Churchill Wins Vote Confidence For War Conduct

Says United States Is Determined To Meet German Foes

LONDON - (AP) - TheHouse of Commons, with but one dissenting vote, expressed confidence Thursday in the conduct of the war by Prime Minister Churchill after he told them the United States was determined to close with the German foe as soon as possible.

The vote was 464 to one. The presence of an AEF on soil of the United Kingdom-in Northern Ireland-represents the desire of the United States that her ready troops should establish battle con-

tact as soon as feasible, the Prime Minister said. In a 42-minute summation for his government, Churchill also indicated appointment of a British coun-terpart to the United States' chief of war production, Donald M. Nelson, and disclosed that Singapore had been steadily reinforced for a fight to the finish.

Sweeping new gains by Russia's armies were reported Thursday as word circulated in London that Adolf Hitler, who five weeks ago ousted Field Marshal Gen. Walther Von Brauchitsch and assumed supreme command of the German Army, had reached a compromise with his generals because he was "unable to carry on without the aid of experienced strategists."

In ousting Von Brauchitsch, a few days before Christmas, Hitler de-clared his "intuitions" had led him 'to reserve to himself personally all essential decisions" in directing the war

Handles Bombs For Practice; Picks Up **Duds From Targets**

To the experienced soldler the best indication that Sloan Field will undoubtedly be the largest bombardier training base in the United States Army, is the fact that it is the station of the largest Ordnance Company in the Army. At most air fields Ordnance work is taken care of by a small detachment, seldom by an entire company.

The Ordnance Department is the branch of the Army that is entrust-ed with the designing, procurement, servicing and issuance of all the weapons of warfare used by the armed forces. Although, numerically speaking, it is one of the smallest branches of the Army, Ordnance operates one of the largest school in the Army to train it's personnel in the highly technical work that it does. The school is located at Aberdeen, Maryland. The 437th Ordnance Company (Aviation), the Sloan Field company, has many graduates of the Aberdeen school.


Captain Kennetn A. Mack, com-mander of the 437th, is a graduate of the Ordnance Officers School and before coming to Sloan Field assisted in the forming of the Elling Field Ordnance Company and Ordnance set-up at that station.

At Sioan the Ordnance Company principal duty is the loading and delivery to the Air Corps of the thousands of practice bombs that will be dropped by the bombardier cadets. tional defense subjects. President Harvey W. Cox of the Atlanta school has issued an open letter to the 1,500 students and 27 faculty members on "Emory's part in the war'

He announced that for the duration of the war, the Emory facwill go on a 12-month schedule. In every division of the university, including medicine, the summer quarter will be the same as any other semester, to enable students to complete a four-year course in three years.

Among special courses which will be offered are first aid and fire protection ;elements of radio circuit construction; glass blowing and ballistics; geography, public opinion and propaganda; Portu-guese and Latin American relations




