lubbock and Dr. Gary Peterson, A&M Sorghum Breeder-Lubbock, about SCA and ergot symptoms of sticky honeydew in sorghum fields on the High Plains.

Dr. Calvin Trostle found a small colony of SCA while looking at a sorghum variety trial near Vega (Oldham County) Tues., Nov. 6. Bynum went to the field on Nov. 7 and could not find anymore SCA. Bynum was able to ID the aphids as SCA from a sample saved by Dr. Trostle. But, this field did not have ergot infected heads. Because Vega, is not far from the USDA-ARS/Texas A&M AgriLife Research station at Bushland, Dr. Jourdan Bell, A&M Extension Agronomist-Amarillo, and

Bynum looked for SCA in sorghum fields at the Bushland station on Nov. 7. With the help of Grant Johnson, USDA Technician, we found one nice size SCA colony in a dryland field. We were not able to find another colony this size, but found individual aphids on other leaves in the dryland field and in an irrigated field. Also, it was not difficult to see that the secondary tiller heads were infected with ergot in the dryland field.

Dr. Gary Odvody, A&M Plant Pathologist-Corpus Christi, provides this description of sorghum ergot. "...honeydew on the sorghum heads is almost surely sorghum ergot caused by *Claviceps africana*. It is probably very common across the area as the ever cooler nights promote male-sterility in the late-developing heads, which favors infection by *C. africana*. Typically, sorghum ergot is readily controlled or prevented through rapid pollination and seed set. The longer dew periods also contribute to infection by *C. africana* and the dripping of honeydew onto the ground also indicates extended dew periods." And comments by Dr. Ron French, A&M Plant Pathologist-Amarillo are "We had ideal low temperatures that favored disease at some time in September which affected late planted sorghum, suckers, volunteers" and "We have had several cases of sorghum ergot based on reports from others and phone calls/emails I have received."

So, for our situation of light SCA infestations in the Panhandle, the issue of "gummy" honeydew in late-developing heads is from Ergot and SCA.

ETT constructs, owns and operates transmission facilities within the Electric Reliability Council of Texas, primarily in and around the AEP Texas Central Company and AEP Texas North Company service territories. In 2013, ETT completed construction of seven 345-kilovolt (kV) transmission line projects associated with the Competitive Renewable Energy Zones (CREZ) initiative in West Texas. Spigot is open:

Flow of legislative bills, resolutions begins

AUSTIN—On Nov. 10, dozens among Texas' 31 state senators and 150 state representatives, including a few members-elect who won't be sworn for nearly two months, jumped right in and filed legislative bills in advance of the 84th regular session of the Texas Legislature, which convenes on Tuesday, Jan. 13.

In all last week, 316 House and 170 Senate bills, proposed constitutional amendments and commemorative resolutions were filed. These are samples of the subject matter in those early-filed bills: acceptable forms of voter identification, use of a portable wireless communication device while operating a motor vehicle, repeal of the franchise tax, property tax reform, minimum wage increase, changes regarding the offense of student hazing, and free pre-kindergarten in public schools. The bill-filing deadline is the 60th day of the session, March 13. By then, lawmakers likely will have filed more than 10,000 bills and resolutions.

In other news, Sen. Glenn Hegar, R-Katy, who was elected state comptroller on Nov. 4, announced he will resign from the Senate effective Dec. 5. Gov. Rick Perry set Dec. 6 as the date for a special election to fill the seat opened by Hegar's departure. State Rep. Lois Kolkhorst, R-Brenham, is in the race for the seat. Kolkhorst is chair of the House Committee on Public Health and a member of the House Committee on County Affairs. Others candidates for the seat are expected to file declarations soon.

New effort to help veterans

A pilot project, the Texas Veterans Initiative, will allow a \$1 million investment by the state to match local and private funds to expand and evaluate community-based mental health programs serving veterans and their families.

In a Nov. 10 announcement, Gov. Rick Perry, Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst and House Speaker Joe Straus said that if the pilot phase generates widespread interest from communities around the state, the Legislature could act in 2015 to expand it. The project will be funded through the budget of the Texas Health and Human Services Commission.

"This project brings communities together to provide better outcomes for Texans who served our country in uniform," Straus said. "It's a smart, effective way

to address an issue that affects veterans across this state. This pilot program is a very good starting point as we head into the legislative session."

