City of Benjamin Request for **Injunction Denied Benjamin Versus Sheedy Trial Will Proceed**

Last week at the Knox County Courthouse in Benjamin, 50th Judicial District Judge William H. Heatly heard compelling arguments from attorneys representing the City of Benjamin and one of its citizens and former mayor, Mike Sheedy.

At that hearing, the City was seeking a temporary injunction which would have forced Sheedy to remove a locked gate he constructed over a portion of a road in Benjamin commonly known as Oxford Street.

Judge Heatly did not issue that injunction. It is now up to the City of Benjamin to proceed to final trial and ask the judge or a jury for a verdict. According to the City and it's attorneys, they plan to do just that.

Attorneys for the plaintiff (City of Benjamin) from the law firm of Taylor, Olson, Adkins, Sralla and Elam of Fort Worth, are pitted against Don Ross Malone and Matthew Ross Malone of the Malone Law Firm of Vernon and Wichita Falls, who represent the other case precedents."

The lawsuit filed by the City began over a dispute from what the City says is a public right-ofway and Sheedy claims is private property.

Sheedy says he fenced the land to keep his cattle from wandering out onto the highway. He also stated he has given or offered keys to the City and anyone else who needs access beyond the gate.

The City says the road is and has always been a City street and should be clear of any barriers or blockage. The City has also over the past 70 years performed routine maintenance on the street. Their contention is that maintenance of the street and continual usage as a main thoroughfare constitutes ownership.

"This case will continue and we are attempting to set a hearing for final trial," Allen Taylor, attorney for the City said. "We believe that this case is covered under an implied dedication for public right-of-way ruling set in

Miller v. Elliott and Mission

v. Rio Grande Railroad are two previous cases where rulings went in favor of cities and theirclaims to public right-of-ways on or near private lands.


Malone argues however, that no one who had business beyond the gate has ever been denied access, and that inconvenience, or having to open a gate, are not sufficient reasons for removing the gate. Prior court rulings have set precedents in favor of Malone's argument.

"Inconvenience is not a basis for an injunction," Malone said in court. "No one has been harmed nor denied access, they have only been inconvenienced."

In a case that will determine which party ultimately has control over that specific section of the street, Judge Heatly, or perhaps a jury, will hear much more from the two counselors and from many witnesses. Numerous precedent-setting cases were cited by lawyers for both sides, each with its own bearing on the


Students were asked to bring photos and memorabilia from active military and veterans. These items were placed on a "Wall of Honor" in the cafeteria.

This was a great way for the Knox City students to show their respect for the U.S. military.



Benjamin v Sheedy

Several recurring themes found their way into the examination and cross-examination of witnesses' testimonies.

The Plaintiff's attorney asked each former City worker if they performed work on Oxford Street and all said they did. When asked if Oxford was part of the City road system, they all agreed it was. Furthermore, the City's attorney asked if anyone ever told them it was private property, and all said no.

Malone had his own set of questions for the witnesses, foremost of which was if any land owner had ever told the City or any City employees that they planned to donate their property to the City. Each witness replied

Attorneys for the defendant issued a statement following Judge Heatly's decision to deny

the temporary injunction.

"We think it's in accordance with the facts presented today and respecting the rights of property owners and the City's rights," Don Ross Malone stated.

Both lawyers made lengthy, articulate and well-documented arguments which included calling numerous witnesses from Benjamin and the surrounding area. Several former city administrators and mayors were called to testify before the court.

Mayor Linda Cox issued a statement following Wednesday's decision which summed up the City's plan of action.

"The injunction was a strategic move by the City," Mayor Cox said. "There was nothing compelling the judge to make that decision to issue the injunction, so we will now proceed to



Cars were whizzing by honking and pointing. Flickers of fire could be seen, fanned by the head wind.

Punch, punch, punch...seven times. "You have reached Shannon's Arena and Livestock Exchange. Team roping every Tuesday, Wednesday ... etc." "Shannon! The hay's on fire! Call me!" Byron swerved his pyrotechnic hay wagon into a gravel clearing. He mashed on the brakes and three flaming bales toppled off the right side in front of the "Land of Enchantment Nursing Home!"

