## Briscoe County Landowners Petition For Annexation Into Water Cons. District

Underground water control is becoming an increasingly political issue. Numerous bills introduced during the past two legislative sessions would have allowed underground water to be controlled by the State, had they passed. Similar legislation is expected during the 1989 regular session.

Many Briscoe County landowners now feel that "local control is

the best control" and have filed annexation of territory petitions with the board of directors of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1.

Petitions containing the signatures of 67 Briscoe County landowners were received by board members at their regular meeting on September 13. State law requires a minimum of 50 signatures of landowners within a territory requesting annexation into a Water District.

A public hearing to receive testimony from Briscoe County landowners regarding the annexation will be held October 25 at 7:00 p.m. in the Pioneer Room at First State Bank, 500 Main Street, in Silverton.

Interested parties are encouraged to give public testimony and ask questions about the Water District at this hearing. Testimony given at the hearing will be used by the Water District's board of directors to determine whether the annexation is of mutual benefit to the Water District and to the territory above the escarpment in Briscoe County.

If the board finds the addition to be feasible, an election will be called for January 21, 1989 to allow voters residing in the area of Briscoe County located above the escarpment and the existing

Water District to decide upon the annexation. A majority vote within both areas is required before new land may be added to the Water District.

## Students Must Pass Math, English Tests

Texas state law has mandated that students must pass a Mathematics and English test by the end of their 12th grade year in order to receive a diploma. The test is called the TEAMS test, and this will be given October 25th and 26th to the 11th grade in Silverton. The test will start at 8:30 a.m. and last until approximately 11:30 a.m.

Students who do not pass both sections will be given another chance to pass the part they failed on May 2nd and 3rd, 1989. They will have two more chances during their senior year, if needed, to pass the TEAMS test.

There are no make-up days for those who miss the test. Special help will be provided each school morning from 8:00 until 8:20 o'clock for any student who does not pass the test or who needs extra help in any area of study.

## Commissioners Have Routine Business Meeting

Briscoe County Commissioners held a routine business meeting Monday morning, with all the commissioners, the county judge and county attorney present.

Discussion was brought by Jimmy Burson of the weight limit that has been posted at a certain bridge in the county, over which he must haul feed and livestock. About six weeks ago a sign was posted at the bridge stating the load limit to be 5000 pounds. Commissioner Shafe Weaver told Burson that "the bridges were inspected by the State Highway Department and they recommended the weight limit that is posted." Burson wanted to know if he was breaking the law by taking a heavier load across the bridge, and Commissioner Weaver, in whose precinct the bridge is located, said that the county would not be liable for any damage resulting from heavier loads. When he asked who would be liable for any resulting damage, Burson was told that he or the driver of the load would probably be liable for any damage resulting to the bridge in question or to the load. Burson said he didn't want to be unreasonable, but he had no alternative route. He went ahead to say that he didn't feel that he had reasonable access to the ranch where he is earning his livelihood and that he didn't really feel that the bridge is needed because no one lives over there and a water crossing would serve the need just as well. The commissioner said that in spite of the fact that it was possible the bridge would wash out sometime, the county couldn't afford to repair or replace the bridge.

Sandra Smith's bond as deputy tax assessor was received and unanimously approved.

A crack that leaks downspout

runoff rainwater into the basement of the courthouse was discussed as well as sealing of the crack. Commissioners took a look at the situation following the conclusion of their business, and decided to run a concrete slab along the affected area of the courthouse.

Revenue Sharing Fund was unanimously voted to be transferred to the Courthouse and Jail Fund.

Commissioners voted to pay the county's pro-rata share of the expense of District Judge David Cave's office.

