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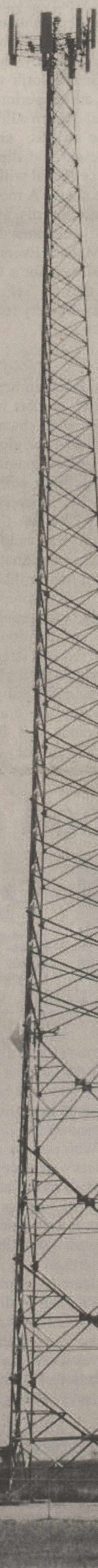

Can you really hear me now?

After months of waiting, KC finally gets cell phone service

After years of not getting a decent signal, Knox City finally joined the cellular age last week when Verizon flipped the switch on its new 3G cell phone tower south of the city.

The news could have been more welcome for area residents.

"Cell phone service has been around for 20 years. It was about time we got service here," said Knox City City Administrator Chad Roberts, who helped spearhead a months-long push to entice Verizon Communications to build a tower in eastern Knox County. The international cell phone service provider initially began construction on the tower in late March.

"I spent a lot of time dealing with them," said Roberts. "This is something our community needed. Hopefully, this is just a start."

Verizon officially turned on the transmitters on the tower on Tuesday, May 15. Almost immediately, cell phone customers in Knox City and Benjamin began receiving more reliable service.

Reliable cellular service has been a hot topic in Knox City on more than one occasion over the past few years. At least twice before, deals to improve service seemed imminent.

In 2008, Alltel Communications looked as if it would take the lead locally. The company negotiated a lease to build a tower on property belonging to Lois Robertson. Alltel was even granted a license from the Federal Communications Commission.

Unfortunately for Knox City, Alltel's plans were put on hold shortly afterward when the company was sold to Verizon.

When the sale was approved, Verizon announced it was halting all of Alltel's planned construction until it had an opportunity to perform studies on areas of need. Four years later, Knox City got the call it had been waiting for. The community, according to Verizon officials, needed better service.

Less than 90 days ago, Verizon officials broke ground on the tower, installing transmission lines and erecting the steel tower in three stages.

Knox County voters will be able to cast their ballot on issues facing them next Tuesday when the Joint Primary Election is held.

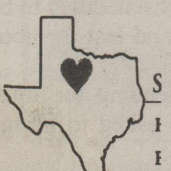

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Postal Service says it won't close offices ... yet

Benjamin, O'Brien and Weinert residents can breathe a bit easier. The mail is still going to be coming to their towns ... at least for now.

The U.S. Postal Service announced a new strategy recently it hopes will keep the nation's smallest post offices open for business, while providing a framework to achieve significant cost savings.

The plan, which would save several area post offices, would keep the existing post office in place, but with modified retail window hours to match customer use. Access to the retail lobby and to P.O. Boxes would remain unchanged, and the town's ZIP Code and community identity would be retained.

The USPS had been contemplating closing some of the nation's smaller post offices as a way to curb expenses and costs.

"Meeting the needs of postal customers is, and will always be, a top priority. We continue to balance that by better aligning service options with customer demand and reducing the cost to serve," said Postmaster General/CEO Patrick R. Donahoe. "With that said, we've listened to our customers in rural America and we've heard them loud and clear — they want to keep their Post Office open. We believe today's announcement will serve our customers' needs and allow us to achieve real savings to help the Postal Service return to long-term financial stability."

The new strategy would be implemented over a two-year, multi-phased approach and would not be completed until September 2014. Once implementation is completed, the Postal Service estimates savings of a half billion dollars annually.

Motorists warned to buckle up in 'Click It or Ticket' campaign

Here's a warning for all Knox County motorists. Buckle that seat belt or else be prepared to give some money to the state.

From May 21 through June 3, including the Memorial Day weekend, state troopers, police officers and sheriff's deputies will be on the lookout for drivers

and passengers who are not buckled up, or whose children are not properly restrained.

Throughout this two week-long enforcement period of the Texas Department of Transportation's annual "Click It or Ticket" campaign, drivers and passengers who choose not to fasten their seat belts could be pulled over and fined up to \$250, plus court costs.

