The ATC Inspector General will hold a personal conference period during the upcoming inspection at 1 p.m. March 30 in the Reese Library conference room.

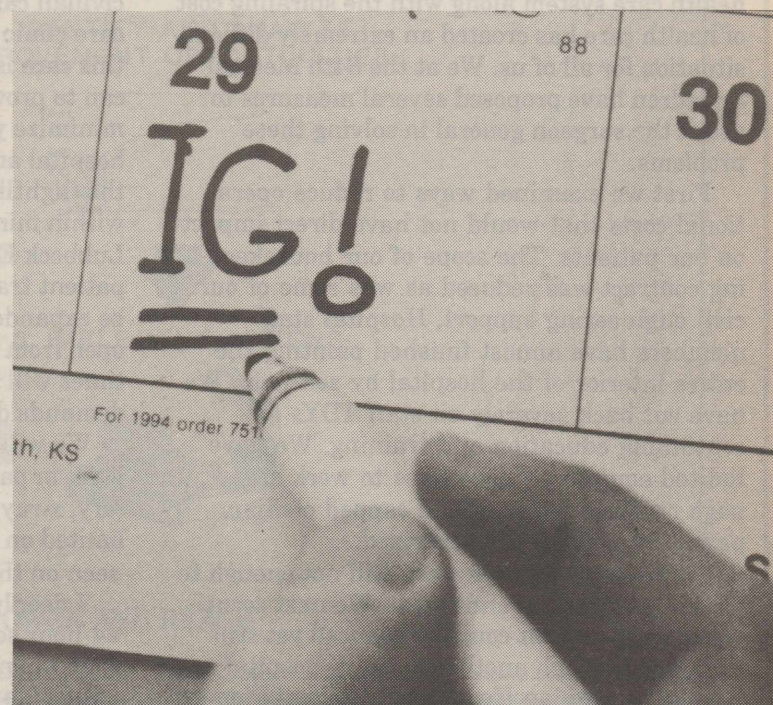
Special permission or appointments are unnecessary.

This is an opportunity for people to report fraud, waste and abuse. Anyone who cannot attend can call the ATC/IG work center at 6481 (after it is established) and make an appointment.

IG personnel will also conduct an inspection outbriefing, discussing the results of the March 29-April 9 Quality Air Force Assessment and Operational Readiness Inspection, at 10 a.m. April 9 in the Simler Theater.

Wing officials remind contractors they may NOT attend either executive or theater outbriefs, in accordance with Air Force and ATC regulations.

UPT Class 93-06 graduates today

Thirty-two of the Air Force's newest pilots will get their wings when Reese UPT Class 93-06 graduates during a ceremony at 10 a.m. today in the Simler Theater.

Retired Brig. Gen. Charles Casson will be the guest speaker at the graduation. The ceremony is open to all base personnel.

The ceremony will be followed by several events in the Reese Officers' Open Mess. They include a buffet from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m., a parents' social at 6:15 p.m. and a dinner-dance at 7 p.m.

During the ceremony and dinner-dance, awards will be presented to students and permanent party members. They will include the commander's trophy (top graduate), "top stick" (best in flying training), academics, distinguished graduate, leadership and outstanding second lieutenant.

Permanent party awards will go to the outstanding academic and flightline instructor pilots, maintainers and mission makers.

DOD approves 15-year out Program will be limited in scope, usage

WASHINGTON — With a green light from the defense secretary, each of the services is developing early retirement programs for certain active-duty people with more than 15 but less than 20 years of service, Pentagon officials said.

Secretary Les Aspin approved use of the early retirement program to allow the military to keep using primarily voluntary means of drawing down and help avoid involuntary separations.

Early retirement will also help the Department of Defense achieve two goals during the drawdown — maintaining readiness and treating members fairly, officials said.

Part of President Clinton's defense conversion initiative, the program is designed to help servicemembers, affected by the force reduction, transition to civilian life.

The service secretaries will prescribe regulations and policies for eligibility for the program. Criteria may include such factors as grade, years of service and skill.

Local personnel officials said they have yet to receive details of the plan, but will publicize them as soon as they are received.

