

"Economic resources will mean the final decision," said the Journal of the Red Army, "Soviet Russia, Britain and the United States are producing 28 times as much gasoline as Germany together with her vassals and occupied lands."

Baby Crop Hit Record In 1941

WASHINGTON (A)—The Census Bureau Friday acclaimed the 1941 crop of American babies as the largest in two decades.

The births numbered about 2,500,-

000 and were second only to the 2,-600,000 record set in 1921. One reason for last year's big crop was the fact, the bureau said, that a large number of the record 1921 babies themselves were married and producing children last

The draft, which helped boost marriages to a record of 1,565,000, also may have had something to do with it. Marriages have been so unusually numerous the last couple of years, in fact, that the bureau predicted another big crop of babies this year, "even if large numbers of married men are inducted into the armed forces."

In 1921 there were many babies because the AEF had just come home from France and was busy reestablishing family life

The baby crop was so big last year that it exceeded deaths by 1,090,000, thus increasing the nation's popula-tion by an amount approximately equal to the population of the state of Oregon.

The bureau added that experts could not agree on whether the re-cent increase in the American birth ate—now 18.8 per 1,000 population -was temporary or represented a long time trend.
