Reese controllers 'tower' over ATC

Reese air traffic controllers and facilities "tower" above the rest of the command, having captured three annual ATC awards.

In addition to Reese having the facility of the year, Capt. Martin Heller and MSgt. Bobby Davis were honored as air traffic control managers of the year in the officer and enlisted categories, respectively.

Captain Heller was praised for revitalizing the tower mission, quality of service and relations with the flying community through his "vast experience, leadership ability and puritan work ethic." Among his contributions, he helped the tower upgrade project get completed 18 months ahead of schedule and \$20,000 under budget.

He also was a key player in starting flying operations for the T-1A, working with Federal Aviation

Administration and ATC guidelines to smoothly integrate T-1A operations into Reese's overall flying environment.

Captain Heller's work was lauded in numerous other areas, including greater pilot-controller understanding and strong participation in off-duty base activities.

Sergeant Davis was described by superiors as "a proven technical expert, effective leader and dedicated professional...the 'magnet' that has kept the control tower together through rough times."

Displaying a leadership style that earned the trust of the other controllers, he spearheaded the quality force mindset that exists in the tower today. His leadership was credited in part with two aircraft save awards in his first 90 days as

tower chief controller and several dozen self-help improvement projects.

Quick thinking is also one of the sergeant's strong suits. During a basewide communications failure that threatened to shut down flying operations for the day, Sergeant Davis put together an alternative communications method that allowed the wing to save more than 65 training sorties.

Like Captain Heller, Sergeant Davis is active in off-duty activities such as unit fundraisers, youth activities and community projects.

The tower itself oversaw one of the nation's busiest airfields throughout the year, with a traffic count of 107,000. Controllers saw to it that the tower maintained sustained rates of efficiency (their on-time instrument departure rate

was 99.5 percent), showed outstanding handling of unusual workloads, and accumulated a superior safety record. They did this despite going through an extended period when manning was critical.

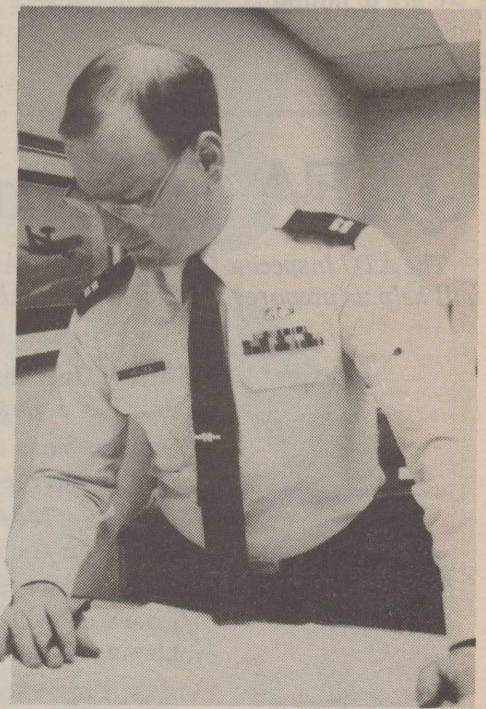
One reason the tower staff was able to do what it did was training. The tower shined during a visit from an air traffic system analysis team this past year, and training was a big reason.

"Captain Heller, Sergeant Davis and everybody involved in these awards did an absolutely super job this year," said Lt. Col. Michael "Boots" Miller, 64th Operations Support Squadron commander. "I can't say enough about what they've accomplished. They are excellent examples of the squadron vision -- 'Quality customer service and commitment to excellence.'"

From my perspective

The Department of Defense, Air Force and Air Training Command take a firm stand on the subject of drug and alcohol abuse. I intensely support the efforts to eliminate alcohol and drug abuse, very simply because substance abuse seriously impairs our mission.



Our alcohol abuse policy is easy to understand. For those who choose to drink, we encourage responsible drinking. This demands good judgment in setting drinking limits while maintaining high standards of conduct. If you do have too much to drink, don't drive — get a ride. Excessive drinking creates disciplinary problems, causes drunk driving incidents, and reflects poorly on yourself and the Air Force. Persons who drink to excess and exhibit inappropriate behavior or conduct will receive disciplinary and administrative action.

