Owls Do Well in First Scrimmage

Silverton's varsity Owls did fairly well in their scrimmage with Cotton Center here last Friday night, and the Junior Varsity team did pretty good in their scrimmage the night before. Lots of boys are out for the team, but Coach Jack Shely will be the first to tell you that this is a rebuilding year at Silverton.

There are seven starters returning from last year's 9-3 squad.

"We've got the nucleus of our ballclub back, plus we've got some youngsters that played quite a bit last year," Shely said. "The offensive unit will probably be the stronger of the two just because we've got a bit more experience there."

It's not likely the Owls will be

hurting on the defensive side of the ball, but some important positions will have to be filled.

The offensive returnees include end Denny Hill, quarterback Kendal Minyard, end-back Bradley Brunson and end-back Wayne Henderson. The defensive holdovers are end Frank Lowrey, linebacker Brunson and end Henderson.

"We're probably going to make some position changes because we're more experienced on offense than on defense," Shely said. "We're looking at probably moving Denny Hill to an offensive end from center, where he played last year.

"We alternated running backs

—Bradley Brunson and Wayne

Henderson—a year ago—and if

we started today, they'd probably both be in our starting backfield."

With Hill moving to an end, Silverton's starting center could be Rob Weaks or Bryan Breedlove.

Defensively, the Owls likely will have Hill at safety, Minyard and Brunson at linebacking positions, Henderson at a defensive end, and Breedlove in the line.

"We graduated both of our outside linebackers, so that's a big point of concern for us," Shely said. "We're also real hard-pressed to find somebody at safety."

Hill, along with Minyard and Kirk Couch, are the likely starting safety candidates.



This technique involves the injection of healthy immature muscle cells, called myoblasts, into diseased muscle in an effort to produce hybrid muscle cells that display healthy characteristics. The procedure has shown positive results in laboratory mice. "The people of Silverton can take great pride in their contribution to this major research undertaking," said Mrs. Stephens.

Scientists are closer than ever to developing a treatment or cure-if increased public support of MDA's work can be achieved," Mrs. Stephens added.

The association currently sponsors some 500 individual research projects worldwide. It also supports some 230 outpatient clinics nationwide, where people with any of the 40 muscle disorders covered by MDA programs receive medical care, orthopedic aids and related ser-



Asbestos Act Requires School To Conduct Inspections

A federal law called the Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act (AHERA) now requires each school to conduct inspections to determine if asbestos is present in any buildings. If asbestos is found, it is evaluated by a specially trained, certified individual to determine if it poses a hazard. If a hazard does exist, the school must plan specific actions to eliminate the hazard. Procedures must also be adopted to ensure that the condition of nonhazardous asbestos does not change in any way which would create a hazard.

The Silverton Independent School District has concluded an asbestos inspection, and the administration is able to tell you that asbestos was found in the following buildings: Silverton Elementary, Silverton Cafeteria and Home Ec. and Silverton Junior High. The form and condition of this asbestos indicate that it is not hazardous, but special operations and maintenance procedures will be used to ensure this remains true. Periodic surveillance and reinspection by certified personnel will be used to verify that the material remains nonhazardous. Asbestos with some hazard potential was found in the following buildings: Silverton Field House, Silverton

High School and Silverton Gymnasium. The district has adopted a specific plan and timetable for implementation to eliminate any possible hazard.

The inspection information and the plan for dealing with any potential hazard that may exist are all detailed in our asbestos management plan, prepared by the Texas Association of School Boards. This document is available for your inspection at Silverton ISD, Office of Superintendent of Schools, Silverton, Texas. If you have questions about the plan, you may contact David Cavitt, Superintendent, Silverton ISD.

The introduction to the management plan provides a good overview of asbestos and the circumstances under which it can be a hazard. The administration hopes you will take time to read it so you will better understand some of the procedures you may see in use in district buildings. The regulations governing asbestos are very stringent. The school is required to use some of these procedures to reduce to an absolute minimum even the remotest possibility of asbestos contamination. Such procedures, however, together with the management plan, are evidence that the district intends to fully comply with all federal and state asbestos requirements and that your school board and administrators have no greater priority than the health and welfare of the students and staff members entrusted to their care.

CROP REPORT

Cultural Practices For

TRITICALE

FOR WEST TEXAS, OKLAHOMA, KANSAS
AND SURROUNDING AREAS

Being a cross of wheat and rye, Triticale can be handled almost the same as these crops with good results. However, there are some differences that top managers should be aware of to maximize forage production.

1. Fertilizer: Triticale uses nutrients in approximately the same ratio as wheat. It appears to be at least as efficient as wheat, but it is more sensitive to fertilizer imbalance. Test the soil to be sure the correct amount of each nutrient is available. Since Triticale produces more forage than wheat, higher fertilizer rates are recommended. Generally, it is economical to use 25% more fertilizer than for wheat. Split applications of nitrogen are recommended.

2. Grazing: In the fall, do not let the Triticale get too lush before starting the grazing. Measure the leaves, and start grazing before they are eighteen inches long. Do not over-graze. Using a <u>rotational grazing system</u> will increase the amount of beef per acre by using <u>20%</u>, and reduce the danger of "wheat-pasture poisoning". In the spring, let the Triticale get lush, but not jointed, before adding extra cattle. This also increases the total beef gain, and decreases the danger of grass tetany. Generally, use a 20% higher stocking rate than with wheat.

3. Forage Triticales usually do not produce high grain yields. Triticale hay will return more cash dollars in most years than selling seed to your neighbor. Most Triticale varieties are protected under the Plant Variety Protection Act. Trit I & Trit II brands are blends of several varieties of Triticale.

4. Adding legumes to the Triticale is an excellent idea.

5. Handle your cattle mineral program just as you would with wheat.

6. Planting dates and rates: Handle like wheat on land preparation and depth of seeding. Plant the same pounds of seed per acre as wheat, but remember, Triticale has a <u>larger seed than wheat</u>, and you <u>must open the drill 25% wider</u> to plant the same amount of seed per acre as wheat. It is best to plant 2 weeks earlier than wheat, and you can plant as early as August 10th. <u>On intermediate varieties</u> like A208W (spring x winter crosses), <u>delay planting until September 20th</u> to reduce the chances of winter kill. Planting in moist soil is better than dry planting. When fall grazing is not important, Triticale can be planted until mid-December. True winter varieties planted after September 20th may not out-grow wheat until the following spring.

7. For hay, be sure to cut the crop in the boot stage. This makes an excellent hay to feed stressed
