## Only Slight Gain In Oil Shown By Millar After Shot

A 45-quart nitro shot from 4,378-92 feet apparently failed to bring about much increase in production in Gulf Oil Corporation and L. H. Wentz L. H. Millar, first Cambrian sand oil well in Texas.

No. 3 Millar, located one-half mile northwest of the discovery producer of the Wentz Ordovician pool in Northeastern Pecos, swabbed 73 barrels of oil through 7-inch casing during the past 24 hours, lowering fluid to bottom of casing. It probably will be completed on pump. Before shot the well swabbed 71 barrels of oil in 24 hours. Total depth is 4,406 feet in schistose.

A short south outpost to the Abell Ordovician field in Northern Pecos, Stanolind Oil & Gas Company No. 1, Sidney Silverman, went out of the Permian into detrital material at 4,880 feet and is drilling ahead at 4,985 feet in lime and shales of the Simpson, middle Ordovician.

Magnolia Petroleum Company No. 1, D. K. Glenn, Southwestern Crane County Ordovician test between the Sand Hills and Abell fields, is drilling at 2,395 feet in lime and anhydrite.

Gulf No. 6-B J. B. Tubb et al, in the Sand Hills pool of Crane, was acidized with 5,000 gallons in Ellenburger, lower Ordovician, dolomite and flowed 137 barrels of new oil in one hour after recovering acid load. Gas volume measured 6,500,000 cubic feet per day. The well topped Ellenburger at 5,613 feet and is bottomed at 5,872 in dolomite.

C. A. Kitsons heirs No. 1 A. B. Burehard, Reeves County wildcat 13 miles northwest of Toyah, has been abandoned at 3,757 feet in sand and shale. It topped Delaware line at 3,594 feet and Delaware sand at 3,547.

Hockley Failure  
Bruce C. McKague of Midland has filed with the proration office application to plug and abandon his No. 1 J. H. Goodpasture, Eastern Hockley County wildcat four miles southeast of Levelland and 11 miles northeast of the Slaughter field. Total depth is 5,202 feet in lime, two feet past contract. The well is reported to have shown some sulphur water in the lime but no test was made. It was drilled by Millhoan Drilling Company of Tulsa.

Texas No. 1 J. Bay Robertson in Southern Gaines County is idle at 2,965 feet in anhydrite after cementing 10 3/4-inch casing at 2,949 feet with 350 sacks.

In Northwestern Andrews County Humble No. 1 Sims et al is changing drillpipe, bottomed at 7,490 feet in Clear Fork line.

Fuhrman Petroleum Corporation of Midland No. 2 M. A. Thornberry, in the Fuhrman West pool of Southern Andrews, flowed a rated 216 barrels of 30.2-gravity oil per day, plus one per cent acid water. It was acidized with 3,000 gallons. Operator called top of pay at 4,355 feet and hole is bottomed at 4,580 in lime. The well's gas-oil ratio is 900.

Atlantic No. 1-A Texu, Southwest Central Andrews 8,700-foot project, is drilling at 6,350 feet in lime. Owner will start to employ Barold well logging service at the 6,400-foot level.

In the Embarras Ellenburger pool of Southern Andrews, discovered by Phillips Petroleum Company, the firm's No. 3 University-Andrews is drilling at 5,267 in lime and its No. 4 University-Andrews at 5,095 in lime.

Magnolia No. 1 Powell, Southeastern Martin County deep test, is drilling at 3,720 feet in anhydrite.

## Stimson Declares Jap Threat Wanes On Pacific Coast

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of War Stimson said Thursday the losses inflicted on the Japanese in the Pacific had temporarily but substantially reduced the threat of an attack on the Pacific Coast which he has repeatedly said might be expected.

War and Navy Department information, he said, that the Japanese thus far had made only a "very small landing" in the Aleutian Islands off Alaska but he stressed that fog and unfavorable weather obscured developments in the North Pacific.

Information is still incomplete, the Secretary also told. His press conference, on the earlier air and sea engagement of Midway.

"But after three days fighting the enemy fleet was scattered all over the Pacific Ocean, hustling away as fast as it could in the opposite direction, without air protection," he stated.

