"Meek Blood Center is in need of all types of blood, especially types O and A, as they are the most common blood types in our area," Frances Baker, donor recruiter, said. "Our mission is to ensure blood availability to the hospitals we service at all times. We are totally dependent on volunteer donors for the blood supply."

Blood donors must be at least 17 years old, weigh at least 110 pounds, in good health and free of infection or illness. Most medication are acceptable. Those who have questions regarding donor eligibility may call Meek Blood Center at 325-670-2805.

Each donor will receive a Tshirt and a complimentary total cholesterol reading. Cholesterol results can be obtained two days after the blood drive by calling 325-670-2799.

Sheriff urges key removal from all cars

In the recent past, in fact the last couple of years, it seems to be a popular mode of transportation to "borrow" someone's car without permission. In most circumstances, the vehicles are left abandoned somewhere, sometimes nearby and many times elsewhere.

A variety of vehicles are taken, some very nice vehicles, some that seem to be barely able move, but none the less, they belong to someone other than the person who takes them on a road trip. In virtually every case, the keys are left somewhere in the vehicle and the vehicle is unlocked. Even though this is a very small and friendly community, there are those who are not so considerate as to leave "your" stuff along.

The same goes for your house and other buildings. Many times, the houses that are entered with intentions of committing theft are unlocked. Again, there are individuals prowling the streets and neighborhood that are just looking for something to get into and carry off your possessions. It is very easy to lock your house, windows, sliding doors, garage doors, anything that might permit unauthorized entry. A person can secure a window with a simple nail properly placed, sliding doors with a stick, your front door with a locking door lock.

Not securing your "stuff" is just inviting entry and loss and it's a matter of time before someone does try to enter the unsecured door. I'm not saying that locking the doors and windows will prevent thefts altogether, but is will curb the thieves ambition and cause him/her a little more inconvenience. And for goodness sake, even if it takes a little more time, lock your vehicle and take your keys out, even if you park it in front of your own house for only a few minutes. You might get busy and forget about leaving the keys in the vehicle, ending up leaving the vehicle unattended for several hours or overnight.

The local agencies do a good job of watching the neighborhoods and relocating the vehicles once taken, however, please help us help you keep your "stuff" where it belongs, with you. You would be surprised what is prowling the streets and what your law enforcement is having to deal with on a regular basis.

Historical commission meets, discusses fundraiser, museum

The Knox County Historical Commission and Friends of KCHS met February 10, 2004 discussing the recent fundraiser meal and museum plans.

Our meal was the biggest success to date, feeding approximately 475 people and with a donation of \$750.00 from the Wichita-Brazos Soil Conservation District, donations totaled \$1,325. The generous contributions of 26 silent auction items netted \$1,051 and the quilt, which was won by Jim Cox, brought in \$1,109. The net profit of the entire fundraiser was \$5,643.

There were 46 door prizes donated from all over the county. The food was delicious, thanks to the many volunteers and visiting with friends

added to the enjoyment of the occasion. Officials were very happy with the interest shown for the museum by the success of this fundraiser.

At the meeting, the beginning phases of construction were discussed. A motion was made and passed that we start construction as soon as possible. Money received from fundraisers and donations since 1966 has given us a total of \$65,000 to start this project. Applications to five foundations for grants have been made with no success. Money is tight, interest is low, or the rural area is a detriment, they say. To preserve the history of Knox County a determined effort by our citizens, past and present, will produce the necessary funds and labor to build this museum.





it takes to be a County Judge. As Deputy Clerk, I assisted Civil and Criminal District Court. Due to my time in the Clerk's office, I gained the knowledge and experience to also conduct countywide elections.

Serving on the Benjamin School Board and attending summer leadership seminars has given me opportunities to grow and continue my leadership abilities as a team builder.


