Impatient over delays in converting the enormous resources and man-power of our nation into a real all-out effort for victory, Americans are demanding the shelving of politics.

As long as special groups seek and demand special privileges or advantages, more leisure and more wages instead of more production, and as long as the government fails to curb such practices and fails to convert all activities and the economy of the nation to a war basis, there can be no real all-out effort for victory.

From California comes a suggested ten-point program. We may not agree with each proposal but it contains some valuable ideas. The program:

1. Convert government to a war basis: Abandon peacetime politics. Forget the party system; the Republicans, the Democrats, the New Deal, and every other deal. We insist on leaders who are something more than faithful politicians or brilliant scholars. We want fearless and impartial leaders; men with proven business ability to serve as administrators, who are more interested in winning the war than in winning the next election. Cut non-war expenditures to the hone and eliminate all non assential humans and agencies bone and eliminate all non-essential bureaus and agencies. 2. Convert industry to a war basis: All plants capable of producing war material must be converted immediately to that work on a 24-hour days, seven-day week.