In the Aleutians, Stimson said, the American and Japanese forces thus far had only fleeting glimpses of each other through the eyes of aircraft.

## May Place Rubber Under New Control

WASHINGTON (AP)—The first Congressional threat to Donald M. Nelson's overall control of War Production appeared developing Thursday with drafting of legislation to place direction of the rubber program under and independent agency.

Conceived by a group of Senators seeking production of synthetic rubber and alcohol farm products, the bill would create a powerful "Rubber Supplies Agency," to coordinate activities now directed by separate units under Nelson.

## Rubber Drive Getting Big Results Here

Saturday will be a big day for the rubber salvage campaign, said Pat Ruckman Thursday, after a trip to several adjoining counties, and telephoned reports from others. "There will be more rubber saved than anyone expected," said Ruckman, "for we just never had any idea of the great amount that has been discarded and forgot."

On Saturday all individual filling stations, and the oil company bulk dealers, will get their rubber salvage together and try to add it up, said Ruckman, who is director of the salvage campaign for twelve counties of this area.

"Big Spring is bringing in a very heavy amount, and looks like it will crowd Midland for tops," said Ruckman. "Talked Thursday to Lamesa, Snyder, Colorado City, Odessa and Big Spring, and every one reports that the folks who bring in the rubber, and certainly the filling station men, can hardly believe the eyes. None of them ever guessed the campaign would dig up so much."

Ruckman believes that by the end of the week the nation will have gathered enough scrap rubber to absorb every bit of the nation's capacity of reprocessing. He said reports from all Texas showed a wonderful response.

"But, although we will have all we can reprocess, you have no idea how far that will go," said Ruckman. "You see, that reprocessed rubber will be used to retread tires. That means that the rubber that we are gathering may keep us all rolling for a good year, or more. It surely is a great campaign. Tell the folks that they are doing a wonderful job."

## Armored Forces Fast Developing

DALLAS (AP)—Major Gen. Jacob L. Devers, commanding officer of the Armored Forces, Fort Knox, Ky., said Thursday that an increase in armored divisions of the U. S. Army could be expected right away.

"Such divisions now number eight," he said. "There's plenty coming up," said General Devers, "but any further announcement should come from Washington."

## Perhaps You Saw Him Flying, Last Night, Today General Kuter Of Army Air Forces In Midland To Visit Bombardiers

Go out and take a look into the skies over Midland. There you will see the boys who will be in the headlines of the world tomorrow. There ride the men who will win this war. There fly the men who will preserve your home.

And, if you looked at a bomber driving over-head here Wednesday night, or if you squinted up at one that roared over Thursday morning, perhaps you were seeing a great plane that bore the man who says that the Bombardier will win this war.

For Brigadier General Laurence S. Kuter, Deputy Chief of Staff of the Army Air Forces in Midland from Washington, coming here to see the Midland Army Flying School in operation. But, it appears that he is, actually, starting for a bit of real flying after so many hours at his desk in Washington. For he said "No, not inspection... I'm just here to visit, to see the men, ride with them, to get a pick-up from these great boys. America has a deep interest in the Midland Army Flying School, and well it may, for from here will come the key men from which the nation's striking force will be drawn."

The striking young general is accompanied by Colonel B. E. Gates, Major J. S. Clark, and Captain J. H. Chamberlin, all of Washington staff headquarters. General Kuter is not new to Midland, for he has flown here many times in his routine flights from coast to coast, for "you have such a pleasant city in which to visit that I stop over here whenever I can."

"How do Midland folks like our fine boys?" he questioned. "That's fine, I thought West Texans would take them to their hearts. Those boys are the salt of the earth. They are here in a wonderful flying climate, and getting a training that will make them our victory arm."

## Haynes To Head Drive To Hit Japs In China With Bomber Attacks

Japanese Mass Bombers In Burma, To Attack India; While Chinese Say Japs Plan Blow At Siberia With New Army Of 600,000 Men

A picture of tremendously growing American strength in the Battle of the Pacific, where U. S. airmen have already exacted a 10-to-1 toll in Japanese men and planes, was drawn by Admiral Chester W. Nimitz, Thursday along with a hint that new sledgehammer blows against Japan are in the offing.

