

The family of Arthur Thomas Cooke the Gold Star Family, will be recognized and place a memorial wreath at the arch, which is engraved with the names of Knox County veterans killed in war. His parents were Wiley Thomas and Ottis Tomison Cook

He is buried in the Manila American Cemetery and Memorial at Manila, Philippine Islands. From 9:30 a.m. until 2:00 p.m. a historical exhibit related to veterans and American wars will be

Parties finally agree on judge in DeLay trial By Ed Sterling

AUSTIN - Merry-go-round, carrousel, roulette: newspapers recently used those words to describe the process of finding a judge who would satisfy the disparate comfort standards of indicted U.S. Rep. Tom DeLay and the state of Texas's ethics prosecutor, Ronnie Earle.

State Supreme Court Chief Justice Wallace Jefferson's naming of semi-retired Judge Pat Priest of San Antonio to preside over the Sugar Land Republican's eventual trial seemed acceptable to concerned parties, but only after DeLay's attorneys and Travis County District Attorney Earle filed a dizzying series of trial-related motions and counter-motions.

Before Priest - who happens to be a Democrat - was named, other capable judges were bounced because of their political party affiliations and partisan campaign contributions. It's hard to find a non-partisan judge in Texas, but Priest's record of fairness earned him the nod.

When a trial date is set, De-Lay will face a felony charge of money-laundering and a felony charge of conspiracy to circum2002 election. Normally, it would take half a year or more for such a case to go to trial, but DeLay's attorneys have said they want to speed up the process.

Also indicted by Travis County grand juries and facing the same charges as DeLay are Jim Ellis, executive director of DeLay's Washington, D.C.based Americans for a Republican Majority political action committee, and John Colyandro, former executive director of De-Lay's Austin-based Texans for a Republican Majority political action committee. DeLay, Ellis and Colyandro have denied all charges against them.

When DeLay was indicted in September, he stepped down from his powerful post as U.S. House Majority Leader, in accordance with House rules prohibiting indicted members from serving in leadership positions. Governor calls for undelivered aid Gov. Rick Perry wrote a letter to Homeland Security Secretary Michael Chertoff seeking promised but undelivered assistance in the wake of hurricanes Katrina and Rita.

Perry told Chertoff, "(that)



However, teacher groups said Perry instead should have worked with the Legislature over the last regular and special sessions to deliver an across-the-board pay increase for teachers that would have moved Texas up to the national average.

Recycling Christmas

I've always had "mis-givings" about the practice of buying expensive Christmas gifts for people thinking they'd return the generosity. ELK SCENT

Brent epitomizes the typical Montana outdoorsman - a hunter, a cowboy, a conservationist and an independent critter. Hunting season, he and his equally capable wife Kathy had hauled their horses to a camp at the end of the road and prepared to begin the morning bow hunt. Brett had prepared thoroughly, including putting a dollop of concentrated elk urine (aka scent) into a plastic bag along with his cammo hunting clothes to steep overnight.

He placed his new \$350 compound bow on the hood of the pickup. Several 30" 4-blade razor point arrows were attached to the bow. Ben Gay, his good 12year grulla gelding was saddled in anticipation. Brent applied the frightening black Rambo face paint, then changed into his cammo gear doused in elk urine. Its pungency stung the eyes of small mammals and made knot-

Kathy stayed upwind a horseback Brent swung aboard Ben, squiggled his slick-seated polyester cammo pants in the saddle, picked up his bow and swung his horse downwind. The full force of

the elk urine bouquet enveloped Ben Gay's head. He reacted as if a real bull elk had just walked up behind him and blew into his ear. He started bucking! (Kathy said crow hopping.) Brent was holding his bow out at arms length as he slid around on the seat like a Frisbee in a frying pan!

They were bucking down a grade, which meant every time Brent pitched forward over the saddle Ben bucked under him and caught him! The bow and arrow flapped like a broken wing.

At the bottom of the hill Ben mistook a small sapling for a giant log and cleared it by four feet! On impact Brent cartwheeled over the front, breaking bones! Brent was down. Kathy called Duane, the local veterinarian who was the only one who could find the remote location of their camp. Brent said between clenched teeth to bring a stretcher.

It took Doc an excruciating hour to reach them in his Explorer. He had no stretcher but had brought a 5-foot steel small animal exam table. The fifteen miles of Forest Service road

were particularly uncomfortable for a 6'7" man on a 5' stretcher wedged in the Explorer. Once on the blacktop Dr. Duane kicked his rig up to 95 mph with the windows down and a scarf over his face. The gale force winds helped alleviate the poisonous effect of elk urine that now permeated the cockpit.

