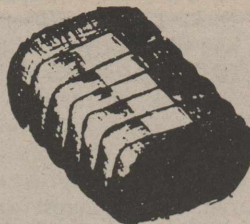

I am sitting at my typewriter in a very unhappy frame of mind today. As you've probably heard, our grant application for Briscoe County Processing, Inc. didn't receive state approval.

In Monday's Commissioners' Court meeting, instead of going ahead and planning another grant application hearing for today (Thursday), Commissioners Long, Chandler and Eddleman voted to postpone further work on the application until after April 26, because no one could give them satisfactory reasons why the grant application was turned down.

This will cause our grant application, which was to have been re-submitted for consideration in the next go-round, to be delayed long enough that it won't make the deadline and it will be another two months before the grant applications will be considered again.

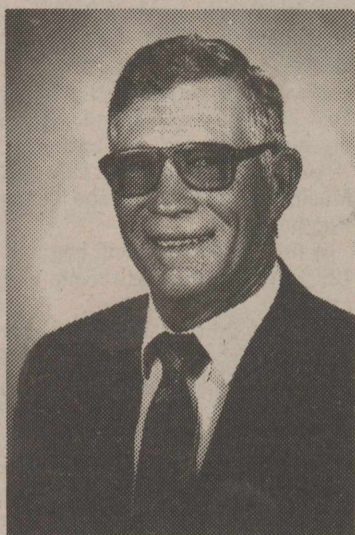
This sends a message to Austin that Briscoe County is not interested in this project which we so badly need and which most of us want desperately.

Briscoe County Processing, Inc. wanted to process the 1988 crop of peanuts, and instead it looks like such a monkey wrench has been thrown into the works that we could be in danger of losing the whole project, which is an economic disaster of untold proportions.

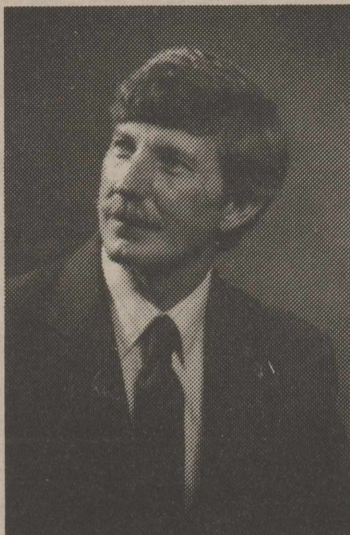
After the meeting, the Commissioners tried to change their actions, but in so doing and posting the notice for a special meeting Thursday, they didn't take into consideration that a session would have to be held to change their actions at the meeting that had already taken place. This brought about a warning from the County Attorney that they were about to do something which could be illegal, and the hearing was called off.

I knew it was too good to be true when Archer & Archer first planned to bring the processing plant to Briscoe County. The thing I didn't realize was that some of our own people might be the ones to ruin it for us. We need the economic "shot in the arm" so badly, and most of us want it. This is a case of a few ruining something that I think the majority was hoping would be brought to reality.

We have committed ourselves to staying in Silverton, but with another of our customers in the process of closing, the handwriting may be on the wall. We may not be able to stay here either, and the more of us who go, the greater will be the tax burden on those who stay.

Younger, Garvin Are New Commissioners

Aaron Younger and L. B. Garvin, jr. were nominated as Briscoe County Commissioners in the second Democratic Primary Tuesday, and since they have no Republican opposition in the fall, it was the same as election to office. Their terms begin January 1, 1989.

Younger defeated Alton (Tobe) Riddell 66-50, while Garvin defeated Larry Comer 156-151.

Briscoe County Democrats also gave the nod for nomination to Mel Phillips over Bryan Poff, 308-189, in the race for State Senator. Phillips carried all the

county's boxes except number seven, which votes at Lake Mackenzie, which gave a 7-0 edge to Poff.

A total of 528 Briscoe voters went to the polls on a very pretty sunny day with light winds. There were 44 votes cast in the absentee box; 106 in Precinct 1; 36 in Precinct 2; 283 in Precinct 3; 52 in Precinct 4 and seven in Precinct 5. This represents only about 40% of the county's voting strength.

In the county's Republican Primary, it was Beau Boulter beating Wes Gilbreath, 25-0, for the nomination as United States

Emergency Service Report

Silverton's emergency services have been busy during the past few days.

Saturday the firemen answered a call to the Luther Ranch where the home of John T. Burson was burning. The house suffered quite a bit of smoke and structural damage, and Burson was taken for treatment of smoke inhalation. A few things were removed from the house.

Sunday firemen were called to extinguish a fire in some round bales of hay that had caught from a trash fire.