Texas law requires that both drivers and passengers wear seat belts. Children younger than 8 years old must ride in a child safety seat or booster seat.

Suspicious of good cow market

I was visiting with Bill in Alabama. He's a cattleman, a bit of a philosopher and a constant worrier. I mentioned that one of my friends had sold a set of 520 lb feeder cattle for \$1.99 a pound! That's more than a thousand dollars a head!

"I know," said Bill, "I've sold some myself but..." then he paused and added, "I'm wondering if the price is getting too high?"

I cast a skeptical eye, but he was serious. "Whattaya mean?" I asked

"Is it possible that the price will drive people away from beef and ruin our business?" he said.

I immediately thought of that Yogi Berra observation, "The place is so crowded, nobody goes there anymore."

Due to the government's cheap-food policy re-established with each new Farm Bill, and the tremendous advances in production brought on by modern ag technology, food prices have stayed cheap in relation to other essential commodities.

ON THE EDGE OF COMMON SENSE

I compared the number of 500 lb feeder cattle it took to buy a new ¾ ton pickup in the last four decades. In the 70's it took 22 head, in the 80's it took 36 head, in the 90's it took 72, and in the 00's it took 79 head. With each passing decade the farmer's product declined in value relative to his costs. Then suddenly in 2012 the number of feeders it took to buy a pickup dropped to 64 head! That's back to the mid-80's average.

We in agriculture have grown used to being treated like Cinderella's stepchild or the kindly old hick uncle who still has cows, plants a garden and drives a real tractor. The consumer believes we live a simple life, Ma and Pa Kettle, like

the sod-busters on the plains that need to be protected by the hero (a congressman or senator) who shoots the bad guy and runs off with the farmer's daughter!

It would be an eye opener for a good portion of consumers to spend a day with a Washington feedlot operator, Illinois corn grower, Georgia seed stock producer, Utah rancher or an Arkansas cotton farmer. To see computer projections of average daily gain, soil testing, laser leveling, vineyard irrigation systems, dairy genetic selections, swine and poultry's meticulous ration calculations and the voluminous scientific research being used in all phases of agriculture.

The corn seed or semen sample that is put to work on our farms and ranches every day has as much technology behind it as a satellite on its way to Mars. But the trusting consumer doesn't see all that. They only see us driving a grain truck out to the mill or taking a trailer load of feeders to the sale. We, in our greasy overalls or well-worn cowboy hat, are the tip of the technological, tried and trusted, diligent, essential iceberg that puts food on their table.

So if the price of beef, grain, milk and strawberries are now a little closer to what they are really worth, I'm gonna be thankful. Of course, if corn hits ten bucks, I just might start to worry.

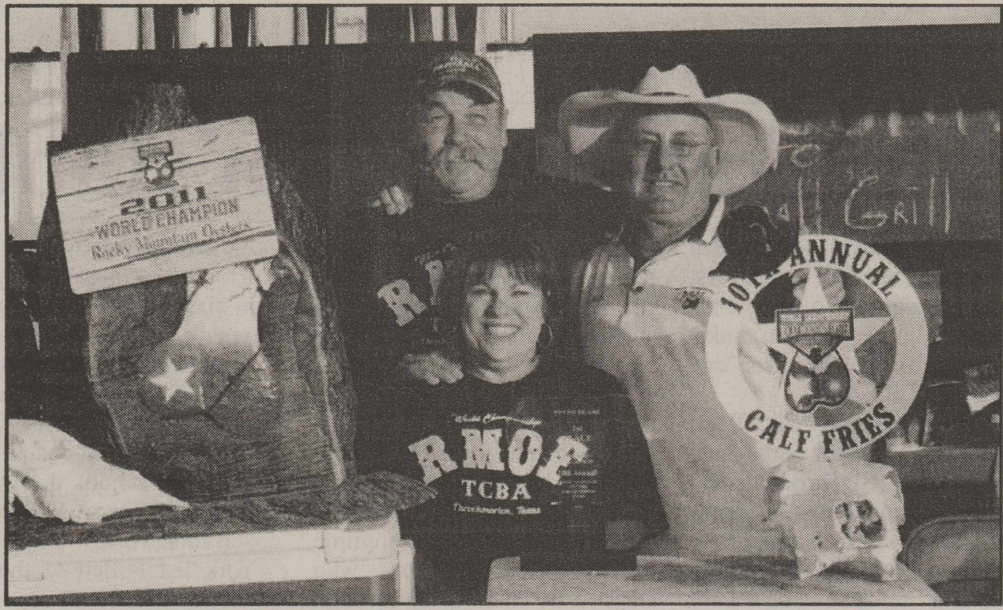

Good luck to all the seniors and I hope life gives you everything you want. Follow your dreams and shoot for the stars.