Our drug abuse policy is equally simple and straightforward. Drug use is illegal, a serious breach of discipline, and incompatible with Air Force standards. Illegal drug use, possession or transfer always requires disciplinary action and usually results in separation, imprisonment or both.

We must be aggressive in identifying and detecting incidents of alcohol and drug abuse if we are to minimize the risk of abusers jeopardizing the personal safety of others as well as themselves.

Fraud in the Air Force

The Air Force Office of Special Investigations (AFOSI) investigates all types of fraud cases against the government. Fraud costs the Air Force millions of dollars. Most AFOSI fraud investigations are in the procurement area: product substitution/diversion/mischarging, conflicts of interest, and bribery. Other types of fraud involve military and civilian members who have been caught cheating the Air Force. Here are some examples:

Cost/Pricing Data Fraud

SUBJECT: USAF Subcontractor

SYNOPSIS: The aerospace subcontractor was investigated for allegedly providing false cost and pricing data for contract items involving additional tooling, inspection, and nonrecurring costs associated with F-111 overwing fairing parts. The investigation substantiated questionable tooling costs previously incurred, double billed, and grossly inflated.

RESULTS: Although the statute of limitations precluded criminal court action, a civil settlement of \$375,000 was paid by the company.

Bribery and Kickbacks

SUBJECT: Active Duty USAF E-5

SYNOPSIS: The staff sergeant was convicted for accepting bribes while extorting monies from numerous foreign contractors who were providing a variety of services to U.S. troops during DESERT STORM in Saudi Arabia. One of the contractors complained, and the subsequent investigation revealed the sergeant had received more than \$130,000 in bribes.

RESULTS: The sergeant was sentenced by general court-martial to a bad conduct discharge, ordered to pay a \$70,000 fine and a \$10,000 forfeiture, and 10 years in prison.

BAQ/VHA Dependent Fraud

SUBJECT: Active Duty USAF NCO

SYNOPSIS: During a local sheriff's narcotic's task force raid of the sergeant's home, they found him living with a girlfriend and admitting to marijuana use. When questioned if he was married, he stated that his wife was dead. However, a review of his records revealed his wife listed as a dependent, as did the Defense Eligibility Enrollment Records System (DEERS). The wife's medical records did not reveal she was deceased; county records indicated she died four years earlier. The sergeant had been receiving BAQ/VHA payments at the dependent rate since that time and had knowingly falsified his BAQ/VHA recertification two years later and then listed his girlfriend as his wife. The loss to the government totaled about \$5,750.

RESULTS: The sergeant pled guilty and was sentenced to an administrative discharge and ordered to pay restitution of \$19,795 to the Air Force. The drug case is still under investigation.

False Certification Fraud

SUBJECT: USAF Contractor

SYNOPSIS: The company allegedly falsely recertified a list of mistested electrical relays manufactured for various Federal contracts, to include the Department of Defense, National Aeronautics and Space Administration, and the Department of Energy. Interviews of company supervisors and managers confirmed the allegations. Air Force systems that would use the subpar relays include the Harm and Stinger Phalynx missiles.

RESULTS: The company's corporate counsel and Department of Justice attorneys reached a \$17.5 million criminal settlement. Civil litigation is still awaiting adjudication.

It's obvious these offenders chose to commit criminal acts against the Air Force due to a powerful motivator—greed—which is becoming more prevalent in these budget-tightening days. The impact is felt throughout the Air Force, and we should all accept the responsibility to prevent fraud, waste, and abuse at every opportunity. Mutual command/AFOSI support and teamwork are essential for successful prevention, detection and neutralizations of fraud.