The volunteer ambulance service transported a patient to High Plains Baptist Hospital in Amarillo Sunday morning.

Both the fire and ambulance services answered a call Sunday evening to Briscoe Co-op Gin where two cars had collided at the intersection of FM 145 and FM 284. The occupants of one vehicle were from Lubbock, and ambulance unit one transported them to a Lubbock hospital. The occupants of the other vehicle were from Plainview, and were transported to Central Plains Hospital by ambulance unit two. While both of Silverton's ambulances were on these runs, a unit came from Quitaque and was on stand-by at the ambulance station until unit two returned from Plainview. Members of the emergency services appreciate this stand-by service by the Quitaque volunteers.

Tuesday at noon, firemen answered a call to The Country Cut-Ups where a fire was burning in a door frame. It was extinguished with a minimum of damage to the shop.

You will notice that quite often the fire and ambulance services respond to calls together. This is to support one another. The U. S. Forestry Service says that more men die at grass fires than at forest fires. This is due to the smoke inhalation. So an ambulance unit responds, particularly to rural fires, along with the fire trucks. This is simply taking along a portable emergency room in case it is needed.

A fire truck responds to wrecks along with the ambulance to be there to hose down gasoline spills, etc. if needed to secure the scene for the Paramedics and Emergency Medical Technicians who are there to care for the injured.

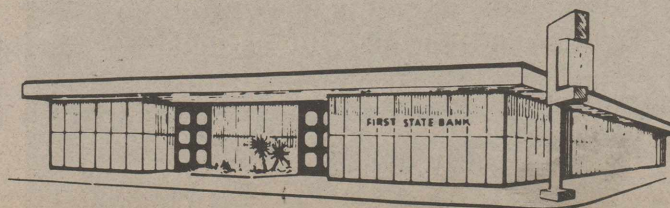

(Editor's Note: Since Larry and Cindy Comer are raising asparagus commercially and it is for sale here in Silverton now, we asked Cindy to share tips on cooking fresh asparagus with our readers.)

Food fit for kings is available right here in your community. Even royalty cannot always enjoy the delicious taste of fresh asparagus which is available only during a short season and in limited areas.

When preparing the spears, a forceful waterstream helps remove soil and grit. They can be steamed, boiled, or zapped in your microwave. As asparagus cooks, it takes on a brilliant green color. Watch it closely and heat it only until it is crisp tender, not soft. If the color changes to a dull green, it's been overcooked and will taste like the canned, but is still excellent for soups and sauces.

Try it! Those who have tried it wait yearly for the fresh, delicate taste of this not-so-common food.

