






## Secretary Rice bids farewell to Air Force

WASHINGTON — Air Force Secretary Donald B. Rice said there is still work to be done if the Air Force is to maintain cutting edge capability in a future of smaller defense budgets.

"My own personal view is that we have reduced about as far as it's prudent and reasonable to do," Secretary

Rice told reporters at the Pentagon Jan. 15, a few days before his tenure as secretary expired.

The current budget situation, and the need to restructure, has come to mean more changes for the Air Force in the future. For instance, Rice said the Air Force has been looking very hard at transferring some conventional bombers to the Guard and Re-

Depending of what happens with the drawdown, there will likely be some "additional reshuffling of missions between active and reserve forces."

Although Secretary Rice wouldn't speculate on where new defense cuts will come, he said the main way that reductions are going to be found is in reducing force structure and end strength.

The Air Force intends to continue to focus on the importance of keeping a well-trained, ready force as it downsizes, he said.

"The main message I'd like to leave to Air Force people is, if you can meet the quality standards of a smaller Air Force for the future, it is going to be a great place to practice a career.

"If you have the self-confidence, that you measure up, then hang in there ... we still got a ways to go to get through the drawdown, but there's a great institution to be part of when we get finished with this

Secretary Rice, who left office Jan. 20 after more than three years as the Air Force's top civilian leader, hopes he will be remembered as someone who started the development of Global Reach - Global Power, the planning framework for the Air Force.

Global reach and power "helped lift the sights of the institution to the broader question of the role of airpower in joint military operations... of what airpower has to contribute in a modern age," he said.

High points of Secretary Rice's Air Force legacy include consolidation of functions, delayering organizations, elimination of excess headquarters, streamlining functions, introduction of total quality management practices and structuring a better cradle-tograve management of weapon systems.

"I think we can take considerable pride in the restructuring of the Air Force, which has involved bringing to bear modern management principles all throughout the Air Force," he said.

"In the process we have refocused the Air Force, and the organization of the Air Force on the missions that matter to the post-Cold War world."

The past three years will also be remembered as a

time when "we made some headway on designing the detail of a leaner, meaner, albeit smaller Air Force of the future," he said.

While tight budgets put a premium on choosing the right systems to protect America, Secretary Rice believes the use of airpower in the future will rely not just on advanced technology and concepts, but on ever-increasing cooperation between land, sea, air and space forces.

To help keep the costs of building and developing new aircraft, Secretary Rice said the Air Force and the Navy both have an opportunity and a responsibility to hone their cooperation.

When the department gets to building the new multi-role fighter, the Navy and the Air Force could carry that out collaboratively, he said.

Although building a new fighter "will be a number of years down the road today given budget realities and force structure needs... eventually, there's going to have to be an airplane that replaces A-10s, F-16s and F-18s.

"I don't see any reason why that airplane can't be designed from the beginning, jointly by the Navy and the Air Force," said Secretary Rice. (Air Force News Service)

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

## SPs urge motorists to drive friendly

The closing of the industrial gate due to a road improvement project continues to increase the traffic congestion at Reese's main gate and the intersection at War Highway and 4th Street.

Security police are providing traffic control in the mornings, but traffic congestion is especially high between 7:15 to 7:30 a.m.

The main gate and its roadways were engineered to move the highest volume of traffic into the base from War Highway using two left turn lanes. These lanes were recently marked to keep turning vehicles separated.

In order to allow vehicles to enter the base from the housing area safely, the security police must stop all traf-

causes traffic to back up past the 4th Street intersection compounding the congestion. To help alleviate the problem, the security police are now posting an additional traffic control officer at 4th Street and War Highway. Additional methods of traffic control are being explored and public suggestions are welcome by contacting the law enforcement section at 3949.

Using the following tips and being alert for any traffic control methods the security police may apply will help ease the traffic congestion and improve access to the base.

☐ Leave earlier. A 10minute adjustment to the morning schedule will help avoid peak traffic.

☐ Avoid Mitchell Boulevard. Housing residents who enter the traffic flow from 4th Street improve the flow by

fic on War Highway. This helping security police avoid stopping the War Highway traffic which handles the bulk of vehicles.

> ☐ Utilize lanes fully. War Highway travelers coming from 19th Street who merge left early give the 4th Street traffic a better chance to enter into the flow.

> Fourth Street drivers can enter the right lane on War Highway and merge left to enter the base. Once you're in one of the left turning lanes, hold that lane while you en-

> □ Avoid the left turn onto Gilbert Avenue. Going around Bldg. 800 before heading left will help take the pressure off the intersection.

□ Drive friendly. All of the employed traffic control measures are negligible compared to the result of drivers being courteous to each other in congested areas.