"We are greatly increasing our battle strength," Admiral Nimitz declared. "Our ships, planes and pilots are being added in constantly increasing numbers."

Meanwhile, American bombers were preparing to help Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek's hard-driven armies in China.

Announcement that Col. Caleb V. Haynes, of North Carolina, veteran of the Battle of Burma, had been appointed chief of the U. S. Bomber Command in China indicated the new American force soon would go into action.

News Is Dark  
The news from the China fighting front was dark. Chinese headquarters acknowledged that Japan's invasion armies now had seized all except 50 miles of the 450-mile Chekiang-Kiangsi Railway which feeds supplies into the heart of China.

This offensive is an important part of the Japanese campaign to tighten their cordon around the still free regions of Southern China and thereby strangle Gen. Chiang's war-time capital of Chungking.

Informed Chungking quarters said they believed Japan might attack Russian Siberia before the summer is over, but declared that at the moment the Japanese were concentrating their air strength in the China and Burma theaters.

Japs Mass Planes  
Chinese army intelligence reports indicated that Japanese had now massed 500 planes in Burma—perhaps for an attack on India or on far southwest China—and had increased the number actually in China to 300.

The Chinese said there was no confirmation of rumors that the Japanese had shifted many planes from Southeast Asia and Occupied China to Manchukuo for an attack on Siberia.

However, many new airports were reported ready to receive eleventh-hour reinforcements for an assault on the Soviet, and the Kwantung army in Manchukuo was said to have been restored to its full strength of 33 divisions (about 600,000 troops) by the return of divisions which had been withdrawn for the Japanese drive into Malaya, the Philippines and the Dutch East Indies.

Gladden Tells Rotary Club Courtesy Will Build Good Will  
C. L. Gladden told Midland Rotarians Thursday that courtesy is needed to build good-will in Latin-American countries.

In an address at the club's meeting in Hotel Scharbauer, Gladden said America can be helped materially if each of us will be more courteous on visits to Mexico and other countries of Latin-America.

"Sometimes I think we have been more courteous to the people we now are fighting—the Germans—than we have been to any people on earth," he continued. "Americans are less thoughtful in Latin-America than any people on earth. Courtesy has as much to do with international good-will as anything else. When we go to Mexico, we owe the Mexican courtesy."

"Hitler made one of his worst mistakes when he sank the Mexican ship. We must have the respect and good-will of Latin Americans. They are ready to be our friends if we will accept them."

Gladden was introduced by Ily Pratt, club secretary. Tom Sealy, president, presided.

## Hitler's Nightmare

In the World War I the Kaiser was afraid of American manpower. In this war Hitler is even more afraid of American industrial power, according to reports from the American correspondents who were interned in Germany after Pearl Harbor and who were recently exchanged for Axis citizens.

Of all the obstacles in his drive for world conquest, Hitler fears most American war production—and no amount of propaganda can dispel that fear from the minds of the German people. They have been sold on the idea that this is a war on wheels, a battle of machines.

And they know that no nation can match the industrial genius of America. They and Hitler fear our mass production techniques, our engineering skill, our ingenuity and enterprise. They know that these have given this country the highest peacetime living standards in the world.

Today they realize that our gigantic assembly lines have stopped turning out automobiles, radios, and a thousand and one peacetime products. They've learned that those assembly lines are running now with accelerated speed, gaining momentum, concentrating on a single objective—building the tools we need for victory.

The job is far from finished. There is a lot of hard work ahead; we dare not let up for a moment. But we're off to a good start, and we're going strong. Our enemies are frightened, for today they know that we're beating them in the battle of war production.

## Still Popular

"Do we today have as much courage and determination as the men who founded this nation? Are we as ready to preserve it as they were to establish it?" Those are challenging words—words that every one of us needs to take to heart today. They were spoken by Walter D. Fuller, chairman of the board of the National Association of Manufacturers.

The truth is that while American manufacturers are concentrating every ounce of energy on production for victory, they are being attacked by those who have long sought to overhaul the patent system.

"We hear it said that the patent system was established 150 years ago, and consequently it must be out of date today. Well—marriage is older than that, but it is still popular."

