

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

BOSTON (UP)—First of its kind in the nation, Boston's co-ordinated system of compressed air-operated air-raid warning sirens and loud speakers serves as a model for

Operated on a radio principle the siren - speakers can transmit warnings or spoken messages to Boston's 800,000 residents over a system of 21 installation at strategic points throughout the city Work is now being completed to enable a single broadcaster to send messages from a central point over the entire system or over any number of loud speakers desired. Has Auxiliary System

Effective range of siren-speakers is about three-quarters of a mile eac,h although in some instances the signals have been heard above the city noises at greater distances. Costing \$1,500 apiece, the horns are installed in groups of four at some locations while at other sites a single unit has proven adequate.

Completing its comprehensive air-raid alarm system. Boston has created an auxiliary system utilizing about 70 church bells and factory whistles.

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