Eligible members closest to 20 years will generally be offered the program first, officials said. Those approved for early retirement will get the same benefits as individuals with 20 or more years of service; however, retirement pay will be reduced.

The early retirement program is not an entitlement, officials said. Congress provided authority for the program in the fiscal 1993 Defense Authorization Act. The authority expires Oct. 1, 1995.

A message from Air Staff earlier this week stressed that the Air Force does not need to use the 15-year retirement program to meet its fiscal 1993 end strength requirement.

Personnel officials are currently refining a plan to use early retirement in fiscal 1994. (Adapted from Air Force News Service)

From my perspective

BY 600 PERCENT"

These are just some of the ominous headlines that are appearing in newspapers throughout the country. Reduced funding of the military health care system along with the spiraling cost of health care has created an extremely difficult situation for all of us. We at the 64th Medical Squadron have proposed several measures to assist the surgeon general in solving these problems.

First we examined ways to reduce operational costs that would not have direct impact on our patients. The scope of our housekeeping contract was reduced as was some of our civil engineering support. Hospital staff members have almost finished painting the entire interior of the hospital by self-help. We have cut back severely on staff TDYs for continuing education and training. We have limited equipment purchases to work stoppage replacement only and capped civilian pay at 93 percent of authorized.

However, these cuts were still not enough to make our financial ends meet. We next scrutinized services that could be reduced yet still obtained through another military hospital or under the Civilian Health and Medical Plan for the Uniformed Services. CHAMPUS civilian doctors in orthopedics and cardiology no longer come to our hospital, though they can still treat our CHAMPUS patients at their downtown offices. We reluctantly terminated the walk-up, over-the-counter drug program March 1, but over-the-counter medication can still be obtained when prescribed by one of our providers.

Even these additional cuts were not enough



to ensure we have enough funds to operate for the remainder of the year. Only after a formal study of all options by our staff and review/approval by the ATC surgeon general did we begin to plan for the conversion of our emergency room to an extended hours primary care clinic, scheduled to take place May 1.

Other ATC bases currently operating under this concept are Vance and Goodfellow and others are presently strongly considering this option. We believe that this plan will have less impact on the majority of our patients than all other options considered. We expect only a small percentage of the patients that presently use the emergency room after hours to seek civilian care downtown after extended primary care clinic hours of operation. However, when this care is required, we will do everything we can to provide as many options as possible to minimize your expense. Twenty-four hour hospital ambulance service will still respond to the flightline and all emergencies on base within minutes and will be backed up by Lubbock Emergency Medical Services for patient transport. Access to primary care will be expanded on weekdays to 6 p.m. and will be open from 8 to 11:30 a.m. on weekends. These times will be adjusted in the future if patient demands dictate a change.

We will provide appointments as well as see walk-in patients during these hours. Laboratory, x-ray and pharmacy services will be limited on weekends and holidays to patients seen on those days in the primary care clinic.

I deeply regret that we can no longer provide 24-hour service to you, but I have been assured that when our funds have been depleted there will be no additional support this year. We must take action now to ensure we can provide as much service as possible for the entire fiscal year.

As long as funding does not get reduced further, I am confident that these measures will put us on firm footing for the rest of this year. Additional information regarding this conversion and CHAMPUS coverage will be publicized throughout the coming weeks.

and then do poorly on your Specialty Knowledge Test, who is to blame? You are.

Why? Because it's your responsibility to personally check the "current" edition of the WAPS catalog, which is published mid-August each year and is available in your unit orderly room or base training offices.

This publication clearly spells out what promotion cycles the material applies to and the edition dates of applicable Career Development courses. So, even if the WAPS library has an out-of-date WAPS catalog,

you're not off the hook. The responsibility is yours.

If you don't think so, check your Promotion Fitness Examination Study Guide. If the study references don't relate to the current cycle, challenge whoever tells you that the information is current, because if they're wrong, you'll pay for their mistake.

Don't let it happen to you. Remember, it's your promotion.