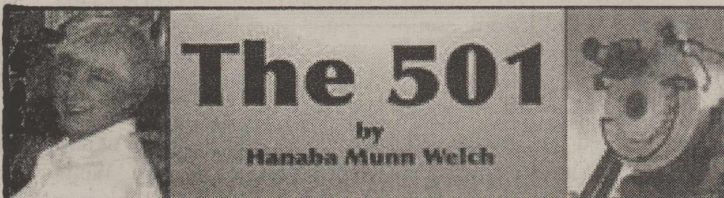

For the want of a nail ... You know the proverb. One thing leads to another, and somebody ends up losing a kingdom over a missing horseshoe nail that caused the horse to lose a shoe, precipitating the loss of a battle, culminating in the loss of said kingdom.

One thing leads to another. True. But when things go wrong on our farm, it's not usually for the want of a nail. I save nails.

OK. Sometimes it's for the want of a good nail. My husband believes only in good nails and thinks life's too short to save bent and rusty nails. Maybe he's right, but I've been saving all sorts of old nails just about all my life. I can't stop now. Besides, every once in a while, he has to swallow his pride and ask me for a nail or two. I nonchalantly oblige. Inwardly I smile.

As for my predilection for old nails, it could be genetic.

My grandmother saved old nails. Back in the early 1950s, she also collected a few long-neck beer bottles. Indeed, all beer bottles had long necks back then. The neckless era came later. They don't make those funny bottles any more, do they? Anyway, even before open-container laws, beer drinkers tossed their longnecks along highways and byways. Maybe you knew that.

If you live in the country by a ditch, expect it to collect some beer bottles. Fact of life. If you want a clean ditch, you pick up the bottles. That's apparently how my grandmother put together her modest bottle collection.

When her house burned circa 1953, her beer bottles didn't fare well. In the ashes, there they lay. Melded with the melted brown glass were nails she'd dropped into the bottles.

The bottles had been hanging on the wall. She had just a few - not as many as in the famous song about bottles of beer on

the wall and containing no beer. Just nails. Why hang them up? Call it inventive decorating, on par with their use as nail repositories. When you collect nails, you have to put them somewhere. Ask me. I even have to be sneaky about it, like a closet alcoholic. My husband holds out hope I'll quit.

But it's hard when you start collecting at a tender age. Daddy paid me a penny a pound for old nails. He didn't want the nails -- just fewer flat tires. But I loved finding every old nail. Clink. Into the coffee can they went.

When I was 12, my grandmother gave me a nail-pulling job. She'd hired a neighbor to wreck an old house in her pasture. My job was to extract the nails from the salvage lumber. She saved both the boards and the nails. My kind of grandmother. No doubt she knew that proverb.

But I'm still wondering a little about the beer bottles. There are other out-of-the-way places you can stash old nails. Just ask me.

Area coaching ranks remain stable

While some schools may find themselves scrambling to fill vacancies in their head coaching positions, the Knox County area has remained relatively clam.

In fact, it hasn't changed much at all.

Heading into the summer, Knox City, Benjamin, Throckmorton and Woodson all appear to retain their football coaches.

In Knox City, Charles Steele will return to the fold. The veteran head coach guided the Greyhounds to a berth in the six-man Division state quarter-finals a year ago.

Benjamin will head into the

year not so much in need of a head coach as it will players. The Mustangs, one of the smaller schools in the six-man ranks, canceled their 2011 season due to a lack of players.

In Throckmorton, Mike Reed appears set to return as the head coach. Reed led Throckmorton to the Division I state championship last season, and has a solid cast of players returning, including all-state end Gary Farquhar.

