Town meeting

Support group commander outlines programs affecting Reese residents

Reese Village renovation projects, hospital services and rumor control are structurally and mechanically were among the topics discussed at Thursday's town meeting in the Enlisted Open Mess.

Col. Bob Brooks, 64th Support Group commander, opened the 90-minute meeting "clearing the air" on several housing projects.

Addressing the largest crowd to attend a town meeting here in more than four years, Colonel Brooks talked about a two-step program to reopen several housing units that had been withheld pending funding of the Phase III renovation program.

"We do not expect to see the Phase III renovation as we had envisioned it," said Colonel Brooks. "We are getting" some funding to modify the units, but not enough for full scale improvements."

The support group commander said that the demand for housing units prompted him to begin opening some of these units prior to Reese receiving any modification funds. Approximately 30 of these will be made available as soon as possible, basically as self-help units.


"We will ensure that these 30 units sound and offer them to people on the waiting list on a self help basis," said the colonel.

Housing officials noted that persons offered one of the self-help units will be able to turn it down without it affecting their status on the list.

These units as well as all Phase III categorized homes will be modified (energy efficient windows, appliances, heaters and air conditioners, new paint, etc.) when Reese receives the modification funding later this year.

Maj. Scott Showers, 64th Civil Engineering Squadron commander, also talked about the continued monitoring and testing of older unit heating systems. Major Showers stressed that all heating units are checked at least annually and older units are checked more often. Any Reese Village resident concerned about the reliability of the heating units should contact the housing office for an inspection.

One Reese Village resident asked if there was a way to obtain shipping see "Town meeting," Page 4









Reese observes Children's Dental Health Month

The Reese Dental Clinic brings you this article in observance of National Children's Dental Health Month. It is the first in a series of dental health articles for children.

February is National
Children's Dental Health
Month. The Reese Dental
Clinic has a few tips to help
parents maintain their
children's healthy smiles.

☐ Put only water in a child's bottle for a nap or at bedtime.

☐ Start brushing the child's teeth as soon as the first tooth appears (six months).

☐ Brush and floss young children's teeth daily until they can be taught to do this alone. Then encourage them to brush and floss.

☐ Take your child to see the dentist regularly. Schedule the first visit by the child's first birthday.

☐ Ask your dentist about dental sealants. Sealants

are used to protect the chewing surfaces of the child's back teeth.

The Reese Dental Clinic also notes that a good diet is essential for your child's growth and development and to maintain a healthy body. Like the rest of the body, the teeth, bones and the soft tissues of the mouth require nutrients supplied by a well-balanced

include:

☐ Frequency of snacks. Limiting the number of times you snack between meals will

minimize the number of acid attacks on your teeth.

The amount of time the food is in the mouth. Foods such as hard candy and breath mints stay in the mouth a long time, leading to extended acid attacks on teeth.

☐ The time of day a food is eaten. Carbohydrates eaten as part of a meal are less harmful to teeth than if eaten alone. Foods eaten just before bedtime can stick to the teeth through the night.

□ What is eaten. Research indicates that certain foods, such as cheese, may help counter the effects of the acids produced by plaque bacteria.

Stray animals pose danger

Security police urge Reese resident awareness

Since the dawn of man, pets have been a part of our lives. Pets give us companionship, affection and protection. They work for us, play with us and are considered a part of the family.

Unfortunately, uncontrolled pets give us noise complaints, bites and other injuries, unwanted litter, scattered garbage and diseases. The majority of these so-called pet problems can easily be resolved by responsible pet owners.

Dogs and cats that are allowed to roam free are usually the ones that cause garbage cans to be tipped over, get into fights, chase children playing outside, harass adults out walking or jogging and are struck by vehicular traffic.

Most personnel do not know the state of Texas requires that:

☐ All dogs and cats be vaccinated.

☐ All dogs and cats be registered.

☐ All dogs and cats be restrained.

Failure to comply with these laws can result in a ticket and fine.

While our problems with stray animals are not as severe as in some places, a lot more can be done. Pet owners must comply with state law and Air Force directives concerning pets. Again, your dogs and cats must be registered, vaccinated and restrained.

There were 39 animal bites at Reese in 1992. Most were caused by animals allowed to roam freely. Two people had to undergo painful treatment for rabies due to bites from unregistered animals. Just as you teach your children about strangers, teach them not to pet or approach stray animals. Finally, do not feed stray animals. Please, report any strays to the security police desk at 3332. We will respond.