A letter has been drafted to send to area health providers notifying them in regard to the county's indigent policy. The county's indigent health providers are Dr. L. S. Foreman, City Drug and Swisher Memorial Hospital, all in Tulia. In a report given by Elaine Forbes, she asked the court to authorize payment of \$30.02 to Dr. Foreman and \$23.00 to City Drug for charges that were above what would be paid for indigent care, so that she and Judge Ross would be able to maintain a good working relationship between the county and the health providers. The court unanimously agreed to pay these charges.

Monthly and quarterly reports from the county offices were read and accepted unanimously.

Line items and bills were reviewed and unanimously approved for payment by the court.

Wednesday found us out on a

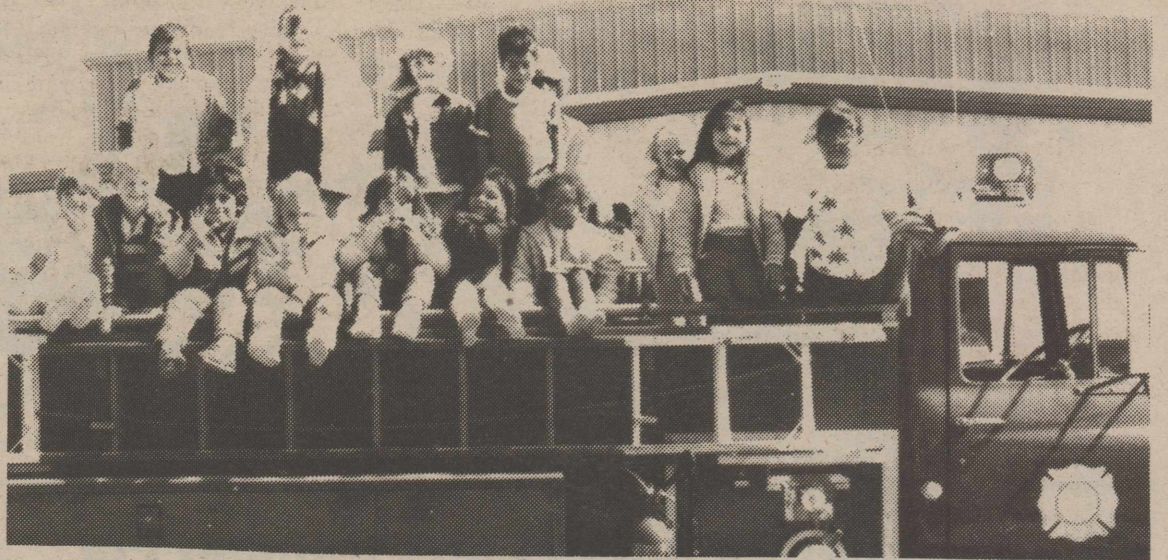
morning stroll in the morning and at a Resident Council Meeting in the afternoon. Thursday was spent making preparations for the new month and Friday was our weekly Bingo Game.

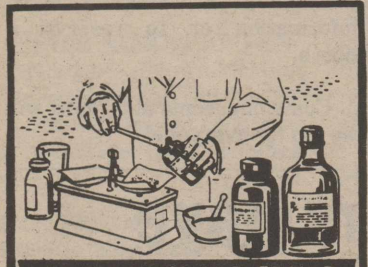

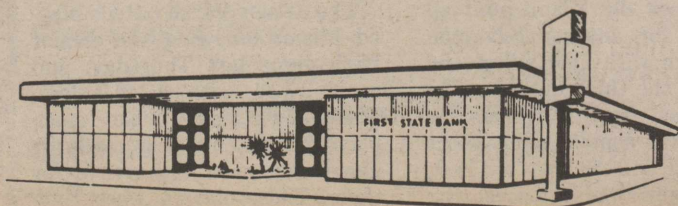

## Owls Win First District Game 40-0 at Miami

Silverton's Owls moved into a tie with Higgins and McLean for the lead in Six-Man Football District 2-A by defeating the Miami Warriors 40-0 last Friday night. All of the District scores were lopsided, as Higgins defeated Groom 51-6 and McLean beat Lefors 40-8.

