## Commissioners Have

 Routine Business MeetingBriscoe County Commissioners held a routine business meeting Monday morning, with all the commissioners, the county judge and county attorney present.
Discussion was brought by Jimmy Burson of the weight limit that has been posted at a certain bridge in the county, over which he must haul feed and which he must haul feed and
livestock. About six weeks ago a livestock. About six weeks ago a
sign was posted at the bridge sign was posted at the bridge
stating the load limit to be 5000 stating the load limit to be 5000
pounds. Commissioner Shafe pounds. Commissioner Shafe Weaver told Burson that State Highway Department and they recommended the weight limit that is posted." Burson wanted to know if he was breaking the law by taking a heavier load across the bridge, heavier Commissioner Weaver, in and Commissioner Weaver, in
whose precinct the bridge is whose precinct the bridge is
located, said that the county located, said that the county
would not be liable for any would not be liable for any
damage resulting from heavier loads. When he asked who would be liable for any resulting damage, Burson was told that he or the driver of the load would probably be liable for any damage resulting to the bridge in question or to the load. Burson question or he didn't want to be said he didn't want to be
unreasonable, but he had no unreasonable, but he had no
alternative route. He went ahead alternative route. He went ahead
to say that he didn't feel that he had reasonable access to the ranch where he is earning his livlihood and that he didn't really feel that the bridge is needed because no one lives over there and a water crossing would serve the need just as well. The commissioner said that in spite of the fact that it was possible the bridge would wash out sometime, the county couldn't afford to repair or replace the bridge.
Sandra Smith's bond as deputy tax assessor was received and unanimously approved.
A crack that leaks downspout
runoff rainwater into the base ment of the courthouse was discussed as well as sealing of the crack. Commissioners took a look at the situation following the conclusion of their business, and decided to run a concrete slab along the affected area of the courthouse.
Revenue Sharing Fund was unanimously voted to be transferred to the Courthouse and Jail Fund.

Commissioners voted to pay the county's pro-rata share of the expense of District Judge David Cave's office.
A letter has been drafted to send to area health providers notifying them in regard to the county's indigent policy. The county's indigent health providers are Dr. L. S. Foreman, City Drug and Swisher Memorial Hospital, all in Tulia. In a report given by Elaine Forbes, she asked the court to authorize payment of $\$ 30.02$ to Dr. Foreman and $\$ 23.00$ to City Drug for charges that were above what would be paid for indigent care, so that she and Judge Ross would be able to maintain a good working relationship between the county and the health providers. The court unanimously agreed to pay these charges.
Monthly and quarterly reports from the county offices were read and accepted unanimously.
Line items and bills were reviewed and unanimously approved for payment by the court.

## Owls Win First District Game 40-0 at Miami

Silverton's Owls moved into a tie with Higgins and McLean for the lead in Six-Man Football District $2-\mathrm{A}$ by defeating the Miami Warriors 40-0 last Friday night. All of the District scores were lopsided, as Higgins decisioned Groom 51-6 and McLean sioned Lefors $40-8$
At Miami, the Owls lit up the scoreboard before fans had hardly gotten settled in their seats when Will Rowell took the opening kickoff all the way back for a touchdown. The PAT kick failed, and with $9: 47$ still remaining to be played in the first quarter, the 0 wls held a $6-0$ lead.

Jewelry is the gift of "lasting beauty," but if you are susceptible to the mail-order and discount promotions, commercials, street peddlers, and even some "friend" offering glittery "bargains" that sound tempting, your enjoyment and the jewelry may tarnish sooner than you expected.

## 14K "Layered" Gold

"Layered" gold or "gold kote" means that there is only a very thin coat of gold bonded to a base metal, and this thin layer will probably wear off shortly with use. When buying gold jewelry, always look for a karat mark such as $10 \mathrm{~K}, 14 \mathrm{~K}$, and 18 K , with a manufacturer's trademark. Make sure the mark appears on a part of the chain besides the clasp. Sometimes, if only the clasp is marked 14 K , the chain may not be real gold. Anything less than 10K cannot be legally marked or sold as real gold. Layered gold jewelry cannot have a karat mark unless it is qualified " 14 K gold-filled" or " 14 K gold electroplated."