Richard Sullivan will be heading into his second year at Woodson, his high school alma mater.

Two other coaching faces familiar to teams in the area that will be returning next fall is Gordon's Shane Mallory and Strawn's Dewaine Lee.

At least nine teams, including perennial power Garden City, will head into the 2012 season with new coaches.

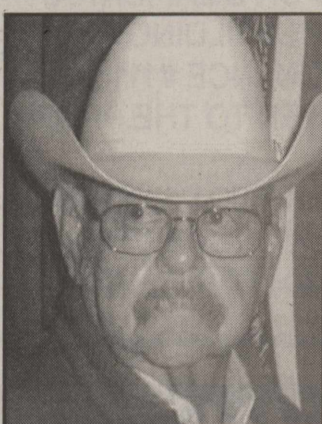
Garden City ISD will be looking to replace longtime head coach Vance Jones, who stepped down midway through the school year. Jones, who had also coached Marathon and Sanderson to the finals, led the Barkats to the Division I state title in 2009 and 2010.

Aspermont, too, will be looking for a new head coach. Veteran six-man coach Larry Reid stepped aside earlier this year.

Another major change on the six-man front is at Water Valley High School. Karry Owens is out as the head coach at the West Texas school, and will be replaced by former Follett head coach John York.

York led Follett to the state finals in 2008.

Other six-man programs looking for head football coaches include Brooksmith, Buckholts, Grandfalls-Royalty, High Island, Lazbuddie and Silverton.

Six-man all-star game headed to Knox City?

Six-man football could be headed for Knox City next summer. All-star six-man football, that is.

Plans have been tossed around to launch a national six-man all-star game that could be played locally. The game could pit a team of Texas players against their counterparts from the U.S. and Canada.

Knox County News' publisher said he has been considering starting the all-star game for the past few months as a way to promote the game, and help small

school athletes gain a bit more notoriety.

"I love six-man football," he said. "And I think something like this would be a lot of fun for everyone."

The game, which would be played in early July, could feature 12-14 players on each roster, and showcase the talents of players from Texas, Colorado, New Mexico, Wyoming, Montana, Florida and the Canadian provinces of Saskatchewan and Alberta.

Texas six-man all-stars used to compete against

athletes from the other six-man areas in the 1990s in the All Americas Bowl. That game was later transformed into the Texas Bowl, which is played every summer in Garden City.

One player that would certainly get a look, Wells admits, is his son, Bobby.

"I can't imagine doing it and not letting him be a part," he said.

Bobby Wells is an all-state defensive end at Strawn High School. He will be entering his senior season this fall.

Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these appeal procedures if you have a concern about:

- the market or appraised value of your property
- the unequal appraisal of your property
- the inclusion of your property on the appraisal roll
- any exemptions that may apply to you
- the qualification for an agricultural or timber appraisal
- the taxable status of your property
- the local governments which should be taxing your property
- the ownership of property
- the change of use of land receiving special appraisal
- any action taken by the chief appraiser, appraisal district or appraisal review board that applies to and adversely affects you.

Review by the Appraisal Review Board

If you can't resolve your problem informally with the county appraisal district (CAD) staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board (ARB).

The ARB is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals or other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the CAD to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notice of the time, date and place of the hearing. If necessary, you may request a hearing in the evening or on a Saturday or Sunday. Prior to your hearing, you may ask to review the evidence the CAD plans to introduce at the hearing to establish any matter at issue. The law provides that before a hearing on a protest or immediately after the hearing begins, you or your agent and the CAD shall each provide the other with a copy of any written material intended to be offered or submitted to the ARB at the hearing. To the greatest extent practicable, the hearing will be informal. You or a designated agent may appear in person to present evidence or you may send notarized evidence for the ARB to review at your hearing. The CAD representative will present evidence about your case. You may cross-examine the CAD representative. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. In most cases, the CAD has the burden of establishing the property's value by a preponderance of the evidence presented.

Deadline for Filing Protests with the ARB*

Usual Deadline

On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever is later).

Late protests are allowed if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good cause.

Late protests are due the day before the ARB approves records for the year. Contact your appraisal district for more information.