At Miami, the Owls lit up the scoreboard before fans had hardly gotten settled in their seats when Will Rowell took the opening kickoff all the way back for a touchdown. The PAT kick failed, and with 9:47 still remaining to be played in the first quarter, the Owls held a 6-0 lead.

An onside kick was recovered by the Owls on the Miami 34, but Silverton wasn't able to do anything offensively and on fourth down the punt was blocked and the Warriors took over at their own 36.

Tough defense was provided by Bradley Brunson, Frank Lowrey, Wayne Henderson and other Owls, and Miami was unable to make any headway and on fourth down they punted into the endzone. The ball changed hands a couple of times, with neither team being able to make much off the other until Miami punted to the Silverton 8. From there runs by Brunson and Neal Edwards picked up a first down on the Silverton 23 with 2:43 remaining in the first quarter. Edwards picked up a yard or two and a pass from Kendal Minyard to Jamie Frizzell moved the Owls to the Miami 18. The offensive machine stalled on the next series, and the ball went over on downs on the Miami 3.

The ball changed hands a couple of times, with each team running three plays and punting, and with 6:06 remaining to be played in the first half, Rowell took another Miami punt all the way back for a touchdown which was called back because of a clipping penalty. This moved the Owls back to their own seven. Runs by Henderson and Edwards picked up a first down on the 25, but on the next series the Owls were unable to pick up enough yardage to offset a quarterback sack, and the ball went over on downs with 2:47 remaining on the clock.

On Miami's third down, the Warriors fumbled and Henderson recovered at midfield, Minyard handed off to Edwards who passed to Frizzell for a first down on the Miami five, then on the next play Henderson carried the touchdown with 1:01 remaining in the period. There was no PAT and the Owls had moved to a 12-0 lead.

On third down after the Owls had kicked off to the Warriors, Brunson recovered a Miami fumble but this was the last play of the first half.

The Owls came back and kicked off to the Warriors who ran three plays for a net loss of 14 yards, and on fourth down Rowell took the Miami punt all the way for another Silverton touchdown with 7:40 still to be played in the third quarter. The PAT pass from Edwards to Lowrey was complete but short of the goal, and the Owls led 18-0.

On Miami's next series, the Warriors fumbled and recovered

their own fumble three times in a row, and they punted to the Silverton 37. The teams ran three plays and punted to the other a couple of times, then the Owls took possession on their own 35 and cranked up the offense again. Runs by Brunson, Henderson and Edwards moved the ball for a first down on the Miami 13. Henderson picked up seven yards on first down, and Minyard passed to Bryan Ramsey complete for a touchdown with 46 seconds remaining in the third quarter. The PAT kick was blocked, and the Owls held a 24-0 lead.

Miami ran three plays, netting no yardage, and punted to the Silverton 10. On first down, Minyard passed complete to Ramsey for a five-yard pickup, and went to Frizzell for a first down on the Silverton 26. Then Minyard went back to Ramsey and passed complete for a first down on the Miami 15. Edwards carried to the four, and Brunson carried the touchdown with 6:37 remaining in the game. Henderson kicked the PAT, and the Owls had moved ahead 32-0.

Miami ran three plays and defense by Frizzell and Lowrey held them to a six-yard gain. They punted, Silverton fumbled, and Lowrey recovered for the Owls. A pass from Minyard to Denny Hill moved the ball into the end zone, and with Henderson's PAT kick, the Owls had moved into the final 40-0 score with 3:54 still to be played.

The Warriors were held on their next series with good defense by Brunson, Frizzell and Lowrey and the ball went over on downs at the Miami 39. Runs by Rowell and Brian Martin picked up a first down on the Miami 20, and then the two combined talents for another first down before the game ended.