## Greesons Livestock Remains Formidable Fair Competition

"Our kids get a lot out of 4-H," emphasizes Martha Greeson, the former Martha Mills who is a graduate of Silverton High School. She and her husband, Mchool. She and her husband, Maynard, have three boys who
are enthusiastic livestock exhibiare enthusiastic livestock exhibi-
tors and have enjoyed considerable success at Stevens County Fairs and other exhibitions.
Chad Greeson, 14, has been in 4 -H seven years with his specialties of sheep, beef and rocketry projects. Clay, 13, has six years experience and his interests experience and his interests
include sheep, beef and rocketry. include sheep, beef and rocketry.
Wade, 9 , is a swine exhibitor. All Wade, 9 , is a swine exhibitor. All
three belong to the Moscow three belong to the Moscow
Country Club. This organization is a new type of club structure being promoted by the state to concentrate on livestock projects. The first meeting of the club took place last November and includes 24 members from and includes 24 members from across the county who are stock projects. Other specialty clubs can be organized as well.
The animals the Greesons exhibit come from their own sheep flock. "All sheep they show are from their own eyes," explains Martha.
Maynard adds, "That makes it a lot more interesting."
They started with four or five ewes. Now they have 40 ewes
with 20 replacement ewe lambs. "The kids are getting started where they can sell club lambs," Maynard says. They have sold some to Haskell County 4-H'ers and anticipate selling to others in the future. Also each of the boys has a heifer and Chad has a calf.
This year's Greeson lineup for the fair will be two or three sheep for Chad which will include two crossbreds and one Hampshire. Clay is preparing three or four lambs and two steers for his effort. Wade is grooming three pigs and a rocketry entry.
Wade is almost a loner with his swine interest, Martha admits. "He doesn't get much supportyou have to really like it." He and his father bought a gilt to raise his own pigs.
In their short experience in $4-\mathrm{H}$ the boys have achieved some remarkable honors. Chad has earned four grand championships earned four grand championships
and one reserve championship. and one reserve championship.
Clay has achieved five grand championships and one reserve championship. Wade is starting out with one each.
Maynard stops to reflect a moment when he's asked what's the secret to livestock success at the fair. Is it selecting the best animal? He replied, "That's part animal? He replied, "That's part
of it, but not all of it. There's of it, but not all of it. There's
feeding-a big part of it." He
adds timing, conditioning and grooming to the list of requirements.
Stevens County Fair isn't the only event the Greesons have on their calendar. They are preparing some animals to compete at the state fair.
There's the "Jackpot" competition in Garden City. The system there involves an entry fee. The winners in the judging share in the resulting prize money. Also, the Kansas Classic occurs early in the year for sheep exhibitors. The purpose of this show is to identify the animal with the best potential to do well in fall judging. Sheep 90 pounds and under are limited for this judging. Chad Greeson won the grand champion at the Classic this year.
Another interesting competition the boys have enjoyed involves grooming and showmanship. The entrant has one hour to completely shear and groom his animal for judging. Then he is judged on showmanship. When asked if they felt this was enough time, they admitted they could have used more. "We were awful busy," remarked one of the boys. Also, there is the American Royal and the National Western competition in Denver. Chad's personal ambition is to win grand champion at the state fair. Clay

## has his sights set on the National

 Western.Maynard comments that "the thing that hurts kids in Kansas the most is that the state fair doesn't have a livestock sale." He points with pride to the Stevens County Livestock Sale which traditionally gives very good support to the 4 -H'ers. "The reason the program is so good is our extension agent (Gary Gold) and the support we get from the community. We have one of the best programs in the state! We get a good price at the sale." That's one of the drawbacks of competing at the state level after the county fair; they could have gotten more money for their animals at the Stevens County Fair, he points out.
All this competition and work has brought some benefits to the family. "I think Kansas is real fortunate to have such competition," asserts Mr. Greeson. He maintains that there is good sportsmanship at all levels. At the national level the Greeson boys get to meet a lot of good
kids, he says. Some of these friends the Greesons get to see only once a year at the state fair. They all know who is going to show up year after year.

Whatever you find to interest you at the kaleidoscope of activities and displays at the fair, you can expect the livestock judging and sale will draw a large crowd. The Greesons will be working hard to make their mark in the top listings. But there's something to consider. Gary Gold says the livestock is going to be top knotch this year Guess the Greesons are going to have to work a little harder.

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## Rural Domestic Well Water

 Quality Important For HealthBird droppings, burrowing ro dents, and septic tank scum which find their way into ground water represent a few of the ways in which rural water supplies can become contaminat ed. The High Plains Under ground Water Conservation Dis trict No. 1 field support section assists rural residents in clearing up their water supply contamination problems.
The Water District samples domestic well water for possible contamination upon request by residents within its boundaries. With a bacteriological water sampling test, fecal coliform from the intestines of a warm-blooded animal can be detected. This is the most common source of well contamination problems, according to Dan Seale, engineer technician in the District's Field Support Section.
Support Section.
Water samples are placed on a media pad in a petri dish and are allowed to incubate 24 hours at $104^{\circ} \mathrm{F}$.
"When a test comes back positive, our first priority is to notify the people to stop drinking the contaminated water and to switch to an alternate source switch to an aiternate, source, such as bottled water. We the try to locate the contamination source and make recommenda-
tions on how to solve the tions on how to
problem," Seale says.
problem, Seale says.
Among the District staff's major recommendations are pro per attention to well sites. "We encourage people to keep their well houses clean and to make sure their wells are properly covered. Even the smallest ro dent hole could provide contamdent hole could provide contam-
inants an access to the water inants an access to
Chlorination of the entire water distribution system usual
ly clears up the wells and makes them safe for human use again; however, if the pollution source however, if the pollution source
still exists, the well will become still exists, the well will become
contaminated again. Wells which contaminated again. Wells which
have tested positive for fecal have tested positive for fecal
coliform should be re-sampled coliform should be re-sampled
within six months after chlorination to ensure their continued safety for human use.