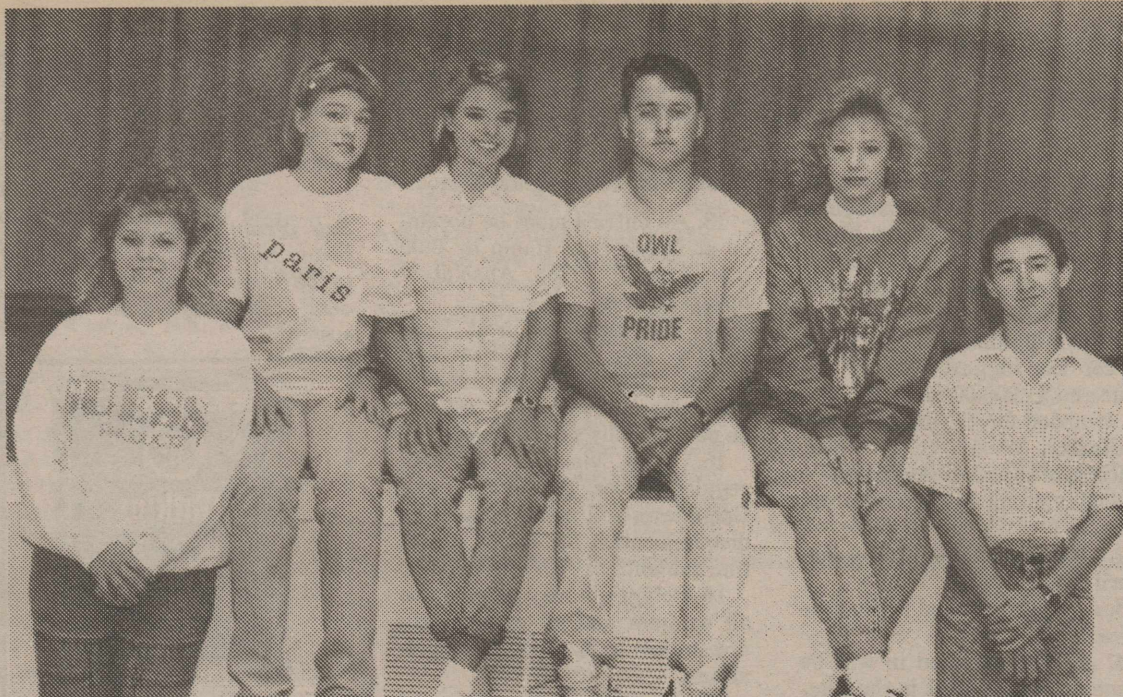

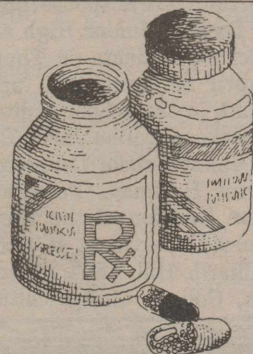

Service Technician Graduates From Case IH Tractor School

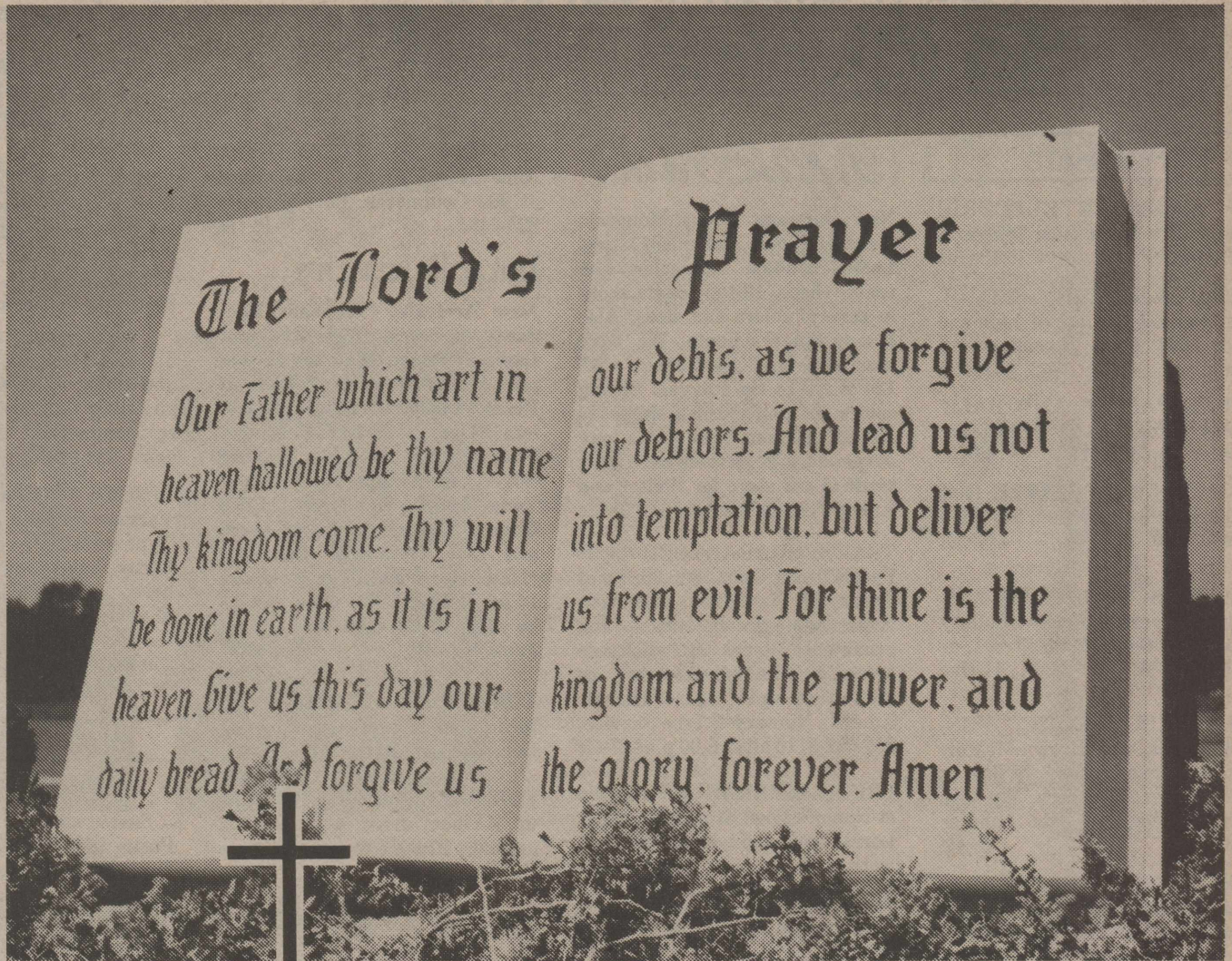