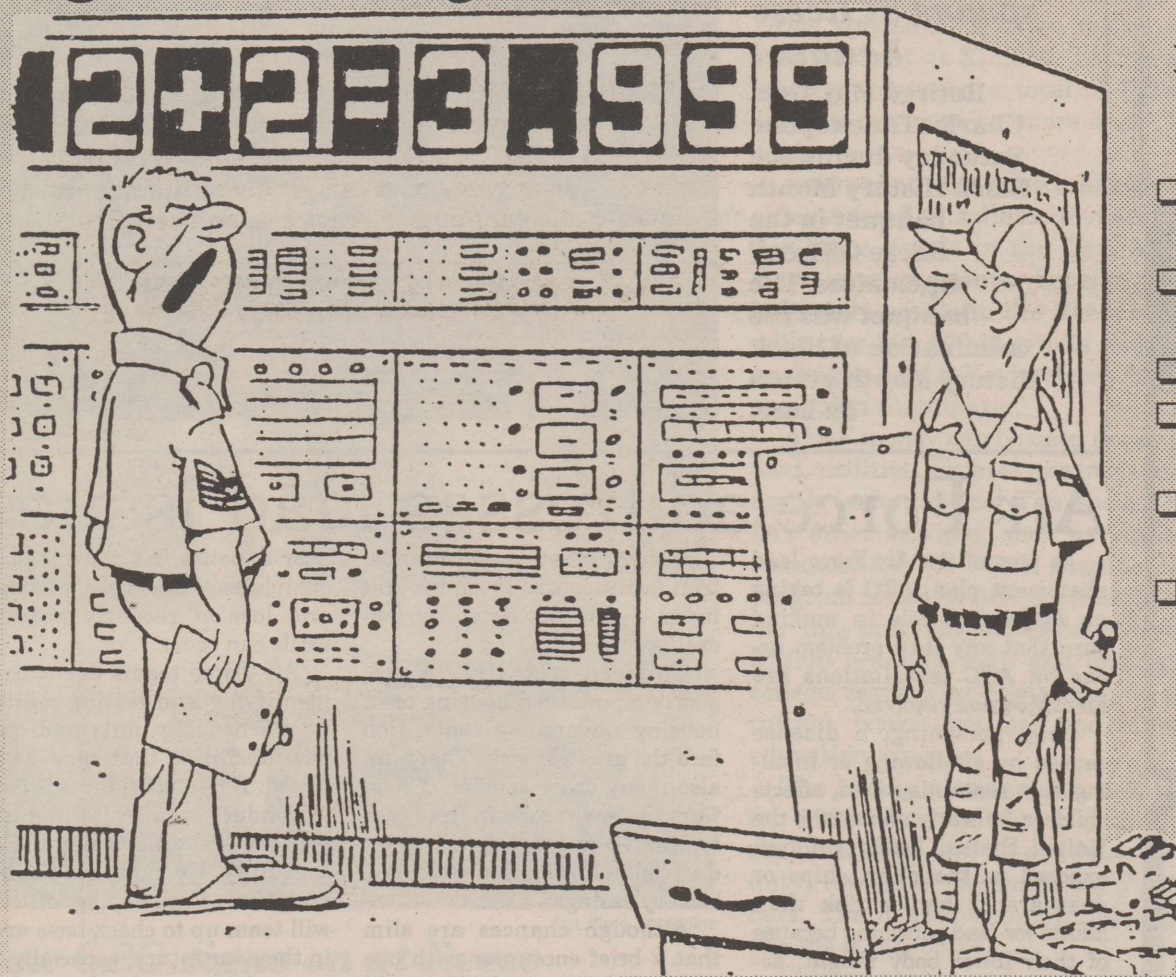

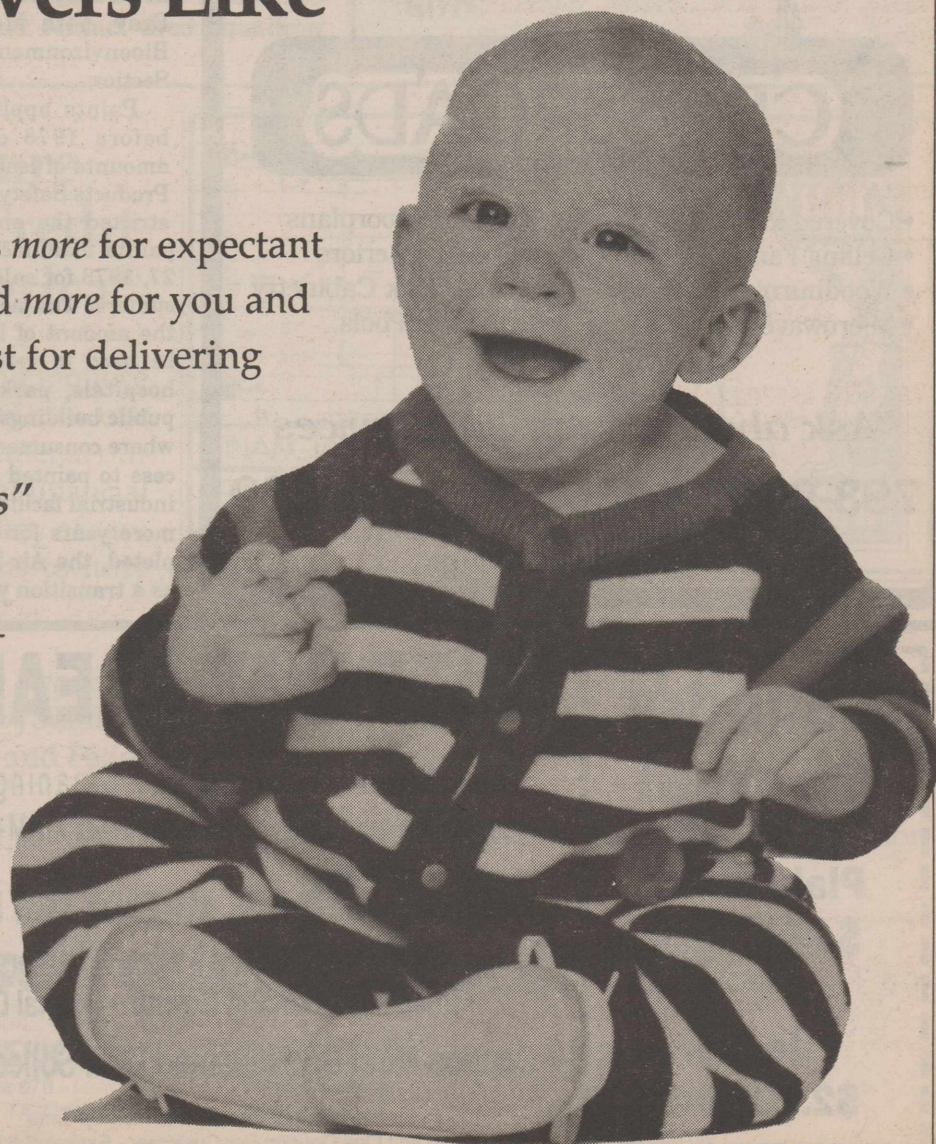

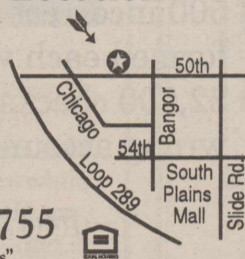

Air Force addresses lead issues

As part of the Air Force lead abatement plan, ATC is taking an aggressive role in making sure that any lead problem areas on ATC installations are identified and resolved.

Lead poisoning, a disease caused by swallowing or inhaling dust containing lead, affects children in nearly all parts of the United States. Young children exposed to the paint chips or dust are at higher risk than adults for lead poisoning because of their lower body weight, developing nervous system and greater tendency to ingest paint. Fortunately, there have been no cases of lead poisoning at Reese according to Capt. Raymond Bray, 64th Medical Squadron Bioenvironmental Engineering Section.

