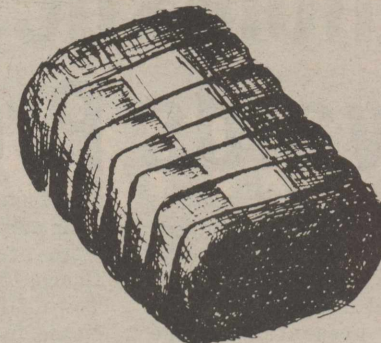
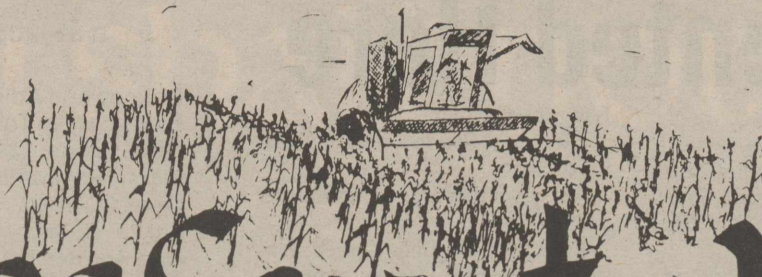


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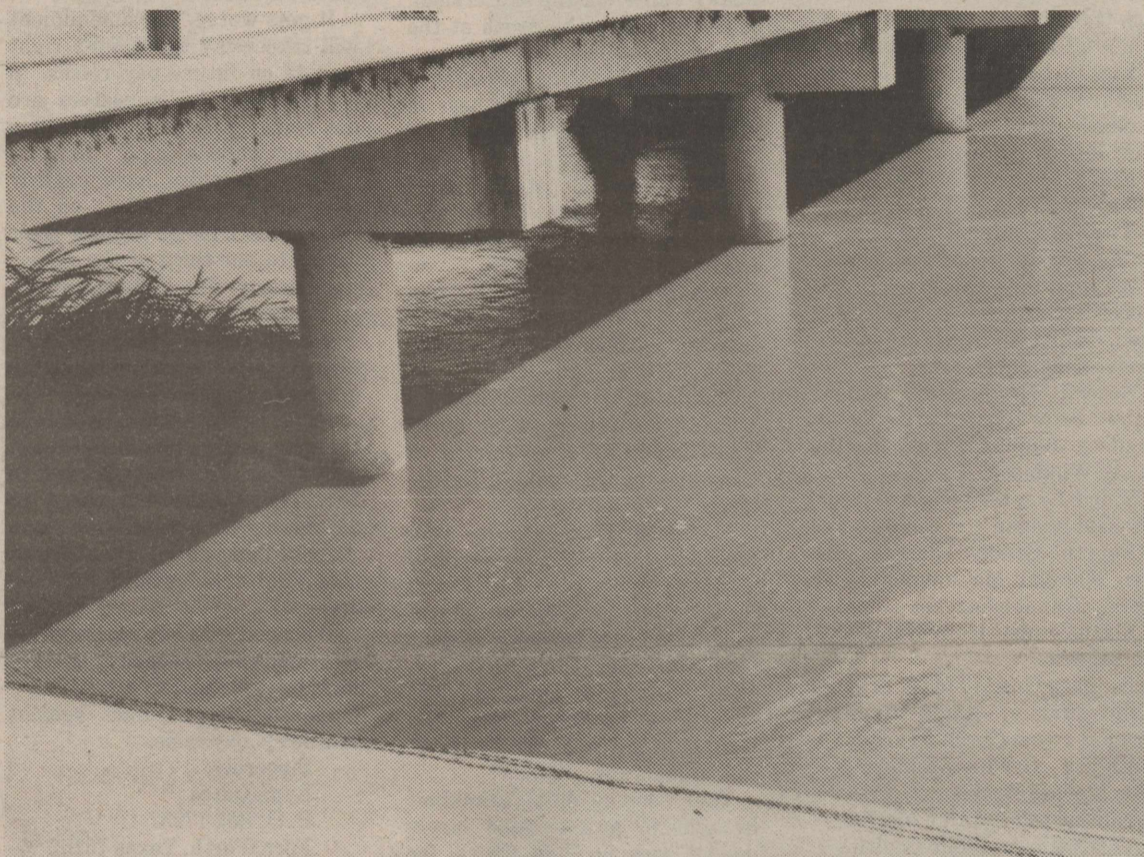