Texas Health and Human Services Commissioner Kyle Janek said, "The U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs currently offers a variety of mental health programs but there are still many gaps and geographic barriers. The Texas Veterans Initiative will create an opportunity for Texas communities to come together to fill those gaps and improve the delivery of mental health services to veterans and their families for years to come."

Ebola monitoring reaches end

Texas Department of State Health Services Commissioner David Lakey announced that the last person being monitored in connection with the state's three diagnosed Ebola patients would be cleared from twice-daily monitoring by the end of the day on Nov. 6.

According to Lakey's announcement, some 177 people were monitored because they had contact with at least one of the three Texas Ebola patients, specimens or medical waste. The last person being monitored Friday is a hospital worker who handled medical waste Oct. 17.

Abbott names secretary of state

Governor-elect Greg Abbott on Nov. 11 announced his choice of Cameron County Judge Carlos Cascos as the next Texas secretary of state, to succeed Secretary of State Nandita Berry, who was appointed by Gov. Perry and was sworn into office on Jan. 7.

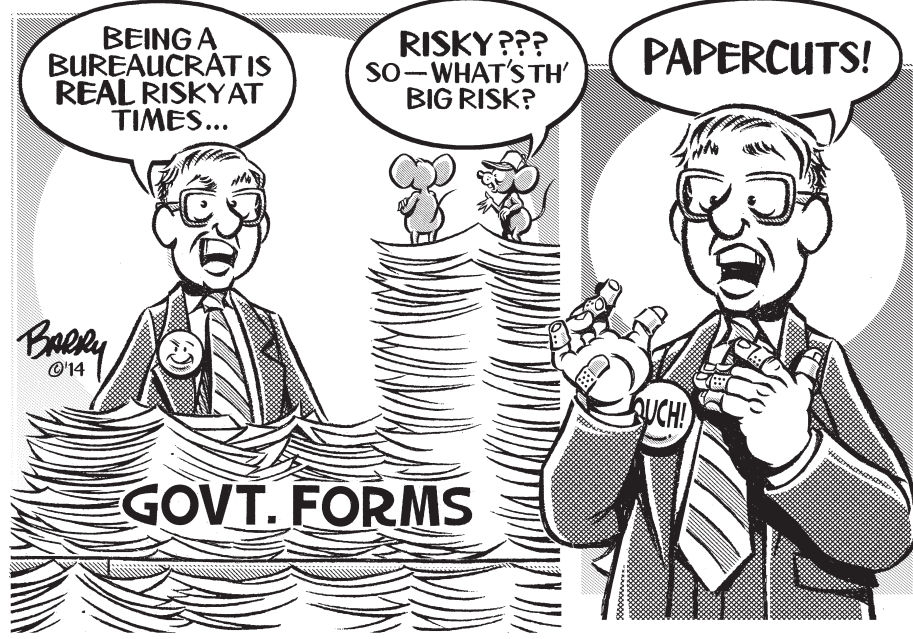
Berry congratulated Cascos, expressed pride in the work she has done over the past year, said she is looking forward to serving out the remainder of her term and then returning to the private sector.

Sales tax revenue increases

State sales tax revenue in October was \$2.41 billion, up 12.9 percent compared to October 2013, Texas Comptroller Susan Combs said in a Nov. 5 news release.

Growth in sales tax receipts can be seen across all major economic sectors, Combs said, with notable increases from retail trade and the oil and natural gas-related sectors, plus increased spending by both consumers and businesses.

The comptroller's office will send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts their November local sales tax allocations totaling \$723.1 million, up 10.5 percent compared to November 2013.

Classes offered for engaged couples

Wedding planning is hard, but marriage can be harder. Thanks to a program sponsored by the Health and Human Services Commission, couples approaching marriage can build a solid foundation and save the \$60 marriage license fee as well.

The Together in Texas program offers premarital education to engaged couples across the state through a network of providers. Couples who go through a class can have their marriage license fee reduced by \$60 and waive the 72-hour waiting period after they get their license.

"The premarital education that couples get

in the Together in Texas program can set a strong foundation for a marriage and give couples a better idea of the challenges they will face," said Gordon Leeks, who oversees the program for HHSC.

"The idea behind Together in Texas is that couples take an eight-hour class which covers conflict resolution, communication and other key aspects of marriage," Leeks said. "The goal is to increase the well-being of all Texas children by providing voluntary marriage and relationship education skills to their parents."

