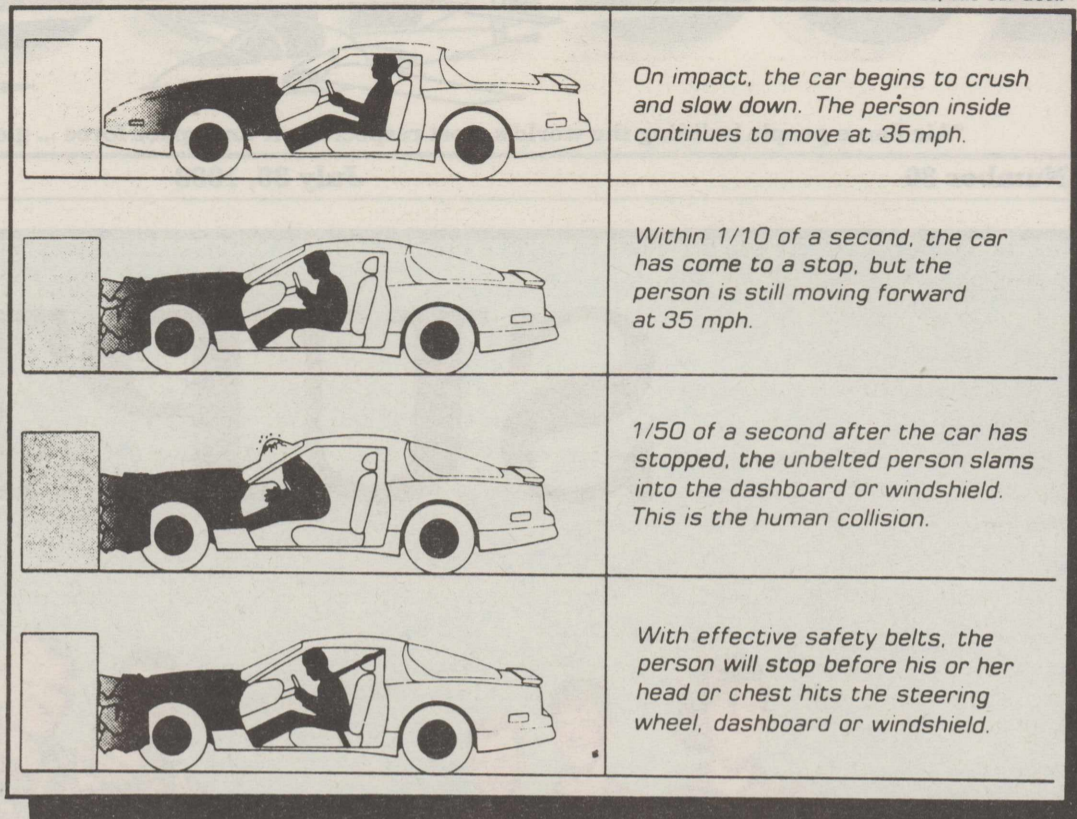

## Equipping yourself for safety

For many reasons, military personnel and family members either forget or ignore the need for personal protective equipment while working, playing around the home or during recreational activities. The injuries to the forgetful person are sometimes minor, but they can be quite painful.

Here are some reminders to prevent such injuries:

□ As the lawn mowing season continues, there are many operations that require the use of personal protective equipment. Wear sturdy shoes to protect your feet from flying objects or objects hidden in the grass during mowing; wear long pants to protect your legs from objects flying off trimmers; and use goggles or a face shield to protect your eyes when you operate your weedeater, powered edger or mower.

□ When cooking outdoors, use long-handled tools and hand protection, such as pot holders or gloves. Many outdoor cooks forget a food item on the grill is just as hot as one in a frying pan.

□ When biking or riding a skateboard, an approved impact-resistant helmet with an adjustable chin strap can prevent a serious head injury. Knee and elbow pads also protect vital areas when skateboarding.

□ Protect your eyes and use impact-resistant sports eye wear when playing racquetball, tennis, handball or squash.