One of the most important factors in our Quality Air Force is the act of empowerment.

Empowerment is simply giving as much authority as practical to the lowest levels.

In restaurants you witness empowerment when a waiter notices your dissatisfaction and provides you with a free soft drink or maybe even a complimentary dessert. You'll notice the waiter does not have to fill out a form, topped with a staffing sheet, to go through the supervisor, maybe the assistant manager, and then finally the manager for approval.

You may laugh at this example, but wait...think about it like never before. Does true empowerment exist in your organization? Chances are, if you look hard enough, you will find ways to im-

There are two very good reasons to ensure empowerment exists in your organization. First, leaders gain the time they need to properly lead. 



Fraud, waste and abuse: how the JAG fits in

In this time of shrinking military budgets, the Air Force must ensure it maximizes the return from every defense dollar spent. Putting planes in the air is an expensive business and there are simply too few dollars to allow for inefficient use of financial resources. All Air Force personnel-from the most junior military member to the most seasoned civilian employee—have a duty to safeguard Air Force assets. The Air Force Fraud, Waste & Abuse Prevention Program is one tool Air Force members can use to safeguard those assets.

At every command level, the Inspector General administers the FWA Program. The IG receives inquiries and allegations of fraud, waste and abuse and investigates accordingly. If the initial investigation reveals no FWA is being committed, a more intensive investigation follows. Before the matter is fully resolved, it is common for any number of Air Force organizations to assist the IG investigation. The Office of the Staff Judge Advocate is one such organization. . dividuals committing FWA ap-

throughout a FWA investiga- law and whether punitive tion. Understandably, a com-sanctions are warranted. Such mander must ensure a FWA - sanctions could involve letters investigation is proceeding in accordance with Air Force regulations and with any applicable laws. The JAG assists the commander and his appointed investigator with that determination. Following the investigation, the office re-

views the legal sufficiency of a FWA investigation for factual completeness and compliance with laws and regulations. Subsequent to the investigation, the JAG continues to assist the commander in implementing a remedies program to prevent future similar occurrences of FWA. From a JAG perspective, two issues may arise: (1) did the individual who committed the FWA also subject himself or herself to criminal or administrative liability?; and (2) do any civil or administrative remedies exist to allow the Air Force to recoup any of its losses? The JAG will provide the commander with the answers to these questions.

With regard to criminal liability, it is no surprise that individuals who commit FWA -are also breaking the law. Military and civilian personnel who commit fraudulent, wasteful or abusive acts may have violated particular federal or state criminal statutes as well as Air Force regulations. In addition, military members may also have violated provisions of the Uniform Code of Military Justice. The JAG will advise the commander as to whether the in-The JAG is usually involved pear to have run afoul of the of reprimand, nonjudicial punishment, or even a trial by courts-martial for military members. For civilians, potential sanctions include administrative action, demotion, firing, and referral of charges to the U.S. Attorney for criminal

The JAG is not concerned solely with any criminal issues arising out of a FWA investigation. Equally important is the Air Force's need to recoup any available amounts lost

prosecution in federal district through FWA. Depending upon the particular circumstances involved, the Air Force may have civil or administrative remedies available by which to recover these funds.

The JAG will review the facts of each case to determine

whether any legal remedies exist and will advise the commander how best to go about recovering financial resources lost to FWA. In this way, the JAG can help to minimize the adverse effect of FWA on the Air Force mission.



Hospital questions answered

Carolyn Johnson, Reese health benefits advisor, offers answers to some of the questions posed to medical officials here.

Dear Carolyn:

My wife recently visited the primary care clinic. The doctor told her she needed to see the cardiologist.

In the past she would see the civilian cardiologist at Reese and we did not have to pay for the visit. The doctor told her that she needed to go downtown to see a cardiologist, and that we would have to use CHAMPUS to pay for the visit. What happened to free medical care?

Due to severe funding constraints, civilian cardiologists, along with other specialties, are either no longer at Reese or can no longer treat persons other than

active duty. We're sorry, but you will have to seek care at another military facility if it is available or see a cardiologist downtown under CHAMPUS.

Dear Carolyn:

In the past I have frequently used the pharmacy's over-the-counter drug program. On my last visit to the hospital I was told the program will be canceled due to lack of funds. Does this mean I have to buy my own aspirin and cough syrup?

Yes, you are correct. Effective March 1, the walk-up over-the-counter drug program at the pharmacy will be canceled. The only way you will be able to receive over-the-counter drugs is with a doctor's prescription.


