Jody the Diadectes discovered near Seymour


By Chris Flis Special to The Knox County News-Courier SEYMOUR -It's difficult to imagine living in Seymour 290 million years ago. It's hard to imagine what a million years is, for that matter. But 290? Million?
The Whiteside Museum of Natural History has been on this planet for roughly 450 days. Yes. Days. And we're thriving. I think Seymouria would be proud. And the discoveries keep coming. The exploration of Seymour's enigmatic, biological past has helped us to paint a vivid picture of great beasts-
large and small, some of which would have given us a terrible fright had they lived for another quarter of a billion years.
Jody the Diadectes is the latest sleeping giant to ruste in its dusty sheets-the discovery made recently a few miles from town. So far, we have a stunning, complete skull- as well as numerous ribs and vertebrae. This is quite enough material to say there is, at least, partial skeleton slowly being exposed.
Diadectes is a favored by museum guests. I often overways favored by museum guests. I often over-
hear children and adults cautiously whisper, "He's so cute-I wish I had one as a pet." A symphony of giggling ensues. I don't blame them - he does have a rather adorable, Eng-
lish Bulldog-esque mug, with droopy forlorn lish Bulldog-esque mug, with droopy forlorn
eyes, and a beefy neck you just want to throw eyes, and a beefy neck you just want to throw
your arms around. And then all 800 pounds of him sits on your lap, resulting in your best impression of a marvelous Maverick Café pancake. Ouch. But who exactly is Diadectes? And why is he so important? Simply, he is one of the very first big land herbivores on the planet, with specialized teeth that helped him to eat plants.
Discovered by
Discovered by Edward Drinker Cope nearly 150 years ago right here in Baylor County, his remains continue to surface and
are easily recognized due to the sheer mass. The skull is incredibly robust-as is the res of his skeleton. It is easy to see why his nickname is the Permian Tank; he was built for walking on land with immense muscles in his back, shoulders, and legs.
If you look up Diadectes, you will get some very good information on him, but you will also see him referred to as both a reptile and an amphibian. Paleontologist Dr. Robert

## Thornberry votes

 for pro-life billsSpecial to The News-Courier
WASHINGTON - U.S. Congressman Mac Thornberry ( R -Clarendon) voted in support of two pro-life bills last week, one that would strip all federal funding from Planned Parenthood and the other would ensure babies born alive following an abortion receive the proper care provided to other newborns. "The possibility that someone would intentionally take the life of a baby in order to sell his or her organs and tissue is abhorrent," said Thornberry. "The investigations into these pursued. In the meantime, we the to make pursued. In the meantime, we fave to make volved."

The "Defind Planned Parenthood Act of 2015,"H.R. 3134, which passed the House by a vote of 241-187, would prohibit any federal funds from going to Planned Parenthood and its abortion-providing affiliates for one year while Congress completes its investigations. The "Born-Alive Abortion Survivors Protection Act," H.R. 3504, which passed by a vote of $248-177$, would criminalize the killing of an infant born alive during an abortion. "These bills need to end up on the president's desk because every life, especially the most innocent, should be protected," sai Thornberry.

The likelihood of the bills becoming law don't appear good because of a possible veto
by the president.
