Red Lines Break At Kharkov Nazi Attack Opens Battle For Egypt Tanks Crush Defense

Heavy Bombardment Heard; Tanks Prayer For Victory Dash Down Border, Outflank British And Guidance In War As Major Battle Of Nile Shapes Up

Associated Press War Editor. A violent all-night bombardment by Axis artillery indicated that the battle of Egypt may already have started Wednesday as the British reported that "very strong" enemy columns of

tanks and motorized infantry were racing along the coast toward the Egyptian-Libyan frontier. While definite word was lacking that Field Marshal Erwin uation, the Governor said:

Rommel had launched his offensive into the ancient land of the Pharaohs, military observers*

pointed out that a heavy artillery barrage usually signals an imminent land attack.

Throughout the night, dispatches said, big Axis field guns shelled the British defense lines and enemy patrols stabbed repeatedly for "soft spots."

"Much enemy movement was observed southward from Gambut," British Imperial headquarters said.

Gambut lies forty-five miles west of the Egyptian border. A Cairo communique said British mobile columns roved the desert west of the main British lines Tuesday and engaged small Axis forces beyond Salum, Egyptian border port.

Casualties ran high, with 48 known dead and 87 missing in the Caribbean sinkings occurring between June 3 and 14; three dead and 85 missing in the June 15 sinking of a medium-sized U.S. mer-chant vessel off the New England Coast and five dead in the torpedoing of a British freighter the





Hoarded Silver

Out of Washington comes word that we are risking power shortages, which would slow down war production, because we can not spare copper from munitions for use in electricity installations.

The power shortages are problematical. They lie somewhere in the future. We may get by without increased power facilities. But we can not get by without shells for our soldiers and those of our allies.

Under such circumstances few will question the War Production Board's decision to take the shells now and worry about electricity later, if we have to.

But what burns up the WPB, and most others who know the facts, is this:

There is no need to risk having to shut down vital war plants for lack of power. We could have munitions and also plenty of electricity, if we put on the pressure.

The Treasury now possesses 120,000 tons of silver. There is being produced in the United States 2000 tons of silver each year. This could be used to assure the electricity we may need badly before long.


Silver is one of three metals particularly suitable for use as a conductor of electricity. One is copper-which is so inum output.

The third is silver, of which 120,000 tons lie idle in

less of the market, or up to \$1.29 if, by some miracle, the market price were to exceed 71 cents. Naturally, domestic Midland-silver goes to the Treasury, not to industry.

The Treasury is forbidden to sell silver, for any purpose, for less than \$1.29 fo reach troy ounce.