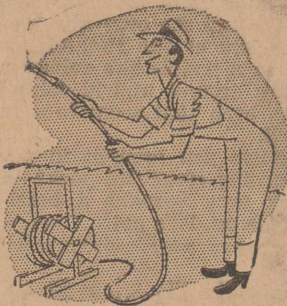

## House Expected To Abandon Sales Tax

WASHINGTON (AP)—A sales tax was conceded by its advocates Thursday to have only an outside chance of approval as the House Ways and Means Committee began putting the finishing touches on a tax bill which probably will produce about \$6,650,000,000 in new revenue.

Hoping to end its work in a week, the committee still has to vote formally on a sales tax and two other subjects—a post-war credit for corporations which pay excess profits taxes, and withholding of individual income taxes at the source.

In 1940, air transport accidents accounted for more than 10 per cent of all deaths in the U. S. Army.

and still studying. "The mathematics of bombing is very difficult, and hard to master. Hitting a relatively small target, miles below, when it may be traveling with you or in other direction, and when you yourself are going at a terrific speed, well, that is no easy job. It could be about like shooting a dodging jack rabbit with a Winchester while the bronc you rode pitched in circles.

"A bombardier's training must be so exacting, too. For if a bombing plane goes out on a mission and the bombardier fails, well, it has just been another ride. A bomber, until a bombardier gets abroad, is just a vehicle. But, when he gets

aboard that bomber becomes the most lethal weapon of the war."

General Kuter is visiting with General I. Davies, commanding at Midland Army Flying School, and with the "boys." One of the youngest generals of the United States Army, he is a graduate of West Point Class of 1927. He was first in the Field Artillery, but in 1929 asked transfer to the Air Corps, now the Air Forces, and completed his work at Brooks Field in 1929, and at Kelly Field in 1930. Since then he has been on active duty in the Air Forces.

In 1930 he began intensive study and practice in Bombing, and he has stayed steadily with that arm, and . . . well, he is here "just to fly around and be with the boys . . . I like this bombing business." The General and his party stopped at the Scharbauer Hotel.

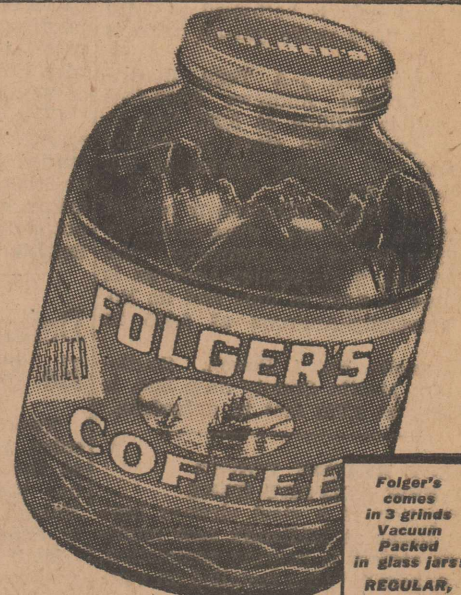

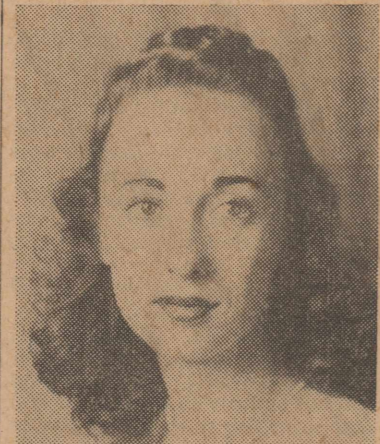
The wedding, which will be one of the brilliant affairs of the season, will take place July 11 in Trinity Episcopal Church.

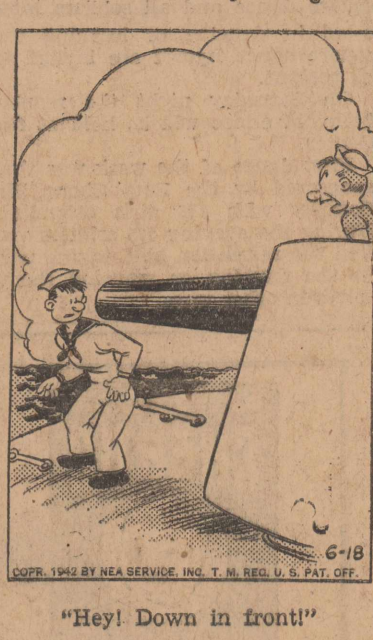

### Woolen Goods Prices Encourage Blending

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Office of Price Administration Wednesday issued a price ceiling order on woolen and worsted apparel fabrics which provides a price premium to induce manufacturers to blend at least 25 per cent of cotton or rayon in the materials.