□ When hiking or just taking long walks, ensure your footwear provides support for the sole of the foot and the ankle. This support will prevent injuries in event of an unexpected twist or turn.

□ When riding a motorcycle or motorbike, over-the-ankle shoes, long pants and shirt combined with an approved helmet will ensure you are following Air Force regulations and state laws.

## Quality Air Force

Recent changes in travel pay service could possibly be seen as a reduction in quality. For example, the finance office no longer gives a cash advance to people eligible for a government charge card from Diners Club. Also, the finance office will no longer offer pay-as-you-wait service for settlement vouchers.

However, the people in finance are still committed to quality travel pay service, to include more convenient access to cash advances, use of a charge card for travel expenses while TDY, and a quick turnaround on settlement payments.

As many people already know, travelers can easily obtain cash advances through automated teller machines at a multitude of locations. In the Reese area, you can get a cash advance from the ATM in the Nations Bank building or from the drive-up ATM at the Reese Federal Credit Union. This means two locations instead of one; your choice of when, since ATMs are open 24 hours a day; and less time spent waiting in the finance lobby. For supervisors, no longer will anyone kill the afternoon by "going to finance."

The whole idea behind a government charge card is to provide the traveler with an easy way to pay for lodging and rental cars without the need for large amounts of cash, either by the traveler or the finance office. Finance can

still give you a cash advance over the counter, however, if you don't travel frequently and are not eligible for a Diners Club card.

"The check's in the mail" by the next day for 90 percent of the settlement vouchers submitted; otherwise we have to answer to the wing commander. This is a quality indicator established by Hq. AETC. The next initiative (available later this year) will be the electronic funds transfer of your settlement payment to a financial institution, similar to your bimonthly pay.

Make no mistake about it, the Air Force is reducing the amount of cash, people and time dedicated to travel pay service. It takes approximately 40 minutes for a traveler to obtain an advance at finance. Over 90 percent of this time can be saved by obtaining cash through an ATM. It takes approximately 19 minutes for finance to calculate and pay a travel advance, enter the transaction into the accounting system and provide any followup required.

All this workload transfers to Diners Club when travelers get their cash advances through ATMs. Also, the U.S. Treasury will borrow less money, since the need for cash on hand will be greatly reduced. Overall, travel pay processing costs will be minimized, but there will be service with many advantages over past methods.

# The future is now!

## Air Force's first SUPT students graduate

The future of pilot training arrived Thursday when Reese Class 93-12 became the Air Force's first students to earn their wings in specialized UPT.

For several years, the Air Force has heralded the coming of SUPT as the future of pilot training. That prophecy came to pass during Thursday morning's graduation ceremony in the Simler Theater.

