### IG period scheduled

The ATC inspector general will hold a personal conference period at 1 p.m. March 30 in the Reese Library conference room. Special permission or appointments are unnecessary.

Individuals should put their complaints on a sheet of paper or an Air Force Form 1482. All military, civilian personnel and retirees are welcome. All disclosures will be held in confidence except to the extent necessary to take action. Matters listed in Table 1 of Air Force Regulation 123-11 cannot be processed by the IG.

This is an opportunity for people to report fraud, waste and abuse. Anyone who cannot attend can call the ATC/ IG work center at 6481 (after it is established) and make an appointment.

### From my perspective

Assessing beauty or relative worth, as we know, is often a subjective action. Value or worth may not be bound by clearly stated objectives, definitive parameters, or conventional wisdom, but be driven in part by societal norms, preju-



dice, individual whim or group-think mentality. Many examples can be found in popular culture, music or nationwide fads.

### Is it really fraud, waste & abuse or a miscommunication?

Similarly, opinion, innuendo or incomplete knowledge of supporting conditions and assumptions may create the perception that a given military activity, function or command decision constitutes a fraudulent, wasteful or abusive practice. Therefore, let's briefly review the inspector general system definitions of abuse, fraud and waste.

ABUSE: The INTENTIONAL wrongful or improper use of Air Force resources. Examples include misuse of rank, position or authority which results in the loss or misuse of resources such as vehicles, computers and copy machines.

Complaints involving the mistreatment of personnel are handled by either the IG Complaint Program (Air Force Regulation 123-11) or the appropriate civilian personnel grievance channel.

FRAUD: Any INTENTIONAL deception designed to unlawfully deprive the Air Force of something of value or to secure from the Air Force for an individual a benefit, privilege, allowance or consideration to which he or she is not entitled. Such practices include the offer, payment or acceptance of bribes or gratuities, making false statements, submitting false claims, using false weights or measures, evading or corrupting inspectors, deceit either by suppressing the truth or misrepresenting facts, adulterating or substituting materials, falsifying records and books of accounts, and arranging for secret profits, kickbacks or commissions. The term also includes conflict of interest cases, criminal irregularities and the unauthorized disclosure of official information

relating to procurement and disposal matters.

WASTE: The EXTRAVAGANT, CARE-LESS or NEEDLESS expenditure of Air Force funds or consumption of Air Force property that results from deficient practices, systems, controls or decisions. The term also includes improper practices not involving prosecutable fraud.

These definitions are by necessity broadbased and open to some interpretation. Thus, a properly conducted formal investigation may require expertise from agencies such as judge advocate, security police and Air Force Office of Special Investigations.

#### Resolving an issue:

You have a channel immediately available to clarify misperceptions, and that mechanism entails entering and attempting to resolve FW&A perceptions at the "process owner-level." That's right, simply asking a supervisor, branch chief, senior NCO in charge or responsible officer basic questions, such as why, who decided, or how come, will often garner the rationale for management practices or justification for projects. This fact-finding technique can end speculation, rumor and hall talk, but more importantly allows those people with the answers to properly respond to queries. The alternative to working at the appropriate functional level may be a lengthy inspector general investigation expending man hours and resources interviewing those same supervisors and asking the same questions.

### Responsibilities:

At Reese, senior leaders will continue to promote base-level campaigns, like commanders' calls, staff meetings, and future Roundup articles, aimed at preventing misperception, myths and erroneous data from becoming the basis for unnecessary FW&A allegations. This preventive methodology has proven more cost-effective than after-the-fact inquiries which often validate leadership actions, but don't correct perceptions that precipitated a complaint.

Civilian and military members with questions should talk with the right expert. If he or she cannot or will not provide an answer, be persistent, patient and polite. Attempt to use the chain of command and remember the IG, if required, is available to get a complete, impartial answer.

One last look at enlisted specialty training (i.e. OJT records). It should be up to speed by now . . . MAKE SURE!

Everyone take one last quality look at your pubs!

### General McPeak looks at future

WASHINGTON — Airmen, civilian workers and the Air Force as a whole are looking ahead to an uncertain future.

The new administration is saying, for instance, it wants to cut deeper in the military's end strength and further reduce defense spending.

But, for the most part, the Air Force chief of staff expects a favorable outcome to the administration's plans to streamline.

"I'm very optimistic that the new secretary of defense (Les Aspin) is the right guy for the times we face now," Gen. Merrill A. McPeak said in an interview with Air Force News Service.

"He knows the territory as well as anybody," General McPeak said. "He's been working on security issues for a long, long time. So, he's not going to start on page one. He has a very good understanding of the issues."

General McPeak wouldn't speculate on what Secretary Aspin's appointment will mean to the Air Force, but thinks it's good for the country because "he's a professional."

"This is not going to be amateur hour in Washington, so I'm upbeat on that... he's got a very good track record over time in favor of a strong defense."

Secretary Aspin, 54, served in the Army from 1966 to 1968 and has been in Congress since 1971. He became chairman of the House Armed Services Committee in 1985.

General McPeak said he's also upbeat and very impressed by the positive reaction of Air Force people toward what have been demanding times in the personnel arena. (Air Force News Service)



### 52nd FTS patches reflect heritage

Jan. 22 was the beginning of a new era in Air Training Command with SUPT Class 93-12, the first T-1A specialized undergraduate pilot training class. With the beginning of this new age of pilot training came a whole new look for the 52nd Flying Training Squadron. Commensurate with the new style of training, the 52nd redesigned its flight and operations patches.