Stats showed Silverton to have 11 first downs as compared with none for Miami. The Owls were credited with 150 yards rushing and 202 yards passing for a total offense of 352 yards, while Miami had eight yards rushing and seven yards passing for a total offense of 15 yards. The Owls completed seven of ten passes and had none intercepted, while the Warriors completed one of two passes.

Clay Mercer, a former Owl player who goes to school at Miami now, was the big man defensively for the Warriors.

The Owls will be traveling to Groom for a 7:30 p.m. kickoff Friday, and of course need your support at the game. Other district action will see Higgins at Lefors and McLean at Miami.

The Warriors wasted little time getting on the board, carried the PAT, and with 2:02 remaining in the first quarter, they led 7-0.

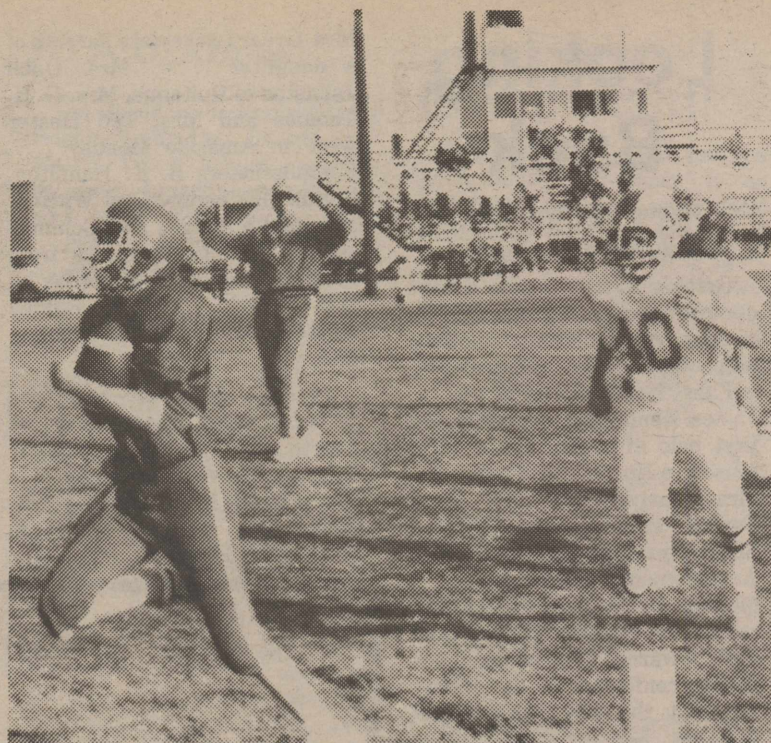

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# Debbie Holt Will Direct Spelling Bee

For the 41st year West Texas State University in Canyon and the Amarillo Globe-News will again sponsor the National Spelling Bee for young students in the area. Named as director for Briscoe County is Debbie Holt, Silverton Elementary School.

The director will coordinate the Bee program with the private and public schools and select a date for the county competition.

The Amarillo Globe-News requests that each county finalist be named by March 18, 1989.

The Scripps Howard National Spelling Bee rules allow any student who will not be in a grade higher than the eighth or older than 16 by the end of the current school term to enter the contest.

Additional information is available from the county bee director.

There are two levels of competition.

A Junior Bee is for students in the fifth and lower grades.

In previous years the Junior Bee included the sixth grade students, but with the middle school concept, the sixth graders are now to be included in the Senior level, which also includes grades seven and eight.

The Junior Bee primarily serves as an introduction to the program.

Junior county winners do not compete in regional unless they win the Senior county title.

In some cases directors combine the two levels of competition and choose only one county champion.

Each Senior winner will compete in the AGN-WTSU area contest on the university's campus on April 15, and the top winner in that event will be given an all-expense paid trip to Washington, D. C. for the speller to represent the district in the 1989 national contest. The trip is for two, courtesy of the Amarillo newspaper.

The Junior winner and Senior winner from each county will be guests of the sponsors at a Bee luncheon in Canyon preceding the afternoon competition. There will be special awards for all finalists.

