

Reese people, jets shine at Top Flight V

COLUMBUS AFB, Miss. — Reese's people and jets shined at Top Flight V, capturing two first places and two third places in the June 4 competition.

The semiannual competition is designed to test instructor pilots and maintainers. Teams, selected by ATC, are evaluated on flying and teaching skills, maintenance, general knowledge and the condition of the aircraft.

Reese's T-1A crew of Capt. Alex Bays and Capt. Joseph Brug nolotti were winners in the Jayhawk category. Competition in that category was done here at Reese prior to Top Flight V.

In addition, Reese was first in the T-38 appearance competition, as tail no. 3706 took first place.

Reese was also well represented in the T-38 competition. The operations team from the 54th Flying Training Squadron "Dragon" Flight took third place; the team was comprised of Flight Commander Capt. Eric Reinhard, Capt. Michael Joyce, Capt. Santiago Vaca and 1st Lt. Joel Heft.


Talon maintainers took third place in their competition. The Lockheed members on that team included Joseph Shadwick, James Rohlik, Ronald Lake, Alvin Long and Randy Weatherford.

For the second consecutive time, the 47th Flying Training Wing from Laughlin AFB, Texas, took top honors.

Finishing second was the 14th FTW at Columbus, the competition's host wing. The 80th FTW from

Sheppard AFB, Texas, placed third.

Laughlin took six first-place awards, including the top wing award. Others firsts came in the top operations flight, top maintenance team, top T-37 flight, top T-38 flight, and Laughlinite Carl Riordan was the top T-37 crew chief. The competition for the most precise arrival over a target also went to Laughlin, only 1.4 seconds off their assigned time.

Laughlin also won overall wing and top maintenance team honors in Top Flight IV competition held in November 1992 at Reese. Top Flight V was the first held at Columbus since competition began in 1989.

"The emphasis is on instruction — being able to take your skills and impart them to someone else," said Gen. Henry Viccellio Jr., ATC commander. "Tomorrow's Air Force is going to be determined to a great degree by what these

people in our command do."

General Viccellio presented the winners with trophies during a banquet in the Columbus AFB Officers Club. Mayor Fred Hayslett of Columbus was among the local dignitaries.

The observers at Top Flight included Brig. Gen. William L. Worthington Jr., ATC director of logistics; Brig. Gen. J. O. McFalls III, ATC director of operations; Brig. Gen. Edward F. Grillo Jr., 97th Air Mobility Wing commander, Altus AFB, Okla.; and Col. Robert E. Gatloff, 12th FTW commander, Randolph AFB, Texas.

Instructor pilots and maintenance teams from each base, and the planes they took to Top Flight, were chosen by a drawing. The teams were given only two days to prepare. The short-notice evaluation looks at how well each base conducts flying training and maintains the aircraft.

Top Flight V had an international flavor, with the leader of Sheppard's operational team being German Luftwaffe Capt. Joachim "Joe" Dufner. He had just finished giving a flying lesson to an American student when he was informed June 1 he had one day to get ready for his first Top Flight. Captain Dufner said he counted on his 2,000 hours in fighters to perform well, but the other pilots had been good, too.


"There's no flight that's perfect," he said. "You're always going to make mistakes, but I've got a chance."

The pilots complained of occasional turbulence, but otherwise flying weather was excellent for Top Flight. High humidity stressed the ground crews, however. And, of course, there was the unexpected to contend with.

On Thursday, a Columbus T-38 drawn for Top Flight required an unexpected engine change. "They started changing the engine at 8 p.m. It was completed by midnight," a DynCorp spokesman said. Like a race car emerging from a pit stop, the T-38 was ready at 6 a.m. when Top Flight started.

Other bases also overcame minor mechanical setbacks. One of the Sheppard T-38s had recently transferred from Williams AFB, Ariz. "It had 16 write-ups (maintenance problems) when it came in," said Walter D. Beeman, team leader of the Maintenance Systems Corp. team from Sheppard. Despite the short notice, his team completed all repairs for the competition. (Adapted from ATC News Service)

End of an era

Class 93-10 last under old UPT

Thirty-three of the Air Force's newest pilots will receive their wings and end undergraduate pilot training as it is currently known when Reese UPT Class 93-10 graduates during a ceremony at 10 a.m. today in the Simler Theater.

This ceremony marks the end of an era, as Class 93-10 is the last to graduate under the old UPT system. All graduates in the future will be the product of "specialized" UPT.

Maj. Gen. Robert E. Harris, former commander of the Pennsylvania Air National Guard, will be the guest speaker at the graduation. The ceremony is open to the base.

The ceremony will be followed by several events in the Reese Officers' Open Mess. They include a buffet from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m., a parents' social at 6:15 p.m. and a dinner-dance at 7 p.m.

