From the desk of the Sheriff

During the month of April, 2011, the Knox County Sheriff's Department responded to a report of a house burglary in the City of Knox City. Responding to a call in Knox City is not unusual since this office had a busy agenda of taking care of calls and other problems within the city limits. Burglary means that someone went into another person's house uninvited, the removed items from that house belonging to the resident of that house with the intentions of selling, trading, throwing away, or whatever else the burglar chooses to do at the time. Within two days, we had statements from both parties involved and within a couple of weeks after that both had been arrested. Sounds like television, doesn't it? Except that we are a small department that does not have an investigator to dwell on cases like this. One officer usually takes the case and follows the majority of it to the end, if there is an end. Along with this case there may be several other bumps in the road, like domestic arguments, accidents, untold number of un-named calls that nobody knows with the exception of the person's involved. Well, enough of the "poor, pitiful, overworked me syndrome". Like I tell folks, if I didn't like it, I wouldn't do it.

Now, there is something that citizen of Knox County as a whole can do. That is simply to think like a cop, believe anyone

will lie to you, could come into you house and take your stuff, take things from your property and really not care how you think about. You can combat the problem by LOCKING your doors, whether your vehicle or house. They all have locks, use them. If you property doesn't have a lock, there are several places in the county that you can buy one for a reasonable price, a cost much less than what a small theft would cost you. If you just run to the store quickly, pull your door shut and jiggle the knob to make sure it securely locked. If you get out of the vehicle at the house, take your keys out and LOCK the doors, whether you have something of value in the car or not. At least you will get in the habit of doing it.

Can you imagine the feeling of waking up in the morning to discover that someone had come into your house while you were asleep and taken some of your stuff? I would make you really made, wouldn't it? But should scare you to think that someone could be in your house while you were asleep and you didn't know it. Get in the habit, lock your doors, windows, vehicle doors, and on top on that, pick your friends carefully.

Sometime you have stuff, and they don't. It can turn into a hassle if they want your stuff. If you are careless, they will get it. Use common sense, folks. It can be very useful even in a small town like ours.





Netanyahu: Making sense in difficult times

Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu is a world leader. He is extremely bright and his words are powerful.

Netanyahu seized the spotlight Tuesday morning when he addressed Congress. Several enthusiastic standing ovations from Democrats and Republicans brought evidence to the fact that our relationship with Israel is more important than ever.

In all, 56 rounds of applause were given during the speech. Quite frankly, it was one of the best speeches I've ever heard.

Netanyahu used momentum gained in his sit down with President Obama last week and his points were enthusiastically received. That's the message Israel and the world needs to hear.

Obama ruffled feathers a couple of weeks ago when he stated Israel needed to revert to their 1967 borders. Obama has attempted to clarify his statement on a couple of occasions, most notably following his meeting at the White House where the president pretty much had his hat handed to him and received both history and geography lessons from Netanyahu.

If Americans were busy sitting the fence on this issue, the last two weeks should serve as a wake-up call.

Since the end of World War II, the United States and Israel have stood hand in hand. In a world full of hate, the two countries have stood out as beacons of freedom. It seemed that pressure from countries throughout the Middle East had begun to sway opinion. Netanyahu has been setting the record straight.

The United States must always stand united with Israel. Likewise, countries in the Middle East need to represent themselves like the governments of Jordan and Egypt.

In my lifetime, 43 years, the world has evolved at an incredible rate. It would be wonderful if peace could follow that trend.

I'm very proud that the U.S. has become a more tolerant country. While far from perfect, you'd have to be blind with hatred not to recognize the advances we've made as a people concerning race, religion, sexual preference, etc.

I think most will agree that life is too short for hate. After all, what good does hatred do? What benefit does hatred have? While it may be hard to forgive and forget, at some point, you have to shed the past and move forward. If you don't, hatred will poison your soul and change the very person you are intended to be.

Israel is hated in the Middle East because of tradition. Generation after generation has been taught that Jews are evil and must either be eradicated or forced out. EPA's Extra-Constitutional Agenda Has Long History

Unelected federal agents who are working to regulate and control the free market economy even after the collapse of "cap and trade" legislation have been called out by Americans for Limited Government.

The legislation now moving on Capitol Hill aimed at blocking the extra-constitutional power grabs of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), and other federal entities, can be traced back to the controversy surrounding Van Jones, an avowed communist, who signed a 9/11 "truther" statement claiming President Bush was behind the 9/11 terrorist attacks. It's important to point out that Van Jones is not an outlier, his ideology is not unusual for an Obama appointee."