Rains Raise Mackenzie Lake Level



Water was flooding down Tule Creek through the Herring place east of Tulia Sunday morning, and this flow has nothing to halt its progress enroute to Lake Mackenzie. Many highways and farm-to-market roads were underwater in places during the Friday rain storm, including 207, 86, 145, 3300 and 2301.

Heavy rains on the Tule watershed had raised the level of Lake Mackenzie about seven feet as of Tuesday morning, according to Manager John Earl Simpson.

"There is still water coming into the lake," he told the Briscoe

County News, "but it is coming in pretty slow now. This puts the lake back to the size it was in January 1988," Simpson added.

Rains on the lake property amounted to 4¼ inches, with heavier rains having fallen to the west and south of the lake.

In Silverton, about 2½ inches has fallen since last week, with virtually no hail having been received. South and southwest of town hail inflicted considerable damage on crops. Some farmers are hoping they won't have to replant, but others are watching developments with a "wait and see" attitude. It is getting a little late to replant cotton, and alternative crops don't adequately replace what was lost.

Buck Hardin reported receiving 3½ to four inches of rain, while six inches fell on the Rex Holt farm.

Wayne Stephens said his farm at Rock Creek received hail earlier in the crop year, and that he didn't get any more this time around.

Rainfall was very heavy at Quitaque, where some terraces were broken by the floodwaters. A lot of fairly large-sized hail fell in the area, and one person was heard to say that she thought she could have traveled "all the way to Allsup's" in a Fish 'n Pal boat. Some houses reportedly had water inside them as a result of the storm.

Lake Mackenzie Fishing Report

Several large fish have been weighed in at the Cactus Cove Marina at Lake Mackenzie during the past several days. Water is rising at the lake following heavy rains on the watershed, and on Monday the depth at the dam was 109'3".

May 20, a Fat Gitzit brought in a 4½-pound largemouth bass in Tule Creek for David Conditt of Amarillo.

An 8½-pound striper was caught by Bill Glenn of Tulia who was working a Deep Wee-R near the first big island May 26.

May 27, J. T. McCain of Tulia caught a 4½-pound largemouth bass in Williams Creek while fishing with crankbait.

The next day, an 8½-pound hybrid bass was caught in north Tule Creek by Ken Adams of Canyon, who was using a Rattletrap.

Memorial Day, a new lake record striper, all 12¼ pounds of it, was caught on the north bank by the bluff by Joe Sanders of Tulia who was working a charreusse popper.

A 6¼-pound walleye was caught on crankbait near the second island May 31 by J. T. McCain of Tulia.

That same day, crankbait brought in a 2¾-pound largemouth bass in Tule Creek for Wendell Sandefer of Canyon.

June 2, a 5¼-pound channel cat was caught on minnows in Williams Creek by Jason and Eddie McBride of Wayside.

Reports have come to the marina of strings of crappie averaging 3/25 to one pound with 15 to the stringer caught on minnows by Red Jennings of Amarillo; several nice largemouth bass, the largest weighing about three pounds, caught on Rattletrap, and five channel cat, the largest going at about 1½-pounds caught using minnows.

The water temperature at a four-foot depth is 70°.

Our legislators in Austin just passed an amendment giving themselves a 300% pay raise.

This outrageous salary increase will cost us, the taxpayers, \$3.5 million a year, at a time when we can least afford it.

It gets worse. The amendment will take away the voter's right to vote on future pay raises. In my opinion, the legislators are not being financially responsible with our wallets.

