## Dumpground Violations Discussed At City Council Meeting

The Silverton City Council discussed dumpground violations at their meeting on January 9, at which Mayor A. R. Martin, Councilmen Lynn Frizzell, Dwain Henderson, Flute Hutsell and Secretary Jerry Patton were present. Councilmen John Bowman and Jim Estes were absent.

Mayor Martin reported on a meeting held January 4 and attended by Linda Wyatt and Michael Graeber of the Texas Department of Health, City Council members and County Commissioners, during which violations at the dumpground were discussed. After a discussion as to what needs to be done to correct the violations, the Council drafted a letter to the Health Department outlining

three proposed corrections. They are:

1. Control dumping by blocking access to the cliff edge, by September 1, 1989.

2. Cover waste in ravine by January 1, 1994.

3. Mark boundaries of site by March 1, 1989.

The Council discussed the city's pending grant application for a new landfill site and other alternatives to closing the present dumpground.

The Council appointed James Edwards as Municipal Court Judge.

Secretary Patton reported that the Senior Citizens Organization had requested the Green Thumb Telephone Reassurance worker to vacate their building

in 30 days. The Council instructed the Secretary to contact the organization and request 60 days for the relocation of the Green Thumb worker.

Resolution No. 1-89-A, extending the contract with Briscoe County Appraisal District to assess and collect property taxes for the year 1989 was approved and passed.

Secretary Patton was instructed to survey the City for abandoned and junked vehicles, and to remove the vehicles under City Ordinance No. 255.

The Council instructed the Secretary to advertise for bids for the City vehicle fuel supply. Bids will be opened February 13, 1989.

## TDA Predatory Management Training Set For Silverton

The Texas Department of Agriculture today announced that a Predator Management Training Program will be held at 6:00 p.m. on Thursday, February 9, 1989, at the Briscoe County Show Barn in Silverton.

The session will include instruction on proper identification of causes of predation, alternate methods of predator control and M-44 sodium cyanide applicator certification training.

To continue use of M-44 sodium cyanide, all applicators

certified before April 18, 1988, must take this course and be recertified. The training leading to M-44 sodium cyanide certification is free. Certification also requires a private applicator license, a noncommercial applicator license or a commercial applicator license, to purchase state-limited-use pesticides.

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service is assisting TDA in conducting this training session.

Also, the Extension Service has for sale at \$5.00 per copy, a publication entitled "Procedure for Evaluating Predation on Livestock and Wildlife." Livestock producers concerned with predation problems may purchase a copy of this publication from: Extension Wildlife and Fisheries, Room 11, Negle Hall, Texas A&M University, College Station, Texas 77843.

After attending to regular business last Thursday evening, Silverton's school board amended the budget and renewed the collections contract with the Briscoe County Tax Appraisal District. Other action included extension of the superintendent's contract.

Much to the board's regret, Mike Settle's resignation was accepted. Mike will be joining her husband in Gunter, Texas. Best of luck to Mike and Billy in their new endeavors. An aide will be assigned to the Fifth grade for the remainder of the year to assist instruction since the class is so large.

The board discussed various items on the superintendent's report, including legislative issues, next year's calendar, the gifted/talented program, selling the 1974 Dodge Van and committee reports on curriculum and maintenance.

## Junior Livestock Show Set to go Here January 28

Rules and regulations have been set forth for the 1989 Briscoe County Junior Livestock Show which is to be held the weekend of January 27-28 at the show barn in Silverton.

All exhibits will be under control of the management, but the show will in no case be responsible for any damage that may occur.

All sheep, swine, heifers and steers must be on the show grounds by 6:00 p.m. January 27. Entry fee is \$7.50 per head for sheep and swine and \$10.50 per head for all cattle. January 16 was the deadline for entry, and a late fee of \$2.50 per head will be charged for entries received after that date.

Animals must remain on the grounds until all judging is complete and will be dismissed by superintendents.

All exhibitors must be bona-fide members of active FFA chapters or 4-H clubs in Briscoe County and enrolled in Silverton or Valley Public Schools.

All animals must have been the property of the owner and exhibitor throughout the feeding period. Such feeding period shall have begun before November 1 for sheep, beef heifers and dairy heifers. Ownership deadline for swine is December 1. Ownership date for steers is July 1 in accordance with State Validation

Regulations.

Each exhibitor shall exhibit his or her own animal, and be responsible for its care while on the show grounds, unless granted permission by the show superintendent. If a student is ineligible to show in accordance with House Bill 72, then the animal entered may be exhibited by a substitute showman, if he or she is a bona-fide 4-H or FFA member in Briscoe County and enrolled in Silverton or Valley Public Schools.

There will be no limit on number of animals entered; however, only two total animals will be allowed in premium sale per exhibitor.

There is no minimum class size.

All bedding for the animals will be furnished by the show. Straw is permitted in cattle pens only.

The weight limits, age limits per species, and class break are as follows:

Sheep: Minimum 90 pounds and no top limit for FW, FWX, MEX/X; minimum of 75 pounds and no top limit for Southdowns. Sheep must have milk teeth.

Hogs: No bottom weight and maximum 250 pounds; five pounds tolerance; classes will be broken at discretion of swine superintendent in regard to breaking by breed and/or by

weight.