Todd's Appointments Watch project has focused upon hundreds of Administration appointees. Obama EPA political appointee Stephen A. Owens is just one example of someone who prior to joining the Administration was at the forefront of pushing a radical agenda, in his case the failed "cap and trade" idea, and now is empowered as a political appointee to make policy through regulation.

House Republicans who have made it a top priority to curtail the EPA's activities should reference some the key findings in "Appointments Watch" to drive the point home. I'm not Horsin' Around

Over the past two weeks, the equine and veterinary worlds are witnessing an outbreak of epic proportions. An outbreak so severe...any exposed veterinary colleges, clinics, and equine events have been forced to shut completely down. What I'm referring to is a virus known as EHV-1 (Equine Herpevirus 1).

EHV-1 is a fast spreading, airborne virus that is highly contagious to horses. It is easily spread by horse to horse contact, but also by contaminated hands, tack, buckets, equipment, & feed. These are some reasons why equine events and veterinary

hospitals across the country are being shut down for biosecurity measures minimize outbreak. Most of you may be experiencing this first hand with the cancelation of events here in West Texas such as the San Angelo S.H.O.T. show.

With a quick incubation period of 1-2 days, if your horse is exposed to EHV-1, it will become sick within this short time frame. Upper respiratory symptoms develop at this point including fever of 102 or higher, cough, nasal discharge, and depression. This is the most common form of EHV-1.

8-12 days after the initial signs (upper respiratory) form), a neurological form of the virus can appear. This is rare, but also the main cause of high morbidity and fatality Symptoms include in coordination, hind end weakness, excessive lying down, diminished tail tone (meaning no control of tail), and inability to get up. This form of EHV-1 is the greatest concern for what the equine industry is experiencing now.

Currently there is no equine vaccine labeled for protection against this neurological form. However, since this begins as an upper respiratory form, by vaccinating with a Rhino vaccine, we can reduce or prevent the number of virus' circulating in the blood. By reducing the number of circulating viruses in the blood, this limits the chance of mutation into the neurological

A third form of EHV-1 is Abortion. This can affect mares from 5 months to 11 months along in gestation. Luckily, we have a vaccine available specifically for preventing EHV-1 induced abortions in horses.

There is no specific treatment for EHV-1, just supportive care. This can include antiviral drugs, antibiotics, anti-inflammatory, IV fluid treatment, and more.

Let me make a quick side note at this point. I can honestly say I know firsthand about EHV-1 and its significance. In the winter of 1997, my 3 year-old reining prospect mare contracted EHV-1. Not only did she show upper respiratory symptoms, but she also developed the neurological form as well. I could literally take her tail and fold it completely over onto her back. Now most of you

Notice of Application Requesting an Adjustment to **Energy Efficiency Cost Recovery Factor and Related Relief**

On April 29, 2011, AEP Texas North Company (TNC) filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (Commission) to approve an Energy Efficiency Cost Recovery Factor (EECRF) that will be in effect during 2012. Section 39.905 of the Public Utility Regulatory Act and Section 25.181 of the Commission's Substantive Rules provide for the Commission to authorize a utility to implement an EECRF and annually adjust it to ensure the timely and reasonable recovery of the utility's costs incurred in connection with satisfying energy efficiency goals established by the Texas Legislature. In August 2010, the Commission authorized TNC to place into effect during 2011 an EECRF designed to recover \$980,940 in energy efficiency costs, based on TNC's projected energy efficiency program costs to meet its energy efficiency objectives for 2011 and recovery of TNC's performance bonus for 2009.

TNC's April 2011 filing asks the Commission to adjust the EECRF for 2012 to increase it by \$423,743. The adjusted EECRF is requested to recover approximately \$1,404,683 in energy efficiency costs in 2012, consisting of: (1) \$768,593 in projected energy efficiency program costs for TNC to meet its energy efficiency objectives for 2012; (2) a performance bonus of \$447,620 for TNC's having exceeded its demand reduction goals for 2010; and (3) recovery of \$188,470 in under-recovered EECRF program revenues in

The EECRF applies to all retail electric providers (REPs) who serve end-use customers in TNC's service area. All end-use customers who take service below 69,000 volts are potentially affected by the requested EECRF, depending upon the actions of their REPs. The proposed EECRF will include the following charges on bills rendered to REPs for retail transmission and distribution service:

