To Relieve Embattled Hero es; Many Relief Supplies Were Lost; Had No Support ing Air Force To Protect By Roger D. Greene **Associated Press War Editor** Secretary of War Stimson announced Thursday that American-Filipino defenders of Bataan numbered 36,853 troops when their resistance apparently collapsed after three months of bloody conflict against Japan's invasion armies.

Stimson indicated that the bulk of this force had either been killed or captured.

Stimson Reveals That Herculean Efforts Were Made

The War Secretary also disclosed President Roosevelt has authorized the American commander in the Philippines to make any decision he deemed necessary in the light of events.

"This is only a temporary loss," Stimson said. "We shall not stop until we drive out the invaders from the islands."

Stimson's report on the end of America's heroic chapter of Bataan followed a War Department bulletin announcing that wave after wave of Japanese shock troops had engulfed the battle-exhausted defenders east

Stimson said the figure of 36,853 effectives was in the report received yesterday from General Wainwright. He stressed that this figure included only the men fighting on Bataan at that time.

The Pacific War Picture Today

Major developments crowd the Far Pacific war picture:

1. The Berlin radio, quoting Tokyo dispatches, reported that Japanese sea-borne troops supported by cruisers and destroyers had landed north of Akyab, Burmese port on the Bay of Bengal, and had advanced within 30 miles of the Indian frontier.

2. London Naval reporters said the "biggest naval battle in all history seems about to blaze up in the Bay of Bengal between the Japanese and British fleets."

In this connection, it was recalled that Axis reports last week declared powerful British naval forces had been sighted speeding around the Cape of Good Hope en route to the Indian Ocean and the Bay of Bengal.

3. Striking at a key British naval base guarding India, Japanese bombers Thursday morning attacked Trincomalee, on the northeast coast of Ceylon, just off the southern tip of India.

Simultaneously, two Japanese planes were sighted over Colombo, the Ceylon capital, where Japan suffered her heaviest aerial defeat of the war in an attack Easter Sunday.

4. New Delhi dispatches reported a rising note of optimism in the critical negotiations to mobilize India's 390,000,000 on the side of the United Nations.

Latest reports said a general understanding was as good as reached on the main issues between the dominant All-India Congress party, the voice of India's 270,000,000 Hindus, and Sir Stafford Cripps, British special envoy.

5. On the Burma war front, Chinese troops holding the eastern flank of the Allied line were reported locked in heavy battle with Japanese invasion forces on the highway between Toungoo and Mauchi.

On the British-defended western flank, Japanese reinforcements wre said to be moving up for a new assault.

The British have already been thrown back to a line only 65. miles below the rich central Burma oil fields, chief source of China's oil supplies.

6. Fierce air-sea battles in the Indian Ocean were indicated by Imperial Tokyo headquarters, which asserted that Japanese forces had sunk two British cruisrs and 21 Allied merchant ships there up to last Tuesday.

Tokyo said 23 other ships had been badly damaged.

A London Admiralty communique acknowledged the sinking of the 1,100 of the crews normally totalling 1,330 men, were rescued.



Oil War Council Asks Rubber For **Civil Use Made**

WASHINGTON (AP)-The Petroleum Industry War Council urged the government Thursday to permit the production of at least 300,-000 tons of synthetic rubber annually for civilian use. A committee representing industry

immediately began to study the problem of making synthetic rubber, especially butyl rubber, "with a view of determining its practicability in meeting the tire shortage." The council adopted a resolution Wednesday urging that federal agencies take immediate steps to provide the money and allocate the construction materials necessary to provide a minimum of 300,000 tons of synthetic rubber for civilian use, over and above the 700,000 tons already planned for military and other necessary purposes.

Family Pools Sugar To Make Cake For **Special Treat**

By Mrs. Gaynor Maddox NEA Service Staff Writer Let each member of the family contribute part of his weekly sugar allowance to one gala springtime cake. Then call it a family feast.

ORANGE COCONUT CAKE Two cups sifted cake flour. 2 teaspoons double-acting baking powder, 1/4-teaspoon salt, 1 tablespoon grated orange rind, 1/3 cup butter or other shortening, 1 cup sugar, 1 egg, unbeaten; 3/4 cup milk.

Sift flour once, measure, baking powder and salt, and sift together three times. Add orange rind to butter and cream thoroughly; add sugar gradually and cream together until light and fluffy

Add egg and beat very thoroughly. Add flour, alternately with milk, a small amount at a time, beating after each addition until smooth. Bake in two greased 8-inch layer pans in moderate oven (375 degrees F.) 20 to 25 minutes


Spread Sunny Orange Filling between layers, and Orange Snow Frosting on top and sides of cake, spreading sides and one-inch border on top with shredded coconut, spoon grated orange rind. garnishing with orange sections, free from membranes.

SUNNY ORANGE FILLING Four tablespoons sugar, 1 1/2 tablespoons flour, dash of salt, 1 egg yolk, 1/2 cup orange juice, 1 1/2 tablespoons lemon juice, 1 teaspoon grated orange rind, 1 tablespoon butter.

Combine sugar, flour and salt in top of small double boiler; add egg yolk and fruit juice and mix thoroughly. Place over boiling water and cook 10 minutes, or until thickened, stirring constantly. Add or-ange rind and butter. Cool. Makes enough filling to spread between two 8-inch layers.





"Chip Off The Old Block"

Outnumbered 5 to 1, **Exhausted Defenders** Are Overwhelmed

By Roger D. Greene

America's heroic chapter of Bataan in the book of history appeared ended Thursday as a War Department bulletin reported that wave after wave of Japanese shock troops had engulied the battle-exhausted defenders and announced:

'Full details are not available, but this situation indicates the probability that the defenses on Bataan have been overcome."

A communique at 5:15 A.M., Eastern War Time, said Lieut. Gen. Jonathan M. Wainwright had messaged from Fort Mills on Corregidor Island that an attempt to relieve the situation 'failed due to complete exhaustion of he troops.'

The restrictions become effective for wool clothing Thursday-in time to affect production of most of the garments to be sold next fall and winter; restrictions on cotton, rayon and other materials do not become effective until June 19-after most of this summer's clothes are finished.

Russians Smash Nazi River Base

LCNDON (AP)-Soviet forces have smashed across the upper Dnieper River in a furious final drive to pinch off the Vyasma-Ghatsk-Rzhev bulge toward Moscow, Soviet dispatches relayed by Stockholm said Wédnesday.

This crossing, between Dorogdbuzh and Durovo, was a striking achievement, these dispatches said, since the Germans had established vast fortifications along the river.

The Red Army appeared intent upon utilizing the brief period remaining before the spring thaw to crush Nazi armies within the central front sack and to prepare to meet later German offensive from the direction of Smolensk which is 50 miles west of the point where the Dnieper was reported crossed.







Roosevelt, Nelson Disagree On Wisdom Of Wartime Cash Bonus

President Dislikes While Nelson Likes The Cash Bonus Plan

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Roosevelt and his war production chief, Donald M. Nelson, differed openly Wednesday on the wisdom of wartime cash bonuses for workers who set a fast pace in vital arms industries

Nevertheless, there were numerous signs that the hotly debated controversy over wages and hours might be edging nearer a solution despite the continuing surface turmoil

Mr. Roosevelt, while intimating that there might be an announcement on the wage question soon, told his press conference Tuesday that he was utterly opposed to the wartime bonus plan because men in such a national emergency ought to produce all they could. He added he also disapproved bonuses in peace time on a piece-work basis.












