Twenty Students From Knox City High School Graduate





AUSTIN - Here's a Friday, May 25, snapshot of what's going on at the state Capitol with sine die, the end of the 80th regular session of the Texas Legislature, set for 10 p.m. Monday, May 28.

A conference committee of House and Senate members concurred on SB 792, the transportation bill that lawmakers had to rework to avoid the governor's calling a special session. Gov. Rick

Likely Passage Of Road Bill Lessens Prospect For Special Session

Perry said he would summon the Legislature back to Austin if the bill stripped too much authority from the Texas Department of Transportation in devising a new, comprehensive road plan.

So, the bill satisfies Perry and gives lawmakers and their constituents a two-year study period they can use to get a better picture of how their own local and regional road plans might interface with Perry's statewide plan.

Senate kills voter fraud bill

HB 218, the "voter I.D." bill, died in the Senate. Under the bill, Texans would have had to present a valid picture identification card or two other forms of identification other than their voter registration card in order to cast a ballot.

Rep. Betty Brown, R-Terrell, the author of HB 218, said her bill was meant to prevent

voter fraud. Opponents said the bill targeted minorities, the elderly and the disabled. Opponents also disputed allegations of widespread voter fraud enabled by false identification at the polls.

Sen. Mario Gallegos, D-Galena Park, who is recovering from a liver transplant, disobeyed doctor's orders by remaining at the Capitol to help block the bill from further consideration by the full Senate.

Memorial Day observance is held

Because the end of the legislative session coincides with Memorial Day, May 28, the House and Senate met in a joint session on Thursday, May 24, for an early observance.

Lawmakers, the governor, lieutenant governor and other state officials honored present and former members of

the military and especially the loved ones of military men and women who have died in Iraq and Afghanistan since March 2003.

Family members and friends were seated in the House chamber and came forward to be recognized as the names of fallen military members were called.

> **TYC-fixing bill moves** forward

Texas Youth Commission reform is in the works with the adoption of the conference committee report on Committee Substitute to SB 103 by

Sen. Juan "Chuy" Hinojosa, D-McAllen, and sponsored in the House by Rep. Jerry Madden, R-Richardson.

At early presstime for this column, the legislation was due for a final vote by the full House, and delivery to the governor's desk.

Investigative reporting initially published by The Dallas Morning News spurred a growing body of detail bringing to light corruption at the agency, including rape, abuse and mistreatment of TYC inmates.

Public outcry prompted management changes at the agency and public hearings drew input from people across Texas. Lawmakers filed more than two dozen bills, including SB 103, to fix problems at the agency.

> Final work due on state budget

A Sunday, May 27, vote was expected for the \$150 billion 2008-2009 state budget.

Passage of a budget is the Legislature's primary and only constitutionally mandated duty. The budget bill, HB 1, was in conference committee at press time for this column. Speaker change rumors con-


Lawmakers could attempt to remove the speaker by a vote of no confidence or wait until after sine die to mount campaigns for the powerful post.





We are watched over and protected from evil by our armed forces. They go before us to make our way safe and without harm. We are very thankful and really without words to express our appreciation.


Let us not forget or not be mindful of the One who



Treatment Technique (TT) A required process intended to reduce the level of a contaminant in drinking water. Action Level (AL) The concentration of a contaminant which, if

The third summer Museum event will be the home made ice cream sale at the Knox City Watermelon Festival July 28th. Volunteers can make ice cream, help at the booth, or help out by buying cold cups of ice cream for all the family. This project is always a fast sell out on a hot

Keep Benjamin Beautiful held a hamburger supper and movie fundraiser on Saturday evening. This was the group's first fundraiser of the year.



(Continued from Page 1) Four or five days before D-Day, his troops were moving tanks to the front line preparing to cross the Rhine River into Germany when Nazi air raids hit them with what they called buzz bombs. Jessie was taken to the hospital in Dover, England where he was in a coma for several months.

Upon returning home to the United States, he remained in the V.A. hospital for over a year. Later, he married and had three children. He worked forty years for the City of Stamford.

In 1991 and 1992, Stamford was building a memorial at the Post Office. The V.A. representative was looking into Jessie's military background to add his name on the memorial. He saw a bypassed promotion and after 50 years, Jessie was promoted to Staff Sergeant.

Charlie Mack Baker

United States Army, German war. Injured on the front line. Received two purple hearts. Tina Baker's (staff) granddad.

Gunners Mate 3rd Class Claude Bailey

Gunners Mate 3rd Class for the U.S. Navy. Served three years during which he was in eleven major battles in the Pacific Islands against the Japanese.

Claude was a member of the SS Montpelier, one of the ships in the carrier fleet commanded by Admiral Halte.

These ships were in heavy battle with Japanese air raids and battles from ship to shore assisting troops landing on those islands.

Claude was the fastest gunner on their ship and was responsible for destroying numerous enemy planes.

The men aboard the Montpelier were given the award for Outstanding Heroism against the Japanese.

Gunners Mate 1st Class Arthur Morrison

Arthur's job was to keep the au guns working and clean and ready au for battle. His ship was involved "" in the third wave of invasion at 2 Iwo Jima. As men were leaving F his ship onto the beach, he said there were being shot down from T the Japanese that were bunkered B down in the hills and anywhere S else they could hide. B

Arthur said he was scared out of his wits and if anyone says they weren't they are lying!

Private Clay Moore

Clay joined the Army at 18 years of age. He spent three years as a cook in Frankfort, Germany. Clay said he can remember times when there was nothing to cook or nothing to eat, not even bread.

Private 1st Class Ansley Hendershot

Private 1st Class, United States Army. Ansley served eight years. He traveled to England, France, Germany and Italy. Ansley was a dishwasher in the Army. He was in Germany after the end of the war. He said that the destruction was unbelievable to see. The most memorable thing he saw was there were hundreds of cannons lined up that belonged to the German army. The American troops just started on one end and one by one blew up all the cannons.

Staff Sergeant Oather Poe

Husband of Hope Poe, resident. Served two years in the U.S. Army as Staff Sergeant, one year in the Philippines.

Private First Class Anthony Dormire

Private First Class, United States Army. Anthony drove a tank and was part of a recon group. Anthony was in the Army two years.

1st Sergeant Kevin Hoeckendorf

ABTry 1-94 FA Unit # 92862. Served 15 months in Iraq. Currently stationed in Strasberg, Germany. and Advanced Individual Training at Fort Sill, Oklahoma, he was assigned to Bravo Battery 1/40 "Bushmasters" from November 2001 until his graduation in February 2002.

Following his Initial Entry Training he reported to Schofield Barracks, Hawaii in February 2002. SGT Valencia deployed with Fox Battery to Afghanistan in support of Operation Enduring Freedom V as a Mortar Crewmember, April 2004 to April 2005.

On September 9, 2004, SGT Valencia was awarded the Army Commendation Medal with "Valor" device for his fire support actions upon enemy contact which resulted in saving the lives of the Soldiers on ABAD PRT.