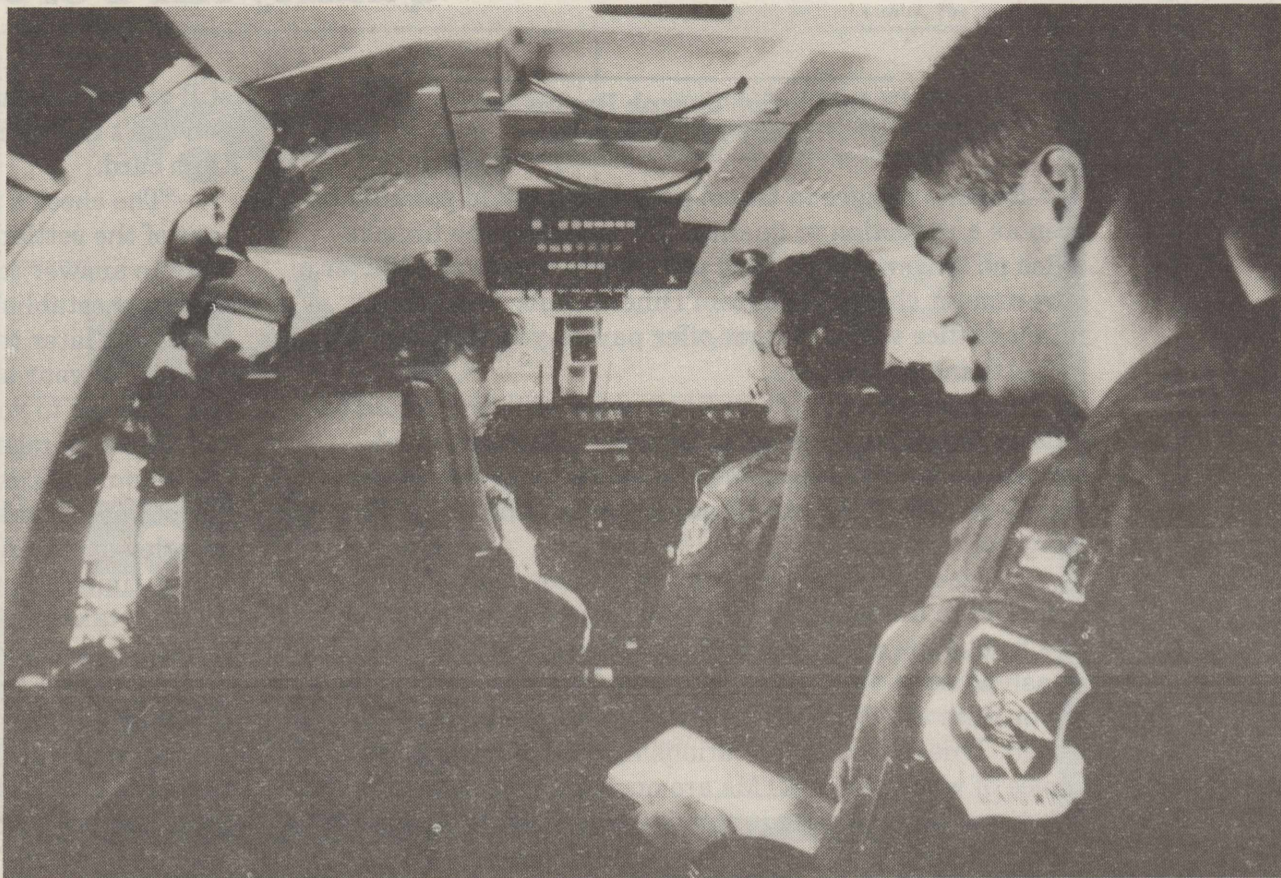
Thirty new aviators pinned on their wings during the ceremony, making them the first to complete SUPT. Guest speaker at the graduation was Maj. Gen. Everett Pratt Jr., 19th Air Force commander.

The dual-track SUPT syllabus better prepares students for follow-on training than the old one, which put all students through primary training in the T-37 and advanced training in the T-38. The new syllabus has students entering one of two tracks after T-37 training: fighter-bomber students go on to the T-38, while airlift-tanker students fly the T-1A.

"In a nutshell, we're producing a much better-prepared pilot for follow-on training in a major weapon system," said Col. Roger Brady, 64th FTW commander. The "bottom line," according to Lt. Col. Gerald Scroggins, 52nd Flying Training Squadron commander, is that the T-1A students get training comparable to the follow-on assignments in heavy aircraft. Colonel Scroggins, whose squadron handles T-1A training on Reese, said one area where this is especially true is crew resource management. Unlike the T-38, which seats only two pilots, the T-1A multiseat flight deck allows students to learn the "ins and outs" of working as part of a crew.

That's not all they learn. Capt. Kim Corcoran, T-1A flight commander for Class 93-12, noted that students can also learn the basics of air refueling and air drop, among other procedures.

While the T-1A may be viewed as the "vehicle" of

SUPT because of its newness, the benefits of the new syllabus are not limited to students in the "Jayhawk." Lt. Col. Terry Gilbert, commander of the 54th FTS, which flies Reese's T-38s, said that his unit has changed its philosophy from training a universally assignable pilot to producing an aviator who is comfortable and familiar with basic fighter-bomber concepts and maneuvers.