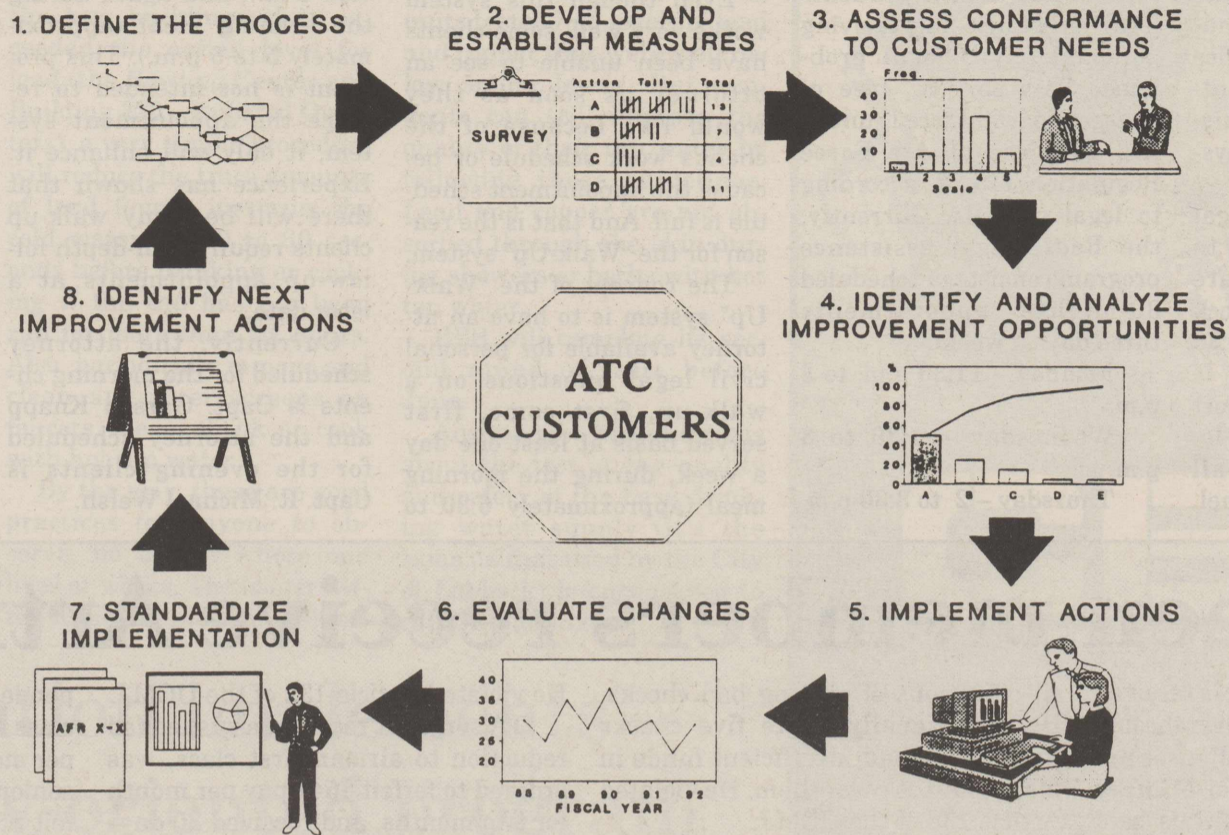

Legal office announces new service

Assistance now available at Caprock Cafe

In order to better meet the needs of the military community, the Reese Legal Office has augmented its appointment system of legal assistance with a "Walk-Up" system.

The goal is to make legal advice more accessible to more people. Attorneys are now available at the Caprock Cafe every Wednesday at 6:30 a.m.

One of the many support functions provided by the legal office is providing all qualified military personnel,

retirees and their dependents legal assistance in resolving personal (civil) legal problems. This service, free of charge, is conducted under the auspices of Air Force Regulation 110-22, according to legal officials. Currently, the Reese legal assistance program consists of scheduled 30-minute appointments three days a week:

Monday - 11:30 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Wednesday - 1:30 to 3 p.m.

Thursday - 2 to 3:30 p.m.

Even though this system works very well, some clients have been unable to see an attorney as soon as they would like because of the client's work schedule or because the appointment schedule is full. And that is the reason for the "Walk-Up" system.