Gene Parker, director of placement at WTSU, serves as bee coordinator.

"This is a tremendous program," Parker said, "and I encourage all schools in our area to make the program available to our students. We are pleased to be a part of this educational program."

Copies of the study book, "Words of the Champions," are

available from Jeane Bartlett, bee editor of the Amarillo Globe-News, at 50-cents each. This word list is used in most school eliminations and contains more than 3,000 words.

### Jewelry "Bargains" and "Discounts"

Jewelry is the gift of "lasting beauty," but if you are susceptible to the mail-order and discount promotions, commercials, street peddlers, and even some "friend" offering glittery "bargains" that sound tempting, your enjoyment and the jewelry may tarnish sooner than you expected.

#### 14K "Layered" Gold

"Layered" gold or "gold kote" means that there is only a very thin coat of gold bonded to a base metal, and this thin layer will probably wear off shortly with use. When buying gold jewelry, always look for a karat mark such as 10K, 14K, and 18K, with a manufacturer's trademark. Make sure the mark appears on a part of the chain besides the clasp. Sometimes, if only the clasp is marked 14K, the chain may not be real gold. Anything less than 10K cannot be legally marked or sold as real gold. Layered gold jewelry cannot have a karat mark unless it is qualified "14K gold-filled" or "14K gold electroplated."

## Greesons Livestock Remains Formidable Fair Competition

"Our kids get a lot out of 4-H," emphasizes Martha Greeson, the former Martha Mills who is a graduate of Silverton High School. She and her husband, Maynard, have three boys who are enthusiastic livestock exhibitors and have enjoyed considerable success at Stevens County Fairs and other exhibitions.

Chad Greeson, 14, has been in 4-H seven years with his specialties of sheep, beef and rocketry projects. Clay, 13, has six years experience and his interests include sheep, beef and rocketry. Wade, 9, is a swine exhibitor. All three belong to the Moscow Country Club. This organization is a new type of club structure being promoted by the state to concentrate on livestock projects. The first meeting of the club took place last November and includes 24 members from across the county who are particularly interested in livestock projects. Other specialty clubs can be organized as well.

The animals the Greesons exhibit come from their own sheep flock. "All sheep they show are from their own eyes," explains Martha.

Maynard adds, "That makes it a lot more interesting."

They started with four or five ewes. Now they have 40 ewes

with 20 replacement ewe lambs. "The kids are getting started where they can sell club lambs," Maynard says. They have sold some to Haskell County 4-H'ers and anticipate selling to others in the future. Also each of the boys has a heifer and Chad has a calf.

This year's Greeson lineup for the fair will be two or three sheep for Chad which will include two crossbreds and one Hampshire. Clay is preparing three or four lambs and two steers for his effort. Wade is grooming three pigs and a rocketry entry.

Wade is almost a loner with his swine interest, Martha admits. "He doesn't get much support—you have to really like it." He and his father bought a gilt to raise his own pigs.

In their short experience in 4-H the boys have achieved some remarkable honors. Chad has earned four grand championships and one reserve championship. Clay has achieved five grand championships and one reserve championship. Wade is starting out with one each.

Maynard stops to reflect a moment when he's asked what's the secret to livestock success at the fair. Is it selecting the best animal? He replied, "That's part of it, but not all of it. There's feeding—a big part of it." He

adds timing, conditioning and grooming to the list of requirements.

Stevens County Fair isn't the only event the Greesons have on their calendar. They are preparing some animals to compete at the state fair.

There's the "Jackpot" competition in Garden City. The system there involves an entry fee. The winners in the judging share in the resulting prize money. Also, the Kansas Classic occurs early in the year for sheep exhibitors. The purpose of this show is to identify the animal with the best potential to do well in fall judging. Sheep 90 pounds and under are limited for this judging. Chad Greeson won the grand champion at the Classic this year.