"We're exposing the fighter-bomber students to the things that they'll see in follow-on training," said Lt. Col. Julius "Bo" McRee, 64th Operations Group commander. "There are a lot of variations in the (T-38) syllabus, such as two-ship, low-level flying and fluid maneuvering."

Essentially, "specialized" UPT is just that — regardless of which track students are placed in.

In addition to those syllabus changes, personnel changes have also aided students. A recent policy revision

now assigns IPs with experience outside the training environment.

"The MWS pilots coming in give the students an opportunity to benefit from their operational experience," said 2nd Lt. Matt Beckley of Class 93-12.

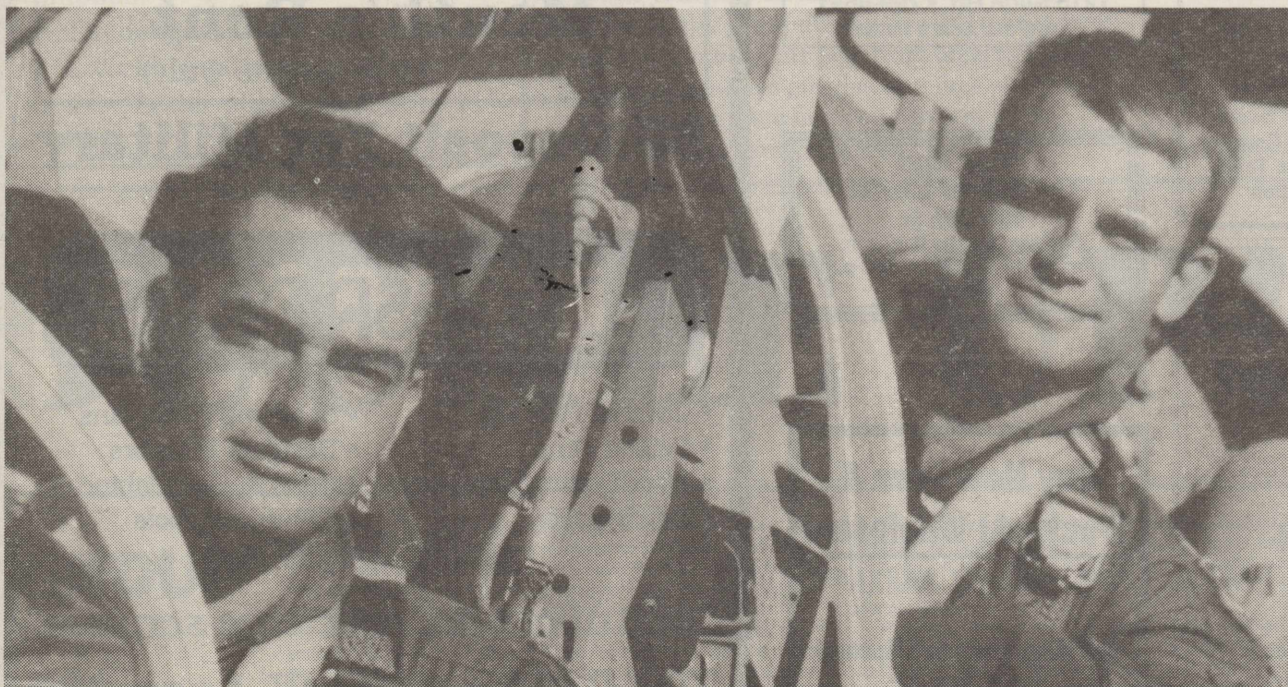
Members of Class 93-12 were not unaware of the historic nature of their class, but it was not their prime concern.

"We were all thrilled to be part of the first SUPT class," said 2nd Lt. Jean Twomey, "but at the same time we were staying focused on the day-to-day training." When asked how much more confident she feels about her follow-on training in C-5s as a result of SUPT, Lieutenant Twomey replied, "Tons."