The concept of the "Walk-Up" system is to have an attorney available for personal civil legal questions on a walk-up, first come, first served basis at least one day a week, during the morning meal (approximately 6:30 to

7:30 a.m.), and again during the evening meal (approximately 5 to 6 p.m.). This program is not intended to replace the appointment system; it only will enhance it. Experience has shown that there will be many walk-up clients requiring in-depth follow-up appointments at a later date.

Currently, the attorney scheduled for the morning clients is Capt. Garson Knapp and the attorney scheduled for the evening clients is Capt. R. Michael Welsh.

Each will be seated at a table in the Caprock Cafe with a sign on the table identifying themselves and welcoming people to simply sit down with them either before, during or after your meal and discuss with them any personal civil legal matters you may have.

Members do not have to be eligible to eat at the Caprock Cafe in order to utilize this service.

Thirteen members receive Articles 15

Thirteen wing members received Article 15 punishments over the last quarter for a variety of offenses under the Uniform Code of Military Justice. Reese legal officials said this brought the number of Reese military members punished under Article 15 during fiscal year 1993 to 16.

During the last quarter, the Article 15 offenses and punishments were as follows:

□ A first lieutenant was ordered to forfeit \$750 pay per month for two months for adultery and aiding and abetting another in disobeying a direct written order. He violated Articles 134 and 90 of the UCMJ.

□ A master sergeant was ordered to forfeit \$300 pay for indecent exposure. He violated Article 134 of the UCMJ. Additionally, he was forced to retire from the Air Force.

□ A technical sergeant received a suspended reduction to staff sergeant, was ordered to forfeit \$50 pay per month for two months, and received 12 days extra duty for five

specifications of writing bad checks. He intentionally wrote five checks knowing he had insufficient funds in his account to cover them. He violated Article 134 of the UCMJ.

□ A technical sergeant was reduced to staff sergeant and ordered to forfeit \$200 pay per month for two months for dereliction of duty. He sexually harassed a female member of his unit. He violated Article 92 of the UCMJ.

□ A staff sergeant received a suspended reduction to senior airman, was ordered to forfeit \$100 pay per month for two months, and received 24 days of extra duty for dereliction of duty and leaving his appointed place of duty. He failed to perform his assigned duties and then left his workplace in the middle of his shift without authority. He violated Articles 92 and 86 of the UCMJ.

□ A staff sergeant was reduced to senior airman and ordered to forfeit \$500 pay per month for two months for filing a false/fraudulent claim with the Legal Office for fictitious damages to his household goods after a PCS move.

He violated Article 132 of the UCMJ.

□ A sergeant received a suspended reduction to airman first class, was ordered to forfeit \$541 pay per month for two months, and received 30 days extra duty for driving while intoxicated on Reese AFB. He violated Article 111 of the UCMJ.

□ A sergeant was reduced to airman first class and ordered to forfeit \$50 pay per month for two months for two specifications of assaulting his wife and communicating a threat to his wife. He violated Articles 128 and 134 of the UCMJ.

□ Four individuals were involved in a bomb hoax during a base wide exercise. The individuals claimed they were "just trying to have some fun," which was unprofessional and inappropriate. Base wide exercises are conducted for a very serious reason—to prepare us all in the event of the real thing.

There is no room for "jokes" or "pranks" during exercises. Three of the four individuals involved with the bomb hoax were punished under Article 15: a sergeant received a sus-

pended reduction to airman first class and ordered to forfeit \$50 pay per month for two months; and two senior airmen were ordered to forfeit \$50 pay. They violated Article 134 of the UCMJ. The fourth individual's involvement was less than the others, therefore his punishment was limited to a letter of reprimand.

□ An airman first class was reduced to airman basic for underage drinking. The legal drinking age in Texas (and on Reese) is 21. He violated Article 134 of the UCMJ. This was his second Article 15 for the same offense which resulted in his administrative discharge from the Air Force under AFR 39-10 with a general discharge.