Steers: 800 pounds minimum weight; no maximum. Must be Texas validated.

Dairy heifers: No weight limit.

Beef heifers: No weight limit; must be 12 to 24 months of age and halter broke; do not have to be registered; no teeth requirement.

There will be a livestock show board of directors meeting at the show barn at 8:00 p.m. Friday, January 27.

## Tracy Tomlin Invited To Participate In Tour to U.S.S.R.

Tracy Tomlin, daughter of Emmett and Sandi Tomlin, has been invited to participate in the first Hugh O'Brian Youth (HOBY) Foundation alumni trip to the Soviet Union June 25 - July 11, 1989.

She was required to submit an essay on what she felt her background would contribute to the trip. Thirty-five Alumni Association members from the

United States were selected for the tour.

The group of 35 (plus five staff and counselors) will depart from New York's Kennedy Airport on June 25 or June 27 at 7:30 p.m. for Helsinki, Finland. They will leave Helsinki immediately for Moscow or will spend two nights in Helsinki before proceeding to Moscow. Once in the Soviet Union, the group will be sponsored by Sputnik, the Soviet youth travel organization. Accommodations will be in Sputnik hotels and/or university dormitories. In addition to Moscow, the group will visit the cities of Yaroslav, Rostov, Vel and Leningrad and a seminar program, HOBY-style, is being arranged. The group will depart from Leningrad for Helsinki on July 10, spend the night in Helsinki and depart for JFK

on July 11. Estimated cost of the trip is \$2,500.00. Each alumni member is responsible for his or her own transportation to and from JFK Airport.

Payment in full of the balance must be received no later than February 15, 1989, along with her valid passport number.

The trip is a package which includes transatlantic airfare, all accommodations and meals in Finland and the Soviet Union, all ground transportation, airfare from Helsinki into and out of the USSR and all programs/sight-seeing.

Amarillo Optimists and local individuals have already pledged their sponsorship and donations to the cost of Tracy's trip. She will be contacting Silverton clubs and businesses to request sponsorship, and in return for the sponsorship she will be happy to speak to groups when she returns.

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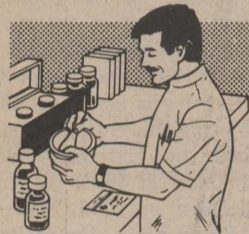

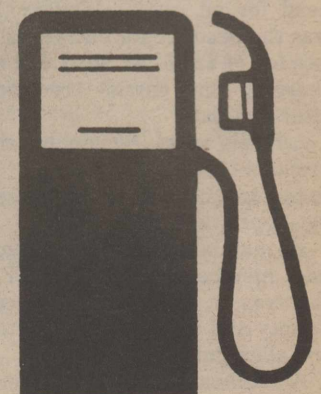

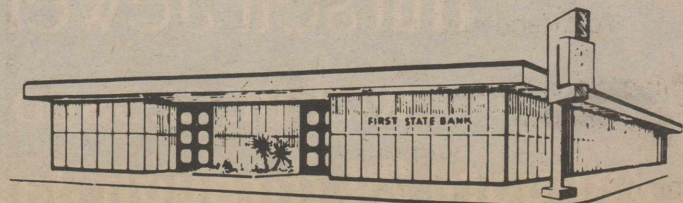

## Ford-Cornett Vows Exchanged Recently

Kay Lynn Ford of Brownfield and Michael Cornett of Lubbock exchanged wedding vows at 3:00 p.m. Saturday, December 3, at the First Baptist Church in Brownfield.

Performing the double-ring ceremony was the Rev. Ken Flowers, pastor.

The bride is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Billy Ray Ford of Brownfield. The groom is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Larry Cornett of Plainview.

The couple were united before a greenery-covered backdrop featuring a heart-shaped candelabra in center with white votive cups and a royal blue bow. A unity candle on the left displayed blue tapers in crystal holders and

a candle ring of white roses.

The Ford family bible on a bookstand was flanked by blue tapers in crystal holders. The pews were marked with royal blue bows.

Given in marriage by her father, the bride wore a white silk organza gown trimmed in Venise and Chantilly lace. The sweetheart neckline was outlined with a row of Venise lace embroidered with seed pearls. The fitted bodice was designed with a basque waistline and the back of the bodice was also embellished with Venise lace appliques over illusion and organza.

Covered buttons extended from the neckline to below the

low-cut waistline in the back. The bodice in both front and back was embroidered with sequins and pearls. The upper part of the sleeves was designed in a full effect, but from just above the elbow to the wrist, they were fitted.

Escorted and given in marriage by her father, the bride wore a gown of white crystalline and satin. It was lavishly embroidered with pearls and iridescent sequins. The Sabrina neckline was edged with embroidered lace, and featured a cascade of pearl strands at the center front of the neckline. 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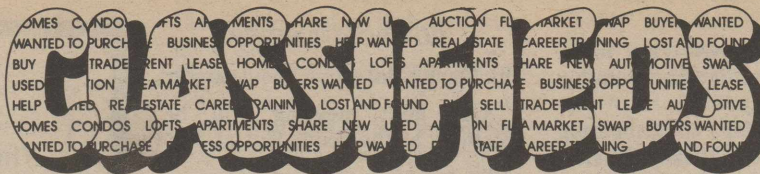