Paints applied to buildings before 1978 contained large amounts of lead. The Consumer Products Safety Act that year restricted the amount of lead in paints manufactured after Feb. 27, 1978 for sale directly to consumers. The act also restricted the amount of lead in paints to be used in residences, schools, hospitals, parks, playgrounds, public buildings and other areas where consumers have direct access to painted surfaces in non-industrial facilities. Allowing two more years for stocks to be depleted, the Air Force used 1980 as a transition year.

Lead in paints used in industrial facilities was — and is still today — not restricted by federal law.

Children who live in old, poorly maintained housing or in housing undergoing renovation face the greatest risk. There are also many other sources of lead from the environment, from contaminated water and soil to industrial pollution and discarded battery casings.

Although chances are slim that a brief encounter with one of the environmental risks could have an adverse affect, parents should know what symptoms to look for.

Low levels of poisoning may not have any visible effects on children. But some studies indicate that low levels of lead may damage the nervous system, including the brain; interfere with growth; harm hearing; lower IQ scores; and make learning difficult.

Low-level lead poisoning may also cause behavioral problems like excitability; inability to concentrate; and frequent emotional outbursts.

There are usually no signs of lead poisoning, or they may be mistaken for symptoms of flu or other illnesses. If present, symptoms may include stomach ache and cramps, irritability, fatigue, frequent vomiting, constipation, headache, sleep disorders and

poor appetite. As more lead accumulates, clumsiness, weakness and loss of recently acquired skills can occur.

Air Force teams are actively identifying and testing military family housing units and other base facilities that may be affected. Reese officials will begin to conduct surveys to highlight problem areas, according to Captain Bray. He said that medical and civil engineering officials will team up to check base areas in the near future, especially the ones that are frequented by small children.

If lead paint were found in a home, the head of the household should ensure that everyone — including older brothers, sisters and baby-sitters of younger children — is alert to the danger of children chewing on painted woodwork or eating paint chips.

People should also sweep flakes and wet mop every day using trisodium phosphate or another high-phosphate cleaner.

Also, removing lead paint is extremely dangerous, especially to children and pregnant women. The safest way is to have a qualified professional remove or cover the lead paint.

The best way to reduce the threat of ever having lead poisoning is to be aware of what causes it and notify a trained professional when you suspect a lead paint hazard.