□ An airman was reduced to airman basic, ordered to forfeit \$100 pay per month for two months, and received 30 days extra duty for failure to go to his appointed place of duty. He reported late to work. He violated Article 86 of the UCMJ.

Civilians fined for on-base offenses

Two civilian contractor employees were recently convicted of misdemeanor offenses in U.S. Magistrate Court in Lubbock. Both individuals were prosecuted by the Reese judge advocates. The presiding judge in both cases was the Honorable J. Q. Warnick Jr.

The nature and result of each case, according to Reese legal officials, were:

Case No. 1 - A civilian contractor employee, who parked his auto illegally, was in the process of having a warning citation placed on his vehicle when he approached the security police officer and

accused her of not having jurisdiction over civilian employees (an incorrect statement). The individual became argumentative and the officer radioed for her supervisor to the scene. The officer ordered the civilian to remain on the scene until her supervisor arrived but the civilian left the scene.

The civilian was cited for failure to obey the command of a law enforcement officer and for failure to update his drivers license with his current address within 10 days (according to Texas law). The individual was found guilty of failure

to obey a law enforcement officer and was fined. The second charge was dismissed.

Case No. 2 - A civilian contractor employee assaulted his supervisor (also a civilian) while on duty at Reese. The individual was prosecuted in U.S. Magistrate Court. The individual pled guilty to the charge and was fined.

All civilians on Reese are subject to federal jurisdiction as carried out by Reese security police personnel. Any violations of either federal law or Texas state law may be directed to the U.S. Magistrate Court for criminal prosecution.

Reese drinking water good

Reese's drinking water got high marks during recent testing. Last October, the 64th Medical Squadron's Bioenvironmental Engineering Services conducted a test of the base's drinking water to find out how much lead and copper was leaching from plumbing into the water. This test was done to comply with the Safe Drinking Water Act, which enforces strict standards for water quality.

The results of our first round of sample collections were excellent. The Texas Department of Health determined that our plumbing system is safe. In 95 percent of the buildings tested (all but two), levels of lead and copper were well below action levels. The SDWA required 90 percent of our samples to

have lead and copper in concentrations below actions levels (.015 milligrams per liter for lead, 1.3 milligrams per liter for copper).

As mentioned, all drinking water examined during the first round of tests is safe. For the two buildings that exceeded the action level for lead (the Bowling Center and Building 320 - Enlisted Quarters), a very simple procedure will reduce the trace amounts of lead found: just run the cold water for 30 to 60 seconds before drinking or cooking if the tap has not been run for more than six hours. Also, periodically remove and clean any filter screens on faucets. Never drink or cook with hot tap water.

By the way, these are good practices for anyone to observe, no matter where one lives or works. The longer water stands in plumbing pipes,

the more metal from pipes and solder will dissolve in the water. After a tap has been in use during the last six hours, however, running the water will not measurably improve its quality.

All of the base housing units tested had levels of lead and copper that were well below action levels. But residents can still improve the quality of their tap water by following these guidelines. Lead and copper are not absorbed through the skin during showers or baths with hot tap water.

BES will complete its second round of tests before June.

Anyone who has questions about the test or the quality and safety of the base drinking water supply (it's the same as that used by the City of Lubbock) is encouraged to call BES at 3328.

Transportation implements new quality-oriented program

As commander of the transportation flight at Reese, I want to tell you about a program we've started called Total Quality Transportation, or TQT.

TQT is the transportation version of total quality management. In transportation, we're responsible for the movement of household goods, passenger flight reservations, freight shipments to include packing and preservation, as well as vehicle operations and maintenance. We're here for only one reason and that's to provide top quality transportation services to our customers.

This is more than just lip service, it's an attitude backed up by action. If there is anything about transportation's services you don't like, I want to know about it. We want to do everything legally possible to help you. We have critiques available at all our sections and I personally read them all.

The bottom line is that you deserve to have courteous, top quality service. From moving your household goods to signing out a vehicle to shipping a package or part; we want to be there to assist you every step of the way. If you don't want to fill out a critique, then call me at 3356 and I'll listen to any complaint, problem or suggestion you have and I'll get back to you with an answer.