During the ceremony and dinner-dance, awards will be

presented to students and permanent party members. They will include the commander's trophy (top graduate), "top stick" (best in flying training), academics, distinguished graduate, leadership and outstanding second lieutenant.

Permanent party awards will go to the outstanding academic and flightline instructor pilots, maintainers and mission makers.

From my perspective

If you're obligating government funds without proper authorization, you actually may be obligating your own money instead. Contracting has the sole authorization to deal with contractors and obligate government funds.

While it may seem harmless to call and ask



for prices or other information about services or products, individuals can run into trouble when contractors take their inquiries as intent to purchase. Doing so can also prevent the government from getting the most for its money.

What usually happens is individuals purchase items and then attempt to get reimbursed for the costs. But if the Air Force doesn't really need it and you purchased it without being authorized by contracting prior to purchasing, you have to pay for it out of your own pocket.

Some of the most common misuses of funds involve farewell gifts. Individuals purchase plaques or other mementos thinking that they are

for official purposes. But regulations clearly prohibit use of government funds for such purchases.

Many individuals may believe that calling on their own speeds up the acquisition process. Actually, letting contracting handle the request can be to the individual's advantage: a well-written justification and requirement allows the contracting officer to determine the best product to fill the customer's needs. Calling a contractor first can result in the customer getting less than what their mission requires.

Define requirements first and let contracting handle the rest.

Quality Air Force

A major part of the Air Force's approach to Total Quality Management focuses on refining and streamlining a process to improve customer service. In the business of training student pilots, our process begins with a new commissioned officer with little or no experience in military aviation and ends with a fully qualified, highly trained pilot, ready to assume new responsibilities in a follow-on major weapon system. Looking to improve that process is a tough job that must begin by properly identifying our customers and their expectations. So, in ATC, who's our customer?

Some would say that since Reese is a pilot training base, the student pilots are our customers. Others would say that since we train pilots for the major commands, they are our customers. Both groups may be right.

In ATC and here at Reese, we are on the leading edge of the Air Force's move toward quality in everything we do. During our transition to specialized undergraduate pilot training, we in the 54th Flying Training Squadron are changing our philosophy from providing the Air Force with a universally assignable pilot, to providing a specialized, uniquely trained pilot who is comfortable and familiar with fighter and bomber concepts.

This change was in direct response to our primary MAJCOM customer — Air Combat Command — who wanted a quality pilot, skilled in basic fighter/bomber fundamentals. Not only are we providing a different service (advanced flying training) to our student customers, but we are providing a more specialized product (pilots) to the gaining MAJCOM.

In order to better train students to employ their aircraft in basic fighter/bomber scenarios, SUPT has brought about several changes to the syllabus of training. From the first day in training, 38 percent of the students begin to develop the basic skills, habit patterns, and mentality of a fighter/bomber pilot by learning to use their aircraft to meet challenging objectives. After learning to fly the aircraft single ship, students are introduced to two-ship fluid maneuvering and low-level flying, new concepts designed to emphasize employing the aircraft in operational terms.

Fluid maneuvering, or FM, was developed to introduce the basic air-to-air skills that students will expand upon when they progress to their follow on fighter/bomber assignments. During F.M. exercises, the objective is to maneuver your aircraft (in three dimensions) from approximately 6,000 feet behind another aircraft (training aid) to a position approximately 1,000 feet behind. All the while, the training aid turns, climbs and dives to present a challenge to the maneuvering aircraft and delay its closing to 1,000 feet.

SUPT is also expanding low-level navigation to include two-ship low-level maneuvering. More advanced than single-ship low-level, students are tasked to

maneuver two aircraft, as low as 500 feet, over a predetermined groundtrack to a target within strict time constraints. As with FM, we're training basic employment principles directly applicable to our future fighter and bomber pilots.

Well, that explains much of what ATC is doing to meet the needs of the MAJCOM customers, but where do the students fit in all of this? While students are primarily concerned with getting their wings, they do realize the importance of quality training in terms of their success in completing SUPT and their ability to pick and choose follow-on aircraft assignments.

The new training in both T-37s and T-38s is much more rigorous, but the new graduate is a unique product — tailored to meet the changing needs of a "leaner, meaner" Air Force. On a day-to-day basis, students look to their individual instructor pilots and squadron supervisors for quality training that will guarantee their success in SUPT. In addition, they look to the future and question what direction their careers should take.

With the command's shift toward instructor pilots with major weapon system experience, there is a wealth of "hands-on" knowledge to be passed to the student pilots. Questions ranging from, "What do I want to fly?" to, "Where do I want to go?" remain atop of the list. So at the squadron level, students are trained according to a higher training standard and they receive guidance and counsel for their Air Force careers in follow-on weapon systems.