Couples can find organizations and churches that offer the classes by searching online at TogetherInTexas.com or calling 2-1-1. Contact the organization of your choice to check on class times and register to attend. Some organizations charge a small fee to cover the costs of the classes, and others offer free classes.

Couples who complete a class get a certificate that they can take to their county clerk when they apply for their marriage license. The certificate is good for one year and serves as proof that the couple is eligible for the discounted marriage license fee.


Program facts:

- The marriage education classes and discount for a marriage license were authorized by House Bill 2685 from the 2007 Texas legislative session.
- 29,000 people statewide completed the classes in FY 2014.
- There are 2,600 organizations in Texas that provide marriage education classes that qualify for the marriage license discount.

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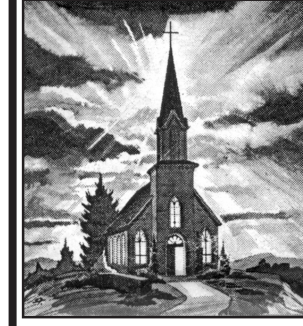

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Farm Bill Safety Net Programs selection continues until March

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) reminds farm owners and producers that the opportunity to choose between the new 2014 Farm Bill established programs, Agriculture Risk Coverage (ARC) and Price Loss Coverage (PLC), begins Nov. 17, 2014, and continues through March 31, 2015. The new programs, designed to help producers better manage risk, usher in one of the most significant reforms to U.S. farm programs in decades.

"USDA is committed to keeping farm owners and producers well informed on all steps in this process to ensure that they have all of the information that they need before making their coverage choice," said Farm Service Agency Administrator Val Dolcini. "The new ARC and PLC programs provide a more rational approach to helping farmers manage risk by ensuring families don't lose the farm because of events beyond their control."

USDA helped create online tools to assist in the decision process, allowing farm owners and producers to enter information about their operation and see projections that show what ARC and/or PLC will mean for them under possible future scenarios. Farm owners and producers can access the online resources, available at www.fsa.usda.gov/arc-plc, from the convenience of their home computer or mobile device at any time.

"In addition to the new online tools, USDA has done extensive outreach,

including partnering with State Cooperative Extension Services to hold meetings and meet with farm owners and producers," said Dolcini. "USDA leaders will continue visiting with farm owners and producers to share information and answer questions about the new programs. We want to help producers boil the information down, understand their options and make the best decision on which program—ARC or PLC—is right for them."

Covered commodities include barley, canola, large and small chickpeas, corn, crambe, flaxseed, grain sorghum, lentils, mustard seed, oats, peanuts, dry peas, rapeseed, long grain rice, medium grain rice (which includes short grain rice), safflower seed, sesame, soybeans, sunflower seed and wheat. Upland cotton is no longer a covered commodity.

Dates associated with ARC and PLC that farm owners and producers need to know:

- Now through Feb. 27, 2015: Farm owners may visit their local Farm Service Agency office to update yield history and/or reallocate base acres.

- Nov. 17, 2014 to March 31, 2015: Producers make a one-time election between ARC and PLC for the 2014 through 2018 crop years.

- Mid-April 2015 through summer 2015: Producers sign contracts for 2014 and 2015 crop years.

- October 2015: Payments issued for 2014 crop year, if needed.

- Now through Feb. 27, 2015: Farm owners make base reallocation/yield updates.

Nov. 17, 2014, to March 31, 2015: Producers make election between ARC/PLC.

Mid-April through Summer 2015: Producers sign contracts for 2014 and 2015 crop years.

October 2015: Payments issued for 2014 crop year, if needed.

To learn more about which safety net options are most appropriate for specific farming operations, farmers can use new Web tools at www.fsa.usda.gov/arc-plc, which can be accessed from the convenience of a home computer or a mobile device at any time. The announcement was made possible through the 2014 Farm Bill, which builds on historic economic gains in rural America over the past five years, while achieving meaningful reform and billions of dollars in savings for the taxpayer. Since enactment, USDA has made significant progress to implement each provision of this critical legislation, including providing disaster relief to farmers and ranchers; strengthening risk management tools; expanding access to rural credit; funding critical research; establishing innovative public-private conservation partnerships; developing new markets for rural-made products; and investing in infrastructure, housing and community facilities to help improve quality of life in rural America.
