Does Ambercrombie sell anything that is made for someone that weighs over 190 pounds? How do you have fat-free butter, and what would be the point of that anyway?


Then the question that really gets me thinking is: Who had the great idea of playing Volleyball in a Gym in August? If I had a daughter, I would be asking how come

There's no such thing as a free lunch

President Obama has stressed the need for more federal revenue. His No. 1 suggestion on how to do so is to raise taxes on the wealthy.

"The tax cuts I'm proposing we get rid of are tax breaks for millionaires and billionaires; tax breaks for oil companies and hedge fund managers and corporate jet owners," Obama said during a press conference earlier this summer.

Some mega-rich people like Warren Buffett agree — though he has yet to follow through on his own words by writing a personal check to the U.S. Treasury for above and beyond what he pays in taxes.

So as the rich continue to come under fire for being rich, the least the president and his team can do is provide them with a free lunch, right?

If you are rich and your children attend a public school in Detroit, then yes, they are part of a federal government pilot program giving free lunches to all students, regardless of income levels.

Included in President Obama's spending binge this year

was a \$4.5 billion expansion of the Healthy Hunger-Free Kids Act, which provides free lunches to low-income public school children. But through the expanded program, this administration is taking it one step further — free lunches for all.

Why? "One of the primary goals of this program is to eliminate the stigma that students feel when they get a free lunch, as opposed to paying cash," Detroit Public Schools Chief Operating Officer Mark Schrupp said in the Detroit Free Press. "Some students would skip important meals to avoid being identified as low-income. Now, all students will walk through a lunch line and not have to pay. Low-income students will not be easily identifiable and will be less likely to skip meals."

This is ironic considering the latest jargon coming from the White House is rich folks already have too much and need to start giving back even more.

Yet, the Department of Agriculture agrees that low-income students shouldn't feel singled out. According to the National Review, "the administration says it is giving rich kids free food to eliminate the shame that less-fortunate students may feel in receiving free food."

What this administration is saying is as long as no one is able to identify the low-income from the rich in the school lunch line, then it is OK for the rich to indulge in the entitlement programs of the poor. Will this carry over to government-assisted housing, food stamps and welfare checks?

It's as if a free-lunch-for-all program will break down the class warfare barriers. It won't, and in fact, it makes America's financial situation even more perilous.

"No wonder America is so deep in debt," says Bill Wilson, president of Americans for Limited Government (ALG). "There is no such thing as a free lunch, Mr. Obama."

He's right. Every "free" government program has to get funds from somewhere and someone. If this program takes root nationally, as it is projected to do so by 2014, more than a \$4.5 billion boost will be needed to support it.

That money will come from taxpaying Americans, who will then be supporting lunch for every public school student.

That is one expensive cafeteria meal.

'Wealthy liberals' seek to shut down job producing drilling innovations in Pennsylvania

"Wealthy liberals" are spreading false and misleading information about new drilling techniques that have opened up natural gas resources in Pennsylvania, according to a report from the Commonwealth Foundation.

A geologic formation known as the Marcellus Shale, which cuts across New York, Pennsylvania, Ohio and West Viriginia, was beyond reach at one time. But this has changed as a result of horizontal drilling and hydraulic fracturing. Almost 489 trillion cubic feet of natural gas, which is sufficient to cover all of America's natural gas needs over a 20 year period is recoverable, the foundation reports.

Unfortunately, anti-drilling activists have stepped in to obstruct further development of the natural gas industry, which is responsible for creating tens of thousands of new jobs, according to the report. Herb and Marion Sandler, who founded the S&L known as

World Savings Bank, are identified as the primary culprits here. In 2007, they launched an investigative reporting outfit called ProPublica, which proceeded to inveigh against the natural gas industry.

"Much attention has been paid to the efforts of gas companies to influence the political debate through campaign contributions and lobbying efforts," the report says. "But anti-drilling activists — while claiming gas companies use their vast financial resources to weaken regulatory structures and silence poorly funded environmental groups - influence politicians through their own lobbying efforts and by spreading myths about drilling. Among the myths alleged about "Big Gas" is that drillers are flocking to Pennsylvania's rich Marcellus Shale reserves, engaging in dangerous and highly polluting drilling activities, and shirking responsibility for damages while successfully avoiding paying taxes."

After scrutinizing several of the natural gas articles produced by ProPublica, the In-

dependent Institute uncovered several areas that cast the industry in very bad light. Here is a portion of Institute's commentary on the reporting from ProPublica: "The Colorado experience of zero cases of water contamination from hydraulic fracturing is consistent with the 2002 study from the Interstate Oil and Gas Com3 policy brief pact Commission (a consortium of state regulatory agencies). The Commission surveyed regulatory agencies in 28 states (including Colorado and the other four states where ProPublica claimed that there were more than 1,000 "documented" cases of contamination). The response covered the entire history of hydraulic fracturing in those states. Every single one of those 28 states reported that there had never been groundwater harm due to fracturing."

The ProPublica report declined to report on any evidence from this study.

The slanted reporting and misinformation could come with a serious price tag for Pennsylvania, if state officials are persuaded to impose restraints on natural gas development. Penn State economists have concluded that the Marcellus development has already resulted in over 88,000 new jobs in Pennsylvania. Moreover, the investments in natural gas drilling have translated over to improved infrastructure for the state.

In 2010, natural gas companies poured about \$200 million into rebuilding and improving local roads, the Commonwealth Foundation reported.

The enhanced drilling techniques have opened the way to economic development that would not have been possible just a few years ago. Horizontal drilling and hydraulic fracturing have helped to take the edge off the recession in Pennsylvania. But job creation could be offset if green pressure groups and "wealthy liberals" are permitted to circulate anti-industry propaganda without a forceful response.







ance, and want to share their cultural experiences with their new American families.