To be eligible for the quarterly competition, entries must win one of the three monthly competitions.



## Personalized Movement Program can help take hassles out of military reassignments

For many Air Force members and their dependents, moving is the most traumatic experience of their career.

Too often belongings are damaged, broken or lost. This leads to customer dissatisfaction and complaints. In fact, over the last year, ATC received in excess of a million dollars in claims from the movement of household goods.

Many changes are currently in the works to help alleviate these problems.

One of the first of these changes is the Personalized Movement Program.

PMP is a program that requires the wing to observe a minimum of eight moves per week. These observations will be conducted by senior officers and squadron commanders.

The purpose of PMP is to make the move better for the member or dependent. Additionally, PMP also places emphasis on observations for unaccompanied dependent moves. If your spouse is left behind while you go to your next duty station, then the unaccompanied dependent move will receive priority to be observed.

How will PMP help you, our customer?

First, we expect a reduction in damages. Currently we're only inspecting about 80 percent of all moves. With this program we'll be able to observe closer to 95 percent.

Secondly, a lot of our folks will have a senior officer or squadron commander there at his or her residence to help get TMO involved to solve any problems pertaining to the carrier, their packing, or any damages that have occurred.

Lastly, this is an excellent opportunity for you to make any recommendations or observations on the quality of your move and any suggestions you'd like to make on how things can be improved.

I know many of you have had bad moves in the past. I'm not saying that PMP is the answer to all moving problems, but it is a step in the right direction.

With your help and recommendations we can make your PCS move a little smoother and identify ways to make everyone's future moves better.

## Privacy Act

## Reese legal officials help explain individual rights, responsibilities

Everyone has heard of the Privacy Act, but do you know your responsibilities in protecting information from disclosure to unauthorized people?

The Privacy Act of 1974 is designed to let people know what records the government maintains on them, so people can review them to assure they are accurate, relevant and complete.

The Act also is designed to protect people from the unauthorized disclosure of information about them to other people.

The Privacy Act has both civil remedies and criminal penalties for failing to comply with the law.

Are you collecting personal information from people without advising them of their rights under the Act? You need to give a Privacy Act ask to provide personal information about themselves which you plan to place into a system of records. You can fulfill this requirement by posting a copy where the information is normally requested, but must supply a personal copy to them if required.

This applies when asking for their Social Security number to create a record, but it does not apply when used only for identification purposes, to retrieve a record, or where it will not be placed into a system of records.

Are you maintaining a system of records and do not know it? The Air Force must publish in the Federal Register a notice describing every system of records created and maintained by the Air Force. A system of records is distinguishable from personal

Personal notes are not subject to the Privacy Act if: (1)

(Editor's note: The fol- Statement to individuals you The notes remain under the control of the person who created them and are never made available to other persons in the course of official business, and (2) the notes are not required by any Air Force directive, and they may be retained or disposed of as the author sees fit. If you do not meet both of these conditions, you are in violation of the law.

> Finally, are you protecting records from unauthorized disclosure or alteration? Are the records adequately safeguarded to prevent access to them by unauthorized persons? Would individuals feel threatened or embarrassed if the information became pub-

> The Privacy Act can be complex, but it does have some common sense rules. If you have any questions about the law and how it applies to any given situation, call the legal office at 3505 or the base information management of-

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## AFR 30-30 applies to all; defines conflict of interest

Air Force Regulation 30-30, "Standards of Conduct," applies to all Air Force employees, military and civilian, and their immediate families. It is designed to prevent conflict between private interests and official duties.

To eliminate the appearance of coercion, intimidation or pressure from rank, grade or position, Air Force personnel are prohibited from making personal commercial solicitations or solicited sales to DOD personnel who are junior in rank or grade, or their family members, at any time, on or off duty.

This limitation includes, but is not limited to, soliciting and selling insurance, stocks, mutual funds, real estate and any other commodities, goods, or services.

This prohibition does not, however, apply to the one-time sale or lease by an individual of personal property or a privatelyowned dwelling. For civilian personnel, the limitation applies only to personnel under their supervision at any level.

## Quality performer

MSgt. Louis Calderon is the chief controller in the Reese Air Traffic Control Tower.

He oversees the tower watch supervisors who are responsible for minute-tominute operations. Sergeant Calderon ensures Federal Aviation Administration rules are followed, and that apprentice controllers are trained. He sets the facility guidance, determines and schedules controller crews, and investigates all concerns regarding control tower operations. As the NCO in charge of the 64th Operations Group's largest enlisted work center, Sergeant Calderon supervises over 22 people.

Sergeant Calderon came to Reese last August with a wealth of air traffic control experience. He is certified to work aircraft from both control tower and radar facilities and he worked for the FAA during the civilian air traffic control strike in 1981.
