NUMBER OF SUSPECTS BEING HELD FOR INVESTIGATION IN BEAUCHAMP SLAYING

With seven men in jail here and two suspects in the custody of Electra officers, all being held for investigation in connection with the killing of Night-watcher J. K. Beauchamp here two weeks ago, local officers are confident that tangible evidence has been uncovered that will lead to the apprehension of the guilty parties.

Two of the men now in custody here were arrested at Berger, in the Panhandle oil fields the first of the week and returned here to be held until several clues can be checked up which may shed further light on the slaying of Beauchamp. The two men being held at Electra were arrested Monday night after the officers there had become suspicious of their actions, and investigation led the officers to believe that the car which they were driving had been stolen. Local officers were notified of the arrest and detention of the men, and Sheriff Turnbow states that a thorough investigation will be made to learn if they have any knowledge of the crime committed here.

Daily newspapers of Wednesday carried dispatches of a reputed confession said to have been made by one of the suspects being held, but officers state that this is only a rumor.

Excitement raged here for a while Wednesday when a party of officers headed by Sheriff Turnbow raided a house fifteen miles east of town and arrested five men, who were held for investigation by a court of inquiry Wednesday night. While nothing definite is given out by the officers it is understood that they are confident that several good leads have been uncovered which will aid them in the case.

One of the men arrested Wednesday eluded the officers when they made their first trip to the house and was not apprehended until Wednesday afternoon, when a posse of twenty or thirty citizens, headed by the eastern part of the county for him. He was arrested by four local young men who were members of the posse after he had covered his tracks sufficiently to baffle two bloodhounds owned by Sheriff Bingham of Stonewall county who had been put on his trail. A revolver was taken from him after he had been placed under arrest.

District Attorney Clem Calhoun of Hamlin is in the city and held the court of inquiry Wednesday night, being assisted by local officers and a number from adjoining counties, including Sheriff Tom Hudson of Jones county, Sheriff Thom Turnbow and City Marshal Bert Welsh seem confident that with the hearty cooperation being given by the officers throughout the state that an early solution of the murder will be made and the guilty parties apprehended.

The fund being raised for the widow and children of the slain officer continues to grow daily, a number of contributions having been received this week. City Marshal Welsh reports that Bill Johnston, City Marshal of Hamlin, presented a purse of \$55 as a donation from himself and other citizens of that city.

13,536 Bales Cotton Ginned in County Prior to October 18

According to the report given out by Special Agent of the Department of Commerce, James E. Lindsey of Rule the following number of bales of cotton have been ginned in Haskell County up to the given date and also a comparison with the same time last year is given.

There were 13,536 bales of cotton ginned in Haskell County from the crop of 1926 prior to October 18th, 1926, as compared with 16,178 bales ginned to October 18th, 1925.

SUSPECT ARRESTED SAGERTON ROBBERY

A man giving his name as Bill Oglesby and claiming Hamilton Texas as his home was brought here last Monday night by Sheriff J. C. Turnbow and lodged in jail in connection with the burglary of Edwards & Caudle Dry Goods Store of Sagerton which occurred some time last Sunday night.

The man was arrested by officer Reynolds of Leuders about 10 o'clock Monday morning near Albany. The officer was distributing election boxes to various voting places in that district when he found the man with a Ford car loaded with goods which he had overturned some time during the early hours of the morning. The car had been righted and the goods reloaded according to reports and he was trying to crank the car when apprehended. The officer seeing a number of garments and other wearing apparel exposed to view decided it was too much for the honest possession of one man and he proceeded to make the arrest. After which it is alleged he confessed to the theft and the Haskell officers were notified. The goods were shipped back to the Edwards and Caudle store at Sagerton and the man was brought here and placed in jail. It is reported that he was well armed and that some whiskey was found in his possession which he seemed to have indulged in very freely which was the cause of his arrest.

An x-ray picture will be made in a few days to determine the condition of the injury. Mr. Hutchins is reported to be one of the best gin men in this section and the Farmers Gin Company regret the accident very much.

RULE MAN KILLED IN SEED CAVE-IN

I. C. Miller 18 year old son of Mrs. Sallie Miller of Rule was smothered to death in a cotton seed cave-in at the Rule Oil Mill some time during Monday night. His lifeless body was found about 6 o'clock Tuesday morning buried beneath tons of cotton seed. Just what time he lost his life is not known but it was thought to be a short while before his body was found. He was employed at the oil mill and had been working there some time. The inquest was held by Judge J. W. Mason at 9 o'clock and his remains turned over to the undertaker and his body prepared for burial.

