

# Air Force Two Million Men

## Stimson Announces Program To Give U.S. Air Superiority

WASHINGTON (P)--a two-million man air force—the world's largest—was announced Saturday as the Army's eventual objective with half tnat number to be mustered before tne end of the year.

This tremendous program, aimed at giving the United States crushing air superiority over all its enemies, was disclosed by Secretary of War Stimson who, before Pearl Harbor, had set a goal of 400,000 men in the Air Force by June 30.

It compares with a reported strength of 1,000,000 to 1,250,000 in the Nazi Luttwatte and of about 1,000,000 in the British RAF. It is, too, more men than the Army nad in all branches at the outbreak of the war.

The war secretary did not break down his over-all 2,000,000 figure into categories of pilots, mechanics, etc. It is known, however, that the original goal of a 400,000-man force alled for training of 30,000 pilots ear. Presumably, this training program eventually will be quadrupled







the registrant to list his place of residence. In the event that he has more than one place, he is required to list his own choice as his place of residence.

In addition, the registration card will have space for recording a mail address. This may be the same as the place of residence or it may be another address where the registrant will receive his mail more

Selective Service Regulations also require each registrant to describe the place of his residence so that its location may be determined from its description. A registrant who lives on an R. F. D. route will be required to supplement his mailing address by a description of the location of his residence.