Although this is only the first class of graduates under the new syllabus, SUPT is already showing its worth.

"Any new system needs time to mature, but the first returns are extremely good," Colonel Brady said. "The students in both the T-1A and the T-38 did very well. They had an extra motivation to do well, because they knew that what they were learning applies directly to the weapon systems they'll be flying."

Colonel Brady added that a regular liaison is being established between the fighter-bomber and airlift-tanker communities and the training community "to ensure we're producing what the customer needs."

# Wing mourns accident victim

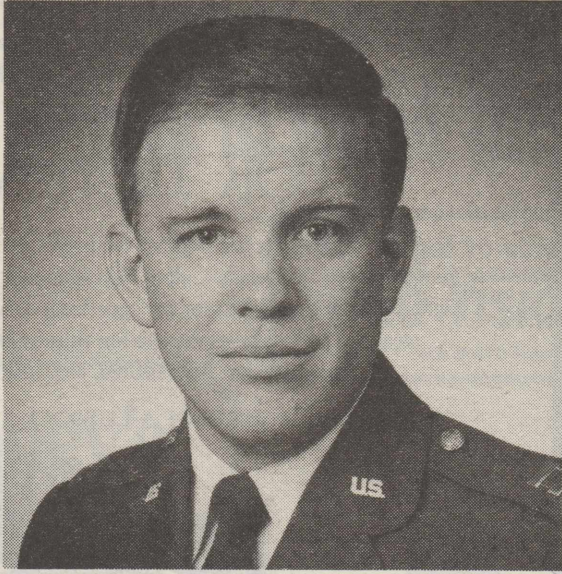
Capt. Cody B. Carr, 54th Flying Training Squadron, was killed in an accident July 21 while visiting his parents on out-of-state leave.

Funeral services for the Utah native were held Monday in his hometown of Mantua. A memorial service at Reese is scheduled for 1 p.m. Thursday in the base chapel.

Captain Carr had been at Reese for nearly three years, serving as a T-38 instructor pilot, flight commander and assistant operations officer. He graduated from the Air Force Academy in 1983, earning a bachelor's degree in aeronautical engineering, and received his wings at Williams AFB, Ariz., as a member of UPT Class 84-06.

Previous assignments included Castle AFB, Calif. for B-52 training and Barksdale AFB, La., as a pilot with the 2nd Bombardment Wing.

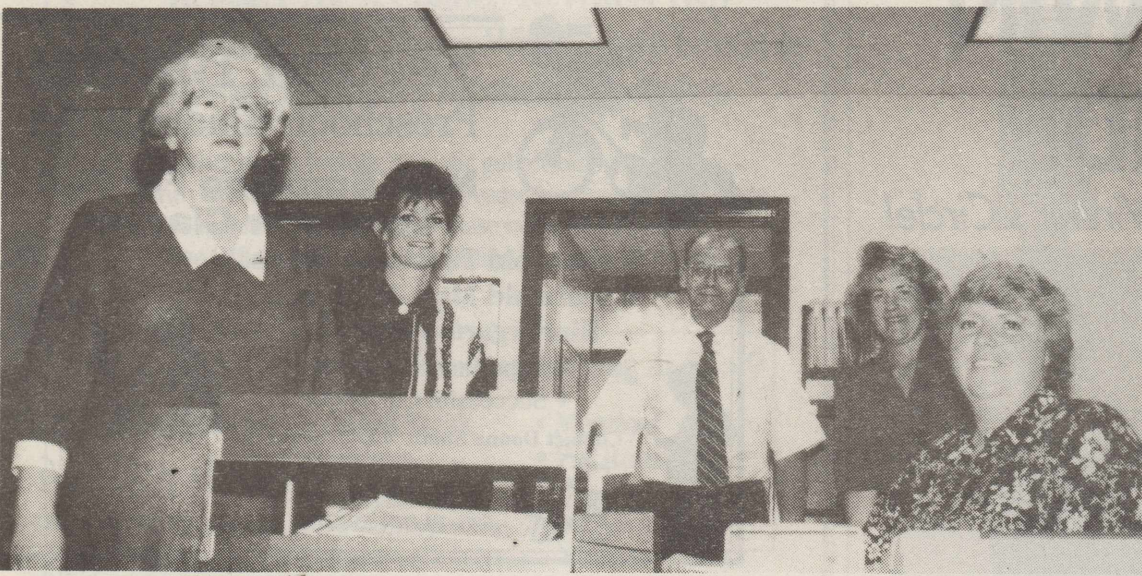
Captain Carr had more than 2,200 hours of flying time in the T-37, T-38 and B-52. In addition to the other decorations he accumulated during his career, the captain was post-

