

Former Benjamin ag teacher Buddy Hale has part in 'Friday Night Lights' movie

Begins Friday, October 8, across the nation

'Friday Night Lights' is coming to the Big Screen on Friday, October 8, across the nation and so is former Benjamin ag teacher Buddy Hale.

'Friday Night Lights' is a movie about Odessa, Texas, and Permian High School's football team and program.

The plot focuses on the book Friday Night Lights written by Buzz Bissinger back in 1988-1989 about a town - Odessa - and a tradition - Permian High School (MOJO) football.

What brings the plot to Knox County - Benjamin, Texas, is that Buddy Hale was the Senior Grade Level Principal of that team at Permian High School - football season 1988 and Senior Class of 1989.

"The book is historically correct and really focuses on the racial, social, and economic issues of that day," states Hale, who is currently the Senior Grade Level Principal of the 2005 Permian High School graduation class.

Peter Berg, the director, the mastermind and entrepreneur of "Friday Night Lights - the Movie" has created a movie about Permian High School that truly captures not only the historical events that occurred then, but also, the emotional, humanistic spirit - "the MOJO of the Permian High School football team of 1988."

What does that mean in a nutshell? Peter Berg captured the spirit of a team, a school, and a community and puts on video tape the feelings, dreams and emotions of those people.

What does that have to do with a Benjamin Mustang player, a Knox City Greyhound booster club president, a Dallas Carter football parent, a Great Bend, Kansas, cheerleader, or a Chula Vista, California, head football coach? It has a lot to do with every one of these people. High school football is as much an American tradition in society as Chevrolet and apple pie.

Excellence at Permian High School is something expected from everyone, Hale said.

Peter Berg's version of the FNL book is powerful because the movie reveals Peter's personal passion for being historically correct, but more importantly, it displays the human hearts of the players, the coaches and the community.

Several of the lead actors will be nominated for Oscars for their roles in the movie.

Accountability ratings are released last week by Texas Education Agency

Elementary campus receives highest rating - exemplary, mid-school & high school recognized as is entire district

The Texas Education Agency released the 2004 accountability ratings last week with Knox City Elementary receiving an Exemplary rating, the highest rating possible. While Knox City High School, O'Brien Middle School and Knox City-O'Brien CISD all received the second highest rating of Recognized.

Louis Baty, School Superintendent commented, "Overall, we are pleased with the ratings released by TEA. Only 6.6% of the campuses in the state received an Exemplary rating and only 32.4% achieved the recognized rating. However, we must continue to strive for academic excellence at each grade level and subject."

Each campus and district is given one of four possible ratings: Exemplary, Recognized, Academically Acceptable, and Academically Unacceptable. In order to achieve the Exemplary rating the passing rate on each section of the Texas Assessment of Academics Skills (TAKS) test must be 90% or higher. The Recognized rating requires at least a 70% passing rate on each section of the TAKS test. Campuses must also meet certain attendance and dropout criteria.

Marsha McGaughey, Elementary Principal stated, "Two years ago, the Sight Base Committee at Knox City Elementary set goals for our campus. The Exemplary

rating is a result of a dedicated faculty and staff, unwavering parental support and a school board committed to the education of our youth. The students' performance on the TAKS test was outstanding. They worked diligently in preparing for the test and met all of the goals that were set."

Sign up for project 319 drip installation

The Haskell, Wichita Brazos and California Creek Soil & Water Conservation Districts are now accepting applications for Drip Irrigation Cost Share installation. Applications are available at the SWCD office from 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

Applications will be accepted through November 1, 2004. Qualifying farms will be awarded contracts on a point system basis.

The maximum cost-share per contract is \$30,000. To be eligible for a contract he land has to have a history of irrigation and have a minimum of 4 gallons per minute per acre of available water. Eligible producers can receive 60% cost share to install the systems not to exceed \$1000.00 per acre.

Family Land Heritage Program seeks historic farms & ranches

AUSTIN - Agriculture Commissioner Susan Combs announced that the Texas Department of Agriculture's Family Land Heritage Program is seeking farms and ranches for recognition by he Family Land Heritage Program, which marks its 30th anniversary this year. Since the first ceremony on October 14, 1974, the program has honored almost 3,900 farms and ranches in 222 counties for being kept in continuous agricultural production by the same fam-

"These families have nurtured life from the land to make a future for their children, all the while making their mark in Texas history," Combs said. "The Family Land Heritage Program honors their contributions to the settlement of the Lone Star State. It also chronicles the unique history of Texas agriculture, a proud record that otherwise might be lost for-

To be eligible for the program, the farm or ranch must meet these qualifications:

• The farm/ranch has to have been agriculturally productive for 100 years or more and the line of ownership traced from the first family member to the present, either through direct relatives, marriage or adoption.

• The land must fit the old U.S. Census definition of a farm: 10 acres or more with agricultural sales of \$50 or more a year; or if less than 10 acres, sales of at least \$250 a year.

• Owner(s) must be actively

managing the everyday operation of the property.

• If all the land has ever been rented to someone outside of the family, it will not qualify. If only a portion was leased, and as much as 10 acres retained in the family for agricultural production with sales of at least \$50 annually, it will qualify.

· Deadline to submit applications for properties established in 1904 or before is November 15, 2004.

Farms and ranches that qualify will be honored during the ceremony in Austin in March 2005. The history of the farm or ranch will be chronicled in a registry and honorees can obtain historic farm or ranch signage for their property.