Another interesting competition the boys have enjoyed involves grooming and showmanship. The entrant has one hour to completely shear and groom his animal for judging. Then he is judged on showmanship. When asked if they felt this was enough time, they admitted they could have used more. "We were awful busy," remarked one of the boys.

Also, there is the American Royal and the National Western competition in Denver. Chad's personal ambition is to win grand champion at the state fair. Clay

has his sights set on the National Western.

Maynard comments that "the thing that hurts kids in Kansas the most is that the state fair doesn't have a livestock sale." He points with pride to the Stevens County Livestock Sale which traditionally gives very good support to the 4-H'ers. "The reason the program is so good is our extension agent (Gary Gold) and the support we get from the community. We have one of the best programs in the state! We get a good price at the sale." That's one of the drawbacks of competing at the state level after the county fair; they could have gotten more money for their animals at the Stevens County Fair, he points out.

All this competition and work has brought some benefits to the family. "I think Kansas is real fortunate to have such competition," asserts Mr. Greeson. He maintains that there is good sportsmanship at all levels. At the national level the Greeson boys get to meet a lot of good

kids, he says. Some of these friends the Greesons get to see only once a year at the state fair. They all know who is going to show up year after year.

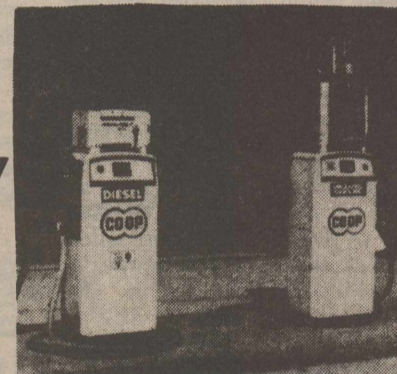

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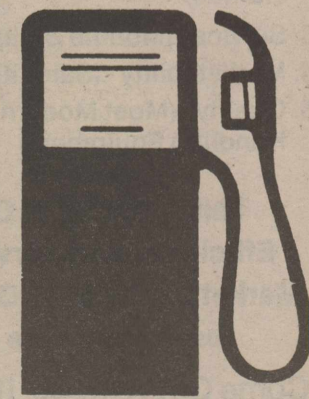
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## Rural Domestic Well Water Quality Important For Health

Bird droppings, burrowing rodents, and septic tank scum which find their way into ground water represent a few of the ways in which rural water supplies can become contaminated. The High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 field support section assists rural residents in clearing up their water supply contamination problems.

The Water District samples domestic well water for possible contamination upon request by residents within its boundaries. With a bacteriological water sampling test, fecal coliform from the intestines of a warm-blooded animal can be detected. This is the most common source of well contamination problems, according to Dan Seale, engineer technician in the District's Field Support Section.

Water samples are placed on a media pad in a petri dish and are allowed to incubate 24 hours at 104° F.

"When a test comes back positive, our first priority is to notify the people to stop drinking the contaminated water and to switch to an alternate source, such as bottled water. We then try to locate the contamination source and make recommendations on how to solve the problem," Seale says.

Among the District staff's major recommendations are proper attention to well sites. "We encourage people to keep their well houses clean and to make sure their wells are properly covered. Even the smallest rodent hole could provide contaminants an access to the water supply," Seale says.

Chlorination of the entire water distribution system usual-

ly clears up the wells and makes them safe for human use again; however, if the pollution source still exists, the well will become contaminated again. Wells which have tested positive for fecal coliform should be re-sampled within six months after chlorination to ensure their continued safety for human use.

The final application will be submitted to the Texas Department of Commerce by October 27, 1988.

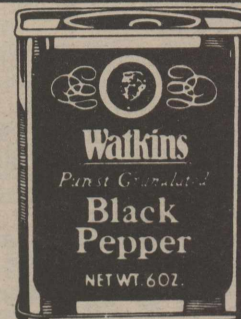