Customer Rate Class **EECRF** Residential Service \$0.000334 per kWh Secondary Service (Less than or equal to 10 kW) \$0.000284 per kWh Secondary Service (Greater than 10 kW) \$0.000303 per kWh Primary Service \$0.000198 per kWh

The monthly amount billed to the REP during 2012 on account of service to a residential end-use customer using 1000 kilowatt hours (kWh) per month will increase by 1 cent over the 2011 EECRF. The effect of the EECRF on the amounts billed to a REP on account of service to other end-use customers will vary depending on the rate schedules under which the REP takes transmission and distribution service and on the end-use customers' usage of electricity.

Persons who wish to intervene in or comment upon these proceedings, Docket No. 39361, Application of AEP Texas North Company to Adjust Energy Efficiency Cost Recovery Factor and Related Relief, should notify the Commission as soon as possible, as an intervention deadline will be imposed. A request to intervene or for further information should be mailed to the Public Utility Commission of Texas, P. O. Box 13326, Austin, Texas 78711-3326. 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Prospective wine-grape grower workshop June 17

LUBBOCK — The Texas AgriLife Extension Service will conduct a Prospective Wine-Grape Grower Workshop from 9 a.m. - 3 p.m. June 17 for people interested in commercial wine-grape production.

The workshop will be held at the Texas AgriLife Research and Extension Center in Lubbock, located at 1102 East Farm-to-Market 1294.

Registration will begin at 8:30 a.m. with the program

to immediately follow.

"This workshop will be useful to those considering planting a commercial vineyard or those thinking about expanding a smaller operation to a commercial scale," said Dusty Timmons, AgriLife Extension viticulture adviser for the High Plains and West Texas.

The workshop was developed to help small-scale producers determine if it was both economically feasible and individually suitable for them to commit to a commercial vine-

yard enterprise, Timmons said. Program topics include necessary viticulture expertise, site selection, risk factors, labor requirements and economics.

He noted that AgriLife Extension presents prospective grower workshops in regions of Texas conducive to wine-grape production, and the workshop is a prerequisite for registration and acceptance into the Texas Viticulture Certificate Program.

"This is the last workshop before we start taking applications for the next viticulture certification program," Timmons said. "We hope people interested in getting their professional certification will take this opportunity to attend the workshop so they can meet that requirement prior to applying for that statewide program."

The application period for the next certification program will be from June 1-30. Notification of acceptance will occur by about July 15, with registration approximately July 15-Aug. 31. The program will begin on or around

Sept. 15.



COLLEGE STATION -Rain came to many parts of the state, giving some relief to drought-stricken crops and pastures, and - temporarily at least — alleviating the danger of wildfire. But in the Childress area, the drought continues.

The consensus among Texas AgriLife Extension Service personnel and farmers located where rain was received was that it came too late to save small-grain crops, and more rain will be needed soon for any substantial improvement in pasture and hay land.

Parts of Central Texas received from a trace to 4 inches of rain on May 13. About 1 inch was more common, as was received at Davidson Brothers

Farms, just east of Georgetown. ing, you'll think it's alright," The Davidson Brothers, Dennis and Buster, and son Dustin. raise stocker cattle and grow hay, as well as some corn and

"Our biggest rain since January was yesterday at about eight-tenths," Dennis said. "We had 8 inches of rain in a two-day period in September, which was enough moisture to get our oats up for grazing. But we didn't have another good rain until Christmas Eve."

Then there were small rains near the end of January, which they have "been pretty much living on" until the recent 0.9 inch rain, he said.

"Corn: It's deceiving if you look at it. It's green, and if you don't know much about farm-

Dennis said. "But if you look at it right now, it's starting to tassle and it's not even waist high, so that's not going to make any grain. I don't even think it'll put an ear out."

Dennis said they'll probably either bale or ensile their corn. But because it won't likely make any grain, the silage will not be of any quality, and will mainly be a filler-feed.

Local wheat was in similar condition, said Jared Ripple, AgriLife Extension integrated pest management agent for Williamson County. The crop may look good and golden from the road, but plants are stunted and stands thin. The crop is apparently making grain, but yields will be well below average.

