Japanese Mass Bombers In Burma, To Attack India; While Chinese Say Japs Plan Blow At Siberia With New Army Of 600,000 Men By The Associated Press.

A picture of tremendously growing American strength in the Battle of the Pacific, where U.S. airmen have already exacted a 10-to-1 toll in Japanese men and planes, was drawn by Admiral Chester W. Nimitz, Thursday along with a hint that new sledgehammer blows against Japan are in the offing.

"We are greatly increasing our battle strength," Admiral Nimitz declared.

"Our ships, planes and pilots are being added in constantly increasing numbers."

Providing monthly cash payments for the injury, disability, death or enemy detention of civilians, the measure would establish the machinery for co-ordinated relief of wartime civilian distress on an emergency basis in areas which had suffered from bombing or other attacks.

Hitler's Nightmare

In the World War I the Kaiser was afraid of American manpower. In this war Hitler is even more afraid of American industrial power, according to reports from the American correspondents who were interned in Germany after Pearl Harbor and who were recently exchanged for Axis citizens.

Of all the obstacles in his drive for world conquest, Hitler fears most American war production-and no amount of propaganda can dispel that fear from the minds of the German people. They have been sold on the idea that this is a war on wheels, a battle of machines.

And they know that no nation can match the industrial genius of America. They and Hitler fear our mass production techniques, our engineering skill, our ingenuity and enterprise. They know that these have given this country the highest peacetime living standards in the world.

Today they realize that our gigantic assembly lines have stopped turning out automobiles, radios, and a thousand and one peacetime products. They've learned that those assembly lines are running now with accelerated, speed, gaining momentum, concentrating on a single objectivebuilding the tools we need for victory.

The job is far from finished. There is a lot of hard work ahead; we dare not let up for a moment. But we're off to a good start, and we're going strong. Our enemies are frightened, for today they know that we're beating them in the battle of war production.



"Do we today have as much courage and determination as the men who founded this nation? Are we as ready to preserve it as they were to establish it?" Those are challenging words—words that every one of us needs to take to heart today. They were spoken by Walter D. Fuller, chairman of the board of the National Association of Manufacturers.

Both official Washington and the general public continue to think of Germany's little northern ally differently than of any other Hitler associate. We have declared war on three Nazi stooge nations. Secretary Hull merely warns Finland to watch her step.

Home Sewing Easy If Directions For Pattern Followed Accurately

Sewing at home requires no special skill. You needn't be an expert in order to follow a dress pattern any more than you need to be a highly clear eyes, gleaming hair, scrubbed boaid chef in order to follow a new recipe. In sewing, just as in cooking, acuracy is all important

To begin with, select a pattern which is easy to sew. Many patterns are Hollywood. lesigned with beginners in mind and require the least possible fitting and he simplest of finishing YOUR PATTERN SIZE

First off, you must order the right size. Since pattern sizes and readyto-wear sizes vary, it is best not to judge the pattern size you require by that which you buy in ready-made dresses, but measure your figure(or the figure of the child for whom you plan to sew), and from the measurements, determine the size to order.

The bust measurement is the guide for mature sizes while collarbone to floor is the guide for small children's sizes. As we have pointed out before, begin with an easy pattern. As you buy the material for a dress, select at the same time buttons which will be atractive with it and, any trimming materials such as bias told tape, ric rac, edging or embroidered braid which is suggested. Also, you will need a spool of thread to match, possibly fasteners.

The woman who sews at home regularly has learned to assemble all of her needs before she starts any sewing project. You will find it most ef-ficient to follow this method, too.

Gasoline Stocks Hit Toboggan In **Past Few Weeks**

NEW YORK (A)-Gasoline stocks in the United States dropped another 1,311,000 barrels in the week ended June 13, the thirteenth weekly decline, the American Petroleum Institute announced.

The total at the end of the period was 91,994,000 barrels, compared with 93,305,000 in the preceding week and 91,431,000 barrels in the same week a year ago.

Total gasoline production, how-ever, was 10,389,000 barrels, against 10,310,000 last week, an increase of 79,000 barrels.

Crude oil production also increas-ed, rising 98,850 barrels to a total of 3,700,350 barrels, compared with 3,822,750 a year ago. The report showing daily average crude oil production (in barrels) in-






To Make 45,000 Tanks Takes 1,206,000,000 Man-Hours And Food From 1,935,000 Acres