Of course, they were stopped by the Montana Highway Patrol. As soon as the officer leaned up to the driver's side window, he was hit by the rolling waves of odor that melted the brim of his hat, pitted his sunglasses and turned his brass cartridges green. He staggered away. Duane left.

The emergency room doctor was a pediatrician and was only able to give Brent a children's dose of Morphine. But our hero survived. It turned out that Brent had broken his hip. The patrolman was treated for facial paralysis, Duane had to burn his Explorer, they reported the pediatrician to the ASPCA, Kathy still says crow hopping, and Ben Gay carries several small scars on his rump and right flank in the shape of an X.





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Knox County Sheriff Urges To Take Percautions

Knox County is expected to be a quiet, unassuming neighborhood. Most people are expected to be honest, hard working, and mindful of their own business. In today's world this is probably not practical. There are too many people out there, and around here, who thrive on trying to get your "stuff" from you. This includes going into your house, whether or not you are there, and taking money, guns, jewelry, clothing, or whatever else can be carried. If a person really wants to get your possessions they will try anything to get them.

The Knox County Sheriff's office has had reports of burglaries of houses, vehicles, buildings, thefts from yards, businesses, forged checks passed in business, and just about anything else imaginable. This is happening in all parts of the county, including Knox City, Munday, Goree, Rhineland, Benjamin, Truscott, Vera, Gilliland, and out in the wide open areas of the county.

Reports within the past three months include a house burglary in Rhineland, and individuals in Munday going around to residents with stories ranging

from needing money for gas to take a pregnant spouse to the doctor to needing money for utilities, all just deceptions trying to get money. Also reported have been late night phone calls to county residents from a caller trying to talk the victim out of a few dollars with a far-fetched

Knox County Sheriff Dean Homstad states, "Those who are making the phone calls are local characters calling people they know and are commonly known to those who are being called." On more than one occasion, the favorite target of deception has been the elderly, who the deceptor hopes to confuse so they are able to get any money, that they may readily have available.

The elderly may be more open to deception because many of them may be more sympathetic to those needing assistance, believing the story given to be true. Many of the elderly have more of a sense of trust, and possibly a few dollars available, that the thief can either talk them out of or come back later and take without being detected. On the other hand, some elderly citizens may be afraid to refuse

someone at the door who is asking for money.

The best way to keep someone from getting your belongings, according to Sheriff Homstad, is to be suspicious of everyone. Try to evaluate each situation to decide if the person asking for money is sincere. If you find the situation suspicious send the person away and call the local law enforcement with a description of the person, vehicle, if involved, direction of departure, and the story used by the deceptor. Another good rule of thumb is to lock all of your doors, even when you are at home.

There was an instance within the last couple of years where two undesirables entered the unlocked front doors of a couple of Knox City residents looking for money. Had their doors been locked and entry refused, the thugs, more than likely would have given up, giving the homeowner's time to call law enforcement.

The thieves were eventually apprehended near Goree by Texas Highway Patrol, but not before taking items from the residents. With vast majority,

most burglaries and thefts from buildings and vehicles occur because doors to buildings, homes, or vehicles have been left unlocked or open. Too many times the occupant of a vehicle will get out for a quick stop only to return and find a purse or other valuables missing.

Unless there is a witness, very little can be done to find the stolen items, mostly due to the crime only taking seconds to transpire. Often, everything but the cash will be disposed of soon after the theft has occurred. Sheriff Homstad states, "A common thought is to leave the house unlocked or to leave the vehicle with the keys in it. That way, the thief will take the vehicle without threatening the home owner. That may be true in some instances elsewhere.

In all but one or two cases that I am aware of in my 22 years of actual law enforcement did someone actually take a vehicle without the keys being left in it. If you don't care that they take your car, okay, but after they take it and you report it stolen, then work begins for law enforcement, possibly ending in a high speed chase to try to catch

the vehicle, all because you left your keys in your vehicle. Another thought is to leave your house unlocked. Reason? Well, because if someone wants to get in, they will break in if the doors are locked.

There is some truth to that, however, the majority of the home-grown thieves will not bother a house that is secured. Why not? Well, if a neighbor sees a vehicle drive up and the occupant approaches a house next door only to enter like they belong there, the neighbor may think nothing about it. Now, if the vehicle occupant walks up to a door, tries the door before breaking it or tries to enter through a window, that may cause a slight suspicion, hopefully ending with the good neighbor calling law enforcement."

Sheriff Homstad also stated, "I'm sure that everyone has a story of some instance to dispute the previous information, but, please, try to lock up your house, vehicles, remove items from the surrounding areas, and put them in a secured outbuilding. At least give it a try. You cannot lose anything by trying it, but it might keep you from losing anything."
