Absentee Voting Closes Friday

Absentee voting will be open through Friday in the office of County and District Clerk Bess McWilliams for the Democratic and Republican Primaries to be held Tuesday, March 8.

Polls will be open from 7:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m. Tuesday. Briscoe County Republicans will vote at one precinct, in the home of Diamond Williams, 201 North Loretta in Silverton.

Democratic voting places will be the City Hall in Silverton, Precinct 1; the City Hall in Quitaque, Precinct 2; Pioneer Room at First State Bank in Silverton, Precinct 3; Verlin Towe Office Building in Silverton, Precinct 4; Mackenzie Municipal Water Authority Office,

Precinct 5.

Sample ballots are provided elsewhere in this issue of your hometown newspaper. The sample ballot for the Democratic Primary is not the actual ballot for any one precinct, but shows the candidates for County Commissioner in both Precincts 1 and 3.

There are no write-in votes for either primary, except that the Republicans will be writing in a County Chairman and the Democrats will be writing in a County Chairman and a Precinct Chairman in each of the four Commissioners' precincts.

All candidates for county offices have filed for the Democratic Primary. The primaries nomi-

inate candidates for the general election, but for all practical purposes the county-level candidates consider themselves elected following the primaries due to having no opponents listed on the Republican ballot.

The terms of office of Shafe Weaver, Commissioner of Precinct 1, and Beryl Long, Commissioner of Precinct 3, are expiring at the end of this year. Neither has filed for re-election.

In Precinct 1, the candidates for Commissioner are Alton (Tobe) Riddell, Eddie Rhoderick and Aaron Younger. In Precinct 3, the candidates are Larry Comer, John T. Francis and L. B. Garvin, jr.

Another contested race is that of the County Tax Assessor-Collector, where the incumbent Fairy McWilliams is being opposed by Waynelle Couch and Gloria Wood.

The other county officers are unopposed in their bids for re-election.

Citizens Forum Is Planned Mon. Night

All Briscoe County residents are invited to a Citizens Forum on Monday, March 7, from 7:30 to 9:00 p.m. in the Pioneer Room at First State Bank in Silverton.

The twelve candidates who will be on the county ballot for the Super Tuesday primary on March 8, are being contacted and invited to participate. The purpose of this forum is to provide voters an opportunity to hear the candidates' views in order to be better equipped to make informed choices at the polls.

Those running for office are in positions of leadership and decision-making in the county government. Citizens should welcome this opportunity to exercise their rights to be involved in the election process and determine

how the candidates stand on significant issues pertaining to Briscoe County.

The Family Community Leadership team of Jackie Mercer, Virginia Hardin and Lynda Fogerson are conducting the Forum as a part of community leadership training to help citizens be informed voters. The FCL project is an educational program of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Texas Extension Homemakers Association.

Voters are reminded that county officials make decisions that influence the entire county, not just one precinct. Plan to attend and hear all the candidates.

An immunization clinic offering vaccines that give protection against several childhood diseases is scheduled from 2:00 until 4:00 p.m. Thursday, March 24, in the Silverton Elementary School.

Protection is against polio, diphtheria, lock jaw (tetanus), whooping cough (pertussis), measles, rubella and mumps.

The Texas Department of Health is charging money to help with the cost of keeping the clinic open. The amount of money charged will be based on family income and size, and the ability to pay.

Letters Need To Be Sent To Austin This Week

Judge Jimmy Ross was in Austin Wednesday, February 24, and met with Francisco Grajales, Program Specialist, at the Department of Commerce, and the Judge says that all residents need to write letters this week to Mr. Grajales, setting forth your reasons why the grant is needed and why Briscoe County Processing, Inc. is so vital to the county's economy.

Judge Ross said that he went through the grant application with Mr. Grajales, and all seemed to be in order. The scoring system was discussed, and the scores look good. If the scoring is high enough to qualify Briscoe County to receive the grant, a representative of the Department of Commerce, probably Mr. Grajales, will come here to look at the site, visit with the people, and see what we have going.

Then when Mr. Grajales returns to Austin, he would verify the proposed project, and then it goes before the board for a hearing and recommendation.

