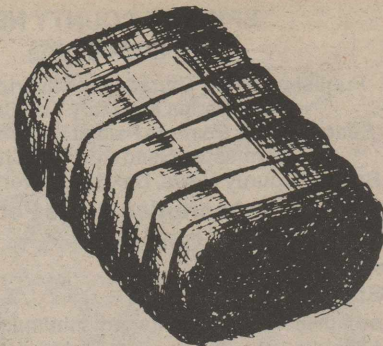

## City Approves Two Documents at Meeting

John Kiehl, representative of the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission, met with the Silverton City Council and presented two sample documents for the city's water project grant. These were "Contractor Locality Section 3 Plan" and "Resolution—Fair Housing" and both were approved and adopted.

Present at the meeting, in addition to Mr. Kiehl, were Mayor A. R. Martin; Councilmen John Bowman, Lynn Frizzell, Dwain Henderson, Flute Hutsell; City Secretary Jerry Patton; City Marshal Bill Boling and

City Judge James Edwards. Absent was Councilman Jim Estes.

David Reagan, one of the city's representatives on the Mackenzie Municipal Water Authority board of directors met with the council to discuss his duties. Reagan presented information in regard to the water supply that now serves Coronado Shores on the lake property. The council requested that Reagan keep them informed on any new proposals of the Water Authority furnishing water to the Coronado Shores side of the lake.

City Marshal Bill Boling and City Judge James Edwards met with the council to discuss violations on which the City Marshal is instructed to issue citations. The following list of violations and amounts of fines was adopted:

## Ordinance.

The secretary reported that the city's landfill grant application was scored eighth out of 40 applications by the regional review committee. The application has been sent to Austin for the final scoring on April 1. The top six applications should receive funding.

Two bids were received for furnishing unleaded fuel for city operations. The bids were opened and read, and the bid of Silverton Oil Company of .7531 per gallon was accepted.

The secretary reported that he had met with the board of directors of the Senior Citizens in regard to the Green Thumb - Telephone Reassurance worker using the Senior Citizens building as her work site. The organization agreed to allow the Green Thumb worker to continue using its building if the city would be her host agency and be responsible for co-signing all time-sheets. The council indicated this would be acceptable if Green Thumb, Inc. approves it.

## Learning Disability Therapist Coming to Silverton on March 11

Steve Shapiro, a special educator and therapist from the Vision Development Center in Tulsa, Oklahoma, will hold a workshop-seminar in Silverton Saturday, March 11, from 9:00 a.m. to 2:30

p.m. in the Pioneer Room at First State Bank.

The center has had wonderful results treating students and adults with reading and learning problems. The program is administered at the center or with an enjoyable home-course. Shapiro's method builds learning skills in the areas of vision, hearing, perception, and coordination. He believes each of these "modes" must be integrated and working together before real learning achievement can occur. This approach is geared toward helping root problems that can cause:

- \*Short attention span
- \*Poor comprehension
- \*Distractibility
- \*Poor handwriting and spelling
- \*Inability to follow directions
- \*Low self image
- \*Dyslexia and more

When underlying root problems have been addressed, struggling students and adults are better able to benefit from tutoring, remedial reading, and other educational procedures for helping children and people achieve their top potential.

Shapiro has held hundreds of seminars around the country and made numerous television appearances. Because this is his first appearance in the Panhandle, KGNC radio has requested an interview with him to be aired live on "Open Line" Thursday morning, March 9. Catch the talk-radio program for an explanation of his method and the upcoming workshop in Silverton.

Pre-registration fees for the workshop are \$25 per family or \$20 per individual and \$25 and \$30 at the door. Pre-registration is appreciated and may be mailed to Cindy Comer, Silverton. ## Bullock is Urging Abolishment of Tax Permit Fee

State Comptroller Bob Bullock is urging the Texas Legislature to abolish the \$25 annual sales tax permit fee.

"The fee is inherently unfair to small businesses," Bullock said in a letter to the House Ways and Means Committee, which is considering several bills to repeal the fee.

Bullock said the fee has generated tremendous hostility at a time "the state can ill-afford to tread on the cooperation and confidence of the business community."

"As someone said about Prohibition, it was a noble experiment that didn't work," Bullock said.

The pyramid on the back of the one dollar bill is left in an unfinished condition to symbolize the quest for a more perfect government and additional states in the Union.

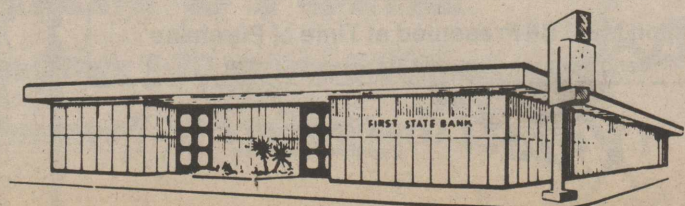

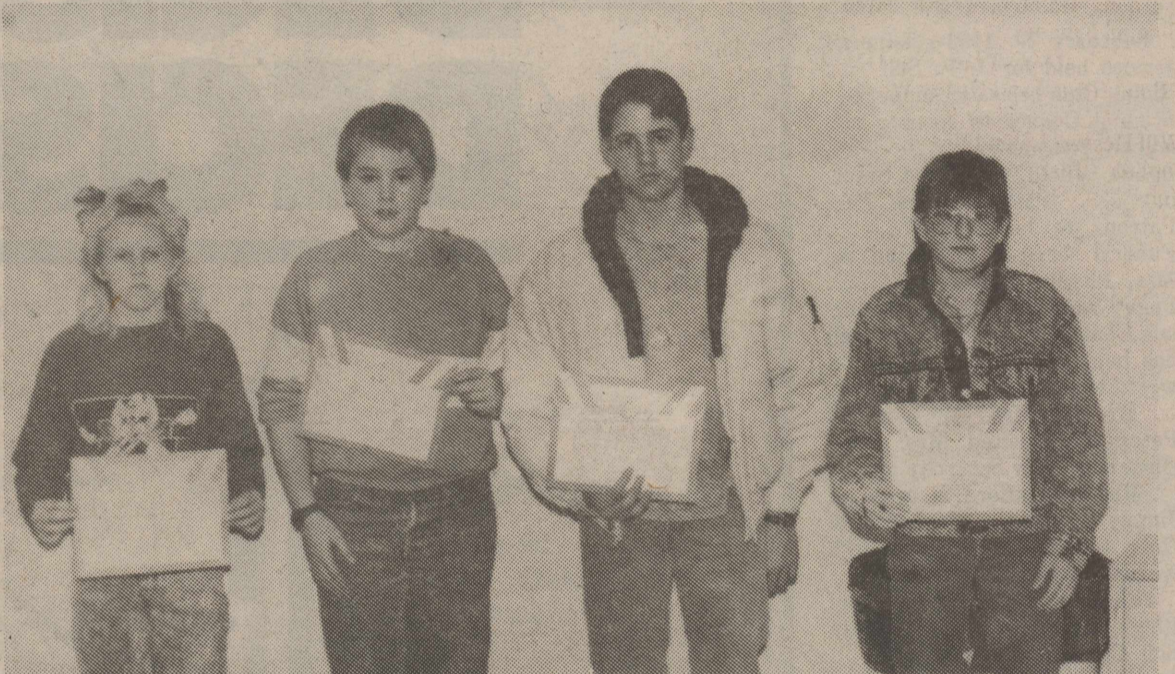
