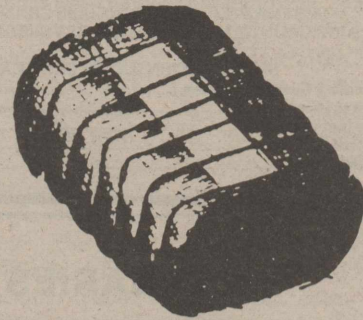

Annual Miss Mackenzie Contest To Be Held Saturday Night Here

Owls Beat Panthers On Penetrations

Silverton's Owls battled the Whitharral Panthers to a 6-6 tie here Friday night, but managed to beat them on penetrations, 3-2, to move ahead in the district race.

The Owls opened the game by kicking off to the Panthers who went on offense on their own 18-yard line. They gained no yardage and on fourth down punted to the Silverton 32. In spite of three assaults by Neal Edwards, the Owls saw the ball go over on fourth down when they came up a few inches short of the first-down marker.

Whitharral needed six yards on their next first-down play, and went for it and failed on fourth down, seeing the ball go over at the Silverton 38.

The Owls also were unable to move the ball, and punted into the endzone for a touchback.

Whitharral made the first first down of the game on a pass

completion, defense on which was made by Edwards at the Silverton 36. The Panthers were penalized twice on the next series, and punted to the Silverton 27. The teams traded a couple of possessions, and early in the second quarter the Owls made their first first down of the game on a run by Edwards to the Whitharral 27. Silverton picked up another first down on a pass interference call against Whitharral in the endzone when Jamie Frizzell looked like he would have a sure touchdown. The first down moved the ball to the Whitharral 11, where the Panther defense stiffened and a quarterback sack resulted in the ball going over on the Whitharral 20.

The Panthers were stalled by penalties and an incomplete pass

Contestants will be judged on appearance, poise and personality. Throughout the evening of the pageant, a number of door prizes will be given away. These have been donated by businesses in the four participating towns.

Gifts will be awarded to Miss Congeniality, Miss Mackenzie, the first and second runners-up. All of the jewelry gifts are from the L. O. A. Junior Study Club.





March of Time Study Club Enjoys Historical Tour

The March of Time Study Club went to Clarendon on Thursday, October 9, 1986, for an enjoyable day visiting historical sites.

The first place was the Lowe house now owned and restored by Dr. Zell SoRelle. This house was built in 1904 and is of Victorian style. It has been recognized by the Texas Historical Commission and given a medallion, and recognized by the National Register of Historical Places.

A tour was made of two churches which display the Texas Historical Commission Medallions. The First Methodist Church, built in 1910, has a high dome ceiling and a grand pipe organ. There are stained glass windows given as memorials.

The group then went to the St. John Episcopal Church which has the distinction of being the first Episcopal Church built in the Texas Panhandle. It is a small white frame structure and was built in 1893 and is still in use. It has some beautiful stained glass windows and lovely wood inter-

Briscoe County Needs Continued Enhancement Of Wildlife

Mike Delano, conservationist with the Caprock Soil & Water Conservation District, has noted that with good cover and food availability, pheasants and other gamebirds provide landowners some good income during the hunting season in addition to helping conserve the gamebird population. Some have quoted a price of \$100 per gun per day, and the average has probably been about \$75.00 per gun for a two-day weekend.

Briscoe County landowners have just begun to take a long look at this economic resource, in contrast to deer hunting areas of the Hill Country where hunting is a big-income enterprise for most ranching operations.

Delano says areas where pheasants have good food and adequate cover which are heavily populated draw top-dollar from hunters. Areas like Hereford have received good monetary benefits not only for the landowners but also for the whole community even if for a brief time.

One way of looking at pheasant season is that it comes three weeks before Christmas; just think what would be wrong with

a few hundred extra dollars for Christmas!

on their next series, and punted to the Silvertown 28. Corey Robertson passed complete to Edwards for a first down on the Whitharral 29, after which Ryan Smith carried to the 22 with 58 seconds remaining in the first half. Needing 18 yards on fourth down after a quarterback sack, Robertson passed complete but Whitharral recovered an Owl fumble on the Panther 22. The first half ended with Whitharral operating on their own 25.

Silvertown kicked off to Whitharral again and took the wind at their backs to open the third period. On second down, Sloan Grabbe recovered a Panther fumble as Whitharral was flagged for holding. Going on offense at the Whitharral 20, the Owls moved ahead on a run by Edwards before being set back to the original line of scrimmage by a quarterback sack. The Owls failed to get the first down on fourth, and the ball went back to the Panthers on the 20 where

action had started.

Whitharral's next series was terminated on third down when Robertson intercepted a Panther pass on the Whitharral 31. The Owls weren't able to move the ball and the teams traded a couple of possessions.

The fourth quarter opened on a series by Whitharral that saw them move to a first down on a personal foul call against the Owls. On their second play of the new series, Grabbe recovered a Panther fumble, and the Owls were back in business on their 28.

The Owls weren't able to move the ball, got off a bad punt due to a bad snap from center, and the Panthers took over again at the Silvertown 26. They made a first down on the Silvertown nine, and after the Owls were penalized 1/2 the distance to the goal, they scored with 4:46 remaining to be played in the game. Clay Schott blocked the extra-points kick.

The Owls started their next series at the 20 after a touchback and lost the ball on a fumble on the 17. Whitharral saw the ball go over on downs after a couple of incomplete passes, and the Owls took over possession again.

Edwards ran for a first down on the Whitharral 16 with 2:56 remaining on the game clock. The Owls were backed up on a penalty, and a pass from Edwards to Robby McWaters fell incomplete. On fourth down, the Owls came back with another pass to McWaters which was good for six points, and Whitharral blocked Grabbe's extra-points kick.

The Owl defense came on strong when Whitharral went on offense, and Smith moved the Panthers back with a quarter-sack with 21 seconds remaining in the game. Whitharral was penalized for unnecessary roughness, and the Owls took over possession of the ball.

On first down, a pass was completed to Grabbe at the 26 as time expired, ending the game in a 6-6 deadlock.

The Owls will be traveling to Texline Friday, and kickoff time is 7:30 p.m. The following Friday night, the Owls will have an open date before hosting powerful Three Way on Halloween night.

Silverton's Junior High Owls traveled to Lefors Thursday afternoon and brought home a 19-7 victory. They scored in the

On the first play for the Owls following the kickoff, they were unable to gain on runs by Frizzell and Smith, and Henderson got off a 30-yard punt on fourth down. Josh Brooks broke up a Lefors pass play, and Smith, Stan Gamble and Clinton Payne teamed up to tackle a Lefors player who looked to weigh about 180 pounds. Gamble put the stop on Lefors on fourth down, causing the ball to go back to the Owls on downs.

Now in the fourth quarter, Brooks passed to Breedlove for a 10-yard gain before Lefors got the ball back. Owls Smith, Wil Bomar and Breedlove stopped a Lefors ballcarrier after he picked up a first down. There was a penalty on the next play, and the ball was resting on the 10-yard line, and the following play moved it to the five for a first down. Brooks stopped the next play on the three, and Russ Baird and Brooks teamed up to hold the next play on the one. Lefors moved the ball to 1/2 yard outside the goal-line before the Owl defense forced the turnover on downs.
