### TERRY'S TALK

COMBS ANNOUNCES LICENSE EXPIRATION DATE CHANGES

Agriculture Commissioner Susan Combs today announced changes to the Texas Department of Agricultures license expiration procedures.

In the past, we have had set expiration dates and have prorated license fees accordingly, Combs said. We expect that changing to an anniversary expiration date for new licenses will increase our efficiency in getting licenses in the hands of the people who need them.

Effective October 1, 2005, new pesticide applicator licenses will expire on the anniversary date they were issued. A pesticide dealer license will expire on the last date of the month of the second anniversary it was issued.

For licenses renewed before October 1, pesticide applicator licenses will continue to expire on Feb. 28 of each year for commercial and noncommercial applicators and Feb. 28 five years after they were issued for private applicators. Dealer licenses expire on Dec. 31 of odd numbered

years.

License holders will receive a renewal form about a month before their license expires, Combs said. It is important for pesticide applicators to be aware of their expiration date so they can get the require continuing education units before their license expires. While the majority of pesticide applicator renewals will still fall on the Feb. 28 date, Combs said she hopes the new system will eventually distribute the w

orkload throughout the year so that licenses can be issued quicker.

New licenses for nursery/floral, rose grading, vegetable seed, grain warehouse and eggs also will expire on the anniversary date they were issued.

Got Gas?

One of the reasons that gasoline is so high is because secretaries, bank presidents and massage therapists are driving pickup trucks instead of gas-saving scooters or ugly hybrid foreign cars. Surfers are cruising in Dodge Rams with Cummins Diesels, soccer moms are taxiing Chevy Duramax monsters around and attorneys are coercing 3/4 ton trucks to court and all they are hauling are their surfboards, dog food and money! Nail stylists are driving crew cabs even though they have no crew! College coeds majoring in liberal studies are "off-roading"

to class in Ford F-350 4x4's with six speed transmissions. Beauticians and CEOs are ordering the towing package even though they have no balls on their bumpers or fifth wheels in their beds.

Psychologists say that the choice to drive a pickup truck is emotionally "driven." The best indicator as to which trucks qualify for cheap gas shall be if the dog rides up front or in the back.

Up front and that will be \$9.50 per gallon please. Some crooks will attempt to qualify for cheaper gas by putting gun racks in their cabs and their ankle biting dogs in the back but even an airline security worker should know that a Llaso Apso, a wiener dog or a Pekingese are not members of the working class.