## Education center tops in AF

In a command where education and training are paramount, the Reese Education Center has shown itself to be top-notch, winning the 1992 Nathan Altschuler Award for excellence in education programs.

To earn this honor, signifying them as superior among Air Force education programs, the Reese center had to consistently strive to do more.

"We set four goals in 1992; chief among them was increasing the number of wing NCOs with associate's degrees or higher," said Jeff Wilbur, Reese education services officer. "It took a lot of hard work by the staff, but we met and exceeded our aim in all four areas."

The objectives the center set down for themselves were:

□ Increase the number of NCOs with degrees from 18 to 25 percent. The figure reached 32 percent at year's end.

□ Maintain the quality indicators standard of having 45 percent or more of the NCOs on base either finished with or participating in a degree program. Forty-six percent of the Reese NCO corps fell into this category.

□ Increase the participation in graduate programs by 20 percent. The year-end figure was triple that goal, as enrollments jumped by 60 percent.

□ Finally, increase enrollment in the undergraduate, four-year, Wayland Baptist University program by 10 percent. Participation soared 41 percent higher.

All this work by the center staff did not go unnoticed by wing members.

"They've always been really

helpful, going out of their way to get the information I needed," said SrA. Laura Holt, 64th FTW. Airman Holt completed her bachelor's degree in March with Park College.

SSgt. Bob Colosimo, 64th Security Police Squadron, said the service he gets at the center is "great."

"You can walk in any time and they'll make the time to talk to you," said Sergeant Colosimo, a student with Wayland. "I've never been told to make an appointment and come back later."

Sgt. Frank Parker, 64th Medical Squadron, echoed those comments, saying that the education staff has always gone above and beyond, helping him as he works on his master's degree at Wayland.

# Food for thought

It's that time again. Time to get out and enjoy the sun, go swimming, and gather with friends and family at picnics. Don't let the fun time turn into a nightmare; plan for food safety. Here are some tips to help keep food safe:

□ When shopping for perishable items such as meats and dairy products, get them last.

□ Check the "date of pack" or expiration dates on products to ensure they are good.

□ Go directly home from the store and place perishable items in the refrigerator to prevent food from spoiling.

□ Don't leave meat on the counter to thaw. The product may reach the "danger zone" (40 to 140 degrees) long before you intend to use it.

□ Always wash your hands before cooking and after preparing different foods to ensure there is no possibility of cross-

contamination. For serving, don't reuse utensils or dishes that have touched raw meat.

□ Keep perishable foods in a cooler as long as possible. Pack with plenty of ice and keep it in the shade.

□ Cook meats thoroughly, especially pork. Ensure pork and poultry have no red or pink meat left when serving.

□ Keep food covered to avoid exposing it to flies and common bacteria.

□ Discard perishable food if it has been at room temperature for more than four hours. After four hours, the level of toxin produced by bacteria may be

enough to cause illness.

Follow these safety tips and you'll ensure a good time for all. If you have any questions or comments concerning food safety feel free to contact military public health at 3534. Also, squadrons desiring to purchase food from a source downtown should call me at 3534 to ensure the source has been inspected by the local health department.