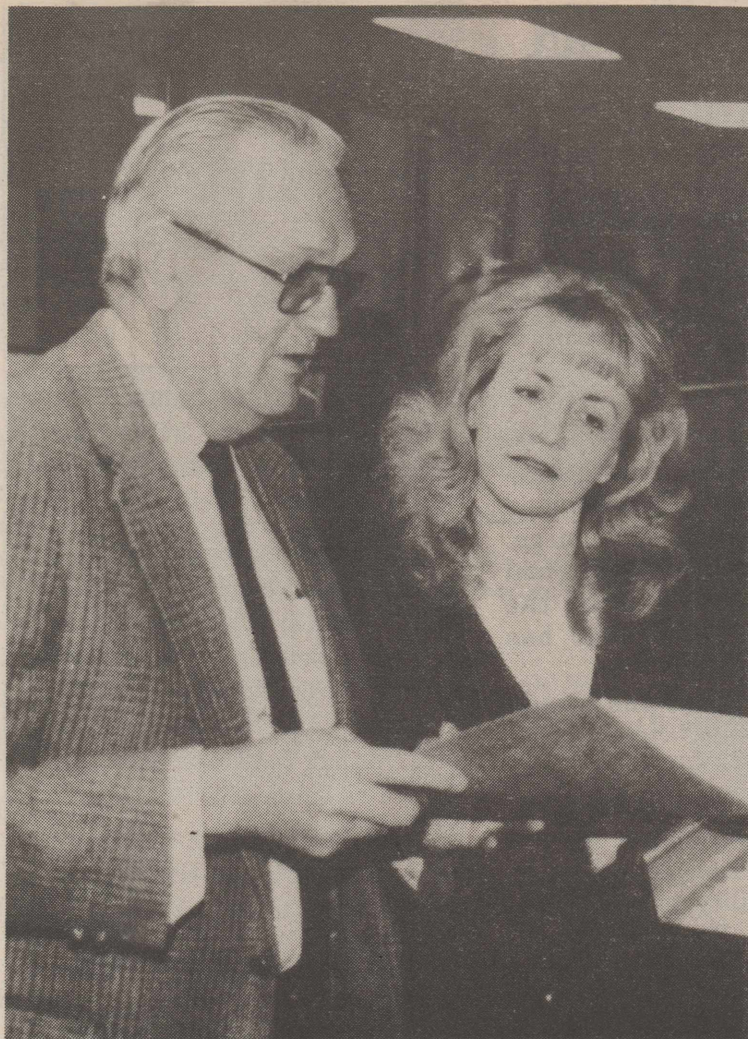

AFAF drive under way

The annual Air Force Assistance Fund Drive started Feb. 22 on Reese, with the base goal set at \$13,510. Last year Reese members donated a total of \$21,579, exceeding our goal by more than 147 percent.

Last year the Air Force Aid Society provided over \$15 million to nearly 30,000 Air Force people in the form of interest-free loans or grants. Locally, the AFAS helped 84 people in the Reese community with over \$51,500 in grants and loans, according to 1st Lt. Kevin Mock, Reese AFAF campaign coordinator.

AFAF money can be used to pay for rent, food, utilities, funeral expenses and other family emergencies. The society also offers other services, such as academic assistance, for Air Force people. One such program is the AFAS education grant. Under this program, students may receive a \$1,000 grant to help pay undergraduate college costs. The grant may be used for tuition, books, lab fees and other direct education expenses.

The society plans to award 5,000 grant for 1993-94 to full-time, undergraduate students who are dependents of active duty, retired or deceased Air Force members. The deadline for preliminary applications is March 26.

College grants and other forms of society aid are available through the Reese Family Support Center, located in Bldg. 310. Call 3305 for more information. Those who have questions about the assistance fund drive should contact their squadron project officer.

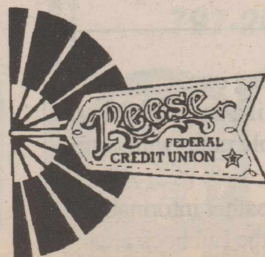

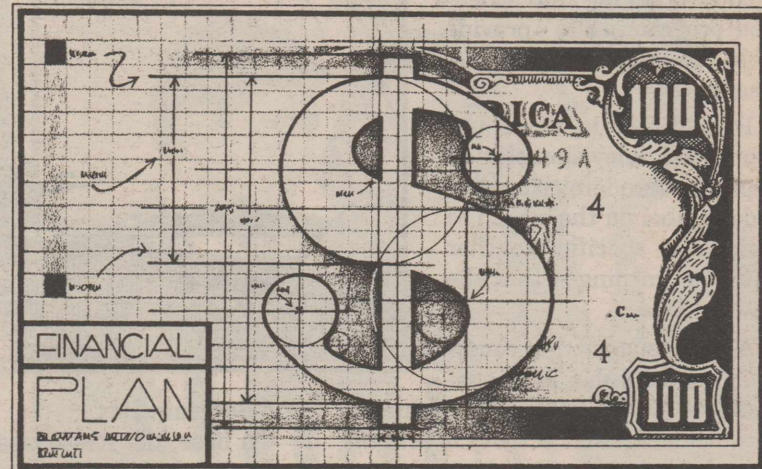

West Texas weather can turn severe literally without warning, pounding the area with high winds, rain, hail and deadly

TORNADOS

Understanding the various severe weather classifications and being prepared to take appropriate action could be the best insurance Reese people can obtain for their families' safety.

For Reese and Lubbock residents, the severe weather conditions to be most concerned with are: thunderstorm watch, thunderstorm warning, tornado watch and tornado warning. The most dangerous of these conditions are thunderstorm warning and tornado warning.

Each of these conditions represents a different level and threat of severe weather. As conditions change, so do the precautions people should take.

