Take your purchases home yourself, instead of asking for delivery service, whenever you can. Save boxes and paper of all kinds—they can be reclaimed and put to further use.





In conjunction with yesterday's article, we see that in opening against a suit contract from a holding topped by the ace, the correct load is the ace, if the king is lacking, or the king from both henors. The general rule is, "Do not underlead an ace against a suit bid." While experienced players sometimes depart from this rule, the exception is justifiable only in certain very special bid-

The lead of a king against any contract shows that the leader also

holds the ace or queen or both.

Against no trump, as a rule, an honor is led only from a holding of at least three honors, with at least two of them in sequence. The lead from holding No. 25 is founded on the standard king lead from king-queen-ten. This holding is like king-queen-ten, "stepped down"

Against a suit, an honor may be led (not always) from a sequence of only two. Note especially holding No. 18.

It used to be standard practice lead an honor from any sequence of two against a suit contract, that is, the king from kingqueen-deuce, the queen from holding No. 26. But modern practice inclines to the low-card lead in the latter case.

With no sequence at all at the top of a suit, the normal correctlead is the fourth highest.