Some letters have already reached the Department of Commerce, but it is vital that more be sent **THIS** week. Address your letters now to Mr. Francisco Grajales, Program Specialist, Community Development Financing Department, Texas Department of Commerce, Box 12728, Capitol Station, Austin, Texas 78711.

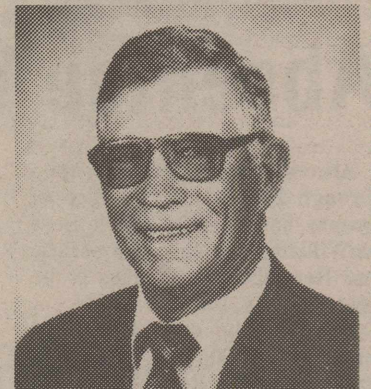

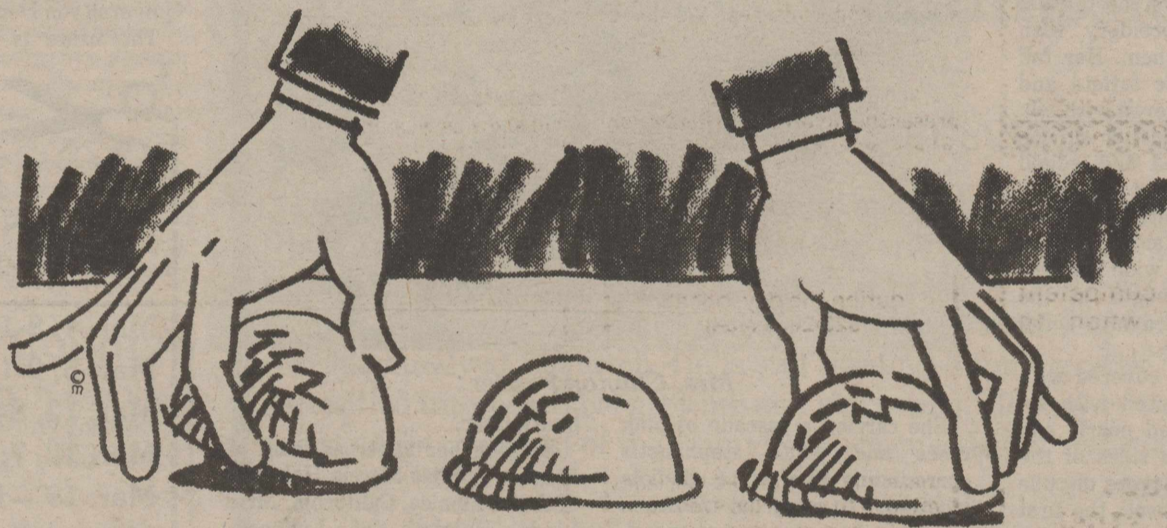
March 3, 1938—Fight night well attended Tuesday. Boys turn pugilists to earn money for

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Almost 300 letters from farm groups, political entities, businesses and individuals have gone to Washington in pursuit of help for High Plains farmers whose 1987 crops were destroyed by weather.

The letters, along with a letter of request signed by High Plains congressmen and Texas senators, were hand delivered to U. S. Department of Agriculture Secretary Richard Lyng on February 25. They were generated and forwarded to Washington by Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., as part of an emergency disaster aid effort that began after widespread hailstorms last July.

Every county on the Plains suffered losses to some degree, according to PCG Executive Vice President Donald Johnson, but the most concentrated damage fell on Briscoe, Floyd, Crosby, Dawson, Lamb, Lynn and Bailey counties.

Those seven counties, according to a study of damage that occurred through August 14 by Dr. Jackie Smith, Area Extension Agronomist, tallied total losses of over 150,000 acres of cotton and severe losses on another 92,000 acres. Net dollar losses, he estimates, were a minimum of \$35 million at the

farm level. Not included in Dr. Smith's calculations are losses of corn, wheat and other crops, losses in other counties or the effects of hailstorms occurring in late August and September.

The Food Security Act of 1985 gives the Secretary authority to make special disaster payments to producers who sustain losses that create an economic emergency of such magnitude as to preclude its alleviation by other existing forms of Federal assistance.

With 300 first-hand testimonials, documentation of the facts and follow-up actions by PCG, the National Cotton Council and others, Johnson says, "We hope to remove any doubt that may remain in the Secretary's mind that hundreds of our producers qualify for disaster payments as authorized by law."