Special Deadlines

For change of use (the appraisal district informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land), the deadline is not later than the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

In certain protests where the owner has submitted an independent appraisal before the hearing, the chief appraiser has the burden of proving the property's value by clear and convincing evidence. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office at

Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that they haven't talked about your case before the ARB hears it.

Review by the District Court or an Arbitrator or SOAH

After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision, you have the right to appeal. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 60 days of the date you receive the ARB's order. In certain cases, as an alternative to filing an appeal in district court, you may file, not later than the 45th day after you receive notice of the ARB order, a request for binding arbitration with the county appraisal district. In certain cases originating in certain counties, as an alternative to filing an appeal in district court, you may appeal to the State Office of Administrative Hearings (SOAH). An appeal to SOAH is initiated by, not later than the 30th day after you receive notice of the ARB's order, filing with the chief appraiser of the county appraisal district a notice of appeal. Appeals to District Court, Binding Arbitration, or SOAH all require payment of certain fees or deposits.

Tax Payment

You must pay either the amount of taxes due on the portion of the taxable value not in dispute or the amount of taxes due on the property under the order from which the appeal is taken.

If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually February 1) or no later than the 125th day after the date you claim you received a tax bill from one or more of the taxing units that tax your property. The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.

* The deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or holiday.

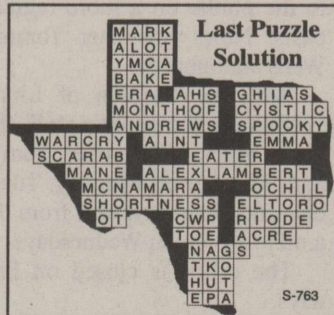

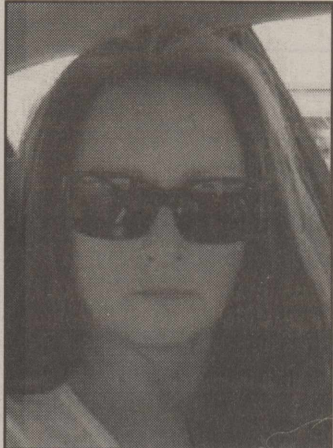

Roberts said he has maintained close contact with Verizon and its construction crew during the process.

"I have been on the phone with Verizon and the (tower) construction company a lot trying to get a date when this would be working," said Roberts. "I spent a lot of time on the phone with them, making sure everything was going as planned."

Knox City residents could be in store for even better news in the coming months, said Roberts. He said Verizon officials have indicated the new tower could make 4G service possible in the future.

"They (Verizon) told me that we are on the list to get the fiber optics needed to make it 4G," he said, noting the proposed

upgrade could happen within the next six months. "Once that is done, we will be state-of-the-art."

Roberts said non-Verizon cell phone users could also be in for good news. He said Verizon has given a tentative OK to allow other cellular phone companies, such as AT&T, to place their equipment on the tower.

According to AT&T officials, their service could be upgraded "if and when they get a contract with Verizon to put up their equipment."

Roberts said new cell phone services likely wouldn't happen quickly, taking a year or more to happen.

The City of Knox City has a deal with U.S. Cellular in place to allow the company to place its equipment on the city-owned water tower.