AgriLife Extension district reporters compiled the following summaries:

Rolling Plains: A few counties in the eastern part of the district received from 0.75 inch to 4 inches of rain. The rest of the region remained dry, windy and under extremely high wildfire danger. Wildfires raged in King and Dickens counties on May 14-15 and into the early week. Preliminary estimates were that more than 75,000 acres were

lost. The wheat harvest was under way, with below-normal yields. Where possible, producers were still irrigating wheat to try to get it to fill out grain heads. Cotton producers were planting on irrigated acres, and some of the crop was already emerging. Dryland cotton farmers were waiting on rain to plant. Pastures were in poor condition, and hay supplies were short. Some producers were considering selling more cows because of the lack of grass and cost of hay. Stockwater tanks and lakes were very low. In Parker County, most of the pecan crop looked good. Growers began spraying for pecan-nut case bearer.

Panhandle: A few counties

got from a trace to slightly more than 1 inch of rain. In some areas, there was only enough rain to settle the dust, and the storms also brought high winds and above-average temperatures. High wildfire danger was ongoing. Irrigators were actively watering, trying to keep up with crop-water demands. High winds made it difficult for producers to irrigate newly planted crops. Cotton and peanut planting was in progress. Rangeland was mostly in very poor condition. Cattle were reported to be in good to fair condition with continued supplemental feeding. There were reports of wheat-streak mosaic in some irrigated wheat.





Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these appeal procedures if you have a concern about:

- · the market or appraised value of your property
- · the unequal appraisal of your property
- the inclusion of your property on the appraisal roll
- · any exemptions that may apply to you
- · the qualification for an agricultural or timber appraisal
- · the taxable status of your property
- the local governments which should be taxing your property
- the ownership of property
- · the change of use of land receiving special appraisal
- any action taken by the chief appraiser, appraisal district or appraisal review board that applies to and adversely affects you.

Review by the Appraisal Review Board

If you can't resolve your problem informally with the county appraisal district (CAD) staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board (ARB).

The ARB is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals or other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the CAD to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notice of the time, date and place of the hearing. If necessary, you may request a hearing in the evening or on a Saturday or Sunday. Prior to your hearing, you may ask to review the evidence the CAD plans to introduce at the hearing to establish any matter at issue. The CAD might ask you for a copy of the evidence you plan to present. The law provides that before a hearing on a protest or immediately after the hearing begins, you or your agent and the CAD shall each provide the other with a copy of any written material intended to be offered or submitted to the ARB at the hearing. To the greatest extent practicable, the hearing will be informal. You or a designated agent may appear in person to present evidence or you may send notarized evidence for the ARB to review at your hearing. The CAD representative will present evidence about your case. You may cross-examine the CAD representative. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. In most cases, the CAD has the burden of establishing the property's value by a preponderance of the evidence presented.

In certain protests where the owner has submitted an independent appraisal before the hearing, the chief appraiser has the burden of proving the property's value by clear and convincing evidence. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office at

Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that they haven't talked about your case before the ARB hears it.

Review by the District Court or an Arbitrator or SOAH

After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision, you have the right to appeal. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 60 days of the date you receive the ARB's order. In certain cases, as an alternative to filing an appeal in district court, you may file, not later than the 45th day after you receive notice of the ARB order, a request for binding arbitration with the county appraisal district. In certain cases originating in certain counties, as an alternative to filing an appeal in district court, you may appeal to the State Office of Administrative Hearings (SOAH). An appeal to SOAH is initiated by, not later than the 30th day after you receive notice of the ARB's order, filing with the chief appraiser of the county appraisal district a notice of appeal with the applicable filing fee.

Tax Payment

You must pay either the amount of taxes due on the portion of the taxable value not in dispute or the amount of taxes due on the property under the order from which the appeal is taken.

Deadline for Filing Protests with the ARB*

Usual Deadline

On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever is later).

Late protests are allowed if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good cause.

Late protests are due the day before the ARB approves records for the year. Contact your appraisal district for more information.

Special Deadlines

For change of use (the appraisal district informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land), the deadline is not later than the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

For ARB changes (the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you filed), the deadline is not later than the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

(You may insert deadline for protests concerning omitted property if doing so would avoid taxpayer confusion.)
Last day to file protest with Knox County Appraisal District

June 20, 2011 no later than 5:00 p.m.

If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually February 1) or no later than the 125th day after the date you claim you received a tax bill from one or more of the taxing units that tax your property. The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.

* The deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or holiday.

Rian was an All-American


Cheerleader for 3 years and a twirler for a year.


On the scholarly front, Tiffany received awards for being a top scholar in parenting and in webmastering.