SMSgt. Barry Rex, Reese Weather flight chief, says Reese people can stay abreast of regional weather conditions by monitoring local radio and television stations.

All of the local broadcast stations provide extensive severe weather coverage, frequently breaking into scheduled programming to provide up-to-the-minute reports on area weather.

In addition to these updates, each television station displays a thunderstorm or tornado symbol on the screen to indicate a specific weather watch or warning within the viewing area.

A watch means that conditions are favorable for a specific severe weather activity. A warning is issued when that activity is actually taking place or considered imminent.

An outlined thundercloud signals a thunderstorm watch. A filled thundercloud means the condition has been upgraded to a warning. As with thunderstorms, an outlined tornado indicates a watch and a filled tornado is a warning. Most of the stations will supplement the watch and warning symbols with the names of the counties affected.

Sergeant Rex suggested that Reese

people may want to invest in a weather radio. He said the radios are readily available in Lubbock stores and cost about \$20.

"This is an excellent item to have as part of your emergency weather kit,"



said Sergeant Rex.

On base, the Reese weather service continuously provides severe weather updates to the command staff and command post. When there is a significant threat of severe weather affecting the base, the command post will issue Emergency Broadcast System audio updates simultaneously on all Mission Cable channels.

Reese residents who are not connected to Mission Cable will not receive these EBS updates.

Planning for a tornado can greatly enhance the chances of surviving one. Make sure everyone in your work area or home knows where to go if a tornado strikes. Maintain an emergency kit. It should include: flashlights, portable radio with extra batteries, drinking water, first aid kit and other emergency items. Monitor local broadcast television and radio stations for severe weather information. KFYO AM-790, is the designated emergency information station in the Lubbock area.

Planning is key to safety

When to take shelter

When the threat of a tornado striking Reese is imminent, the command post will activate the base siren. Once activated, the siren will sound a steady tone until the threat of a tornado has ended.

"As soon as the steady tone sounds," advises 2nd Lt. David Dubay, Air Base Operability Flight chief, "Reese personnel should seek shelter according to their facility tornado shelter plan. Everyone should remain in their tornado shelter until the siren's steady tone has ended. Actions not to take include taking photographs or running to Bldg. 930's Nuclear Fallout Shelter."

Lieutenant Dubay added, "The command post will issue additional guidance on the Emergency Broadcast System. If necessary, security police will supplement broadcasts."

Lieutenant Dubay recommends that Reese personnel educate their families on severe weather protective actions and pick up a family emergency information booklet at the disaster preparedness office.

A 5-to-10 second test of the base warning siren is conducted each Friday at noon unless there is inclement weather in the area.

Soliciting cooperation from all base residents, Lieutenant Dubay said personnel refrain from calling agencies such as security police, weather service or 911 to get weather information. "Stay tuned to local TV and radio stations," he said. "Only bona fide emergency calls should be made to these agencies."

What to do during a ...

Tornado watch



A tornado watch indicates that weather conditions are favorable for the formation of tornados. Tornado activity is possible.

- Secure loose items outside home or workplace.
- Restrict the movements of children to immediate vicinity.
- Have your storm kit standing by.
- Monitor weather broadcasts on local broadcast television and radio stations.

Tornado warning



A tornado warning means that a tornado has actually been sighted or identified on radar. If Reese is in the expected path, the command post will sound the base siren, directing base people and Reese Village residents to seek immediate shelter.

- Take shelter immediately and stay there until the siren stops (on base) or notified via the Emergency Broadcast System that it is clear to leave (off base).
- Don't wait for the siren if you see or hear a tornado approaching. Seek shelter immediately.
- Do not needlessly tie up emergency phone lines. Monitor radio and television broadcasts for updates.

Where to go

- If driving in open country, move away from funnel at a right angle.
- Greatest safety is in the center of the basement.
- Lacking a basement, go to small central rooms such as closets, storerooms or bathrooms.
- Take cover under heavy furniture.
- Stay away from windows.
- Do not stay above ground floor of any building.
- Do not stay in a mobile home. Even a drainage ditch is more protection.