Punch, punch...seven times.

"You have reached...etc." "Shannon! We're cooked! Call

ROLLING PLAINS RAMBLINGS

For the past two weeks, we've read excerpts from Capt. Randolph B. Marcy's, The Prairie Traveler, published in 1859 as a guide book for travelers to the American West. We have seen the great difficulties our ancestors faced as they migrated west.

Let's turn now to 1854, when Capt. Marcy probably became the first Anglo to cross Knox and surrounding counties, seeking a site for a reservation for some Comanche bands, the first reservation proposed for Southern Plains Indians.

Traveling with Marcy on this expedition was W.B. Parker, who took notes which give us a peek at the problems which the frontier military faced on a daily basis. Let's look at what he wrote for August 26 through September 4, 1854.

"August 26th – The weather was still intensely hot - averaging one hundred and six degrees in the shade. - and as the twenty-seventh was Sunday, the Captain (Marcy) determined to commence his survey on Monday, the twenty-eighth; the party was consequently busy all day in preparation, and those of us who had the opportunity kept as quiet as possible, as the most discreet plan under such a sun.'

"I thought we had done with the Comanches, but was mistaken. Towards evening one made his appearance in the distance, and proved to be Naroni; but oh, how changed from the Naroni of the council-fire. Dressed in an old torn vest, breech cloth and leggings, with a shabby straw hat laid aside, the little man looked smaller still and miserably forlorn. He had shot two bucks and came to barter the carcasses for corn. Lounging around for a time, and find no trade, he rode off, and we saw no more of him.'

"August 27th - Sunday, intensely hot, and a general quiet in our camp.'

Shifting their homes so constantly, as these nomads of the plains do, they are very careless of offal about camp, and in time of plenty, this evil accumulates.'

"Our visitors left their temporary abode in a very disgusting

state - half-gnawed bones and masses of corrupted raw flesh lying around, which soon under the sun's intensive rays, made us sensible of their locality.'

"As a sanitary measure, the Captain determined to break up our camp on the morrow, and move up the stream, and though we should miss the fine spring, at this point, we should be nearer the land to be surveyed, which would be more convenient.'

"August 28th to September 4th - Last night was one of great excitement in our camp. About midnight a general stampede of our horses took place, and as Ke-tum-o-see had left in such a bad humor, we concluded, of course, that the Indians had stolen them. But immediate pursuit being ordered, they were found in a ravine some miles off, much frightened, but supposed to have been by wolves, large pack of which had been prowling, and howling around us every night during our stay.'

"We had scarcely got quiet again, when a mounted dragoon rode into camp, calling loudly for the Captain, exclaiming that his comrade had been murdered at the ranch a mile above us.;

"An officer with the Doctor, and a sufficient force were sent up, when it appeared that the express rider from Fort Belknap to Fort Chadbourne, with a single dragoon as escort, had arrived at the ranch about two o'clock A.M., and not wishing to disturb the inmates, were quietly tying their mules to feed them, as was their custom at this place, when a young man, who was sleeping in the open air, being aroused, rushed into the house and shouted Indians. The man inside sprang out of bed, and seizing his gun, rushed to the door and fired two shots, both taking effect upon the poor soldier and mortally wounding him. He lingered insensible until eight A.M., and died. Our carpenter made a rude coffin, and we buried him upon a hillside, alongside of a dragoon who had been killed sometime before, by the Wichitas.'

"This incident shows how exciting is frontier life, and how constantly upon the alert the settlers must be against attack or

"We moved camp six miles up the stream, on the same prairie and to a similar spot to the one we left, though the water was not so good.'

"Major Neighbors returned to his home near San Antonio, and took with him Conner, the two Jacobs and Jack Hunter, the Shawnee. We parted with the Major with regret, his fund of anecdotes of Indian life and customs, and his great experience on the frontier, imparted with so much affability and enthusiasm, had wiled away many an hour in camp and on the march, and we missed him very much.'

