Russia Blames Jap Sub For Sinking Of Ship Challenges Tokyo's Claim That U.S. Sub

Russia and Japan was fanned anew Friday as Moscow bluntly challenged Tokyo's claim that a United States submarine had torpedoed Soviet merchant ship, and pinne the attack on a Japanese underseas

The Soviet radio quoted survivors as saying two Japanese submarines surfaced immediately after the 4.-761-ton S .S. Angarstroi was sun' 32 miles off the Japanese coast

Japs Blamed America. Japan had charged the sinking was an American attempt "to create friction between the Soviet Union and Japan . . . obviously timed for provoking trouble."

"This version does not coincide with the facts," the Russian broad-Crewmen of a Russian freighter at Sydney, Australia, said they were attacked three times recently by a submarine believed to be Japanese.

The success story of the year in baseball concerns Morton Cecil Cooper of the St. Louis Cardinals, who is most likely to be the National League's starting pitcher in the All-Star game in New York