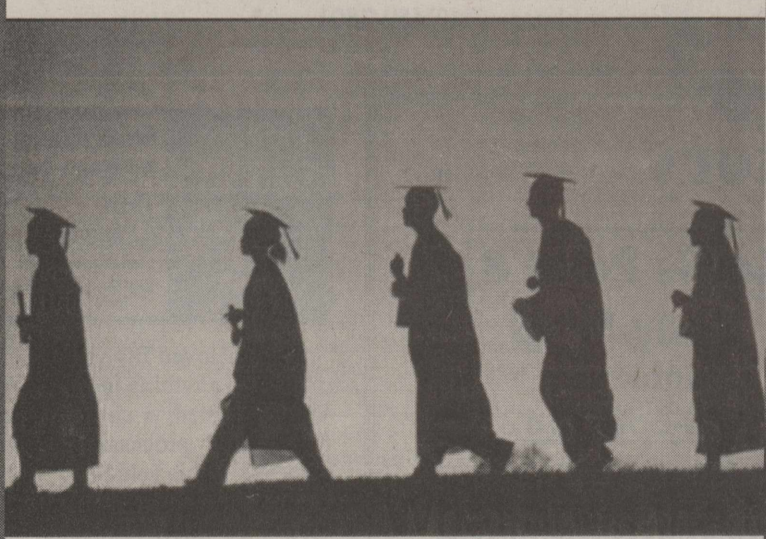

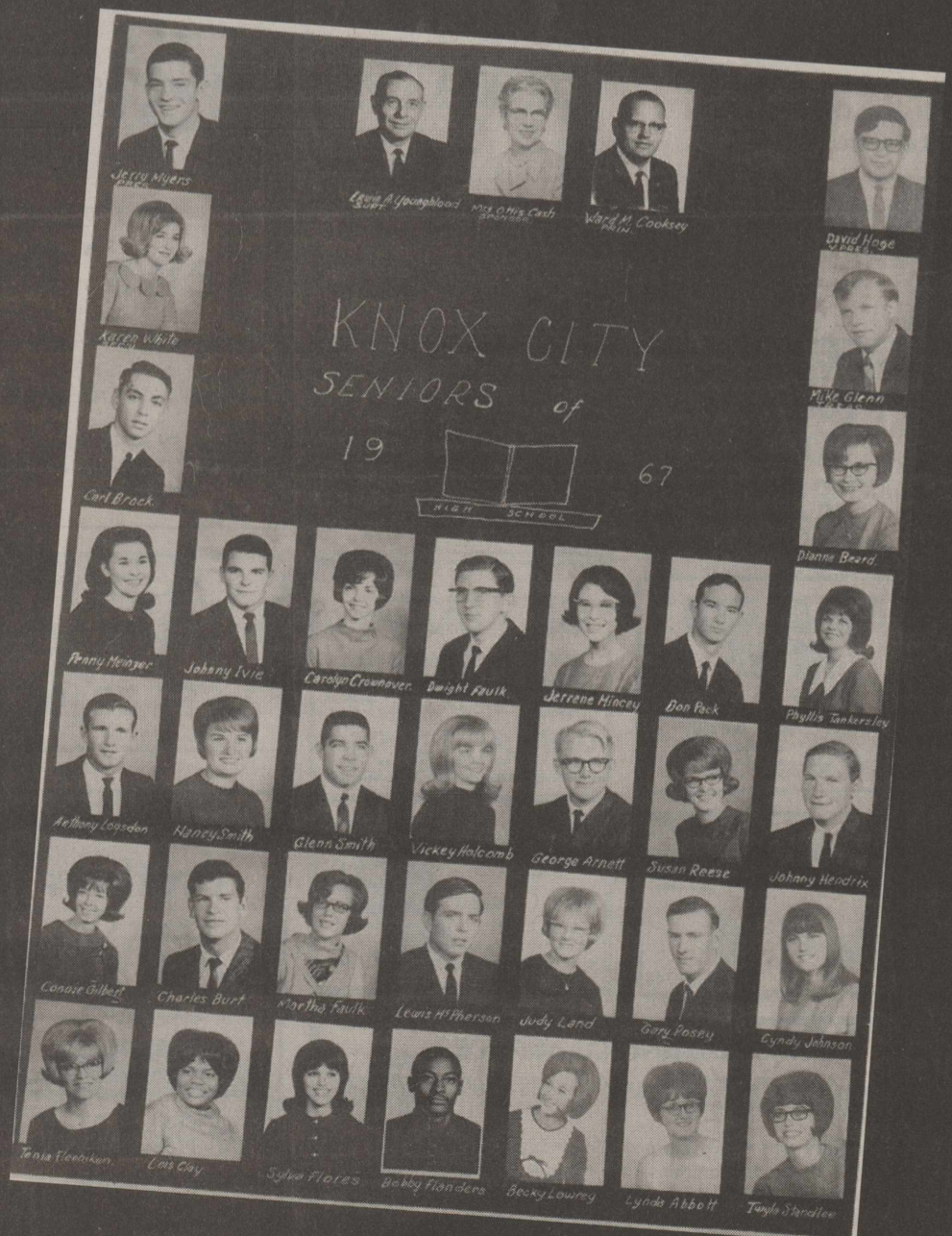