Escaped Prisoner Wanted Here Is Caught In Okla.

Al Corbett, who escaped over a year ago from the Wichita county jail, where he was being held for the Haskell county authorities for safe keeping, has been arrested in Wewoka Oklahoma. Sheriff Fred K. Smith has received notice from the Oklahoma officers that Corbett is being held there on three felony charges.

Corbett was wanted in Aspermont on 18 charges. He was taken in custody there following a series of burglaries and was transferred to Haskell; he was later brought to Wichita county, following an attempt to break jail there.

Sheriff Smith has notified Haskell county officers of Corbett's arrest in Oklahoma and he will probably be returned there as soon as he is released by Oklahoma authorities.

"Blackie" Shaw, who made his escape from the Wichita county jail about the same time, was arrested in Graham Saturday and returned to Wichita Falls Sunday. Shaw is charged here in connection with the alleged theft of pipe over a year ago.

With the arrest of Shaw and Corbett only one escaped prisoner from Wichita county remains at large, Sheriff Smith said Monday. He hopes to have the third man in custody before the expiration of his term of office on January 1.

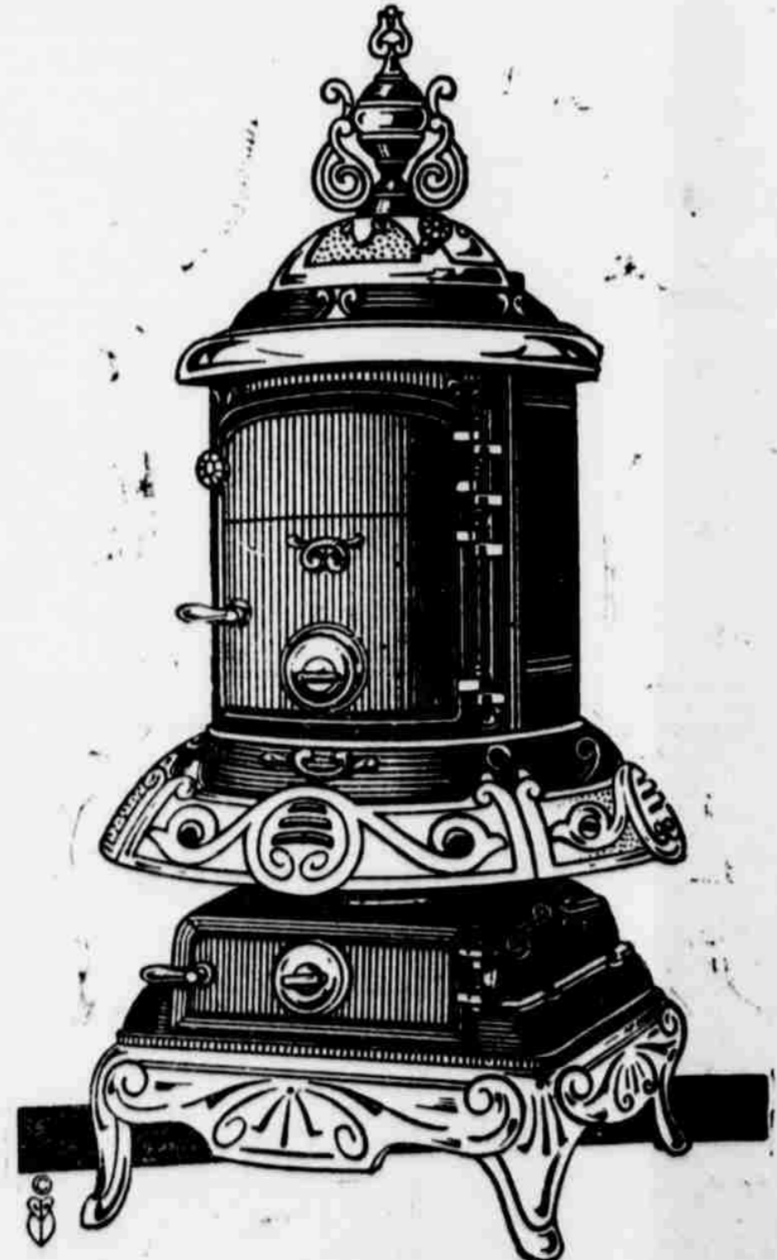

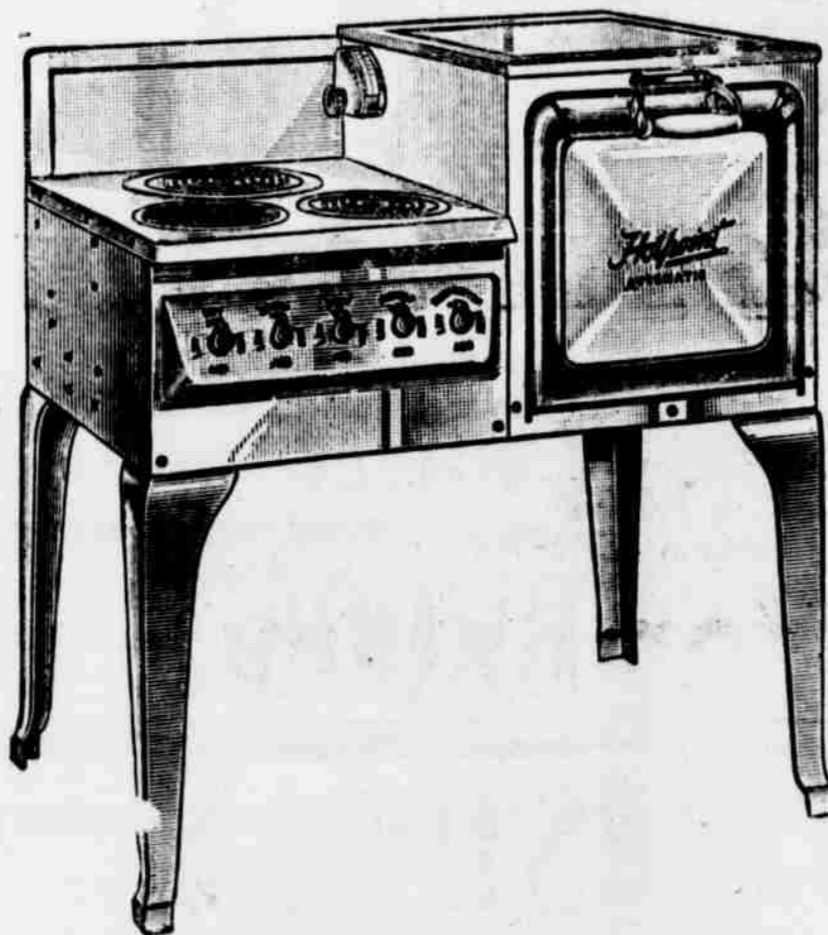

SENATE BILL NO. 273 IS PASSED BY LEGISLATURE

We believe it will be of interest to our readers and doubtless beneficial to know that Senate Bill No. 273 passed in the special session of the Legislature validating the forfeiture and resale of thousands of acres of West Texas lands was signed by the Governor Wednesday October 27th.

The bill amends the law passed on March 19, 1925, and validates the forfeiture and resale of public free school lands in all cases where requests for revaluation were made within the time required by law and of applications for land that were filed after the time allowed by law.

Senator Berkeley of Alpine introduced the bill in the senate and pointed out its vast importance to West Texas. Uncounted thousands of acres are affected by its passage, he said. Without the passage of the bill, great tracts of land would have been forfeited, he said at the time the measure was introduced.