The OPA action was seen as a move to assist the War Production Board in its efforts, pressed over a period of months, to induce mills to turn out blended instead of all-wool fabrics for men's clothing.

WPB was reported last week to be studying a compulsory blending order, but representatives of the industry were in Washington to offer an industry-sponsored compromise plan.

The new OPA ceiling, effective June 22, provides price maximums for five classifications of fabrics at the manufacturers' and wholesalers' level, leaving retail prices subject to the usual price ceiling.

### Midland Health Center 30 Percent Completed

The Midland Health Center, now under construction at the corner of Missouri and Colorado Streets, is nearly 30 per cent completed, it has been announced.

Walls of the building have been under construction for some time, and it is expected that work will begin on the roof soon.

### One Man Dies In Refinery Blaze

BORGIER (AP)—Burns received in a fire at the Phillips Petroleum Company refinery here proved fatal for F. C. Henthron, 28, plant stillman.

Damage estimated at \$100,000 resulted when the butane storage division of the refinery was destroyed.

Witnesses related that Henthron who had first dashed clear of the blaze, attempted to return to one of the butane storage tanks to close a valve when he was enveloped in flames.

Funeral services for Henthron will be held in Okmulgee, Okla., Friday.

R. R. Freund, also hospitalized, was reported improved.

## Vet Senior Golfers Welcome Freshman Knowles As Champ

College Ace Of 1907 Sets Meet Record At Ripe Old Age Of 55

RYE, N. Y.—What sports thrill is comparable to the conquest of youth—an 18-year-old Bobby Feller mowing them down with his fast ball, a 16-year-old Mel Ott breaking into the Giant lineup, a 55-year-old Ellis Knowles copping the United States Senior Golf Championship?

Hardly out of swaddling clothes, with the bounce of youth in his stride and an adolescent confidence in his eye, Ellis Knowles becomes one of the prize sports babies of the year. He won his title the first time he was eligible to compete. His 71-72-143 at Apawamis Country Club here breaks a 39-year record by five strokes.

This is his 43rd year of golf, but Knowles was a mere pipsqueak in the annual tournament conceived by the late Horace K. Hotchkiss in 1904. In fact most of the entrants referred to Knowles and runner-up George Rotan, also 55, of Houston as "bub" or "lad."

Senior golf competition is divided into five brackets: Class A—75 years and above; B—70 to 74 years; C—65 to 69; D—60 to 64; and E (from the French "enfant") for boys of 55 to 59.

Take Nathaniel Vickers, 95. A dignified gentleman with a white Van Dyke beard who is reminiscent of the traditional Confederate general. His 36-hole total, 129-123-252 (less handicap) distressed him no end.

"I can play this course in 10 to 15 strokes lower," he complains. "Why I had a 95 here five or six years ago."

No doddering duffer, Vicker stands ram-rod straight, plays with considerable alacrity. He holed out a 40-foot approach ("I can play that kind of shot") and scored a 5



on a 415-yard uphill test ("That's more like it").

"Why, when I was 82," he says, "I scored a 76 at Belmont Manor in Bermuda. Say, I must be getting

old. But watch me next year." This reporter refrained from inquiring about Mr. Vicker's draft status and the possibility of his induction in the interim.

In the older brackets, the aim is to shoot your age.

Fortunately, Knowles and Rotan had no such directive.

Knowles, a shipping executive was intercollegiate champion as a Yale undergraduate in 1907. Seven years ago, he shot Apawamis in 67, touring the back nine in a phenomenal 28.

"I only play week-ends," he points out, "but I'm hitting the ball farther than I did as an 18-year-old sophomore. I'm scoring better, too. I shot between 75 and 77 then. Now I'm sore if I'm above 75. I've been banging around par for 36 years."