The only concession made by USDA so far has been to declare Floyd County a disaster area in which producers are eligible for low interest emergency disaster loans. And that declaration also qualifies producers in contiguous counties, including Motley, Dickens, Crosby, Lubbock, Hale, Swisher and Briscoe.

Such loans will be helpful to some, Johnson admits. But piling another loan on top of already

intolerable debt loads will not solve the problem, he adds.

The P. O. W. name, gravesite

and any other personal information will be made a part of a permanent record and kept in the Prisoner of War Museum at Andersonville, Georgia. This museum is maintained by the United States Department of Interior.

Six Flags Over Texas To Begin 1988 Season

Six Flags Over Texas will begin its 28th season Saturday, March 5.

season. The Silver Star Carousel, a 1925 creation of master carousel builder William Dentzel, has undergone a three-year restoration and will be opened to park visitors in mid-March.

Early visitors will also see work underway on a new food court, the largest addition ever to Six Flags food service facilities. It is located in the park's U.S.A. section.

Six Flags will be open on weekends only until May 28, when daily operation for the summer begins. The park will open daily for Spring Break from March 19 through March 27. Gates will open at 10:00 a.m. each operating day. Closing hours vary.

One-day tickets are \$17.95. Tickets for two consecutive days are \$22.95. The price for children under 48 inches tall and senior citizens age 55 and over is \$11.95. All prices are plus tax.

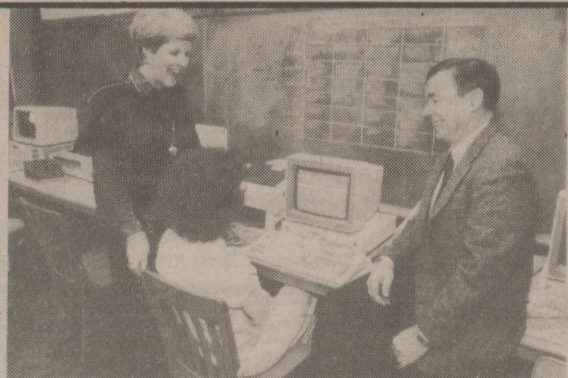

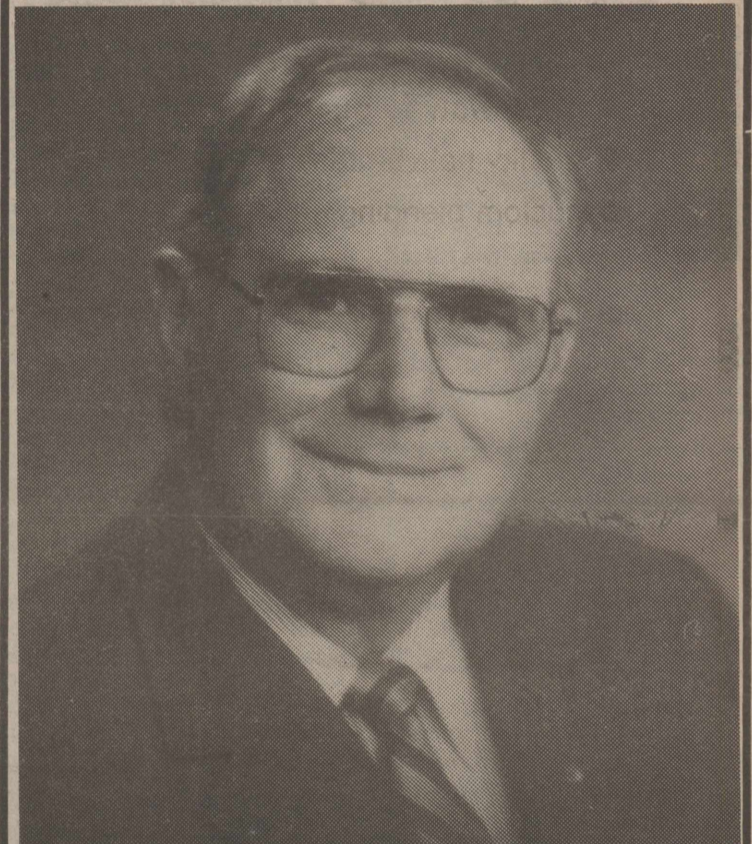