We briefed TQT at the wing staff meeting several weeks ago and passed out critiques. We've already received two critiques that we're initiating. One of our customers felt that

we didn't provide adequate facilities for them to wash their vehicles. The wash rack on the back of Bldg. 460 is open to everyone from 7:30 a.m. to 4:15 p.m. Monday through Friday, and from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturday and Sunday.

If the base wash rack is too crowded or the hours don't fit your needs, then you can use the wash rack adjacent to the base exchange; simply drop by the vehicle operations facility (Bldg. 461) during duty hours and we'll give you tokens to operate the car wash.

Another customer asked if we could run a weekend shuttle service to the mall. Our answer is yes we can. If you need a ride to the mall, call 3356 during normal duty hours and put your name on the mall list. The vehicle will leave from Bldg. 461 at 11 a.m. on Saturday and return at 3 p.m. on the same day.

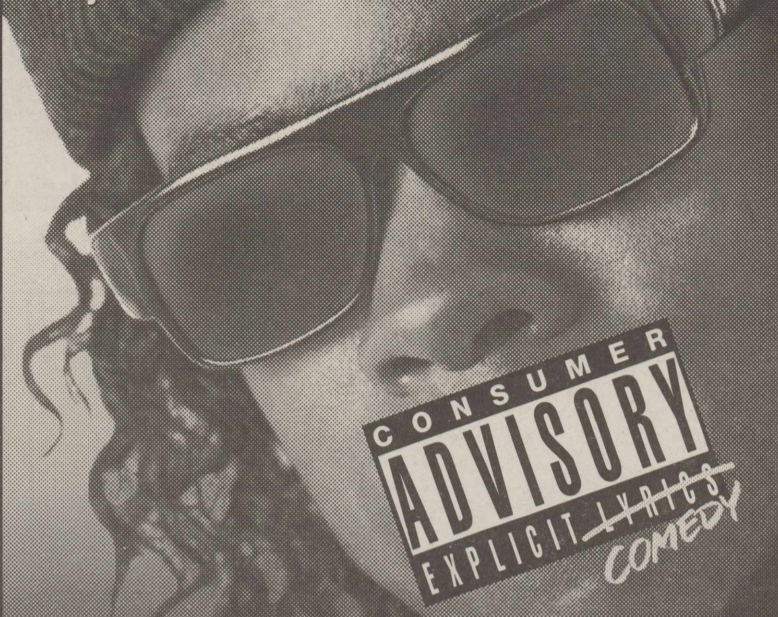
Unfortunately, we don't have the manpower to provide drivers for the vehicle, so someone on the list will have to be authorized by his or her unit commander to operate government vehicles. This service is open to all active-duty members, dependents and retirees. The shuttle will only go to the mall and return with no other stops authorized. So if you need transportation to the mall, here's your answer.

As you can see, we're listening. If we're not doing it right, tell us. TQT is our attitude and we want to do the things that make our customers happy.

Health benefit questions answered

Carolyn Johnson, Reese health benefits advisor, answers some recent questions from wing members.



Ms. Johnson

Dear Carolyn,
I am retired Air Force and was recently hospitalized at a civilian hospital.

I asked the hospital if they accepted Civilian Health and Medical Plan for the Uniformed Services and was told they did and they would file my claims for me. Therefore, I was quite surprised to receive bills from a radiologist and pathologist who provided services to me while I was in the hospital. Why didn't the hospital file the claims for the radiologist and pathologist since the hospital accepted CHAMPUS?

Although most hospitals in the United States accept CHAMPUS, the hospital-based individual professional providers of care (such as pathologists, radiologists and anesthesiologists) may not, in some cases, participate in CHAMPUS. If possible, check

with the hospital before being admitted, to see whether all those who provide professional services you require are participating in CHAMPUS.

Dear Carolyn,
I heard the emergency room at Reese will be closing soon. Since there will be no emergency room available will I still have to pay a deductible and cost share for my dependents? Will a non-availability statement be required?

Your dependents will be liable for deductibles and cost shares as they are not waived, even when services are not available at Reese hospital. A non-availability statement will not be required for outpatient emergency care.