He still hits tremendous drives with a 16 1/2-ounce brown Betsy, one of the heaviest in any golf bag.

"It keeps me from hurrying my backswing," he explains. "I'm an ox for strength."

That it brings results was indicated by his play on a difficult 502-yard uphill hole. He was on the fringe in two belts.

Great Texas Golfer  
Runner-up Rotan, first of the great Texas golfers, is a former National Amateur finalist, a member of the Walker Cup team which defeated the British at St. Andrews, Scotland, in 1923.

Yearlings Knowles and Rotan put new meaning in the Seniors' slogan: "Once a senior, always a senior, some time venerable but never aged."

As one old-timer stresses: "We're glad to have these kids. They'll give par a tussle every time. It helps our tournament to have youngsters like Knowles and Rotan shooting in the low 70s."

"No more of that six above par stuff for us."

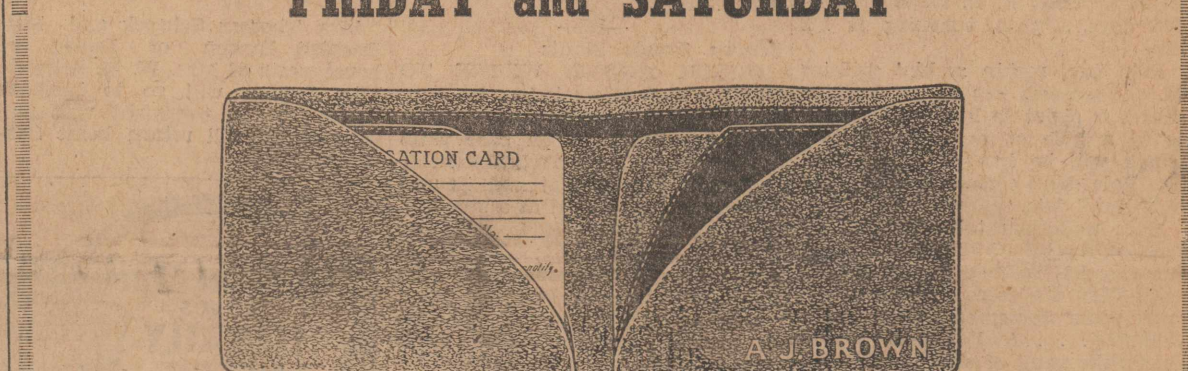

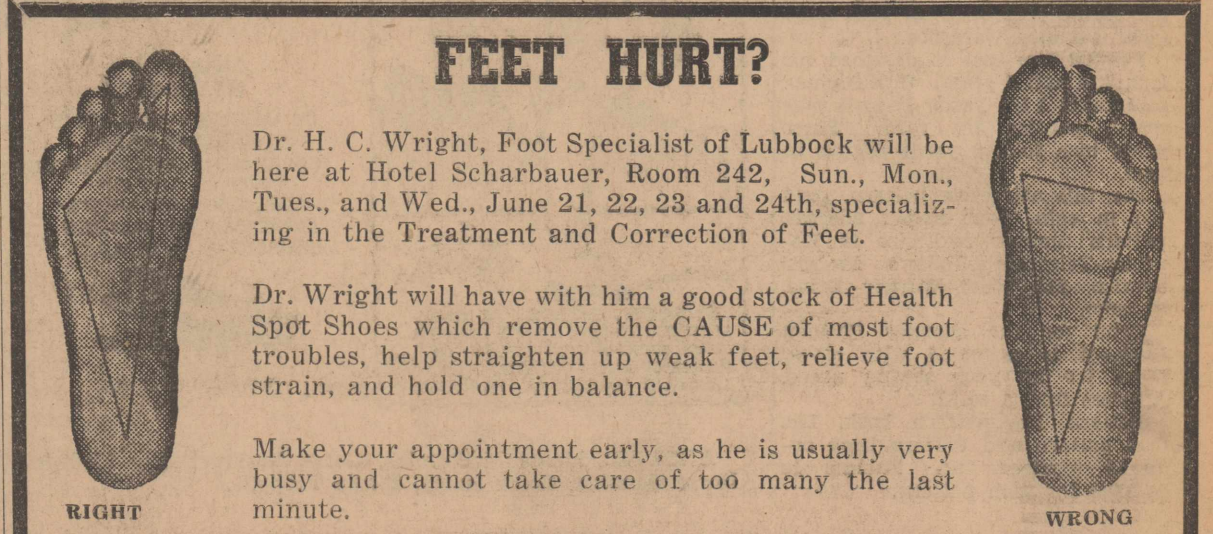

Declarer let the king of diamonds hold the first trick. East led a trump. South then led a club and East correctly led the queen win. The diamond was led to the ace and South ruffed out his third diamond. Then he took out trumps, discarding a spade from dummy.