# Intramural softball playoffs under way

only one away, MEDS played the percentages, loading the bases in order to bring up Lieutenant Lukas. With the outfield playing back, Lieutenant Lukas dropped a bloop single just inside the right field line to score Lieutenant Rosa for the win.

Despite carrying only a .500 record into the playoffs, MWRS used a pair of

UMC is seeking organizations that can provide volunteers to work at the Toys R Us collection point.

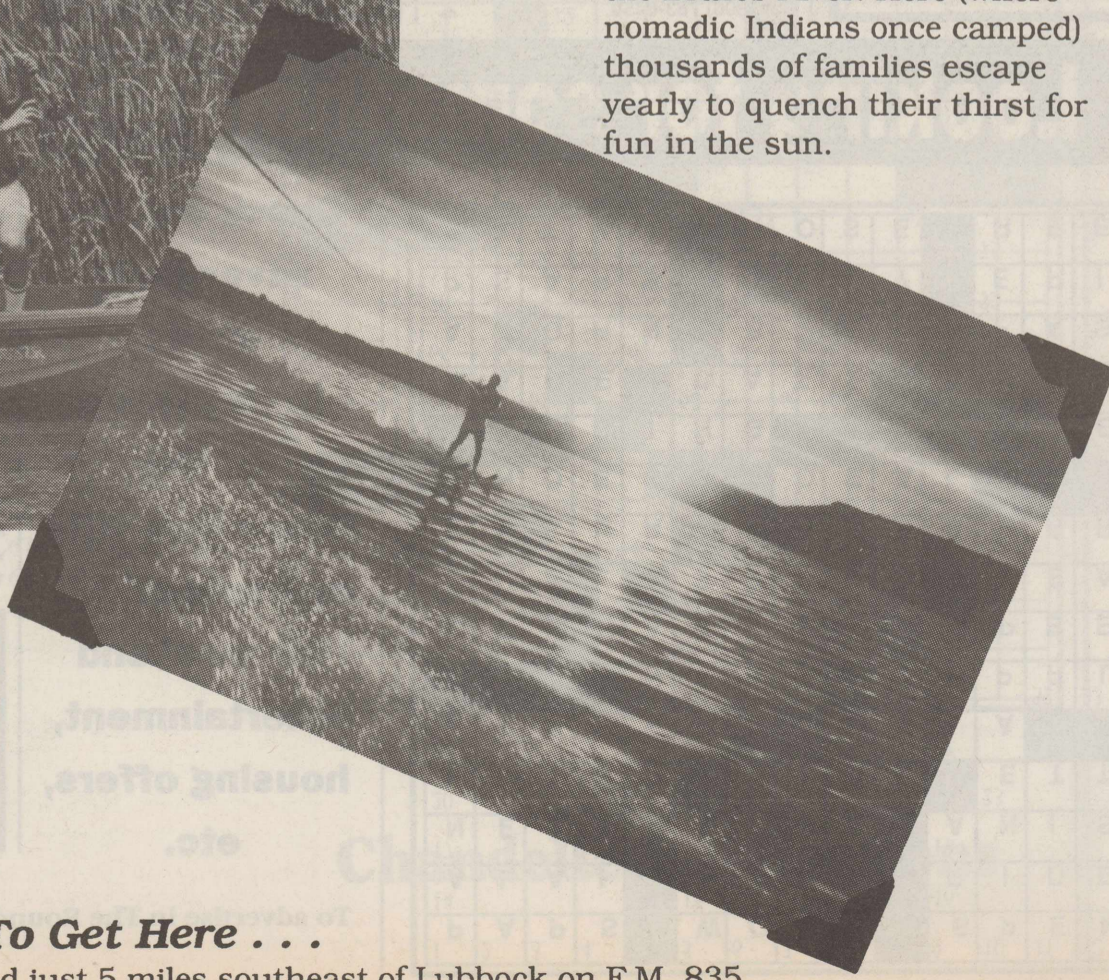
