Abilene will be the location of next **Texas State Veterans Cemetery**

AUSTIN -- Jerry Patterson, Chairman of the Texas Veterans Land Board, and Leo Barraza, Chairman of the Texas Veterans Commission, today announced a site proposed by the city of Abilene will be the location of the next Texas State Veterans Cemetery.

"The proposed Abilene site will make a superb final resting place for our Texas veterans," Patterson said. "This location meets all federal criteria for a state veterans cemetery, and will serve more than 30,000 veterans living within a 75-mile radius.'

The Veterans Land Board will submit Abilene's proposal to the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs, which provides all funding to build state veterans cemeteries. The VLB should know by October 2005 whether the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs has approved funding for the site. Once funding is approved, the

design phase will begin and should be completed by spring 2006. Construction is expected to begin in summer 2006 and the cemetery should open in early 2008.


"This cemetery will be a lasting memorial to the men and women who serve our nation," Patterson said. "We pledge to keep it immaculate, as befits a place of

The Abilene site was chosen by the Texas State Veterans Cemeteries Committee, which met after the public meeting today of the Texas Veterans Land Board in

The Texas State Veterans Cemeteries Committee is composed of Texas Land Board Chairman Patterson and fellow Veterans Land Board members Col. Ladd Pattillo, USAR (Ret.), and Mr. Mike Ussery. Also on the committee are Texas Veterans Commission Chairman Leo Barraza; the immediate Past-Chair of the TVC, Mr. ames Duncan; and Mr. Glen M. Gardner Jr., Chairman of the Texas Coalition of Veterans Organizations and Department Adjutant of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, Department of Texas.

In March 2004, a request for proposals was sent to mayors, city managers, county judges and veterans groups in nine communities located in 11 counties: Abilene, Amarillo, Corpus Christi, Longview, Lubbock, Midland-Odessa, San Angelo, Texarkana and Tyler.

Four proposals were received in time to be considered for funding in 2006. The proposed sites were submitted by the city of Abilene, Nueces County, the American Housing Authority on behalf of the Llano Cemetery Association in Amarillo, and a joint proposal from Smith and Gregg counties.

Greyhounds enjoy week off following 61-36 win over Baird

using the open date on their schedule this week to relax and prepare for the opening week of district play next Friday night when the Albany Lions will travel to Greyhound Stadium. The open date this Friday night follows Knox City's defeat of the Bears at Baird last Friday night, 61-36.

Moving up and down the field at will, Riley Spells led the rushing game for Knox City, adding a whopping 186 yards in 11 carries with 3 touchdowns to his season record. Quentin Spells picked up 92 yards in 8 carries with 2 touchdowns, Cody Wainscott added 60 yards in just 4 carries with 1 touchdown, Ben Simmons had 52 yards on 5 carries, Rico McCrary had 12 yards on 3 carries, Amos Lerma had 6 yards on 3 carries, Andy Shaver picked up 4 yards on 2 carries, and Adan Silva had -4 yards on 2 carries. The 'Hound rushing game picked up a total of 402 yards on 38 carries.

The Greyhound offense also

Andy Shaver completed 3 of 7 passes for 47 yards and Quentin Spells added 7 yards with 1 completed pass. Adan Silva and Rico • McCrary also passed the ball 1 time each.

Offense stats show that Knox City picked up 13 first downs compared to only 7 by Baird, picked up 402 yards rushing to Baird's 82, had 3 penalties for 20 yards compared to Baird's 45 yards with 5 yellow flags. Knox City picked up 456 yards of total offense, Baird had 280.

Knox City's backup varsity and junior varsity players gained valuable game experience as Coach Hutchinson started subbing them into the game as early as the second quarter.

On defense, Eric Lewis leads the season stats with 58 tackles, followed by Kylin DelValle with 43, and Cody Wainscott with 39. Other tackle totals are 37 for Ben Simmons, 31 for Chris Norton

The Knox City Greyhounds are picked up another 54 yards and Tomas Myers, 29 for T.J. through the air as quarterback Richardson and Riley Spells, 28 for C.J. Bruce and Quentin Spells, 16 for Derrick Magana, 12 for Ryan Harrington, 10 for L.B. Thompson and Brandon Grimsley, 5 for Ricky Dale Smith and Jeremy Saxton, 3 for Ty Chisum and Adan Silva, 2 for Jeff Garcia, Drew Barnard, Travis Hawkins, Rico McCrary and Amos Lerma, while Sandro Garcia and Tim Sanders have 1 tackle each.