Next he led the other club. When Perlestein, sitting West, produced the ten instead of the ace, declarer ducked and Perlestein held the trick.

At this point Perlestein led the king of spades. He saw that if he led low, or if declarer were left to develop the spades, the nine-spot finesse would be the normal play and would make the contract. The best defensive chance was for West to lead the king, as though he held the king-queen. The play worked, for the declarer held off, and then he was beaten.

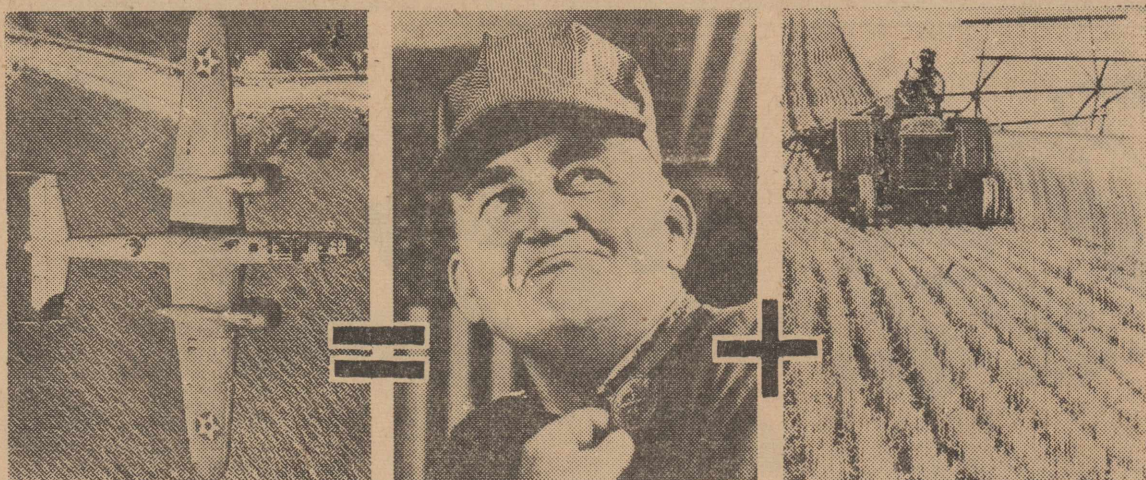

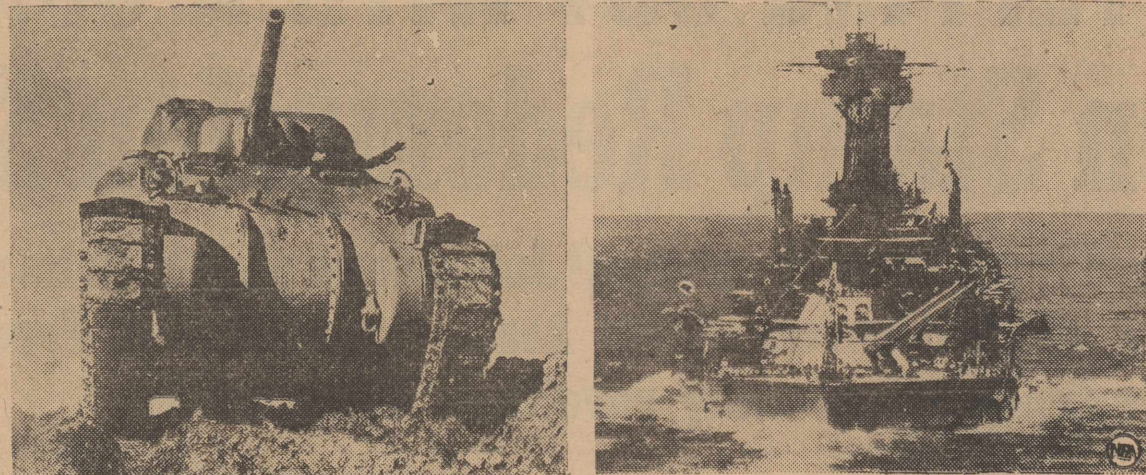

Mrs. Well-to-do-America, who has had a maid ever since her first baby arrived, may not have one long and she is wondering how she'll ever manage without "regular help."