The designs of the patches started with an idea to incorporate aviation history into all the new patches. The first patch was the "A" Flight patch using design features from the 8th Air Force (World War II) insignia. After the "A" Flight patch was designed, the squadron decided to incorporate the white star with the red circle in all the squadron patch designs. On a historical side light, the white star with the red circle pre-dates the Japanese assault on Pearl Harbor. After the raid, the red circle was removed since it resembled the "Rising Sun" used by the



Japanese military.

The "B" Flight patch incorporated the China-Burma-India airlift theme into its design, depicting the C-47 airlift of supplies into Burma during the Far Eastern campaigns of World War II. The airlift, commonly known as "over-the-hump" flights, was crucial in airlifting supplies to our anti-Japanese allies dur-

ing the war.

The "C" Flight patch is a combination of several historical themes. Again, the white star with the red circle was continued in the patch design. The red and white bars on the right side of the patch represent the tail flash designs used in World War II. Finally, the black stripe with yellow borders at the top of

the patch reflects the more modern tail flash design used by the Military Air Transport Service, predecessor to the Military Airlift Command.

The "D" Flight patch reflects the global mission theme that the airlift/tanker aircraft have in today's Air Force. The T-1A will be an integral part of this mission for many years to come. In a much scaled-down military, pilot training will play a crucial role in ensuring the smaller numbers of pilots have the skills that will allow them to do the mission effectively and safely.

The "V" Flight and operations patches incorporate a more modern design reflecting the need to remember the past while, at the same time, moving into the future and into a more modern Air Force.

The men and women of the 52nd FTS are proud to have the opportunity to bring in this new age of training and greatly appreciate all those who have shared in meeting the challenges of this new training program.

Through continued cooperation, the 52nd FTS will catapult ATC into the 21st century.

### Ving member offers tips on spending

Now that we have started a new year some of you may have resolved to get a grip on your personal finances. Here's some information that

I suggest you set up a spending plan. A spending plan is a tool to help you spend your money wisely and reach your goals. It can help you cut out inefficient spending and give you more for your money. Of course, in order for this to happen, it takes planning, time and determination.


To be workable, your spending plan must be tailored to your family's needs and income. Whatever the problems, your family needs a spending plan if you are committed to controlling your spending and you can realistically face what the plan and records disclose about you. Such a plan is not to be used to control the spending of another family member. Nor should it be the basis for a complete reform or radical change in your manner of liv-

Rather, a spending plan can point the way to achievement of your family's goals. The first step in making a spending plan is to set your goals. What do you really want to do with your money now and in the future? Your goals serve as a guide for the way you spend your money. You may find it helpful to think about your longterm goals — those you hope to reach in 10 or more years. Then list your goals for the coming year.

This way, your spending plan will include some savings toward long-term and intermediate goals and you will not let immediate goals push others aside. Keep in mind, your goals change as the size, age and income of your family changes.

The first step in making a spending plan is estimating your family's income. Before you can plan wisely, you need to know how much money you will have

during the planning period. A spending plan may cover any period - a week, a month or a year, whichever is best for your family. Be sure to consider



Next, you should determine your next month. If your spending plan is sure where all your money goes, con-



sider keeping a written spending for several weeks. Record any money spend using general head-

ings such as food, housing, transportation, clothing, personal care, medical care and other. When you feel that you have kept a record enough weeks to get a representative pattern of spending, summarize it. Take a sharp look at where your money goes and why. Are you working toward your goals? You may be pleased with your spending pattern and choose to continue it or you may find that your income and spending ends don't meet.

Then you are faced with three choices to bring the two ends together. They are: increase the family's income, cut back on expenditures or go into debt or use credit to cover the deficit (not recommended). Using these categories, estimate your expenses for the

expenses for each month. If you're not to work, don't be too rigid in setting aside money for each category.

Be reasonable in the amount of ac- money allocated to savings and for difcount of your ferent categories of family living expenditures. One of the greatest reasons that spending plans fail is that families cannot "live" within the constraints set for themselves by their plan. Keep track of your spending to see how much you actually spend in each category. After being on your spending plan for one month, check your progress. Compare your actual expenditures and make necessary adjustments.

> If it didn't work at all, don't give up. Most people don't make a perfect plan the first time. Use this month's expenditure records to make a new plan and try again. Repeat the process until you have a plan you can live with. Remember that the purpose of planning is to help your family get more satisfaction from the money you have to spend. Use your family's income to your advantage rather than someone else's.





Better known by its acronym — EMCS — the system saves the base several hundred thousand dollars per year by controlling heating and air conditioning systems on base, according to John Kain, Reese energy manager.

"It does this by gathering information on equipment status and then making automatic adjustments based on climatic conditions, comfort levels in the facility and equipment operation," Mr. Kain explained. Also, EMCS ensures that systems only run as needed.

> The current system has been in place since December. An older energy control system on base "crashed" in June 1992 and took several months to be re-

During that down period, some EMCS field equipment degraded, which is causing some minor problems for the current system. However, Mr. Kain said those problems are being worked quickly.

Future plans call for the system to be integrated into 18 additional facilities.



☐ Assess the tobacco use by civilian employees and reduce the results by 5 percent.

☐ Ensure that all active duty personnel have their blood cholesterol checked every three years and also know what it is.

☐ Ensure all youths enrolled in base programs receive appropriate age-specific screenings, counseling and immunization services.

☐ Extend the alcohol and drug education program to all the installation worksites.

☐ Reduce incidents of back injury attributed to improper lifting techniques by 5 percent.




