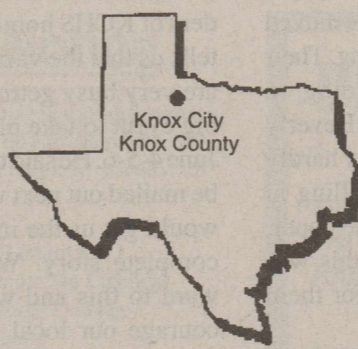


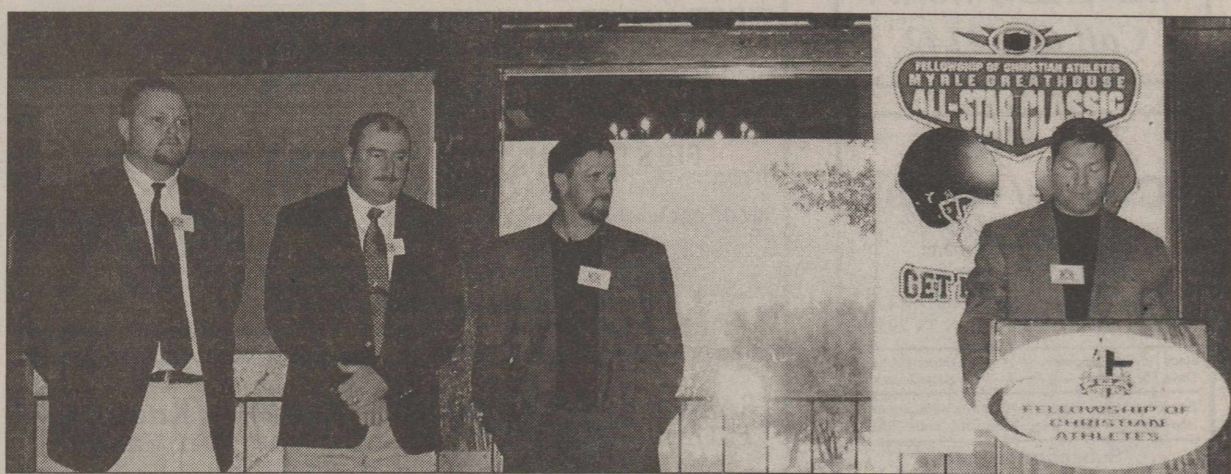

Knox City coaches named to lead FCA All-Star Classic's North Team

Wayne Hutchinson selected as Head Coach

At a Thursday afternoon press conference at the Fairway Oaks Country Club in Abilene, Coach Wayne Hutchinson of Knox City High School was introduced as one of the head coaches for the 2004 Myrle Greathouse Fellowship of Christian Athletes (FCA) All-Star Classic that will be held in Abilene on Saturday, June 5.

After Coach Hutchinson was introduced to the media as the head coach for the North All-Star Team, Coach Brad McCoy of Jim Ned High School in Tuscola was named the South Team's head coach.

Along with the honors and responsibilities of head coach, each team's leader was allowed to select their own assistants for the prestigious game. Coach Hutchinson named coaches Mitch McLemore, Larry Welch and Colin Howeth of Knox City to assist him, along with coaches Jason Dean of Abilene High and Clint Easley of Clyde High School.

Being selected to coach the FCA All-Star Classic is one of the biggest individual honors a high school coach in the Abilene region can receive.

The FCA staff selects players of the highest quality and moral character for the game, and the selection of coaching staffs to work with the best players from throughout the area is an honor that few coaches will experience in their careers.

As the North Team's Head Coach, Wayne Hutchinson brings a lot of experience with him to the All-Star Classic. After graduating from Angelo State University, Coach Hutchinson started his coaching career at Kermit in 1990. In 1992, he moved to Archer City

and coached there from 1992 until 1997. He coached at Whitewright from 1997 until 1999, when he moved to Abilene for a coaching job with Abilene High School. He was offered and accepted the head coaching and athletic director position at Knox City High School in 2001.

Returning to the high school where he led the Knox City Greyhounds to a State Championship as their quarterback in 1983, Coach Hutchinson has led the Hounds to the playoffs each year since he has been here. In 2001, the Greyhounds were the Tri-District Champions; in 2002, the team went all the way to the State Quarterfinals; and in 2003, the team advanced to the playoffs as the District 6A Runner-Up. In 2002, Coach Hutchinson was named the Class A Big Country Coach of the Year. Coach Hutchinson and his wife Kelly have two sons, Hagen and Wes.