Please join the fight against this 300% pay raise.

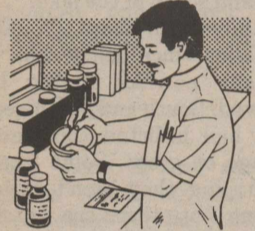

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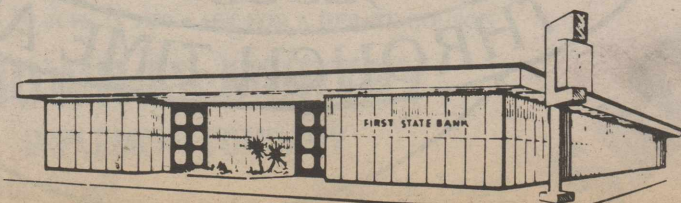

Merida Welch's health failed and in 1947 he died, leaving his widow to rear the children still at home.

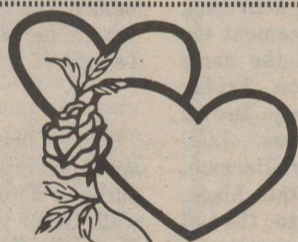
Because her family had shared so many happy times on the farm, she built her new home where she and her husband had planned, and in 1951 the family moved into the newly-constructed home.

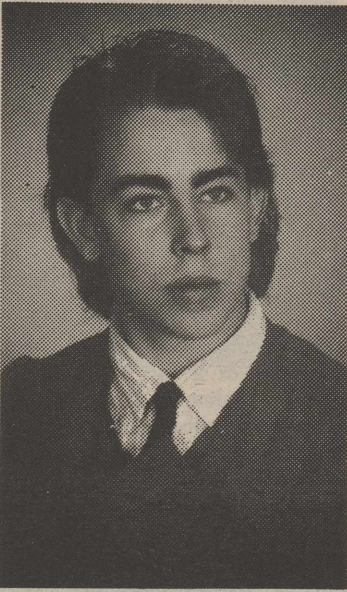

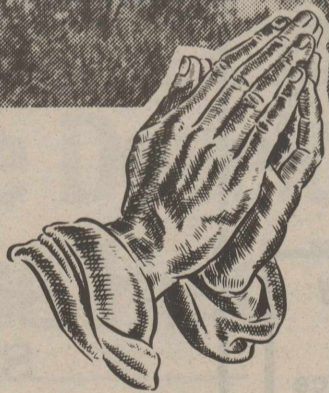

Sheep and shepherds are mentioned more than two hundred times in the Bible. Economically, that reflects the importance of sheep raising as a means of livelihood in Bible times. Religiously, it suggests that men saw in the pastoral scene vivid implications of religious experience.

Probably the best known passage in the Old Testament is the Twenty-third Psalm. Among the most beloved parables of Jesus in the New Testament are the Good Shepherd and the Lost Sheep. In these and many other verses of scripture the shepherd and his sheep are seen as symbols of God and man. Particularly they emphasize God's faithfulness to us and our dependence on God.

Sheep raising is not the heart of our economy today. But discovering our spiritual needs and realizing God's readiness to fulfill them — that is the religious quest to which the Bible continues to call men.

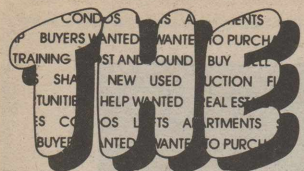

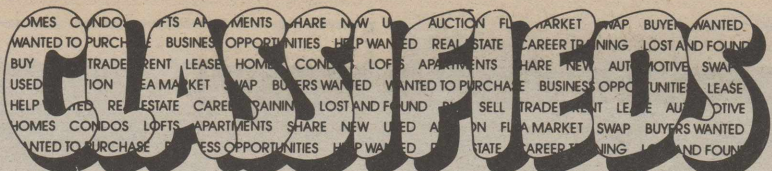