WEINERT HAVING GOOD BUSINESS THIS FALL

Part of the Weinert section is hit hard by a cotton failure, yet the city is prosperous and thriving in spite of the disaster. A serious hail storm in June destroyed more than 2,000 acres of growing cotton which was replanted, but owing to the leaf worm and other insects the cotton did not mature scarcely a boll in the entire strip. Heavy rains in parts of the Weinert section covered up and over flowed quite a lot of growing cotton which was replanted and of course it failed to mature any cotton which greatly increased the number of acres in the Weinert trade territory which will produce no cotton this year. But there is more feed grown in all that section than was ever known before and the farmers are taking the advantage of the good season in the ground and are sowing the hauled out cotton land to wheat. Already large fields of wheat have been put in and many others are preparing to sow hundreds of acres within the next few weeks. The cotton acreage will be cut considerably if the wheat has season to make a yield.

A representative of the Free Press was in Weinert last Friday and reports the merchants doing a prosperous business. Not a merchant of the city was heard to complain of the condition being poor. The gins were humming all the while and many farmers were on the streets marketing cotton. The picked cotton was selling around 11 cents per pound while the snapped cotton was selling at a much lower price. Large boxes of eggs were noticed in a number of the grocery stores which were brought in and sold by the farmers and poultrymen. This is a big factor in the Weinert trade territory together with the chickens and turkeys which are produced in that section. The farmers are giving much more attention to producing a living at home from the poultry and cattle industries than ever before and this winter they expect to increase their production with the aid of the wonderful feed crop sown in wheat and used as such by the farmers this fall.