Now that we know what the MAJCOMs want — a specialized, highly trained product — and we know what we need to do to properly train our students, how do we get there? Hq. ATC gave us the direction; we in the 54th needed to draw the road map.

In January, our initial cadre of four instructors was trained at Randolph AFB, Texas, to teach FM. Now we are well on our way to qualifying the entire squadron. In order to provide quality training today and in the future, we also developed comprehensive training guidelines. These guidelines were developed so that each flight's training program is in line with command and squadron goals. Flexibility is purposely built in to these programs so that common sense may prevail where regulations do not stipulate a specific course of action. The training we provide our instructor pilots now will get us through the short term; the training programs we develop as a result of our experience and expertise will serve us well into the future.

In today's Air Force we must be committed to excellence and quality with every tax dollar spent. SUPT is designed to provide a specific product to our MAJCOMs through a streamlined process that costs less without sacrificing quality. Given this objective, the 54th FTS has refined and developed comprehensive training programs to teach fighter/bomber fundamentals to tomorrow's pilots. By providing quality training and demanding excellence, we provide a quality product to *both* of our customers.

ATC evaluates base facility excellence

The Air Training Command Facility Excellence Evaluation team will visit Reese June 21 through 24.

Headed by Col. Hunter Hopson Jr., ATC deputy director of civil engineering, the seven-person team will evaluate how well Reese maintains its facilities and plans for future needs.

"The Facility Excellence Evaluation Program has several objectives," said Maj. Duncan Showers, 64th Civil Engineering Squadron commander. "Chief among these is to encourage a high standard of general housekeeping, working conditions and living conditions. The program also puts a great deal of emphasis on quality-of-life improvements."

Col. Bob Brooks, 64th Support Group commander, said the team's arrival provides another opportunity to show the tremendous pride Reese people have in their indi-

vidual facilities and the overall base.

"We impressed the Quality Air Force Assessment team in April," said Colonel Brooks, "and I'm sure Colonel Hopson and his team will be equally impressed."

Another objective for the team is to see how the base uses innovative efforts to maintain the command standard in facility maintenance and upkeep.

According to Capt. Steve Moes, the team coordinator, the team also looks at how well each installation uses self-help as a force multiplier.

The captain added that one of the rewards of being on the team is being able to recognize those bases that reflect achievements in base care.

The bulk of the team's evaluation will be done June 22. The team is scheduled to outbrief the base population on their evaluation at 9 a.m. June 24 in the Simler Theater.



Reese expands testing for water contamination

Col. David R. Love, 64th Flying Training Wing commander, has announced a program of extended testing of groundwater wells in the immediate vicinity of Reese.

The announcement was made during a news conference here June 3.

Colonel Love said the testing is primarily to look for traces of trichlorethylene, or TCE, in the groundwater around Reese. TCE is a chemical used in industrial solvents and was last purchased by Reese in 1972.

The groundwater situation does not affect Reese residences or offices. The base has been on Lubbock city water for more than 20 years

and does not use groundwater wells. Reese Elementary also uses Lubbock water.

The extended testing is being con-

ducted by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and is already under way. The testing will analyze groundwater under 36 sections of Lubbock County surrounding the base.

Reese officials emphasize that the expanded testing is not an indication of any new contamination or significant growth in off-base areas identified by the corps in February. Those tests were conducted as part of a continuing Installation Restoration Program initiated here in August 1983.

Reese officials elected to expand the testing area in the interest of public safety and in cooperation with the Environmental Protection Agency.

Wing officials said that in order to define the testing, evaluation and reporting process, the EPA issued an "Administra-

tive Order on Consent." The order is an agreement between Reese and the EPA to work together to successfully determine the exact locations of TCE in the groundwater, to provide safe water for affected areas and to work with the Texas Water Commission to establish procedures for cleanup of those areas.

"Many of the requirements of the agreement have already been fulfilled by Reese," said Colonel Love. "Basically, the agreement defines additional reporting requirements for Reese and extends the area that Reese is already monitoring."

Approximately 300 wells will be tested in the 36 section area over the next two months.

To date, TCE has been detected in relatively low levels in two off base locations. One is immediately south of Fourth Street from War Highway, parallel with

Reese Village. The second is directly east of Reese Village, extending north of Third Street to FM 179. Reese officials have already completed the installation of carbon filter systems on most area wells that have been found to have any detectable levels of TCE, including those below the EPA drinking water standard of five parts per billion, where the land owner has desired Air Force assistance.

The filters remove TCE, which is insoluble, and any other impurities from the water.


"The filters make the water completely safe," said Colonel Love.

As a permanent solution, the base is seeking an alternate water supply source for all affected residents and businesses. A primary water source being pursued is the extension of city of Lubbock water lines to those areas.


Construction continues

Quality performer


This week's quality performer is Maj. Terry Hughes, executive officer to the 64th Operations Group Commander.


