Naval Action Gives American Public More Assurance That Their Navy Is Active In The Great Battle Of The Pacific

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The Navy said late Saturday United States submarine had sunk three enemy mer-

ships brought the American attack almost to the heart of the Nipponese Empire. Tokyo Bay, on which are situated the great cities of Tokyo and Yokohama, is about 3,375 miles from Honolulu and some 4,260 miles from Seattle.

Navy Is Active The submarine which thus struck so successfully gave the American public further assurance that the Navy is active. The Navy Friday reported a bag of three transports and two cargo vessels in the Western Pacific area and the day before that told of sinking a fast, modern 17,000-ton liner which the enemy may have converted into

an aircraft carrier or transport.

The Navy used only the phrase 'Off Tokyo Bay" to give the location of the submarine's three-ply victory. However, in Navy parlance, "off" is prefixed to the nearest port and in this instance the action must have been quite close to the bay as there are many ports scattered up and down the Japanese Islands. When the emergency comes, you can read: Keep cool, stay home, turn off gas, leave busses, autos, cars, know your air raid alarm avoid top and bottom floors, cover all windows with black cloth, keep flashlights and candles handy, spray incendiary bombs, never splash them, wait until air warden gives all clear signal, kep pails of water handy for fire department, turn out all lights, pull down all shades, ignore all rumors and gossip, stay away from all windows, lie down when bombs fall, keep your radio going keep your head, avoid panic, walk, don't run, keep cool.

Trade Classes To Be Held Monahans Wickett Schools

MONAHANS (Special) -- Three extension courses in trades and industries will be started in the Monahans-Wickett school system January 26 under sponsorship of the government, Supt. M. L. H. Baze has announced.

A course in blueprint reading will be taught at the Monahans high school by Arthur Williamson. It is open to all members of the building trades and petroleum industries and to lumber yard employes.

Production practice, under the direction of W. S. Van Eman, will be the subject of a course open to men engaged in oil field production, to be given at the Wickett school building. The third course, on oil field science, will also be held at the Wickett school with R. C. Ryle

Three-fourths of the cost of the courses will be paid by the govern-ment, the remainder to be paid by the student or the company which employs him.

Precautions About Handling NATURAL GAS

In Case Of Air-Raid Alarms!

Natural gas is the safest fuel you could be using during an air raid. BUT, the HANDLING of natural gas is a technical matter, requiring the services of trained men who know how to avoid the hazards involved.

It is therefore extremely important that everyone should study and follow the carefully prepared instructions relating to the handling of natural gas during air raid alarms. If these instructions are not followed, serious consequences may result. Untrained persons should not attempt to turn gas off and on at the meters.

Following are the official instructions which have been approved and adopted by local Office of Civilian Defense. They are simple. Read them carefully. Discuss them in the family circle so all will understand. Cut them out and post them where all can see them. Above all, follow them!

In Case Of An Air-Raid Alarm:

- Make no attempt to shut off the gas at the meter.
- Simply turn off all burners which you customarily turn on and off. Do not turn off pilot lights.
- Only in case the house or building is badly damaged should the gas be turned off at the meter.
- If, for any reason, the gas is turned off at the meter, do not turn it on again yourself. Call for a trained man.