Coming to Knox City with Coach Hutchinson in 2001, Coach Mitch McLemore will serve as the defensive coordinator for the FCA North All-Star Team. Coach McLemore graduated from Midwestern State University in Wichita Falls and has coached three years at Bryson High School, one year at Munday High School, five years at Archer City, one year at Alvord High School and three years here at Knox City. Bringing a lot of experience to the defense, 'Coach Mac' has served as the defensive coordinator at Knox City, Alvord, Archer City and Munday. Coach McLemore and his wife Kim have two children, Marni and Ty.

Also assisting with the FCA North All-Star Team, Coach Larry Welch of Knox City High School

brings a wealth of football experience and knowledge as a line coach. Coach Welch graduated from college at Panhandle State University, and coached at Goree from 1993 until 1998 before coming to Knox City. Having served under Coach Hutchinson as the line coach since 2001, Coach Welch is no stranger to championship and playoff games. He is also the head boys basketball coach at Knox City High School. He and his wife Annelle reside in Rhineland and have three children, Ambra, Laurie and Lari Dee.

Another graduate of Midwestern State University, Coach Colin Howeth has been coaching at Knox City since 2000. Serving as assistant varsity coach and junior high coordinator, Coach Howeth has also gained a lot of experience in championship and playoff games that is sure to help the FCA North All Star Team. Colin and his wife Christie have one daughter, nine month old Gracie.

Coaching at Abilene High School since 1999, Jason Dean graduated from McMurry University, where he also served as a graduate assistant on the football team in 1997. He started his coaching career at Franklin Middle School in 1998 before moving to Abilene High School. Coach Dean and his wife Bethany have one son, Tatum.

Another graduate of McMurry, Coach Clint Easley is currently coaching at Clyde High School. He has also coached at Franklin Middle School in Abilene, Palestine High School, Turkey-Valley High School and McMurry University. His wife's name is Julie and the couple reside in Clyde.

Players will be announced on Sunday, March 28.

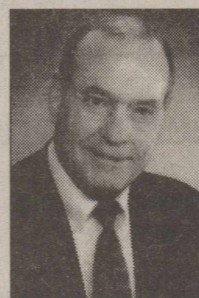

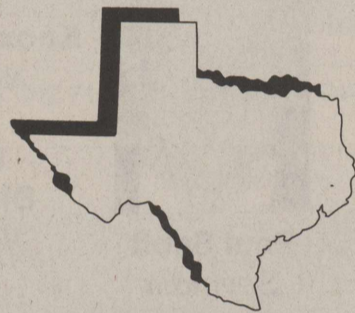

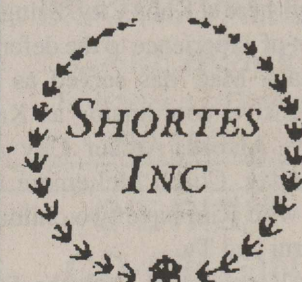

Deadline for joint election is this Monday

For city council, school and hospital boards

Monday, March 15, will be the deadline for anyone to file for the joint city, school, and hospital election which is scheduled for May 15.

Until this year, the deadline for the hospital filing was different, but hospital officials have been notified that the hospital filing deadline will be the same as that for the city and school.

Filing for the three two year terms on the council are incumbents Bud Reynolds and Fred Ledesma along with Dan Godsey. Tommy Mangis has filed for the one year unexpired term.

Incumbents Dale Turner and Raul Espinosa have filed for Knox City-O'Brien school trustees, but no other information was available on the school board election due to the office's closing for spring break.

In the hospital election, incumbents filing are James Reid of Munday and JoAnn Albus of Knox City.

The hospital board has three elective members including the above mentioned as well as Clint Jones' whose term will continue until next year.

There are four appointed members including Tracy Cartwright, Lezli Williams, John Loftin, and board president Leon Burkham.

Any person wanting to file for the hospital board must present a petition with the names of 25 registered voters.

On February 10, 2004, VALOR Telecommunications of Texas, LP (VALOR) filed its Second Amended Application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (Commission) to establish surcharges to recover lost revenues and incurred costs associated with Expanded Local Calling Service (ELCS) routes implemented from February 1, 1996 through December 31, 2002 between VALOR's Texas telephone exchanges and, in many instances, the exchanges of other local telephone companies. The Second Amended Application was filed pursuant to the Commission's Substantive Rule § 26.221 titled "Applications to Establish or Increase Expanded Local Calling Service Surcharges."

ELCS expands the local calling scope of a telephone exchange to include one or more additional telephone exchanges if customers in a petitioning exchange approve by ballot the payment of an ELCS fee in lieu of long distance charges. Costs and lost revenues associated with Valoro's surcharge application are those not recovered through existing ELCS fees.

