

The 0-4 Class AA Anson Tigers flexed their muscles last Friday night for their homecoming game, barely losing to Knox City's Greyhounds, 24-20.

Playing at Tiger Field, the 'Hounds seemed to start the game a little overconfident of their 4-0 season record while Anson looked like they were trying as hard as they could to change their 0-4 record.

Historical museum building for Knox County is underway

The historical museum building long planned for Knox County is underway. Officially named the Wichita-Brazos Museum and Cultural Center, the museum site is on the north side of U.S. Highway 82 in Benjamin, about one block east of the Knox County courthouse.

-

Phase one, putting the building "in the dry" in now underway. The building's finance committee made a decision last spring, to buy and store rebar and metal. The purchases made then have saved a few thousand dollars. Jeff Jordon of Olney is donating his labor and has started work on the foundation.

It was good news announced at the September 14 meeting of ways to raise money for the completion of the museum. (1.) A Knox County historical calendar is on the way to an Abilene publisher. Kenneth Roberts and members of the KCHC staff have been collecting photos of Knox County buildings since last spring and working out the format for the calendar. Every community in the county will be represented in the calendar. The calendar should be available for the annual Knox County Veterans Day celebration in Benjamin, Thursday, November 11. Old pictures of places, people and events in Knox County are being collected for future calendars. (2.) A quilt, called "Flowers Around the World", has been pieced by Mary Cartwright of

Munday as a museum fundraiser. Tickets for the completed quilt will go on sale in October. (3.) A garage sale to benefit the Wichita-Brazos Museum and Cultural Center's building fund will be held at the Truscott Community Center October 16. (4.) A cookbook has been suggested for a future project.

Anyone who wants to help with one or more of the upcoming events can call the Knox County Historical Commission office at 940-459-2229 located in the Knox County Courthouse. Volunteers are needed to donate pictures for future calendars, donating items to the October 16 garage sale, selling quilt tickets and sending in recipes.

In addition, Mary Birkenfeld of Rhineland has completed an application for a grant for the building from the Priddy Foundation of Wichita Falls. This grant would help complete the inside of the building.

The traditional hamburger meal will be served after the Veterans Day program on November 11. The meal will be at the Benjamin Ex-Students Center and that money will go to the KCHC Veterans Fund, used to maintain the memorial and to add named to the granite markers. Volunteers are needed for serving the meal and helping at the historical exhibit in the courthouse on that day. Items are needed to display at the exhibit.




