#### **RV** lot

My complaint is concerning the recreational vehicle lot that the 64th Services Squadron operates. It used to be \$6; now it has gone up to \$10. It's not so much the price, it's the fact that the people that live in housing are almost forced to put their stuff there, because you don't want it downtown at some storage locker and it [the cost] coming out of your pocket.

If you could look into this for me, sir, I really would appreciate it.

Thanks for your call. As you probably know, we have a RV lot to preclude the congestion and parking problems these vehicles pose in the housing area. The RV lot provides a secure place for individuals who have chosen to own RVs to park there.

While the price has increased, it is still half the price you would pay downtown, and it is about average for an AETC base.

The money goes to pay for personnel operating the lot. Owning an RV or another "extra" vehicle usually entails some expense, and I believe our RV lot is helping keep that expense to a minimum.

#### **BX** construction

I am retired Air Force and I have a question concerning the construction over at the exchange. It's been almost a year now, I think, and those 30-foot patches are still not patched up. I'd like to know about when it will be completed and why it is taking so long.

I understand and share your frustration, but there is a plan we're following. The road construction at the BX is an ongoing project which has a completion date of March 18.

This project was designed to be constructed in two phases. The 30-foot patches in question are in phase II of this project. Phase II will tie in to the area in question, and extend through the area where the old auto hobby shop was located. The delay in starting phase II was caused by another project, which consisted of removing hazardous materials from the site where the auto hobby shop was located.

The environmental concerns regarding the removal of hazardous materials caused several unforeseen delays in the removal process. However, that project is complete and phase II of the road project is well under way. We regret the inconvenience and appreciate your patience. Thanks for calling.

## **Inclement weather policy explained**

With winter and poor driving conditions rapidly approaching, it seems prudent to review the inclement weather policy for Reese. Commanders and supervisors should be aware of these policies and ensure all of their members.are briefed prior to the first incident of inclement weather.

When weather conditions occur during normal duty hours, the wing commander will determine whether to continue operations or suspend operations and dismiss all employees except those providing critical services. Critical services.are those required regardless of weather conditions. Personnel performing these critical services will be designated, in writing, by the squadron commander as "emergency weather essential."

If early dismissal is authorized, notification will be through in-house communications (i.e., group commanders will notify squadron commanders, who will notify flight chiefs, and so on). A specific dismissal time will be given; however, supervisors are encouraged to utilize a staggered release to avoid traffic congestion. Supervisors must consider and coordinate instructions to second- and third-shift employees.

When severe weather occurs dur-

ing non-duty hours the wing commander has three options:

□ The installation will remain open as usual.

□ A specific late reporting hour will be specified.


□ The installation will be closed and all employees not rendering critical services are excused from reporting for duty for the designated period.

In all cases, emergency weather essential personnel will report at their regularly scheduled time or as directed by their supervisor. Notification during non-duty hours will be by a public news media release from public affairs. Radio stations KFYO-AM (790 KHz) and KZII-FM (102.5 KHz) are the Lubbock area primary outlets of the nationwide Emergency Broadcast System and will be notified first. Other radio and television stations will be notified as time allows.

During severe weather conditions, the safety and welfare of the Reese work force are paramount. However, employees must be encouraged to understand weather conditions do not create automatic official absences. Employees are expected to make all reasonable efforts to report for duty on inclement weather days.

### 1993 enlisted awards winners announced

#### **MSgt. Donald Carroll**

First sergeant of the year Sergeant Carroll, a native of Washington, D.C., earned recognition for being "highly enthusiastic, caring and a top-notch counselor." Among his other accomplishments, the MG member revitalized the unit advisory council, booster club and Top 4.

He also reorganized the unit dormitory program — working with civil engineering to repair common areas, setting up self-help teams and rewriting the local dormitory manager's guide. The effort resulted in praise during the most recent Quality Air Force Assessment.

Sergeant Carroll was also cited for his participation in a variety of social, community and charitable activities, such as the holiday food fund, Toys for Tots, Air Force Sergeants Association, Meals on Wheels and more.

#### MSgt. James Koranda Senior NCO of the year

Sergeant Koranda, the other winner from MG, is the NCO in charge of nutritional medicine. Originally from Washington state, he was credited with maintaining the quality standards in his section despite a lengthy period when manning was at 50 percent. His work was praised during a command staff assistance visit, as AETC officials said he provided the "highest level" of patient satisfaction.

He is active in unit fundraisers, the unit booster club and Top 4, and he offered his time to several community projects during the year, such as the Easter Seals camp, Mentoring Program and saving bonds drive.

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He graduated as valedictorian from Wayland

#### SSgt. Harry Washington NCO of the year

Sergeant Washington was credited with helping the 52nd Flying Training Squadron, then a new unit, start their orderly room and information management section "from scratch." OG officials said he finished "impossible" tasks in record time, selflessly using his off-duty time when needed.

The Milwaukee native's work was so good that the command inspectors found his section "flawless" during the April QAFA. Now in charge of the OG information management program, Sergeant Washington provides guidance to four squadrons and six major contractors.

The sergeant also spends large parts of his free time helping in the community. He does volunteer work with a local drug/alcohol abuse treatment center for adolescents, works as a lay minister for the Church of Christ at the base chapel and serves as a volunteer at the Texas Tech University Medical Center, helping seriously ill patients and their families.

Airman of the year

Airman Todd, a freight packaging specialist from LS, oversaw the movement of more than 65 tons of cargo, ranging from commonplace items to high explosives.

He was a key player in wing mobility activities, helping earn top ratings for the air cargo terminal during the command operational readiness inspection in April. Airman Todd was also the driving force behind the acquisition of an automated United Parcel Service computer in his section.

The Kentucky native is a member of the base honor guard and unit advisory council, he serves as an adjunct instructor in the Reese Airman Leadership School, and he was LS airman of the quarter during the past year.

### **CHAMPUS** filing change

AURORA, Colo. - Rules for filing CHAMPUS claims will change in the new year, said CHAMPUS officials.

Starting Jan. 1, all CHAMPUS claims must be filed with the appropriate CHAMPUS contractor no later than one year after the services are provided. In the case of inpatient care, the claim must be filed within one year of the date the patient is discharged from the hospital.

For example, if professional or outpatient facility services were provided Jan. 1, 1994, the claim must be postmarked no later than Jan. 1, 1995.

For inpatient facility services, if the patient was discharged Jan. 1, 1994, that claim must also be postmarked no later



than January 1995. Claims for treatment or services provided any time during 1993 are due to a claims contractor by the end of 1994. The deadline for filing claims