In the Second Amended Application, VALOR proposes to implement monthly ELCS surcharges for five years beginning on the date the Commission issues a final order on VALOR's request. The Commission can establish an ELCS surcharge for any duration. ELCS surcharges apply in addition to monthly ELCS fees. VALOR proposes the following monthly ELCS surcharges per residential line: \$.86 in Year 1, \$.85 in Year 2, \$.03 in Year 3, \$.02 in Year 4, \$.01 in Year 5. VALOR proposes the following monthly ELCS surcharges per business line: \$1.72 in Year 1, \$1.70 in Year 2, \$0.6 in Year 3, \$0.4 in Year 4, \$0.2 in Year 5.

VALOR is currently billing interim ELCS surcharges approved by the Commission, including an interim ELCS surcharge of \$.65 per month per residential line and an interim ELCS surcharge of \$1.30 per month per business line. If rates below the level of the interim surcharges are ultimately approved by the Commission, VALOR may be required by the Commission to refund all or part of the interim surcharges.

If VALOR's Second Amended Application is approved, the net annual effect on VALOR's Year 1 revenues will be zero since the requested surcharges are designed to replace lost revenues and to reimburse VALOR for increases in costs associated with the provision of ELCS. The estimated total lost revenues and increased costs VALOR seeks to recover through this proceeding is \$3,867,372 in Year 1, \$3,791,870 in Year 2, \$133,831 in Year 3, \$89,220 in Year 4, and \$44,610 in Year 5.

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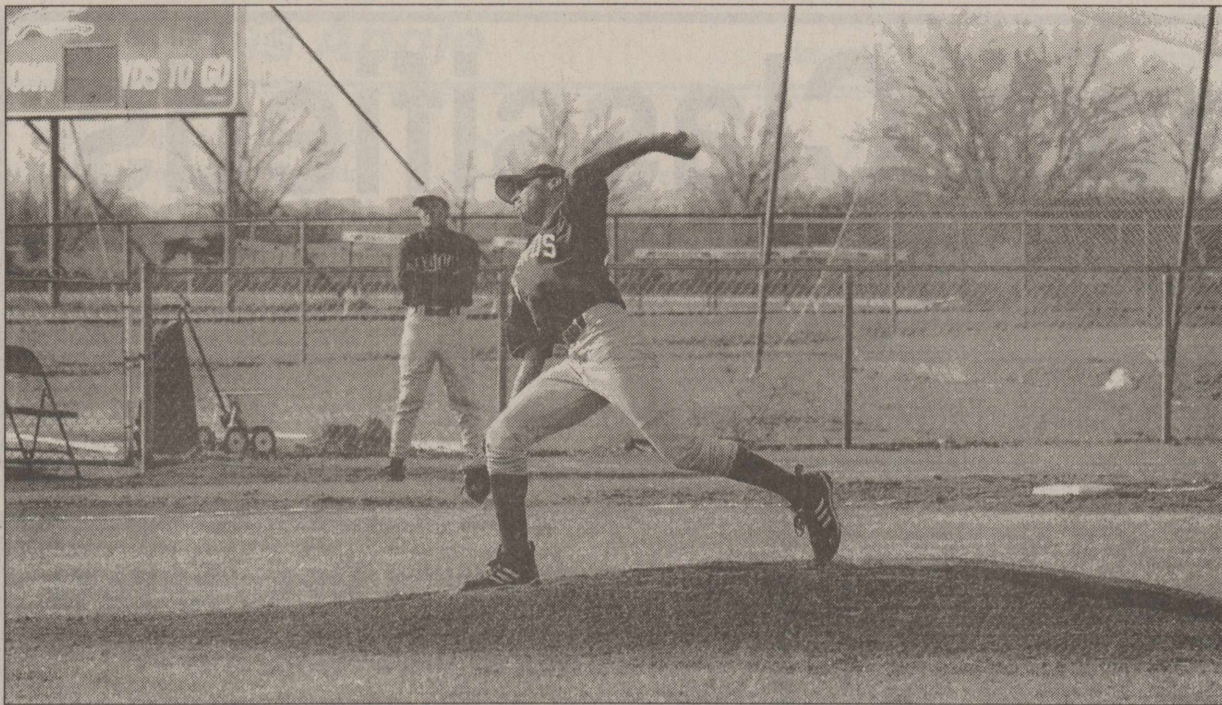
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GREYHOUND PITCHER Derrick Magana is shown here during the practice game against Seymour.