Well, it might not be as tough going as she thinks. Some such women, tired of having to break in a new maid every few months as the girls get better jobs have already made up their minds to get along without help and have discovered it isn't as hard going as they thought it would be.

Let's take the case of Mrs. Jones, for an example. For the first time in years she is doing all of her own work.

The first week it just about had her licked, but at the end of it she sat down and decided to do a little head work. Thinking things over she discovered that she had depended on a maid for so long that she had let things get out of hand. Instead of living as simply as possible and cutting the housework to a minimum, she had let the job of housekeeping get harder and harder. That is often the way when someone else is doing the work.

She had let the family grow careless, too, about keeping their things in order and picking up after themselves. She had let them learn to expect a certain amount of being waited on.

So, she hired a strong-armed woman for a few days to help in getting her house organized. Then she worked out a schedule for herself, that allowed her a few free hours every day. She also let her family know that the era of carelessness and clutter was over. They would all have to cooperate by making as little work as possible.

She has only been doing her own work for a few months—but it is going along fine now. She has even discovered that there are some advantages to the present set-up. Cheerless Maids Were No Fun

Often the maids she had weren't efficient enough to suit her, and some of them were none too cheerful to have around. She doesn't have either of those problems to contend with now, and she really

enjoys having her house to herself.

Then, too, she finds that her family really appreciates the things she cooks for them—and she gets more satisfaction from their praise of a meal when she has cooked it herself. She thinks that having to help around the house is good training for the children. Though she could have had them help when there was a servant doing the work, somehow she never bothered with it. And, she can get out of all kinds of social activities that don't especially appeal to her, by saying she just hasn't time for them.

So, don't worry too much about getting along on your own. It may not be as dreary as you imagine.

WASHINGTON (P)—Petroleum Coordinator Harold L. Ickes announced Wednesday approval of plans for the construction of an 8-inch petroleum products pipe line across northern Florida, to help supply the Atlantic coastal areas as far north as Norfolk, Va.

The project was proposed by the American Liberty Pipe Line Company, Dallas, to be built with second-hand pipe evacuated in Texas. Ickes said the company now was negotiating financing arrangements with government agencies.

With a daily capacity estimated at 35,000 barrels, the proposed conduit would extend from Port St. Joe on the Florida Gulf Coast to Jacksonville on the East Coast, a distance of 220 miles.

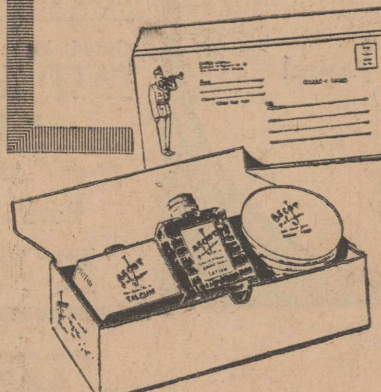

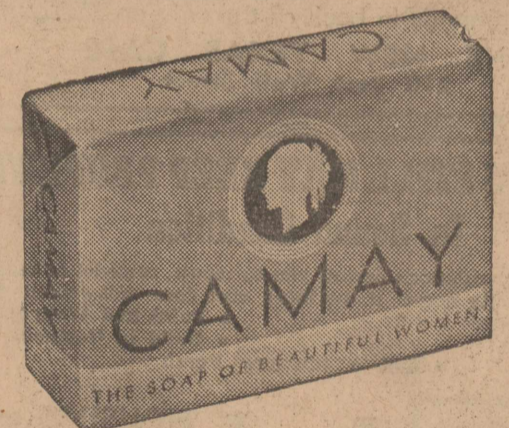