"We remained at this point until the fourth of September, the surveying parties actively employed in running the lines and marking them, which was done by raising mounds at intervals of half a mile along the line.'

"Our mess was well supplied with wild turkeys, catfish and turtles, and a stream in the vicinity, a tributary of the Clear Fork, afforded fine sport to anglers, with a fish called here a trout, but which proved to be a species of bass, very game and rising readily to the fly.'

"The soil was very fertile and the country around rich in mineral affording a fine field for geologizing.'

"The rock was limestone, appearing on the south-west edge of the prairie piled up in layers of rectangular blocks, looking in the distance like a regularly built fortification.'

"After the surveying party completed its work on the Clear Fork, the expedition returned to Fort Belknap, and a little later moved down the Brazos to locate a reserve for the "Caddoes, Ionies, Ah-nan-da-kas, To-wacko-me, Wichitas, and Ton-kahwas, who exist in this neighborhood."



NOTICE FOR APPLICATION AND INTENT TO **OBTAIN AIR PERMIT RENEWAL**

PERMIT NO. 29611

APPLICATION O'Brien Cooperative Gin Company has applied to the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEO) for the renewal of Air Quality Permit No. 29611 which would authorize continued operation of the Cotton Gin located at 706 Grand Central, O'Brien, Haskell County, Texas. The facility will emit the following air contanimants: organic compounds, nitrogen oxides, sulfur dioxide, particulate mat-

ter and carbon monoxide. This application was submitted to the TCEQ on March 04, 2005. The application is available for viewing and copying at the TCEQ central office, the TCEQ Abilene regional office, and the Haskell County Courthouse, 1 Avenue D, Haskell, Haskell County, Texas. The facility's compliance file, if any exists, is available for public review in the Abilene regional office of the TCEQ. The TCEQ executive director has determined the application is administratively complete and will conduct a technical review of the application. Information in the application indicates that this permit renewal would not result in an increase in allowable emissions and would not result in the emission of an air contaminant not previously emitted. The TCEQ may act on this application without seeking further public comment or providing an opportunity for a contested case hearing if certain criteria are met. PUBLIC COMMENT You may submit public comments, or a request for a contested case hearing to the TCEQ Office of the Chief Clerk at the address below. The TCEQ will consider all public comments in developing a final decision on the application. The deadline to submit public comments is 15 days after newspaper notice is published. After the deadline for public comments, the executive director will prepare a response to all relevant and material, or significant public comments. Issues such as property values, noise, traffic safety, and zoning are outside of the TCEQ's jurisdiction to address in the permit process. After the technical review is complete the executive director will consider the comments and prepare a response to all relevant and material, or significant public comments. If only comments are received, the response to comments,

along with the executive director's decision on the application, will then be mailed to everyone who submitted public comments or who is on the mailing list for this application, unless the applic contested case hearing

OPPORTUNITY FOR A CON-

TESTED CASE HEARING You may request a contested case hearing. The applicant or the executive director may also request that the application be directly referred to a contested case hearing after technical review of the application. A contested case hearing is a legal proceeding similar to a civil trial in state district court. Unless a written request for a contested case hearing is filed within 15 days from this notice, the executive director may act on the application. If no hearing request is received within this 15-day period, no further opportunity for hearing will be provided. According to the Texas Clean Air Act § 382.056(o) a contested case hearing may only be granted if the applicant's compliance history is in the lowest classification under applicable compliance history requirements and if the hearing request is based on disputed issues of fact that are relevant and material to the Commission's decision on the application. Further, the Commission may only grant a hearing on those issues raised during the public comment period and not withdrawn.

A person who may be affected by emissions of air contaminants from the facility is entitled to request a hearing. If any requests for a contested case hearing are timely filed, the executive director will forward the application and any requests for a contested case hearing to the TCEQ Commissioners for their consideration at a scheduled Commission meeting. Unless the application is directly referred to a contested case hearing, the executive director will mail the response to comments along with notification of Commission meeting to everyone who submitted comments or is on the mailing list for this application. 
Mrs. Myers was born June 11, 1926 in Haskell County to J.C. and Tempe Goodson.




