Hazen was the winner of the world championship Masters Individual last year. Richard Frey was one of the original members of The Four Aces.

Frey's psychic club bid helped his team win 920 points on today's hand. The opening lead was won by the ace of diamonds. Crediting Frey (South) with two aces for his opening bid, the declarer played a small heart from dummy and finessed the nine-spot. Frey winning with the ten. A diamond return was ruffed by declarer and dummy entered with a spade. Now another low heart was played from dummy. North played low and declarer decided to play South for a doubleton ace, played low, and the queen won the trick. The third diamond was ruffed. Instead of cashing the spades and conceding the loss of the contract by one trick, Declarer attempted a wild chance on making it. A low club was played in the hope that South had the ace and would refuse to win. But of course North won and cashed two long diamonds, setting the contract three tricks. Had the clubs been attacked before touching trumps, declarer would have found at once that South had made a psychic bid.

U-Boats Now Raise Flag, Want Credit

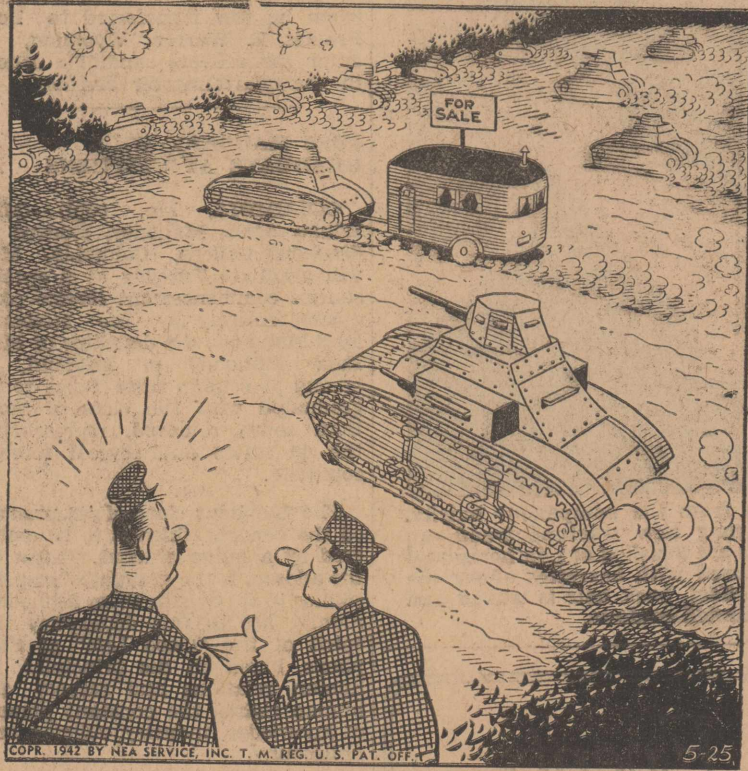
KEY WEST, Fla. (AP)—The hoisting of a Nazi flag by a submarine that torpedoed an American ship indicates that German U-boats want full credit for their marauding, a rescued seaman said Monday.

Leonard Shearer of Newcastle, Pa., third assistant engineer aboard a vessel sunk off Cuba May 18, said that U-boat crewmen raised their flag because "they wanted to be darned sure we knew their identity."

Survivors of several ships have said recently they believed their attackers were Italian U-boats.

A Latvian ship rescued the surviving seaman and brought them to Key West. Captain Charles D. Bryant of Houston, Texas, was among six missing and presumed to be dead.
